Titus Walters: A passionate voice for Hamtramck has now been silenced

After battling ill health for the past several months, City Councilmember Titus Walters succumbed to a failing heart.

Walters, 52, died last Sunday while in hospice care.

Prior to being elected to city council in 2013, he served several years as president of the Hamtramck School Board.

He was passionate about Hamtramck and its children.

Mayor Karen Majewski said Walters "wore his heart on his sleeve."

"Titus ... loved his family, his students, his

church, and his community and he let that love guide him in everything he did," Majewski said.

"Few of us manage to touch so many lives in so short a time on earth as Titus has. I'm profoundly grateful for having had the opportunity to know and work with him over the years. The spirit of conviction he embodied will continue to be an inspiration and provide a role model for people of all backgrounds and generations. On behalf of the City of Hamtramck, I extend my sincere condolences to his family and loved ones. We will

City has a plan for streets

If you're a typical Hamtramckan, you probably think your street is a disaster.

Most of them are riddled with potholes and mounds of old patches coming apart.

For the first time in who knows when, the city now has a five-year plan outlining which streets will be repaired during that period.

Chances are, though, it's not likely going to be your street. Because of limited resources, the city can't possibly afford to repair anywhere near the majority of city streets during the next five years, considering that the estimated cost to repair a street is \$1.5 million to \$2 million per mile.

The city receives a little over \$1 million a year in Act 51 monies from the state to make repairs to streets. The city's road repair fund has a \$4 million surplus, which begs the question: Why have city officials been holding onto it instead of spending it on street repairs?

There are 37 miles of roads in Hamtramck and most of them are rated in fair to poor condition, according to a recent study performed by Hennessey Engineers, Inc.

It's an exhaustive re-

Debate is already taking place over who will succeed councilmember

So who will follow in the footsteps of Titus Walters on city council?

That question has stirred up a hornet's nest among some councilmembers since Walters died last weekend.

According to the City Charter, which speaks straightforward and plainly on this, it's the fourth place finisher in

the last general election. That election took place in November 2013.

But complicating matters is in that election there were two races, one for a four-year term and another for a two-year term.

Some councilmembers are arguing that the fourth place finisher in that election should be taken from the field of

candidates who ran for the term that Walters did. Using that formula it would be Rashad Almasmari.

The city is asserting, however, that based on a 2007 opinion by former City Attorney James Allen, when a similar predicament took place, the results from both elections should be combined.

Using that formula, lan

Perrotta will take Walters' place.

Councilmembers Robert Zwolak, Mohammed Hassan and Anam Miah aren't buying that version. They insist that since Perrotta ran for a different term in the 2013 election, the next person is Almasmari.

However, the city charter does not back that

all miss him deeply.”

Hamtramck School Board President Maggie Srodek credited Walters for helping her follow his role as board president.

“Titus was a mentor and a friend,” Srodek said. “It’s a great loss for both the school district and the city. He gave his all when it came to Hamtramck.”

Walters’ election to the city council was a historical occasion.

It had been 91 years since the last African-American (Dr. James Henderson) had been elected to the city council.

Technically, the first African-American (Ordine Toliver) to serve on council was back in 1920 when Hamtramck was not yet incorporated as a city and instead was a village.

Henderson served on the very first council (1922-1924) when Hamtramck officially became a city.

The only other African-American to serve on council was William Hood, when he was appointed to the position to fill a vacancy about eight years ago.

The black community has historically com-

prised about 13 percent of Hamtramck’s total population, but only a handful from that community have attempted to seek public office over the decades.

Walters downplayed the significance of his election, telling The Review:

“I never look at color, but I know the importance of it,” he said, and added: “You have to be a leader for the whole community.”

Walters was also a deacon at Corinthian Baptist Church.

While Walters had a deep devotion to the city and his church, he also at times displayed a fiery temper and could lash out at fellow elected officials.

However, if he felt he had crossed a line he would not hesitate to apologize. Walters was also critical of the constant in-fighting in Hamtramck politics and campaigned on a promise to end the division.

“We’re all God’s children, we’re all one people and we have to quit this,” he said at a candidate forum before being elected.

Funeral services for Walters will be this Saturday (Oct. 3), 10 a.m. at Corinthian Baptist Church, 1725 Caniff. Family hour starts at 9 a.m. before services.

On Friday (Oct. 2), viewing will be from 4 to 8 p.m. at Butler Funeral Home 12140 Morang in Detroit.

up. It simply says the next in line is the fourth-place finisher, or in other words the next highest vote-getter, said Allen in his opinion.

In a swirl of emails that circulated among councilmembers and the city administration, Zwolak further disputes whether tonight’s (Friday, Oct. 2) special meeting to declare a vacancy on council is even required.

He said the charter does not require a special meeting. He is correct about that, but a city ordinance, passed after the city charter was approved by voters, does require the city manager to call for a special meeting within five days of a council vacancy occurring in order for the council to officially declare a vacancy.

Zwolak goes even further, insisting that the city first receive documentation authenticating the death of Walters, even though the charter does not require that.

City Manager Katrina Powell stepped into the fray, saying that Zwolak’s emailing violates the state’s Open Meetings Act.

It was not immediately clear what the specific violation is, but it’s a good guess it’s about not allowing elected officials to “round robin” outside of a meeting.

Whether or not there will be a discussion on how to fill Walters’ vacancy on Friday is anyone’s guess. The sole purpose of the meeting is to adopt a resolution that declares a vacancy.

There is a comment period for councilmembers

after that, and the topic of who should be tapped could come up, but ultimately it is not up to the council to decide. That matter is handled by the City Clerk’s Office.

According to the City Clerk’s Office the next person in line to fill a vacancy is Ian Perrotta.

A registered letter will be sent to Perrotta to determine whether he is in-

terested in the job.

Zwolak is demanding that whoever fills the seat should first prove their residency by showing their driver’s license and proof of insurance, which is a step that is not required by city charter.

There is a little over two years left in Walters’ term.



Neighborhood Arts Festival returns 'bigger and better'

The summer may be over, but it's still festival season in Hamtramck.

Next week, on Oct. 10, the 6th Annual Hamtramck Neighborhood Arts Festival returns, and organizer Steve Hughes promises this year will be "bigger and better."

Since this is Hamtramck, this is no ordinary festival. There is no central location. Instead there are art happenings, which include music performances, dance, theater, crafts, and whatever else is happening in yards, porches, home studios, lofts and sidewalks throughout town.

"The festival is artist initiated," said Hughes, who also operates the Public Pool art space on Caniff.

On Saturday at noon, start off the day with bloody marys at Hamtramck's newest bar, Bumbo's, on Holbrook and Mitchell.

The festival then starts at the homes of artists who live south of Caniff and then later in the day it continues north of Caniff.

Some highlights include events at Lo and Behold on Jos. Campau near Belmont, and a pop-up beer garden next to it.

When does it end? Well, pretty much whenever.

The lore of Hamtramck ...

Polio was a fearsome foe

If you were a kid in the mid-1950s you might remember marching off to one of the schools in town on an evening to stand in line and be given a sugar cube or a shot.

Seems like an odd thing to do, but it may have been the most important thing you ever did in your life.

Those items contained the polio vaccine. Polio has been nearly eradicated today, although the virus probably will never become extinct. But most people born after the 1950s have an idea of the terror the disease inspired. And with good reason.

Polio is a devastating disease. If you got the bug and were lucky you might just end up with a mild case and just temporary paralysis of some part of your body, or no paralysis at all.

If you were not so lucky, you could spend the rest of your life in an iron lung, a

massive contraption that encased your entire body below the neck in which varying pressure forced your lungs to function. Or you could die.

Not a pretty picture. But it was a reality for many, even after the polio vaccine was introduced.

In September, 1958, the city was rocked by three cases of polio, all affecting children. Two of the children, a brother and sister, ages 3 and 4, were stricken while visiting Camden, N.J. They were transferred to Herman Kiefer Hospital for treatment. A third child, age 14 months, also was stricken and suffered slight paralysis. And there would be more throughout the year.

Polio inoculations were in full force at the time. In all, 3,887 school children were given the Salk polio vaccine in conjunction with the city's public and parochial schools.

Along with the school

program, some 1,500 preschoolers received the vaccine at the city Health Department.

Even so, Wayne County was in the midst of a polio outbreak at the time. In that outbreak some 400 new cases had been reported. On Sept. 16, the Detroit Health Department reported that 30 new cases had been reported including one death, bringing that city's total for the year to 365 cases compared with 141 for the same period the previous year. Eleven people had died, compared with two in 1957.


In one weekend 27 new cases were reported and 25 unconfirmed cases were being investigated.

There are still some residents who may remember the old wading pool that used to be at the southeast corner of Holbrook at Conant. It was a popular place to bring the kids. But polio is often water-borne, so the city eventually closed the pool and filled it in.

Even with the polio vaccine it took a while to contain the disease, though it finally was relegated to being a rarity. But while it reigned, it was a terrifying specter.

School district has shown it can manage well and think ahead

It was a banner week for the public school district.

Last week we reported that the school board OK'd a deal with the Detroit City Football Club to lease Keyworth Stadium and also that the district is now out of a financial crisis.

As we said last week, the Keyworth deal will mean some immediate upgrades to the aging stadium and the influx of 3,000 to 6,000 soccer fans each week during their season.

This is a win-win for the school district and the city, which will bene-

That seems to have trickled down to parents who continue to boost student enrollment. The district had braced itself for a drop in enrollment this year but instead saw it remain steady.

This is going to be an exciting school year for the school district, and if you are a parent who has not yet decided where to place your children, be sure to check it out.

Our schools are on a rebound.

City has a plan for streets

port, called a Transportation Asset Management Plan, that maps out a plan of attack for the city.

Most of our roads are asphalt, with just a little over 5 miles being concrete. That's unfortunate because concrete lasts much longer than asphalt.

In the good news side of things, the city has wasted no time in starting up repairs.

This year all of Hanley was milled down the middle of the lane and will soon get a new layer of asphalt. Just down the street at Goodson and Gallagher, a 200-foot section of Goodson will be re-

placed curb-to curb, and new water lines will be installed.

Next spring, it's Lumpkin's turn for a total reconstruction from Poland to Caniff.

Also next year Holbrook from Jos. Campau to Lumpkin will be reconstructed. That will cost \$950,000.

In 2017, Hamtramck Dr., which is nightmare to navigate without hitting a pothole, will be reconstructed from Jos. Campau to Conant. The cost: \$900,000.

After the next five years cycles through, there is a plan to repair eight more

sections of streets over a five-year period, unless something else pops up.

There are a couple of ways the city could speed up repairs by either finding new grants or asking voters to pass special tax millages to produce extra funding. The federal government has been issuing several grants over the past eight years to help communities build up infrastructure support, but it's unclear if that will continue.

And asking voters to pay more in taxes through a special millage is always a dicey venture.

Niczay said he expects the next round of negotiations to go smoothly. The team's season starts next April in their new home, Keyworth Stadium.


