

**Basement
flooding info
is needed**

By now, most residents have cleaned up after last week's massive basement flooding.

Plenty of folks were upset with the city's still faulty sewer system that can't handle heavy rains and leads to sewer backups in basements.

Although it's unlikely you would get anywhere suing the city for basement flooding since that's already been done and the city has agreed to take steps to correct the problem, there is another form of relief.

According to a notice put out by the City of Hamtramck, you can make a claim to recover costs of damaged or lost items caused by flooding.

You can find the claim form — "Sewer Overflow/Back-Up Claim" — online at: http://hamtramck.us/services_department/index.php

What is the chance of receiving compensation by filling out that claim form? Nada, or in other words, no chance at all.

That's because last week's flooding did not rise to the level of an emergency, at least what the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) considers an emergency.

But — and this is a big

A new tool for the city in eliminating neighborhood blight

For the past several years Albert Andrus has tried to get city officials to demolish a rotting abandoned house behind him on Belmont.

And for the same amount of time city officials have tried without success to find the owners of the house to force them to tear it down.

"It's a nuisance and hazard to our neighborhood," Andrus told The Review last June.

Andrus' wait will soon be over.

The city is about to take action, thanks to two new programs involving a landbank agreement with Wayne County and one that hooks up with a state

landbank.

In the next couple of months there will be another 20 or so blighted structures coming down.

The city recently joined with a state landbank to speed up the process for

the city to capture abandoned and dilapidated houses and have them demolished.

Community and Economic Development Director Kathy Angerer said she is about to submit a

list of properties that need to be demolished to a Wayne County Circuit Court judge, and with his approval within the next month a major chunk of blight will be removed.

The new deal with the landbanks cuts the red tape surrounding properties with complex ownership questions.

"From day one I said I'm going to get rid of our blight," Angerer said when she stepped into her job a few years ago. "It's one more tool to allow the city to combat blight."

An added benefit for the city is it doesn't cost anything to have the houses demolished. The landbank takes care of that. The only cost is a \$500 filing fee for each structure.

There's more good news for the neighbors who have had to endure the unsightly houses. They will have first dibs on buying the land the houses occupied.

If there are no takers, the state landbank will sell the lots to those who qualify as responsible property owners.

And if there is still no one interested in the property, the state landbank will maintain the lot and make sure it's not overrun with tall grass and weeds.

but - filing a claim will help the city track where flooding is happening. With this information, the city can make a good case for receiving government funding to tackle this problem. Plus, if the rains continue and it does get to the level of an emergency, your claim will already be on file.

So what's an emergency?

That's when flooding comes up to your living area. In other words, the water rises up through the basement and into the first level of your dwelling.

Homeowners weren't the only ones cursing out last week's heavy rains. Hamtramck City Hall also experienced flooding in the building's basement - about five feet worth.

Water also leaked down walls and damaged some furniture.

If you haven't cleaned out your basement yet, and need a helping hand there is good news.

The city is providing, through the Wayne County Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, "Muck-Out Kits."

The kits contain a bucket, mop, bleach and other materials that will be helpful when cleaning flood

damaged spaces. Kits are available at the City of Hamtramck Department of Public Services on a first-come, first served basis.

The city also has advice on how to proceed in cleaning up after a basement flood.

Obviously, wait for the water to recede before cleaning up.

• Make sure the power is shut off before walking in the water.

• Throw away food and medicine that became contaminated by the water.

Illustrator CS6. In November they will make posters that will be entered into the poster contests for the North American International Auto Show and the Society of Automotive Engineers.


Kosciuszko Middle School



In Our Opinion

Charter schools have proven to be a failure and a drain on finances

After 22 years can anyone say the charter school experiment has worked?

At that time the schools were promoted as a way for parents to expand their choices in how to educate their kids. Some thought the public schools were failing to do their job.

After all these years it's agreed that charter schools do not outperform public schools. What they do accomplish is siphoning off financial aid from public schools, thus dragging a number of districts down.

We suspect what was

at work all those years ago was a backdoor way of eroding the political might of public school teachers and their union, the Michigan Education Association.

In Hamtramck, the public schools once had enrollments of 5,000 to 6,000. With several charter schools operating here, that number has been whittled down to a little over 3,000.

Each student represents a little over \$7,000 in state funding. In all the district has lost over \$20 million. Not surprisingly that led to financial drain and budget deficits. The district was

forced to privatize many jobs and cut others.

Hamtramck Public Schools now enjoy a \$7 million budget surplus, but it came at a steep price. Teachers and other district employees had to take cuts in salaries and benefits, and they are still waiting for those cuts to be restored.

We think charter school students have lost out as well since the schools don't have the finances to fund all the resources public schools can afford.

It's time to quit this charade and end the charter school drain.


