With fingers crossed, Pope Park fundraiser reaches its goal and more

It didn't quite take a Hail Mary for the Pope Park fundraiser to meet its goal.

But it came close. The Karol Wojtyla Hamtramck Committee was crossing its collective fingers over the weekend as the final hours ticked down on Monday's deadline to collect at least \$25,000 by midnight.

Over the weekend the

fundraiser was still a few thousand dollars short of its goal.

As it turned out, the committee, through an on-line fundraiser, received more than it asked for, a whopping \$31,307 from 307 donors.

That means the Michigan Economic Development Corporation will kick in an additional \$25,000 as part of a matching

Folk artist who created 'Hamtramck Disneyland' has died

His whimsical inspiration has attracted thousands of visitors to Hamtramck for over 20 years.

Dmytro Szylak, the creator of "Hamtramck Disneyland," died on May 1 at the age of 92.

For decades his self-created

collection of whirligigs and found objects, which tower over his house and the one next-door on Klinger, has attracted visitors from near and far.

On any given afternoon it is not unusual to see a gathering in the alley be-

City fights back on legal fees

For \$500,000 more, the city could finally put an end to a 40-year-old housing discrimination lawsuit.

Michael Barnhart, the attorney representing plaintiffs in the longstanding housing discrimination lawsuit, is seeking a court order to force the city to make that payment.

He told The Review several weeks ago that the city still has three houses to go before satisfying an agreement reached years ago to build 200 housing units.

The city, however, has said it has reached that agreement and is now challenging Barnhart's motion in federal court.

City Manager Katrina Powell wouldn't release the city's motion in the matter because the city attorney said it was protected under attorney-client privilege.

The Review obtained a copy through the federal court in Detroit, and in fact anyone can see it through the court's website.

City Attorney John Clark did not return a call for comment.

Retired Federal Judge Damon Keith is still overseeing the case, which

was originally filed back in the 1970s.

So, what is in the motion submitted by Hamtramck City Attorney John Clark that the public supposedly can't see?

Clark points out in his motion that since 2011 Barnhart has been "paid close to a million dollars in legal fees, money which could have been used to finish the remaining three houses and finally bring

an end to this litigation."

Clark also stressed that the city is still under state receivership and ultimately "the city does not have the dollars" to fund the latest request.

Included in Clark's motion were city financial records breaking down payments made to Barnhart since 2011.

Asked to comment on Clark's motion, Barnhart declined, saying: "I think

it's really, really inappropriate to comment on a matter pending in court."

It is not immediately known when Judge Keith will decide on the motions.

City Councilmember Robert Zwolak, who has played a role as a city official in one position or another during much of the time the lawsuit has played out, said if the past is any guide, it's likely Barnhart will get his request.

"Everything has been a done deal," he said when it comes to granting Barnhart's requests.

Zwolak also questioned why the city has been paying Barnhart's legal fees since 2011, two years after the city's funding source for the housing development was closed down by court agreement.

"Where were they before?" he said. "I don't see where we have secure footing on this because we didn't intervene before."

Prior to a new city manager coming on board six months ago, the city was under the control of Emergency Manager Cathy Square for 18 months. Zwolak said he brought up the issue of Barnhart still being paid "but she (Square) wouldn't acknowledge it."

grant.

"Lesson learned: All you have to do is ask and people tend to be very charitable," said Tom Jankowski, the Chairman of the Committee.

"I'm very proud of the people who stepped up, even though it looked a little daunting," he added.

Fellow committee member Andrea Karpinski said many of the donations came in tens and twenties, which represented a true cross section of the community and former residents.

"I believed the community would come together to reach the goal," said Committee member Andrea Karpinski. "That's the whole concept of the project."

Kathy Angerer, the Director of Community & Economic Development, added:

"Hamtramck did it. So proud of our city, its residents and businesses and all of our friends who love Hamtramck. The Pope Park Patronicity Fundraiser was a huge success."

"The City of Hamtramck is grateful for all the support and thanks the many residents, friends and businesses who gave so generously to support the renovation of Pope Park. This project is a perfect example of how a community and government can work together in partnership."

With over \$50,000 from this fundraiser, \$20,000 from an earlier fundraising drive and \$30,000 from a state development grant, the park will receive a major makeover in the coming months.

Plans call for removing the iron gating to open it up, replacing the paving

and adding more greenery and improved lighting.

Money left over will go toward future maintenance of the park.

The park boasts one of the few monuments worldwide made to honor Pope John Paul II – the first Polish pope in history.

The Pope actually saw the monument during his historic visit to Hamtramck in 1987 when his motorcade sped down Jos. Campau (and we do mean sped!). A huge stage was built at the corner of Jos. Campau and Hewitt, which

was an empty lot then, where he spoke to a rain-soaked gathering.

It was one of three public appearances the Pope participated in during his visit to the metro area. He spoke here in Hamtramck on the importance of keeping your ethnic heritage, a fitting theme for a city that has always attracted newly-arrived immigrants from around the world, especially Poles during the early 1900s.

Pope Park has become a destination spot for visitors.

A celebration in honor of the birth of Buddha

Last Monday was a very special occasion for Hamtramck and Detroit's Bangladesh Buddhist community.

That was the day for the celebration of the birth of Buddha.

About 100 members of the community gathered at PNA Hall on Conant to commemorate the holiday. There were cultural dances, prayers and discussions on Buddha.

Also on hand were Mayor Karen Majewski, Public Schools Superintendent Tom Niczay and Review Publisher John Ulaj.

Mayor Majewski welcomed the gathering, saying: "Hamtramck is a city that welcomes people from all over the world. ... This is a city you can feel at home."

Both Niczay and Ulaj reminded those present of

an upcoming school millage renewal election on Aug. 4 and the need to support it.

Ulaj said he is a product of the public schools, which has also produced doctors and lawyers.

"It's a school district that welcomes diversity," he said.

Niczay warned that there was an anonymous flyer that was distributed before the special February Election in the community that falsely promised an extra \$500 in savings if the millage renewal was rejected.

Niczay reminded those at the hall that only a select few pay the millage: Those who own rental dwellings and those who own commercial properties. He said people who own their own home or rent do not pay the millage.

hind Szylak's house of students or visitors from overseas viewing his creation, which he continued to add to over the years.

It was - and still is - customary to pose in front of this giant artwork and have your photo taken, or as they say today: a selfie.

Szylak began assembling the piece in the early 1990s. It eventually grew to a proportion that caught the attention of city code enforcers who periodically threatened to tear it down.

It probably isn't easy either living nearby Szylak's house. The many whirlygigs loudly clang as the wind blows, and at night, it turns into a festival of lights.

He called the artwork "Hamtramck Disneyland."

As the years went by, there were fewer and fewer threats from the city as the number of visitors increased and national and international newspapers and magazines pumped out stories about Szylak and his artwork.

Scores of documentaries were also produced. Szylak became an interna-

tionally-known folk artist, and Hamtramck became a destination point thanks to his exposure.

If you lingered long enough, chances were Szylak would come out of his house and chat, sometimes asking for a donation of \$1. Often you could catch him high up on a ladder tinkering with the elaborate structure, adding new items and shoring up support beams.

When visitors stopped by, he always had a kind greeting and a smile. He seemed never to tire talking about his work.

Szylak was an immigrant from Ukraine and worked at GM for 30 years until his retirement.

In a short documentary by filmmaker Terry Murphy, which is posted on The Review website (www.hamtramckreview.com), Szylak has this to say about his creation:

"After retirement, I think about what I'll do. I make a hobby on two garages, on the roof. A lot of people come over. All countries, all world, (come) to see my Disneyland. And a lot

of people say, 'Incredible.' Everybody is happy."

Asked what should happen to his creation after his death, Szylak said:

"I don't know what happens when I no longer live ... Maybe (it) will stay forever. Maybe it depends how people like it."

Mayor Karen Majewski hailed the artwork as a "landmark and tourist attraction, as well as an expression of Mr. Szylak's life and artistic vision."

Szylak is survived by three daughters and a grandchild. It is not known what his family plans to do with his creation.

If his survivors aren't sure what to do, Mayor Majewski says the city is ready to help.

"(We're) committed to preserving this jewel, and the artist's legacy in Hamtramck," Majewski said.

Chris Schneider of Hatch, a Hamtramck art collective, said there are plans being drawn up to keep the artwork in Hamtramck.

Szylak's wife, Katherine, died in 2008. They are buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

Housing lawsuit is far from over for a handful of residents

We reported last week that while the longstanding Hamtramck housing lawsuit is about to wrap up, there are still some folks who have grievances.

The fact that this lawsuit isn't totally and completely over with is scandalous to say the least. The fact that there are still some plaintiffs who feel left out is outrageous.

In fact you know it's pretty bad if they had to come to The Review to get their story told.

While plaintiffs had to wait about 40 years before housing was built for them, others got a smaller deal that they feel was inadequate.

Yes, this lawsuit took 40 years before promised housing was deliv-

ered by the city. That's because the city simply had no funding to tap into until a few years ago, when the federal government stepped in and pumped millions of dollars to build new housing. However, some plaintiffs who weren't forced out by the city but who saw their neighborhood destroyed and blighted didn't get a new house to purchase with the help of generous subsidies.

Instead, they received renovations to their houses. The work, though, was shoddy and fell apart. These folks live in the Grand Haven-Dyardequindre neighborhood – the area just west of the I-75 divide.

They complain their attorney won't take their calls and wasn't any help

to begin with.

While plaintiffs waited for years to witness new housing, this attorney collected a lot of money representing them. In the last four years alone, according to city records, this attorney was paid over \$900,000.

That is an obscene amount of money made on the backs of folks who were discriminated against.

For that amount money, he should at least pick up his phone.

This housing lawsuit has cast a shadow over Hamtramck for years, and it now appears to be near its final end. However, there are still people who feel left behind who deserve to be heard.

Beware of auto insurance policy offers that sound too good

There's a new insurance scam aimed at low-income drivers in the Detroit area.

And if you're not careful, you could find your car towed or impounded during a traffic stop.

According to media reports, scammers are pretending to be insurance agents and are targeting those in the inner-city

with offers of a super-low auto insurance policy.

But unbeknownst to the would-be victims, the fake agent is using a legitimate policy that was purchased by a stolen credit card, or by other means, to acquire a proof of insurance card.

The card is then sold to the victim.

When insurance companies become aware of

the scam, they phone police with the license plate numbers that are associated with the insurance policy.

In Hamtramck, Acting Police Chief Anne Moise said cars associated with a fake insurance policy are generally impounded.

But there can be exceptions.

"Depending on the circumstances of each individual, the way they obtained the fraudulent insurance and the documentation they are able to provide, the investigators have asked the tow

company to give them some leeway and reduce the tow costs and the administration fees as well," Moise said.

She added: "They have not been issuing tickets or filing criminal charges against those with fraudulent insurance - even

though they could under the law. However this is an administrative process requiring those with fraudulent insurance to remedy the situation and provide valid insurance and valid license plates."


