
Quick Hits

City Manager Katrina Powell wanted to change that by requiring homeowners to first get a city inspection of the outside of their dwelling before selling it. Repairs that are needed would have to be made within 30-60 days. Who would be responsible for those repairs would be up to the seller and buyer. But that plan came to a dead halt at Tuesday's city council meeting. Councilmembers Anam Miah, Mohammed Has-



Organizers of the festival recently secured financial backing from the city's Downtown Development Authority, which promised to give the festival \$10,000 to cover expenses. This year's festival planning hit a bump in the road when the city manager demanded last year's police and maintenance bills be paid up front. That matter was taken care of, but it put a financial pinch on moving forward. With that matter behind them, organizers Konrad Maziarz and Shannon Lowell say they are ready to throw the city's biggest festival of the year. "I'm proud to be part of this festival and of all the people who come together with goodness in their hearts for the pure intention of working together to complete the very difficult task of creating a mo-



Lessons learned in 'Disneyland' fundraiser

 A big push was needed near the end of a 60-day fundraising campaign. The HATCH Art collective and a committee made up of local volunteers went into the final 48 hours needing to raise nearly \$13,000 to make its \$50,000 goal for renovations at Hamtramck

Disneyland. With the help of community and business leaders – donations coming from sales at restaurants and markets were in the thousands during the last week of the campaign – the Disneyland group crashed through its goal by raising over \$18,000 in the final two days. When the clock struck midnight during the celebration party at Trixie's, the final tally was \$55,170. There is a \$50,000 match coming as well from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) and Michigan State Development Authority (MSHDA). Over \$105,000 to invest in property improvements, project restoration and programming – HATCH plans to establish an international artist residency at the Disneyland site, as well as have public events – is a good bit of

istic" to demand homeowners to get everything up to code. He said many of the houses here are upwards of being 100 years old. He said just about every house in the city will have something that needs to be repaired.

City Manager Powell insisted the ordinance was needed to keep the housing stock in good shape and for the safety


of residents.

change to make positive things happen in Hamtramck.

There are valuable lessons to be learned from the success of this campaign, which might be used as an adjustable model for future community projects.

I was involved in the campaign from start to finish. As a media consultant, as a witness to Dmytro Szyrak's personal art journey from 1992 – when we met – until his death in 2015, and as a community member grateful to be part of an effort to preserve a local folk art treasure that has touched people around the world.

Here are some take-aways:

- The power in community building is obvious: it starts with belief in community life. Everyone associated with the campaign believed in the art piece, believed in preserving the legacy of the artist and believed in Hamtramck itself. Everyone played a key role, regardless of how much time they could give to

the project.

- The fancy term for this kind of effort is creative placemaking. Neighborhood and community identity – Disneyland and Hamtramck overall have plenty of that, yes? – is critical to this approach that sees inspiration and potential as foundations for growth of public life.

- Similar group efforts can be created for other needs in the community. A great example of people pooling their resources to activate public life is the North-East Investment Cooperative, established in 2011 in Minneapolis as a way to buy and rehab underused properties on a toothless commercial strip. Instead of complaining about storefronts on Jos. Campau that are vacant, why not create a community-driven syndicate of investors, buy some buildings and redevelop

them in ways that suit the place? Smart economic growth in Hamtramck is less about national chains, more about independent retailers that keep money in the community. Read more on the Minneapolis group here: <http://www.neic.coop/our-story/>

- The cooperative effort on this campaign between the art community and Hamtramck merchants – most importantly, leaders in the Bangladeshi and Yemeni

business communities – is a signal that more collaborations are coming. New relationships are forming. People are finding common ground in social and cultural life. An exhibition opening at Public Pool in September by contemporary Islamic artist Osman Khan is the next step in this process.

Finally, the committee offers its heartfelt thanks to the individuals and businesses that contributed to the Disneyland campaign. Not



City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days?
We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Aug. 9. Before the council meeting a work session was held.

During that meeting City Manager Katrina Powell said she removed a bill from the city's list of expenses. It was a legal bill from a law firm involved in a longstanding housing discrimination lawsuit filed against the city 50 years ago.

She said the city is challenging it.

Councilmember Ian Perrotta asked if the city is going to stop paying all bills regarding this lawsuit.

"We're reviewing them," said Powell.

Mayor Karen Majewski questioned the removal of five trees from Holmes. Powell said the city removes trees that are dead or damaged.

She said removing the trees reduces insurance claims filed against the city.

She added that the city is not replacing the trees.

A question was raised about rubble left behind from a party store fire on Carpenter. City Attorney Travis Mihelick said the city is waiting for money to be released from an escrow account.

The issue, he said, is being held up in federal court.

Mayor Majewski noted that other cities would not allow the debris to remain for as long as it has.

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski questioned what will happen to a house that caught on fire on Sobieski. She was told the city is seeking emergency demoli-

tion funds to tear it down and clear it out.

During the public comment section in the regular meeting, Robert Zwolak said the company that performs street patching does not clean up after it's done. He said there is a lot of loose gravel left behind which then gets into the city's sewer system and clogs that up.

He noted that there is an increase in crime and questioned if there is a program in place to combat it.

Several homeowners once again complained that their houses were unfairly targeted for an assessment increase. The homeowners were part of a housing discrimination lawsuit filed 50 years ago.

They insisted that their home purchase agreement, as part of a

settlement with the city, forbids the city from increasing their property values.

City Manager Powell said she will hold a meeting on this subject at a later date.

"Nobody wants you to lose your home," Powell said. "We want to help you but this isn't going to happen overnight."

However, she noted that there is a citywide reassessment taking place. She said there had not been a comprehensive assessment since the 1940s in some areas of the city.

Powell urged councilmembers and the public from engaging in negative comments made about city officials and the city on Facebook.

ment aside for celebration," said Lowell.

Once again, the festival will feature live music, food vendors, artist displays and games and rides. Festival hours are noon to 10 p.m. each day.

The highlight of the holiday weekend is the Polish Day Parade on Monday, Sept. 5 starting at 1:30 p.m. The parade begins at Jos. Campau and Holbrook and travels northward to Casmere.

Hamtramck's music line-up has earned the reputation of being one of the most adventurous, featuring the best in local rock and DJs. The music highlight of the weekend is the legendary rock/punk outfit, Black Merda, which plays on Monday at 9 p.m.

Everyone's favorite party band, the Polish Muslims will return at their usual slot on Sunday at 7 p.m.

The festival draws upwards of 80,000 visitors each year. Many of the festivalgoers spill over into local bars and restaurants. For those establishments, the festival weekend is one of the biggest money-making times of the year.

The festival's origin goes back to 1980 when the city's then-largest taxpayer and employer, Dodge Main, abruptly announced it was closing. The mayor

at that time, Robert Kozaren, decided the city needed a morale booster and quickly organized a festival.

It not only picked up the spirits of residents, it grew to become one of the largest Labor Day weekend festivals in the metro area.

Today, the festival's

main competition is the Arts, Beats & Eats Festival held in Royal Oak.

Unlike that festival, there is no admission charge here in Hamtramck. And unlike in Royal Oak, you won't find overzealous cops here handing out parking and traffic tickets.





Crime watch: House break-ins are on the rise

This summer's crime spree is still vexing residents and visitors.

During the past two weeks there has been a spike in house break-ins. There is no pattern to the break-ins and they occur at all times — including in the middle of the day.

Also occurring frequently are street robberies, usually involving two suspects.

Police Chief Anne Moise said that since

there is an ongoing investigation she could not talk in detail about the crimes.

"We're doing some mapping and trying to determine a pattern," she told The Review.

It's not unusual for an uptick in crime during warmer weather.

There has been one arrest for a break-in, Moise said, but she could not say if that suspect can be tied to other break-ins.

Moise said that for

the most part, residents are taking the correct precautions to keep their homes safe. In at least one incident, a suspect looked for a number of ways to break in, checking various windows and doors, all of which were locked.

Moise stressed that residents should not hesitate to call 911 when they see something suspicious, such as a person looking for ways to break into a house.

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at model-media.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

Part of the appeal of Detroit's Eastern Market, aside from its impressive array of vendors selling fresh food products, is its buildings. There's the barnyard-style sheds, storefronts on Market Street, and converted lofts—all housed in attractive brick.

But these beautiful old buildings, specifically the ones Eastern Market utilizes for food processing, need to be modernized to conform to new legal standards.

And if not for the proactive efforts of Eastern Market Corporation, this issue could have seriously undermined one of our region's most unique and cherished institutions.

Last year, Eastern Market Corp. engaged hundreds of stakeholders and urban planning firms from Detroit and London, England to produce a plan for guiding the expansion and redevelopment of the district through 2025. Instead of being threatened by the new law, it's using it as an opportunity to modernize.


Eastern Market, which made its plan available to the public, is pursuing two major initiatives: create an enterprise zone for food processing to retain existing processing companies

and recruit new ones, and serve as a broker between Southeast Michigan farmers and commercial consumers to bolster commerce.

"You have a lot of companies with a great family recipe, we get them licensed, they start to feel confident, and work their business. Then they're ready for the next stage of growth," says Mike DiBernardo, Eastern Market's director of Food Innovation Programs.

But Eastern Market wants to still be able to accommodate businesses looking to grow and those that would consider relocating to a food processing district.

Once riddled with potholes, city parking lots are now a smooth ride

Hamtramck's three city-owned parking lots are now a lot smoother to drive on. On Tuesday, the pot holes and cracks in the lots were spray-patched over.

City Manager Katrina

Powell said that so far the project has cost only \$1,000.

Coming up, she said, there will be striping for parking spaces and the return of parking meters.

Yes, you read that right. Say goodbye to free parking in city lots.

The city parking lot repair is part of a summer-long street repair program. The city has been tackling the problem a little each year. This year the following streets have been or will soon be repaved:

- Botsford from Jos. Campau to MacKay (full width)
- Trowbridge from Jos. Campau to Gallagher (center lane only except

for full width from Jos. Campau to alley)

- Casmere from Jos. Campau to Conant (full width)

Powell said that in the coming year she will begin to repave alleys, which have long been neglected. The city's engineering company has been tasked with determining which alleys need to be repaired first.


