Hamtramck High Class of 2017 earned \$5,402,068 in scholarship money

Scholarship Summary

This has been a very successful year for the Class of 2017 regarding scholarships and merit/need grants. 81 students out of a class of 178 (46% of the Class of 2017) received scholarships and/or merit and need grants. The total

amount of scholarships is \$3,991,430 among 59 students with the amount of merit and need grants being \$1,410,638. One student received a full scholarship to the University of Chicago valued at \$280,000.

The Class of 2017 received scholarship offers

from the University of Michigan Ann Arbor, University of Michigan Dearborn, University of Michigan Flint, University of Chicago, University of Detroit Mercy, Michigan State University, Wayne State University, Lawrence Technological University, Marygrove Col-

The Board conducted a "Board self-assessment" which was provided by the Michigan Association of School Board. The information gleaned from the self-assessment will enable the Board to know where they are in terms of Leadership, Academic Performance, Board Responsibilities, and Board Effectiveness, Data-Driven Decision Making, Community Engagement/Advocacy and Board-Superintendent of Relations.

The residents of Hamtramck are very fortunate to have these elected officials who are so very dedicated to doing the right thing for students. The future for Hamtramck Public Schools is very bright under their governance. The Board is ready, willing,

able and courageous to understand their strengths and commit to grow in areas that are not necessarily areas of strength. That is what effective leaders do.

The District is fiscally sound and is focused on making long term improvements for the safety and maintenance of our properties. During 2016-2017 the District made improvements to the Kosciuszko campus which houses Dickinson West Elementary and Kosciuszko Middle School by remodeling the cafeterias, kitchen, bathrooms, flooring and lockers. New security cameras have been installed in all schools, the Community Center as well as at Pulaski Park. Dickinson East had a new roof installed.

School Board and staff continue improvements

The Hamtramck Board of Education and Superintendent Niczay continue Board of Education Study Sessions to review, discuss and implement "ever-changing" Michigan Rules and Regulations effecting Board of Education school district governance. Superintendent Niczay continues to involve Dr. Leonard Rezmierski, Administrative Advisor to Wayne County Superintendents and Boards of Education. Dr. Rezmierski has over 50 years of experience in Michigan Public Education. The Board of Education 2016-17 adopted District Goals focus on four areas: Increasing the understanding of the financial realities, from all funding sources, "amongst all stakeholders"; Retain and Recruit the highest quality staff; Improve student proficiency in reading and math scores by 3% - 6%; and Increase the "Youth



Spring Concert




District Goals for 2016-2017

All students will successfully complete each grade level and/or course taken, demonstrating proficiency on local, state and national assessments.

- Increase understanding of the Hamtramck Public Schools revenue and cost structure amongst all stakeholders, allocate financial resources to meet District's educational goals and community recreational needs.
 - The recreation committee will conduct a review/study of Districts' Recreation Department with emphasis on eliminating deficit spending by implementing a comprehensive evaluation and goal setting system for revenue, expenditure, staffing, supplies and programming during 2016-2017.
 - Maintain District Fund Balance 10% from 2015-2016 as adopted by the Board of Education on May 12, 2016. Further support the parameters of a 12%-15% fund balance for the next five years.
 - Develop and implement an overall facility plan that incorporates Sinking Funds; Cafeteria Funds; Capital Funds; and General Funds; with emphasis towards potential or projected continued student growth with increased capacity options in the plan.
- Recommend and implement strategies to retain and recruit the highest quality staff members for Hamtramck Public Schools.
 - Establish a committee to review "best practices" to retain quality staff, while attracting candidates to fill vacated positions through District Teacher Job Fairs, Wayne RESA Aspiring Administrators Academy and a local University partner.
- Improve reading and math scores by 3%-6% on the District assessments.
 - Increase reading and math proficiency on State assessments by the average percent of statewide increase.
 - For EL students increase speaking, listening, reading, and writing scores on the WIDA and other local assessments by 3%-6%.
- Youth voice will be included in School Improvement Plans and the District Improvement Plan.

Special Services continues to serve students and families

The 2016-2017 school year has been the busiest yet for the Hamtramck Public Schools' Special Services Department. We have had staff from Dickinson East Elementary School present at prominent conferences within the county and state sharing her expertise on best practices for teaching math and English Language Arts concepts. Our School Psychologists and Speech Pathologists worked hard to educate parents and staff about the various disabilities and their functions of students, throughout various district meetings. Additionally, our Social Workers have assisted with the ongoing districtwide implementation of PBIS (Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports) and MTSS (Multi-Tiered Support System) at all HPS schools. Our department has really

helped to enhance the program offerings at all buildings and we are always working to increase the continuum of services offered for Hamtramck Public Schools' students with disabilities. The Special Services Department is full of teachers, paraprofessionals and support staff that work hard to maintain a level of care, compassion, and services that are unforgettable for the students and families

of Hamtramck Public Schools and it is our mission to improve and enhance with every passing year!

Our department's highlights for this year focused on our students with disabilities being able to experience increased academic success with more project based learning such as partnering with the Michigan Department of Career Development and Rehabilitation Services (MRS) to conduct Café' Friday's at Hamtramck High School; and having a student inducted into the Honor's Society at Hamtramck High School. Overall, the Special Services Department continues to reflect and adjust how we can continue to best service the students and families of Hamtramck Public Schools for our students to be the finest they can be and beyond!

School district's financial picture is in stable shape

As the end of the 2016/2017 school year approaches, Hamtramck Public Schools has a great deal to be proud of. We have a district fund balance of 26.62%, which far exceeds the 10% adopted by the Board of Education on May 12, 2016. As projected by our CFO Sherry Lynem, our general fund revenues have exceeded our expenses this budget year. Sources attributed to the increase in revenues include: additional \$2.44 million due to increased student enrollment; approximately \$886,529 from the passing of the Wayne County Enhancement Millage has been received to date; and our Title funding produced an additional \$866,346.

Nevertheless, along with additional revenues came additional expenses: increased staffing – two new administrator positions (district EL Director and Assistant Principal at Dickinson East) and two

additional custodians; added one additional bus for in-district bussing; absorbed Title funding shortcomings when Holbrook emerged from Priority School status; added \$100,000 to maintenance budget for general repairs; and added \$160,000 to the technology budget.

We were able to make considerable facility improvements due largely in part to sinking fund and cafeteria fund dollars. This

past year we expended \$1,816,570 sinking fund millage dollars to replace the roof at Dickinson East, remodel the bathrooms and walkways at Kosciuszko, install surveillance cameras throughout the district, and replace the boilers at Holbrook and Kosciuszko. A total of \$940,228 cafeteria fund dollars were spent fully renovating the cafeteria at Kosciuszko, including state of the art kitchen equipment. Our structural improvements are far from over, we have additional facility improvements planned for the 2017/2018 school year and beyond.

We appreciate the support of our community and will continue to be fiscally responsible stewards of the funds we receive. We will keep the residents of Hamtramck informed as we reinvent and revitalize Hamtramck Public Schools for the students, staff, and parents of our district.

helping our students to recognize that reading extends beyond the four walls of the classroom.



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English language learners get a helping hand

I am excited to be a part of the Hamtramck Public School District! The following information has been shared with all stakeholders in August of 2016 and I am proud to say that we are heading in the right direction. Last September, the English language learners (ELLs) made up 50% of the student population in the district. Currently, the ELLs make up 62% of the student population in our district. Since the student numbers continue to grow, it is a goal to ensure that all students receive adequate services to help them be successful as they develop English language proficiency skills. One of the ways to ensure success in the ELL Program is to work closely with administrators, teachers, parents, students and community members/ organizations.

Data Driven Decisions

Data was used to guide conversations and lead many efforts to making well informed decisions. Pahlka states that "our ability to do great things with data will make a real difference in every aspect of our lives". With this understanding, data is a vital part of the ELL Program. I have reviewed multiple and varied data (state and local assessments) to determine student placement, services for each student, and increase the staff per building/ per need and realign staff in the district. I am proud to share that all ELLs are receiving adequate services through their ESL teachers and additional support through paraprofessionals. Additionally, the data was used:

- to identify ALL ELLs in the district
- to identify levels of support for the ELLs
- to determine priorities in the district goals
- to implement professional development for staff in the focus areas
- to guide instruction

English Language Learners are a Part of the Global Society

Many of the ELLs are entering the United States from war torn countries. Some have left their families, their homes and their belongings. One of the program goals is to help students acculturate which is merging of their native culture with the American culture. Much research supports acculturation that is on a voluntarily level, it isn't forced upon a student. The administrators and teachers understand that each student is different and respect the students' individual needs and the students' ability to maintain their personal identity.

One of the ways to help the ELLs be a part of the school community was through the ELL Youth Voice and Engagement Committee at Hamtramck High School. The committee consists of 25 members who were selected by teachers. I wanted to get a perspective from a variety of students, so I did not make any academic or behavior limitations. I felt it was important to hear from an ELL student who was failing or did not show any academic growth. Also, it was important to hear from a student that may have had many school infractions. The committee meets once monthly.

Students expressed their school's strengths and its weaknesses during the first session. It was uplifting to see the committee members transform their thoughts and ideas throughout the school year. They addressed the weaknesses and made it a goal to turn them into strengths. Some of the issues the students tackled included improving the lunch procedures and selection as well as improving the restrooms. They met with directors and administrators to address these issues. Their input was shared with the superintendent, Mr. Niczay. I am looking forward to having the ELL Youth Voice and Engagement Committee in more schools next year.

English language learners participated in the Religious Diversity Journeys (RDJ) through The Interfaith Leadership Council of Metropolitan Detroit. The RDJ immersed 25 students from each participating school district in the Wayne and Oakland Counties. We had students from Holbrook and Kosciuszko visit a variety of houses of worship and learn about the customs and practices of each faith.

The ELLs in Hamtramck High School were led by ESL Math Teacher, Mrs. Livezey, participated in Henry Ford College Engineering Competition. The students worked in teams to develop a prototype and entered the competition. The students left earning 1st place and 3rd place. The senior in the team also received a HFC schol-

arship. We are looking forward to participating next year. Henry Ford College hosted the students for a field trip to the Engineering Dept. to look at a variety of engineering fields and meet with the professors.

Next year, Mr. Katopodis and I will be working to promote diversity and build tolerance at Hamtramck High School. We have plans for a, Hamtramck Talks, spin off of Ted Talks. Stay tuned for more details to follow.

ESL Teachers are Bridging the Gap

Michigan Department of Education requires that a certified teacher or a teacher willing to obtain an ESL endorsement are highly qualified to work with the ELLs. Since there is a shortage of ESL endorsed teachers in our district, I worked with Wayne State University to study the options for teachers to obtain their ESL endorsement. Dr. Hopkins from Wayne State University held an informational meeting for district employees seeking the ESL endorsement. Soon after, the district team and I worked together for a plan to support the interested teachers. The district is supporting teachers by covering 75% of the total costs. The ESL Cohort is growing and they have shared positive feedback after concluding their first course. Some have suggested sharing their experience and information with their colleagues.

ESL Teachers and I meet monthly except during the administration of WIDA. During our first meeting, we worked on an activity identifying the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOTs) in our district. This activity helped me understand much about the district and the program to develop a strategic approach to addressing the issues in a timely manner. It was important to understand where we were, where we want to be and how to get there. Best practices, program expectations, and compliance issues are a part of our monthly discussions.

The ESL Teachers have a lot on their plate from providing instruction to the ELLs, to working with the general education teachers, to working with the parents. It is important to know each building's ESL Teacher. Some teachers are testing coordinators since they must administer the WIDA Screener and lead the efforts for the annual WIDA assessment which are both language proficiency assessments. Some teachers are parent

coordinators and are responsible for working more closely with the parents.

Since our ELLs are growing, the ELL staff is growing too. I have added the English Language Development Specialist (ELDS) to our team. Currently, we have one in each school level. One of their responsibilities will be to monitor the Formally Limited English Proficient (FLEP) students, which is per Every Student Succeeds Act, for four years. Also, the ELDS will be working more closely with the general education teachers to help the ELLs become more successful in the general education classes.

Family-School Partnerships are Better Together

There is much research that indicates that parents involved in their children's learning is linked to an increase in: student achievement, self-regulations, less discipline issues and more positive attitudes. With this understanding and the results of the qualitative data that I collected in the beginning of the school year, I knew that many efforts must be on creating stronger partnerships between the families and schools. This was an expectation of me from the board and the superintendent. I am looking to get parent liaisons in some schools and a parent coordinator to support parents and students for next school year.

I worked with administrators to establish the "Principal Forums" which occurs monthly and relevant information is shared with parents while addressing school related issues. I started to work with some principals and then the principals soared. I was happy with the parent turn out in all the buildings.

Next, many families have sought out Adult ESL Programs at their child's school so I created the Family Literacy Program. It is running in Dickinson East, Dickinson West and Kosciuszko from 3:30-5:30 on Mondays-Wednesdays with Thursday as a planning day for teachers

and paraprofessionals. The program has a teacher that works with adults while the paraprofessional provides child care. The goal behind the Family Literacy Program is to teach life skills to the adults and to share strategies with the parents to help them work with their children on literacy. We have embedded PACT in the program, the Parent and Child Time, empowers parents to be an active parent in their child's education. This program has been very successful and I am looking at the data from this year's program to determine the growth for next year.

Welcoming Hamtramck Families was a successful event that the committee members, Mrs. Robie, Mrs. St. Germaine and Ms. Lisiscki and I worked hard to make a success. The goal of this event was to bring families together to become familiar with the educators, receive health services, learn about community organizations and have fun with their children. The ELL Youth Voice and Engagement Committee did and outstanding leading in a variety of roles and responsibilities. Indeed, it was a proud moment to see the educators at Hamtramck Public Schools, student leaders, and families and community organizations come together with the joint cause. Mr. Niczay would like to have this event again in the fall so be sure to join us!

This is my home away from home, I appreciate the administrators, teachers, paraprofessionals, families and students. I strive for excellence in everything that I do and I appreciate the continuous support of my colleagues, Mr. Niczay and the board members. There is still much ahead as I continue to refine the program, improve systems, and develop stronger relationships and partnerships with all stakeholders. I am grateful to be a part of Hamtramck Public Schools and look forward to continued success.


