

Conant celebrates, bigger future coming

Walking through the Bangladeshi festival – which last weekend celebrated its 20th year holding this event – brought back memories.

I was there for that first one, in 2000. It was a time of impressive growth for the local South Asian community, which began to invest in commercial and residential properties along the Conant Avenue corridor, in both Hamtramck and nearby Detroit neighborhoods in the 1990s.

A quick factoid to ponder: though most of the commercial activity rapidly shifted to Conant, the first shops and restaurants were on Caniff west of Jos. Campau.

The entrepreneurial Ahmed brothers opened the original Bengal Spices market in a storefront on Caniff between Fleming and Lumpkin; then across the street and down the block they opened Hamtramck's first Indian/Bangladeshi

restaurant, Taj Mahal, in the former PRCU (Polish Roman Catholic Union) hall. The same building now houses Ant Hall and Ghost Light Bar.

Shahab Ahmed, the youngest brother, entered politics and won a seat on the city council, becoming the city's first Muslim elected official. He earlier became involved in community life when he started the Caniff Avenue Improvement Project, bringing attention to an artery connecting I-75 with the central business district.

It was also in 2000 that I traveled to New York City to meet sociology professor Roger Sanjek of Queens College, who was tracking migration patterns and trends in the Elmhurst-Corona neighborhood of that borough.

He took me on a walking tour that included stops in Jackson Heights, where a fair number of new South Asian transplants to Hamtramck and Detroit had first lived after

arriving from Bangladesh.

His book, "The Future of Us All - Race and Neighborhood Politics in New York City," offered a glimpse of urban America to come in the new century. From the 1960s to 1990s Queens went from a majority white European population to a multiracial

South, Central and East Asia.

There were clear parallels, albeit on a smaller scale, to changes occurring in Hamtramck, once a majority Polish American city from the early 20th century to roughly the 1970s/1980s (once reaching over 80 percent

mix of people with origins in nearly every corner of the world, including Africa, Central and South America, the Middle East, and

of the resident population, current numbers stand at less than 10 percent claiming Polish ancestry.

Election coming up on Tuesday

Hamtramck's primary election is next Tuesday (Aug. 6).

The only item on the ballot is the race for city council. There are nine candidates vying to be the top six vote-getters to square off in the November General Election.

The, in the November election, the top three vote-getters will serve four-year terms, starting next January.

You can vote for three candidates in Tuesday's election.

Three incumbent councilmembers are seeking re-election, and they are: Anam Miah, Abu Musa and Saad Almasari.

They are being challenged by: Robert Zwolak, Nayeem Choudhury, Carrie Beth Lasley, Mohammed Hassan, Mohammed Alsomiri and Justin Jessop.

Some of the challengers' names should be familiar to voters.

Zwolak is a former city clerk for Hamtramck, and has also served before on city council. Hassan is also a former councilmember.

Both Choudhury and Al-

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

cestry.

My reporting appeared in The Citizen, which no longer publishes but remains archived in bound editions at the Hamtramck Public Library and the Hamtramck Historical Museum.

Anyone interested in these articles can ask to see the 2000 edition at those two locations. Un-

fortunately, there is no digital archive available.

As I walked up and down Conant last Saturday, I imagined the future of this vital corridor, now the focus of an ambitious development project by the City of Detroit.

Wide-ranging plans include the rehabilitation of buildings on Conant, Dequindre and the former

Transfiguration school building near Mound.

American Axle is putting \$5 million toward the neighborhood plan and a Bingham Farms-based housing development company is proposing the construction of a \$17 million, 50-unit apartment building on the northeast corner of Carpenter and Charest.

Streetscape Improvements are planned for the Conant business district, which extends on the Detroit side of the avenue from just north of Harold to Davison. It's unknown what Hamtramck's contribution to the streetscape

will be on the west side of Conant.

Also unknown is how the departure of influential chief City of Detroit planner Maurice Cox, who is leaving for a similar posting in Chicago, will affect the plans for Banglatown.

Cox was an advocate of the "20 minute neighborhood," where people can walk or bike to get basic needs met within that time frame. He expanded the number of planners employed by the city from around six to 36 in five years.

It's not accidental that redevelopment projects

are underway in several Detroit neighborhoods: there is a lot of talent behind the increased activity.

Some Banglatown improvements high on the list to consider would be bike lanes, curb and crosswalk improvements and traffic calming strategies to increase pedestrian activity and safer streets. Facade enhancements to existing businesses, and business recruitment and retention should also be on the list.

It also wouldn't hurt to create budgets for PR and marketing the region's most concentrated

Bangladeshi community. It is far too insular for a neighborhood and business district so unique.

When Conant throws a weekend party everyone in metro Detroit – over 5 million people live within a 50-mile radius – should be invited, the streets packed with visitors from near and far.

Let's keep our eyes on the future and see what comes in the years ahead. I sure will.

As 2020 Census gears up, the city can learn what to expect from past census counts

Now that Census 2020 is about to kick off, let's take a look at what the 2010 Census found out about Hamtramck.

But first, some historical perspective.

In 1990, the official head count was 18,372 – which many city officials considered to be an undercount by at least a few thousand.

For the 2000 census, the city administration at that time, under Mayor Gary Zych, got serious about getting an accurate count and formed a census committee.

The committee, headed by Shahab Ahmed, sent out volunteers to go door-to-door and encouraged residents to fill out the form.

That was not an easy task.

Hamtramck has long

been home to immigrants, and many of them come from countries where you can't trust the governments.

There is a fear among many folks that the information they provide will be used against them. That lack of trust is still alive today.

The effort, as daunting as it seemed then, paid off. The population count shot up by about 4,000, to 22,843.

In 2010, there was not much of an effort made by city officials, and the city's population dipped slightly, down to 22,423.

So, what did the 2010 census find?

Here are some of the stats:

Hamtramck's had a lot of younger folks. About 41 percent were 18 years old or younger.

Some 8 percent were 65

and up.

The male/female make-up was almost even, with females coming in at 49 percent.

A little over 50 percent were white, while Asians represented 24 percent of the population and the black community was 14 percent.

Some 42 percent of the city was foreign-born.

Hamtramck once boasted of having thousands of military veterans, but their number had dwindled to 371.

Housing-wise, about 50 percent of the housing stock was owner-occupied. Monthly rents were at \$672. Rents have since shot up in recent years to anywhere from \$600 to \$800 per month – if you can find a place. There were 6,158 households then.


Education-wise, 70 per-

cent of the population were high school graduates, while only 12 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher.

Here's a scary number: 50 percent of the city were living in poverty. The rest of us were not doing too well either, with a median household income of a little over \$24,000.

For those younger than 65, 16 percent were without health insurance.

Flash forward to today: city officials are now determined to get the 2020 count right, and a committee has been formed, with Virginia Skrzyniarz of the Piast Institute in charge of the effort.

**SUPPLEMENTAL BOND RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE ISSUANCE OF
ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM REVENUE
BONDS**

Minutes of a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, held in the City Hall, 3401 Evaline Street, Hamtramck, Michigan, on June 11, 2019.

PRESENT: Saad Almasmari, Ian Perrotta, Anam Miah, Abu Musa, Fadel Al-Marsoumi

ABSENT: Andrea Karpinski

The following Resolution was offered by Member Anam Miah and supported by Member Ian Perrotta:

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted on May 26, 2015 (the "Resolution"), the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan (the "City") authorized the issuance of its Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2015 (Michigan State Revolving Fund Program) in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$6,525,000 (the "Series 2015 Bonds") under Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), to finance improvements to the City's water supply and sewage disposal system (the "System," as further defined in the Resolution) consisting of the rehabilitation and lining of sewer mains, the construction of new sewer mains, the restoration of streets, rights-of-way and easements affected by the improvements and improvements to related facilities, as well as all work necessary and incidental to these improvements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, the Series 2015 Bonds were issued on September 17, 2015 in the aggregate principal amount of \$6,525,000; and

WHEREAS, the Resolution authorizes the issuance of Additional Junior Lien Bonds (as defined therein) of equal standing with the Series 2015 Bonds for, among other things, the acquisition and construction of repairs, enlargements, extensions, additions and improvements to the System in the discretion of the City; and

WHEREAS, the only Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) outstanding on the date hereof under the Resolution are the Series 2015 Bonds; and

WHEREAS, this Council does hereby determine that it is necessary to acquire, construct and install improvements to the System, consisting of the replacement of lead water service lines, the restoration of property, streets, rights-of-way and easements affected by the improvements, and improvements to related facilities, as well as all work necessary and incidental to these improvements (the "2019 Project"); and

WHEREAS, the cost of acquiring, constructing and installing the 2019 Project is estimated to be approximately Eight Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$880,000); and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to supplement the Resolution at this time and to authorize the issuance of one series of Additional Junior Lien Bonds to defray the cost of acquiring, constructing and installing the 2019 Project, and to sell such Additional Junior Lien Bonds in a private negotiated sale to the Michigan Finance Authority (the "Authority") as authorized by Act 227, Public Acts of Michigan, 1985, as amended ("Act 227"), in order to enable the Authority to provide assistance with respect to the 2019 Project from the proceeds of the Drinking Water Revolving Fund ("DWRF") (the "Program").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, as follows:

Section 1. 2019 SUPPLEMENTAL RESOLUTION. This resolution (hereinafter referred to as the "2019 Supplemental Resolution") is adopted in accordance with Section 22 of the Resolution and pursuant to the authority in Act 94.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS. Except as provided in the preambles hereto and except as hereinafter provided, all terms which are defined in Section 1 of the Resolution shall have the same meanings in this 2019 Supplemental Resolution. In addition, the following terms shall have the following meanings in this 2019 Supplemental Resolution:

(a) "Authorized Officer" means the Mayor, City Manager or Controller of the City, or any one or more of them.

(b) "Issue Date" means the date on which the Series 2019 Bonds are delivered to the original purchaser thereof.

(c) "Contract Documents" means the Purchase Contract between the City and the Authority, the Supplemental Agreement by and among the City, the Authority and the State of Michigan acting through the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, and the Issuer's Certificate for the Series 2109 Bonds, or such other closing documents required by the Authority for the issuance of the Series 2019 Bonds.

(d) "Series 2019 Bonds" means the Bonds authorized in Sections 5 and 6.

Section 3. NECESSITY, PUBLIC PURPOSE. It is hereby determined to be necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the City to acquire and construct the Improvements to the System in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications therefor prepared by Hennessey Engineers, which are hereby approved.

Section 4. ESTIMATED COST; PERIOD OF USEFULNESS. The cost of the Improvements has been estimated by the engineers not to exceed \$880,000, including the payment of legal, engineering, financial and other expenses, which estimate of cost is approved and confirmed, and the period of usefulness of the Improvements is estimated to be greater than forty (40) years.

Section 5. ISSUANCE OF BONDS. To pay a portion of the cost of designing, acquiring, and constructing the Improvements and to pay the legal and financial expenses and all other expenses incidental to the issuance of the Series 2019 Bonds, the City shall borrow the sum of not to exceed \$1,100,000 and issue its revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The Series 2019 Bonds shall be issued in the aggregate principal sum of not to exceed \$1,100,000, as finally determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale, or such lesser amount thereof as shall have been advanced to the City pursuant to the Contract Documents.

During the time funds are being drawn down by the City under the Series 2019 Bond, the Authority will periodically provide the City a statement showing the amount of principal that has been advanced and the date of each advance, which statement shall constitute prima facie evidence of the reported information; provided that no failure on the part of the Authority to provide such a statement or to reflect a disbursement or the correct amount of a disbursement

shall relieve the City of its obligation to repay the outstanding principal amount actually advanced, all accrued interest thereon, and any other amount payable with respect thereto in accordance with the terms of the Series 2019 Bond.

Section 6. SERIES 2019 BOND TERMS. The Series 2019 Bonds shall be issued as one fully registered manuscript bond, shall be sold and delivered to the Authority in any denomination. The Series 2019 Bonds shall be dated the date of delivery to the Authority, or such other date approved by the Authorized Officer, and shall be payable on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale provided the final maturity shall be no later than thirty years after the date of issuance. The Series 2019 Bonds shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 3.00% per annum as determined by the Authorized Officer, payable semiannually on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale.

Notwithstanding the above, the final amount of any maturity and terms of the Series 2019 Bonds shall be as provided in the Contract Documents and will be finally determined by the Authorized Officer.

Section 7. PAYMENT OF SERIES 2019 BONDS; CONFIRMATION OF STATUTORY LIEN. The principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Series 2019 Bonds shall be payable solely from the Net Revenues, and, to secure such payment from the Net Revenues, the statutory lien upon the whole of the Net Revenues established by Act 94 and the pledge created in Section 6 of the Resolution is hereby confirmed in favor of the Series 2019 Bonds as follows: such lien shall be a second lien of equal standing and priority with the Series 2015 Bonds, but junior and subordinate to the lien of all to be issued First Lien Bonds.

The Series 2019 Bonds, including both principal and interest thereon, shall not be a general obligation of the City and shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City for the purpose of any debt limitations imposed by any constitutional or statutory provisions.

Section 8. PRIOR REDEMPTION. The Series 2019 Bonds issued and sold to the Authority shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity upon the terms and conditions set forth in the form of Series 2019 Bonds contained in Section 11 hereof.

Section 9. PAYING AGENT AND REGISTRATION.

(a) Appointment of Paying Agent. From time to time the Authorized Officer shall designate and appoint a Paying Agent, which shall also act as transfer agent and bond registrar. The initial Paying Agent shall be the City Treasurer. In the event of a change in the Paying Agent, notice shall be given in writing, by certified mail, to each Registered Owner not less than sixty (60) days prior to the next interest payment date. The Paying Agent shall keep the official books for the recordation of the Registered Owners of the Bonds.

(b) Registration of Bonds. Registration of the Bonds shall be recorded in the registration books of the City to be kept by a Paying Agent. Bonds may be transferred only by submitting the same, together with a satisfactory instrument of transfer signed by the Registered Owner or the Registered Owner's legal representative duly authorized in writing, to the Paying Agent, after which a new Bond or Bonds shall be issued by the Paying Agent to the transferee (new registered owner) in any denomination, in the same aggregate principal amount as the Bond submitted for transfer. No transfer of Bonds shall be valid unless and until recorded on the bond registration books in accordance with the foregoing. The person in whose name any Bond is registered may for all purposes, notwithstanding any notice to the contrary, be deemed and treated by the City and the Paying Agent as the absolute owner thereof, and any payment of principal and interest on any Bond to the Registered Owner thereof shall constitute a valid discharge of the City's liability upon such Bond to the extent of such payment. No Bond shall be transferred less than fifteen (15) days prior to an interest payment date nor after the Bond has been called for redemption.

(c) Authority's Depository. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Resolution, this 2019 Supplemental Resolution or the Series 2019 Bonds, so long as the Authority is the owner of the Series 2019 Bonds: (a) the Series 2019 Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States; (b) the Series 2019 Bonds are payable as to principal, premium, if any, and interest at The Bank of New York Mellon Trust Company, N. A., or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the City by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository"); (c) the City agrees that it will deposit with the Authority's Depository payments of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Series 2019 Bonds in immediately available funds by 12:00 p.m. (noon) at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise; in the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the City's deposit by 12:00 p.m. (noon) on the scheduled day, the City shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment; and (d) written notice of any redemption of the Series 2019 Bonds shall be given by the City and received by the Authority's Depository at least 40 days prior to the date on which such redemption is to be made.

Section 10. SALE OF BONDS. The Series 2019 Bonds shall be sold to the Authority. The City determines that a negotiated sale to the Authority is in the best interest of the City because the terms offered by the Authority are more favorable than those available from other sources of funding.

Section 11. BOND FORM. The Series 2019 Bonds shall be in substantially the following form with such completions, changes and additions as may be required by the Authority or as recommended by the City's Bond Counsel and approved by the officers of the City signing the Series 2019 Bonds:

A., or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the Issuer by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository"); (b) the Issuer agrees that it will deposit with the Authority's Depository payments of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on this Bond in immediately available funds by 12:00 p.m. (noon) at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise; in the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the Issuer's deposit by 12:00 p.m. (noon) on the scheduled day, the Issuer shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment; and (c) written notice of any redemption of this Bond shall be given by the Issuer and received by the Authority's Depository at least 40 days prior to the date on which such redemption is to be made.

This Bond, being one fully registered manuscript bond, is issued in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended and a resolution adopted by the City Council of the Issuer on May 26, 2015, as supplemented on June 11, 2019 (as supplemented, the "Resolution"), for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the System. The Bonds of this series shall have equal standing with any Additional Junior Lien Bonds that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution, and additional bonds of superior standing to the bonds of this series may be issued pursuant to the Resolution.] [If bond issued as First Lien Bond: The Bonds of this series shall have equal standing with the Issuer's First Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution and the lien securing this Bond is superior to the lien on the Net Revenues securing Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution.] For a complete statement of the revenues from which, and the conditions under which, this Bond is payable, a statement of the conditions under which additional bonds of equal or superior standing may hereafter be issued, and the general covenants and provisions pursuant to which this Bond is issued, reference is made to the Resolution.

Bonds of this series may be subject to redemption prior to maturity by the Issuer only with the prior written consent of the Authority and on such terms as may be required by the Authority.

In the event of a default in the payment of principal or interest hereon when due, whether at maturity, by redemption or otherwise, the amount of such default shall bear interest (the "additional interest") at a rate equal to the rate of interest that is two percent above the Authority's cost of providing funds (as determined by the Authority) to make payment on the bonds of the Authority issued to provide funds to purchase this Bond but in no event in excess of the maximum rate of interest permitted by law. The additional interest shall continue to accrue until the Authority has been fully reimbursed for all costs incurred by the Authority (as determined by the Authority) as a consequence of the Issuer's default. Such additional interest shall be payable on the interest payment date following demand of the Authority. negotiated sale to the Authority, as authorized by Act 227. The Commission determines that the sale and delivery of each series of the Series 2019 Bonds to the Authority as provided in this 2019 Supplemental Resolution will provide the City with the lowest cost of borrowing money for the 2019 Project. Each sale shall be made pursuant to the terms and conditions to be set forth in a Purchase Contract (the "Purchase Contract") and a Supplemental Agreement (the "Supplemental Agreement") related to such series. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute and deliver each Supplemental Agreement and each Purchase Contract in such forms as shall be approved by the Authorized Officer, with such approval to be evidenced by the Authorized Officer's signature thereon. Notwithstanding any other provision of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution, the Series 2019 Bonds shall be initially sold to the Authority as one bond, numbered 1, in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$1,100,000. In addition, the Authorized Officer and other City employees and officials are authorized to execute and deliver to the Authority and such certificates and documents as the Authority or bond counsel shall require and to do all other things necessary to effectuate the sale, issuance, delivery, transfer and exchange of the Series 2019 Bonds in accordance with the provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute any orders, receipts, agreements, pledge agreements, documents or certificates necessary to complete the transaction, including, but not limited to, any issuers certificate, any certificates relating to federal or state securities laws, rules or regulations, and any revenue sharing pledge agreement. The Authorized Officer is authorized to seek a credit assessment, or similar, from Standard & Poor's or another nationally recognized rating organization and to execute and file any applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury, including an Application for State Treasurer's Approval to Issue Long-Term Securities and any

other applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury and to seek any waivers from the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Section 13. TAX COVENANT. The City covenants to comply with all requirements of the Code necessary to assure that the interest on the Series 2019 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. The Authorized Officer and other appropriate officials of the City are authorized to do all things necessary to assure that the interest on the Series 2019 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

Section 14. EXECUTION OF BONDS. The Mayor or the Mayor Pro Tem, and the Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the City, are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Series 2019 Bonds, either manually or by facsimile signature, on behalf of the City. Upon execution, the Series 2019 Bonds shall be delivered to the purchaser upon receipt of the purchase price or upon compliance with the terms and conditions of the related Purchase Contract.

Section 15. CONSTRUCTION FUND. The City Treasurer is hereby directed to create and maintain a construction fund for the 2019 Project (the "Construction Fund"), into which the proceeds of the Series 2019 Bonds shall be deposited. Such moneys shall be used solely for the purpose for which the Series 2019 Bonds were issued. Any unexpected balance in the Construction Fund remaining after completion of the Improvements may be used for such purposes as allowed by law. After completion of the Improvements and disposition of remaining Series 2019 Bond proceeds, if any, pursuant to the provisions of this Section, the Construction Fund shall be closed.

Section 16. SERIES 2019 BOND PROCEEDS. The proceeds of the sale of the Series 2019 Bonds shall be used solely to pay the costs of the 2019 Project and any engineering, legal and other expenses incident thereto; provided that the City Council shall not authorize the payment of any such moneys for acquisition and construction of any part of the 2019 Project until there shall have been first filed with it by the consulting engineer in charge of such work, a written statement to the effect that the sum so to be paid is in full or partial payment of a contractual obligation in connection with the 2019 Project and that the City has received the consideration for such payment. The statement of the consulting engineer shall also show the cost of acquisition and construction of the 2019 Project that has theretofore been approved by him for payment and the amount of the balance that will be required for completion of the 2019 Project.

Section 17. DEFEASANCE. In the event cash or direct obligations of the United States or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by the United States, or a combination thereof, the principal of and interest on which, without reinvestment, come due at times and in amounts sufficient to pay at maturity or irrevocable call for earlier optional or mandatory redemption, the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on any of the Bonds, shall be deposited in trust, this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be defeased with respect to such Bonds (the "Defeased Bonds"), and the owners of the Defeased Bonds shall have no further rights under this 2019 Supplemental Resolution except to receive payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the bonds from the cash or securities deposited in trust and the interest and gains thereon and to transfer and exchange bonds as provided herein. Defeased Bonds shall be treated as if they have been redeemed for all purposes under the Resolution and this 2019 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 18. CONTRACT WITH BONDHOLDERS. The provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall constitute a contract between the City and the Bondholders from time to time, and after the issuance of any of such Bonds, no change, variation or alteration of the provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution may be made that would lessen the security

for the Bonds. The provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be enforceable by appropriate proceedings taken by such Bondholder, either at law or in equity.

Section 19. PUBLICATION AND RECORDATION. This 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be published once in full in a newspaper of general circulation in the City qualified under state law to publish legal notices, and the same shall be recorded in the records of the City and such recording authenticated by the signature of the City Clerk.

Section 20. RESOLUTION SUBJECT TO MICHIGAN LAW. The provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution are subject to the laws of the State of Michigan.

Section 21. SECTION HEADINGS. The section headings in this 2019 Supplemental Resolution are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be a part of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 22. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this 2019 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 23. RATIFICATION OF RESOLUTION; CONFLICTING RESOLUTIONS. The Resolution, as supplemented by this 2109 Supplemental Resolution, is hereby ratified and confirmed. All resolutions or parts thereof, insofar as the same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict; provided, that the foregoing shall not operate to repeal any provision thereof, the repeal of which would impair the obligation on the Series 2015 Bonds or the Series 2019 Bonds.

Section 24. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RESOLUTION. Pursuant to Section 6 of the Act, this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be approved on the date of first reading and this 2019 Supplemental Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.

somiri have run before for council. Alsomiri is renovating the former Shopper's World building on Jos. Campau and Yemans.

This year, the election laws have changed. If you are an unregistered voter, you can now still register on election day and then cast your vote.

You must be at least 18 years old to vote, and if you wish to vote in Hamtramck, you must be a resident.

Also, you can vote by absentee ballot now, without stating a reason. Voting by AV ballot used to be reserved for those who were seniors, or those who were unable

to get to a precinct to vote.

So far, 956 absentee ballots have been mailed out, which City Clerk August Gitschlag said is about average.

Since June 1, some 261 new voters have been registered, which again Gitschlag said is par for the course.

He figures about 80 of those voters were inspired to register because of this election.

There are about 9,000 registered voters in Hamtramck, and in the past few years about half, or nearly so, of them have actually gone on to vote.

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on June 25, and all councilmembers were present. Mayor Karen Majewski was absent.

During the public comment portion of the meeting, former city councilmember Cathy Gordon complained that there are no handicap parking spaces on Jos. Campau.

A resident who lives near city hall said residents in the area should be able to park overnight in the city hall parking lot. He said there is a lack of parking in the area.

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski said the issue has never been brought

up, but agreed that "it makes sense" to allow residents near city hall to do that.

Bill Meyer complained that a house next door to him on Belmont St. is about to fall apart.

Resolutions to install stop signs at Lumpkin and Edwin, Casmere and Charest, and Lumpkin and Norwalk were approved.

Councilmember Karpinski said the stop signs "are really needed," especially the two near Pulaski Park.

Councilmember Anam Miah also applauded the resolutions.

"I have no problem putting in more stop signs,"

he said.

City Manager Kathy Angerer said these three stop signs "are the beginning of an entire citywide approach" to addressing traffic safety concerns.

"We're phasing this in really carefully," she added.

In another matter, the council OK'd a resolution to allow a kiosk to be installed inside city hall. The kiosk will allow people to pay their city bills 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

It will be installed in the front entrance of city hall, which is unlocked around-the-clock, all days of the week.

Hamtramck has a lot to gain in Census 2020

Census 2020 is about to gear up this fall, and as usual, it's a unique chance for Hamtramck to get its full share.

That's a full share in state and federal revenues, that is, or in other words: money and development projects. We're talking about things like more money to repair our streets.

There is a lot at stake, and we agree with city council candidate Robert Zwolak that the city – all residents included – needs to step up for the once-every-10-year population count.

It is estimated that each person counted is worth about \$1,800 in revenue.

Hamtramck has proved in the past that it can rise to the challenge. For the 2000 census count, the city administration at that time organized, and then had a committee formed to get the word out to the neighborhoods.

That effort paid off well. The city's population count went from about 18,000 to 23,000 – a total that was, and still is, short of the actual number of folks who live here. It is estimated Hamtramck has approximately 27,000 people living here.

It's not easy to convince people of the importance of the census. And there are some who are fearful that the infor-

mation they provide will somehow be used against them down the road.

Census information is private, and is not shared with government agencies.

This year, the city administration has appointed Virginia Skrzyniarz of the Piast Institute to head up the volunteer effort.

When forms finally arrive, we will need a lot of volunteers out on the streets, going door-to-door, to urge residents to fill out the census form.

You'll be hearing a lot more about this effort in the months to come. In the meantime, spread the word.

Sexual assault suspect is apprehended and charged with felonies



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

City Finance Director Susan Hendricks gave an update on the city budget. She said there had been some savings from not filling several vacant positions.

Legal costs, however, shot up because of lawsuit settlements, she said.

In the future, she said, the city will not be receiving drug forfeiture funds, which are already drying up.

A discussion was held on awarding a contract to Super Construction, Inc., a Bay City-based company, to install new water lines to houses where road construction is taking place on Holbrook, and also on Caniff next year.

The contract was worth over \$663,000.

During the second public comment portion of

the meeting, former city councilmember Robert Zwolak said the city is "double-dipping" by including a sanitation fee on water bills.

He said there is already a separate tax for sanitation.

Zwolak also warned that the new garbage transfer station will attract more truck traffic, which will tear up the street where it is located. The site is located on Christopher St., off of Conant, south of Holbrook.

"Christopher St. was not constructed for that kind of traffic," he said.

Cathy Gordon spoke again, saying that the new stop signs won't be effective.

"What makes you think they'll (drivers) stop?" she said.
