## Hamtramck Schools Superintendent talks about the new year

With the new school year starting for Hamtramck Public School students, we asked district Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed to give an overview of what to expect with the coronavirus pandemic still spreading.

As you likely already know, this school year will largely be a continuation of at-home learning.

Here is part one of our interview with the superintendent.

**The Review: Briefly, please recap the plans for school this fall.**

Superintendent Ahmed: For the 2020-2021 school year, HPS will be implementing virtual learning for the majority of students and learning labs for our most at-risk learners.

All HPS students will have access to our high-quality instructional staff

and curriculum, as well as a multi-tiered system of support that includes a focus on social and emotional well-being as well as necessary technology devices needed to support learning.

**The Review: Will students be able to go to their school at any time during the school day for help/assistance? Do they have to make an appointment? Will teachers and support**

staff be at the schools?

Superintendent Ahmed: Currently, the majority of HPS students are participating in virtual learning. They are being supported by our excellent staff, and while we are not offering in-person assistance at this time, students and families can always connect with their teacher or principal for additional help.

Our team of Parent Liaisons is also available to assist. Each HPS school building will host learning labs for students with greatest need, including students with IEPs and 504s, English Language Learners and newcomer students.

Teachers facilitating the learning labs will be at the schools, as well as necessary support staff. The majority of our teachers are instructing from their homes at this time.

**The Review: What about special needs students (including those with learning disabilities and behavioral issues)?**

Superintendent Ahmed: We will do our best to meet the goals outlined in IEP's. Learning labs will be used as a way to provide supplemental, in-person instruction for students with IEPs, 504s, EL 1 and newcomer students. Invitations will be sent to these students, who, if they are comfortable attending, will be provided an in-person schedule.

**The Review: And what about those students who are still learning the English language? What is the plan for them?**

Superintendent Ahmed: Our team of parent liaisons worked through the summer to ensure our EL families


Two planes flew into the buildings, which were considered a symbol of America's strength. That led to the buildings' collapsing under the tremendous heat the explosions caused.

## City names new stadium infield in honor of a legend

There is more action at Hamtramck's historic baseball stadium.

Not only is there a new infield, the field now has an honorific name: "Norman 'Turkey' Stearnes Field."

Stearnes is a legendary player who played in the Negro Baseball League back in the 1930s, when

African-Americans were barred from playing in the all-white Major Leagues.

He played with the Detroit Stars, who's home field was Hamtramck Stadium.

According to the National Baseball Hall of Fame website, Stearnes was one of the best hitters in his league.

## Voters are being warned

Don't even think about voting twice.

Recently, President Trump came under criticism for encouraging voters in North Carolina to vote twice: one by absentee ballot, and again in person.

He's suggesting this as a way to test the honor of the system, and whether communities can actually catch those who attempt to vote more than once, media reports said.

It's not clear if the president was entirely serious, but his comments did raise alarms.

It is illegal to knowingly vote more than once in an election. In fact, it is a felony in most states.

Hamtramck City Clerk August Gitschlag blasted out a message on his Facebook page warning residents about the consequences of voting more than once.

"It is illegal to vote more than once in an election. I will catch you, your extra vote won't count, and I will refer you for prosecution," Gitschlag said.

He has been joined in this warning by Michigan Attorney General Dana Nessel, who sent out this email warning:

"Let me be perfectly clear: voting twice is illegal, no matter who tells you to do it. The president's idea is a great one for people looking to go to jail," said Nessel. "My office will prosecute to the fullest extent of the

He was born in 1901 in Nashville, and it is said he got his nickname "because of the unusual way he ran, which resembled that of a turkey, with his arms flapping. However, Stearnes himself claimed

it was because he had a potbelly as a child," the Hall of Fame website said.

Stearnes died in 1979, and was elected into the Hall of Fame in 2000. He has family that still lives in Detroit.

The stadium is currently under renovation, which will include repairing the grandstands, which fell into disrepair over the last few decades.

Funding for the renovation is coming from both grants and online fundraising. The importance of the stadium wasn't known until several years ago, when local baseball historian Gary Gillette and his organization, Friends of Historical Hamtramck Stadium, did exhaustive research on it and discovered its historical legacy.

That research has been used to secure grants.

The state of Michigan has designated the stadium as an official historic site.

Councilmember Ian Perrotta, who has worked on researching the stadium's historical importance, said the naming of the field in honor of Stearnes "is a great opportunity to recognize one of the best players of Negro League Baseball."

Another improvement coming to the stadium and field is a commitment from the city to regularly assign at least three police patrols in the area, to make sure vandals don't damage the site.

That's something that has plagued the stadium for years. There have been occasional reports of people driving on the field, and other incidents of fires being set in the grandstand.

The pledge to step up police patrols was promoted by a city council resolution introduced by Councilmember Perrotta.

The reason for the resolution, Perrotta said at an earlier council meeting in a resolution he proposed, is to make it "imperative for the City of Hamtramck to show a buy-in of the project by committing necessary resources to ensure the project's success and show major donors and partners of the project that the City of Hamtramck is capable of taking the required steps to preserve Hamtramck Stadium and the surrounding area. ..."

law anyone who intentionally flouts our election laws."

Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson also chimed in with this response:

"Our election system has been stress-tested by three successful elections already this year, and in all of them proven that it is absolutely safe and secure," said Benson. "We have protections in place to ensure election officials track and verify every ballot they send and receive, and, in every instance, we ensure that each person gets only one vote."

Michigan voters will be heading to the polls on

Nov. 3. Voter turnout for this election is expected to be huge, because it is a presidential election.

Gitschlag said, this week, that absentee ballots should be ready in the coming weeks.

Locally, Hamtramck voters will be faced with filling four school board seats as well as the state representative position for the district that includes Hamtramck.

Hamtramck resident Abraham Aiyash is the Democratic nominee in the state representative race, and he is expected to win the seat, since a majority of Hamtramck voters have voted Democratic for generations.

## Mayor laments the cancelation of the Labor Day Festival

Once again, Mayor Karen Majewski had bad news about COVID-19 cases in Hamtramck.

As of Monday, for the second week in a row, the number of cases has gone up – from a total of 460 last week to 503 – an increase of 43 cases. The number of deaths for the year remains at 26 here in Hamtramck.

That was the latest update the mayor gave in her weekly Monday morning address to the community, via Facebook.

Monday, of course, was Labor Day, and Majewski said this year's holiday

weekend was noticeably less festive.

In fact, there was no annual Hamtramck Labor Day Festival – only the second time in the event's 40-year history that it has been cancelled.

"This year is a Labor Day unlike any other," Majewski said.

The festival was canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic. The city's growing number of COVID-19 cases, Majewski said, "just underscores why we had to cancel the festival this year."

And if that wasn't

enough of a letdown for many, Hamtramck also lost one of its most colorful characters, Alan "Tex" Booker, who died sometime this year.

(There have been no details available about his death.)

The mayor said that, even when the festival returns next year (fingers crossed), "we'll miss him."

As for the festival organizers and volunteers, the mayor had nothing but praise.

"There's no festival like the Hamtramck Festival," she said.

Continuing on the theme of the virus outbreak, Majewski stressed the importance for residents to wear masks while out in public, and to maintain social distancing.

The mayor said there are still reports of businesses here that are not enforcing those rules. She asked that residents call the city to report

those businesses that are snubbing the safety rules.

"Don't feel like you're snitching on people," she said. "Be each other's keeper."

Another weekly subject she has brought up is the Census count.

It's still not going well in Hamtramck.

Only 56 percent of the households have responded to the once-every-10-year national population count.

While the city's official population count from 2010 puts us at a population of 23,000, there is widespread belief that the true count is closer to 30,000.

Federal funding and congressional representation are based on the Census. Majewski said that, in order for the city to claim its fair share, residents have to participate in the Census.

If few people respond, she said, "it won't tell the story of Hamtramck."

### Approval of Amendments to the Hamtramck Business License

#### Ordinance: Section 110

Changes made to the ordinance include setting due process for license revocations, changing the renewal due date from June 31<sup>st</sup> to May 31<sup>st</sup> and associated late fees, and requirements for an additional license for firework sales.

### Approval of Amendments to Chapter 130

The changes made allow the City to bill property owners for services performed to remove graffiti.

had access to resources and technology. We recently held an in-person orientation to help our families navigate the challenges of remote learning.

Additionally, newcomers and EL students are eligible to participate in our learning labs where

they will receive in-person instruction.

### The Review: Talk about how students can get breakfast and lunch.

Superintendent Ahmed: Our Eat Up and Meet Up program is continuing at multiple locations throughout the community; families should contact their principal or school staff for exact times and pick-up locations. We are providing breakfast and lunch meals in various locations. We are also seeking to move to a 7-day meal program, which will provide students with three breakfast and lunch meals on Fridays.

### The Review: How will the district conduct its yearly headcount?

Superintendent Ahmed: Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed into law Public Acts 147, 148, and 149. Under these new laws, Hamtramck Public Schools will demonstrate student membership accordingly.

Satisfying the membership requirement through a count day method is dependent upon the type of schedule that a student will maintain throughout the 20-21 school year.

Our pupil accounting department is working with Wayne RESA and the Michigan Department of Education to ensure that membership requirements are satisfied for students in grades K-12 who are enrolled at Hamtramck Public Schools.

### The Review: What is the plan for the winter semester?

Superintendent Ahmed: As always, the health and safety of our students, teachers and staff is our top priority. At this time, we are monitoring the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and currently evaluating plans for the winter semester.

We are continuing to utilize guidance from the CDC, the State of Michigan and the Michigan Department of Education in the creation of our winter semester plans. Our planning will continue to be led by the HPS Budget and Restart Team, which includes parents, teachers, staff members, administrators and members of the HPS leadership team.



### City officials need to step up in securing festival

Normally in this week's issue you would see scenes from last weekend's annual Hamtramck Labor Day Festival.

Normal is no longer normal in the age of COVID.

The pandemic has caused a lot of events to be canceled this year – both nationwide and locally.

The Labor Day Festival is also on the list of casualties.

Of course, the loss of events and sports and concerts pale in comparison to the number of deaths this horrible disease has caused. At this point it is over 190,000.

Our heart goes out to the families of those who've died.

Perhaps, there is one good thing this disease

has brought about: we can now review what is really important to all of us.

And that should include the future of the Labor Day Festival.

We'll say this again, like the proverbial broken record, but there needs to be a serious look taken at how this festival is handled.

Organizers have been volunteers over the years, and all of them did outstanding jobs – considering the huge odds they have face.

Every year, we are at the mercy of both the weather and the fickle tastes of festivalgoers.

Somehow, the festival squeaks by financially. But if there is ever a year when the festival is a total rainout, its future would be in grave doubt.

So, we will once again plead for city officials to take a greater role in backing this festival. It is clearly an important event for the city, and helps greatly in promoting Hamtramck.

It is an asset, but it is treated at arms-length by city officials.

Instead of distancing themselves, the city should embrace this festival and give it the financial security it deserves.

Volunteers work tirelessly, around-the-clock, and it is ridiculous to expect that.

We would hope that city officials – and we're looking at the city council here – will roll up their sleeves, and take a closer look at how to make this a more civic-backed event.

### Virus update: Governor eases up on some virus closings

Gov. Whitmer signed another couple of executive orders on Wednesday, Sept. 3, finally bringing some long-sought relief to many of the state's gym owners and public pools.

Additionally, school sports – both the practices and games – have been given the green light, something many coaches, athletes, parents and fans have been loudly clamoring for.

High school football season returns Sept. 17 and 18.

Soccer teams have already resumed play.

Frustratingly for some of us, movie theaters, as well as live theaters and concert venues, remain shuttered at this point, although there has been some talk afoot that this could also change very soon.

The governor, again invoking her mantra of following "the best science and data available," urged prudence.

"I urge everyone who plans to hit the gym after these orders go into effect to take these precautions seriously and do everything in their power to protect themselves and their families," Whitmer said.

"Be smart, and stay

safe," she added.

Michigan's chief medical executive and Department of Health and Human Services Chief Deputy for Health, Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, weighed in as well.

"Individuals can now choose whether or not to play organized sports, and if they do choose to play, this order requires strict safety measures to reduce risk," she said.

## City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Aug. 25, and all councilmembers were present.

City Manager Kathy Angerer gave her bi-monthly update on the Census, and how residents were responding.

She said Census workers are now going to households that did not submit their forms. She said the workers will have an ID badge with their photo included.

In another matter, Angerer talked about a training program being offered by the Michigan Economic Development Corporation. The training in question addresses gentrification, and how to prevent it.

What is gentrification? According to information provided to council, it is defined this way:

"Gentrification is a general term for the arrival of wealthier people into an existing urban district, a related increase in rents and property values, and changes in the district's character and culture. The term is often used negatively, suggesting the displacement of poor communities by rich outsiders."

However, not all aspects

of gentrification are undesirable, according to the information sheet.

"Who wouldn't want to see reduced crime, new investment in buildings and infrastructure, and increased economic activity in their neighborhoods? Unfortunately, the benefits of these changes are often enjoyed disproportionately by the new arrivals, while the established residents find themselves economically and socially marginalized.

"Gentrification has been the cause of painful conflict in many American cities, often along racial and economic fault lines. Neighborhood change is often viewed as a miscarriage of social justice, in which wealthy, usually white, newcomers are congratulated for 'improving' a neighborhood whose poor, minority residents are displaced by skyrocketing rents and economic change."

A short presentation was made by a member of the Huron River Group regarding the city's recreation plan. The plan calls for joint action between the city and the school board.

A meeting between the

two public bodies was held on Sept. 9.

In the public comment portion of the meeting, Kit Parks congratulated the city for taking steps in dealing with gentrification. She said that Hamtramck rents have increased.

In another matter, she criticized the police department for traffic control during a recent march through southend streets in support of Yemen.

She said organizers of the march had traffic under control, and that the police presence was a waste of money. She questioned the police chief's decision for assigning officers to the demonstration.

A number of speakers spoke in support of Councilmember Ian Perrotta, who was the subject of a proposed censure by some of his council colleagues.

The censure was regarding his treatment of a city hall employee, and the foul language he used.

(Perrotta admitted to using "cuss" words, and has apologized to the employee.)

# Wayne State students unearth Hamtramck's past

Bits of broken glass, beads, rusty old iron nails and even marbles may seem to be no more than scrap, but they also can be clues to the past.

That's why Wayne State University Professor Krysta Ryzewski has brought a second crew of students to continue an archeological dig at the site of the old Hamtramck Village Hall on Jos. Campau and Grayling streets.

The students are following up on a dig done at the site in 2018.

Built in 1915, the decorative building once housed the Village of Hamtramck police and fire departments and various village and city offices for decades until it was demolished in the 1970s.

It wasn't the only building to occupy the site between Alice and Grayling Streets. Years ago, there was a tin shop on the north corner of the lot. The infamous Nut House bar was nearby also. And, even before 1913, there was a house on the southwest corner of the site, on Alice Street.

It's mainly that piece of real estate that brought Ryzewski, and her anthropology students studying Archeology Field Methods, back to do another dig.

"This modest site contains a trove of invaluable information about the individuals who once lived here," the students wrote, in their summary report on the earlier excavation.

"Learning about these individuals makes it possible to understand the similarities and differences between life in the past versus life in the present."

Although much of the students' efforts focus on the gritty work of digging in the dirt and salvaging artifacts, a lot of effort is also devoted to researching the site. That means plowing through old documents, maps, newspapers and photos.

That research has already yielded some fascinating information about the buildings that were there, including the house on Alice St. The students learned that the house was occupied in about 1910 by a man named James Morris, his wife Minnie, and their three children. James died in about 1922, and Minnie eventually moved to Trenton.

After Minnie moved, in

about 1929, Walter Brendle, his wife Martena and their four children moved into the house. Another family later occupied the house, which was demolished in about 1979.

The students were also able to track down an amazing amount of information about the house's occupants, including marriages and lifespans.

"By learning about these families, the history of Hamtramck becomes more solid," the students noted in their report. For example, at some point the families took in "boarders" or "lodgers."

"The presence of boarders and lodgers in the family home, young marriage ages, short life expectancies, a large number of family members living in a single home – even after getting married – are all aspects of American life that were extremely common during the 20th century but are rarely present today."

"Understanding this information about the past teaches us about the evolution of American society over time, as well as the connections we share with individuals from this time period."

There is more to the science of archeology than digging up objects from the ground, as the students' report shows. Each bit of information, and every item, no matter how insignificant it may seem to be, is important in revealing the once-lost story of our past.

All of this contributes to understanding aspects of life in Hamtramck in the past, which in turn, gives an indication of how Hamtramck came to be what it is today.

No one knows what the students will find in the current archeological dig, but no matter what they do turn up, it will contribute to the whole story

of Hamtramck.

Once the students have completed their excavations later this fall, there will be a presentation at the Hamtramck Historical Museum of what was found. More information will be available on the museum's website, [www.hamtramckhistory.org](http://www.hamtramckhistory.org).

Perrotta's brother, Andrew, said that Ian lost his temper after being "stonewalled and misled" by city officials over a zoning matter at Ian's bar, Trixie's.

Andrew said that, if he was in Ian's position, he would resign.

"But he has a higher threshold than me," Andrew said.

The city's new Human Resources director, Nicole Bieri, introduced herself.

She was among 175 people who applied for the job.

In new business, the council took the first steps to update the city's zoning ordinance and the city's business license ordinance.

Among a number of updates in the zoning ordinance, the city will now allow wood composite or vinyl fences.

In another matter, the council agreed to amend a contract with its landscaper contractor, BCL.

The new contract calls for using the company to eliminate graffiti if property owners fail to take action in a timely manner.

City Manager Angerer said that it is important for the city to eliminate graffiti as soon as possible, because the eyesore attracts more of the same, and the city becomes a "dumping ground."

The contract amendment was approved.

Councilmember Perrotta introduced a resolution calling for the city to take steps to secure the improvements being made at the city's historic baseball stadium.

The resolution, which was adopted, requires more police patrols in the area.

The resolution, in part said: "(The) City Council instructs the City Manager to immediately oversee the commencement of regular police patrols of the site at Hamtramck Stadium at least three times per day with instructions to remove anyone using the site in an area that is currently being developed as part of the project, take additional steps where necessary in order to prevent further access to the field ..."

The reason for the resolution, Perrotta said, is to make it "imperative for the City of Hamtramck to show a buy-in of the project, by committing the necessary resources to ensure the project's success and show major donors and partners of the project that the City of Hamtramck is capable of taking the required steps to preserve Hamtramck Stadium and the surrounding area. ..."
