

Ramadan begins next week

First step in Caniff reconstruction is now underway

 First came the rebuilding of Holbrook. Now it's Caniff's turn, and prepare to be inconvenienced. With Caniff being the main artery to I-75, this disruption is going to test the patience of many.

Work crews began this week to replace sewer lines at Caniff and Lumpkin, but the street is actually blocked off at Mackay.

After the sewer lines are replaced, the street will be torn up and then repaved.

Along the way, houses and buildings will be getting new water lines to replace the old lead lines. Houses and commercial buildings were delivered a notice about the work, and property owners must contact the city to grant permission to have their lead water lines replaced.

The rebuilding will go from the I-75 service

drive up to Jos. Campau. It's being funded mostly through a federal grant. The city has to also kick in \$300,000 from its annual state road repair grant.

The total cost is \$1.5 million.

Hamtramck being Hamtramck, there are already

complaints about the disruption on social media. Some folks say the city should have informed the public before work began.

Notices were delivered several weeks ago to homes and businesses along Caniff. The project was approved by the city council about two years

ago, and the city manager has talked about this project this year.

Just like the Holbrook project, which was a much longer stretch of road and was completed in two phases, it will take pretty much the entire warm-weather season to complete the project.

Crime Watch How to prevent bike thefts, and why they are increasing

Getting your bike stolen in Hamtramck is not an uncommon occurrence.

A bike theft shows up in the Hamtramck Police Department's daily incident reports almost every week – even during the winter.

Bikes are often stolen from front porches or backyards – and occa-

sionally when someone leaves their bike in front of a store while they go in for a minute or two.

This is a crime trend that is happening everywhere, especially in urban areas. In Portland, Oregon, for example, there are about 3,000 bikes stolen each year.

Students to return to class

 Students in the Hamtramck Public School District did not return to school this past week.

In a press release issued by the district on Friday, April 9, Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed said that students in kindergarten through 6th grades will now return to in-classroom learning on April 12.

Ahmed said the decision to push back the return to school by a week was caused by the recent surge of COVID-19 cases in the metro area and across the state.



HPS students in Kindergarten through 6th grade will return to in-person classroom learning this Monday.

"Today, it was determined that we will need to delay the return to in-person learning in response to the increased travel and influx of COVID-19 variants," Ahmed said in the press release.

The district is working "closely with the Wayne County Public Health Division to determine next steps," Ahmed added.



How to prevent bike thefts, and why they are increasing

Of course, the population of that city – over 600,000 – dwarfs Hamtramck's 22,000.

But we digress. Bike stealing is exploding nationwide.

Why? Blame it on COVID-19. According to a recent NPR report, many people are avoiding public transit – and the possibility of getting COVID while travelling that way– in favor of commuting by pedal power.

That has led to a boon in bikes sales and – you guessed it – bike thefts.

To make matters worse,

it's rare that police recover stolen bikes, and when they do, there are usually no licenses on them to track down the owners, or (commonly) there was never a police report made in the first place.

So how can you outfox the bike thieves?

We did a quick search online, and there is no shortage of tips.

One big recommendation is to use a U-shaped bike lock instead of a cable lock, which thieves can easily cut through.

Also, get your bike registered with the police department, and note its serial number.

If possible, keep your bike inside, or at the least in the garage, if you have one.

The folks at www.economical.com also suggested these prevention tips, and we quote:

“Double up your securi-

ty by using two high-quality locks. U-locks tend to be more durable than thin cable locks, but because of their shape, U-locks limit the amount of bike you can secure at one time, so consider pairing yours with a sturdy steel chain.

“Use your locks to keep your wheels from being stolen, too. If you choose to double your security by using both a U-lock and a steel chain, first thread the U-lock through to the bike frame, the bike rack or other secure structure, and one wheel. Then, loop the cable lock through both the front and back wheel, as well as through the U-lock.

“Make your bike unique. Bikes with personalized elements are easier to identify after they've been stolen, so they're harder for thieves to sell — making them less likely to be

stolen than more generic styles. Consider giving your bike a one-of-a-kind paint job, or adding distinctive decals.

“Try out a smart lock. Controlled by your smartphone, a smart lock can alert you when your bike is in motion, and even allow you to track the bike's location. There are also locks that sound loud alarms or emit smelly gases when tampered with, to stop thieves in their tracks. Consider trying out one of these high-tech devices for added security.

“Always bring your bike inside at night. Most bike thieves prefer to operate when the sun goes down and no one is around to watch. Whenever possible, bring your bike indoors at night — and if you can't bring it indoors, lock it up in a well-lit area.”

Mayor: COVID uptick is proof the state is in a new surge

The COVID-19 surge is here.

During Monday's weekly update on the COVID crisis by Mayor Karen Majewski via Facebook, she said the number of new cases in Hamtramck blew up to 60 last week.

The total number for the past 12 months is now 2,007, with 44 deaths.


The increase mirrors what is happening all over Michigan, which has experienced the largest rise in cases among all states.

"This just underscores that everything they are telling us about the surge in cases in Michigan is certainly true for Hamtramck," Majewski said.

As of Monday, the number of new cases reported in Michigan for the past month is over 8,000 – compared to a couple of months ago, when it was just over 1,000 new cases being reported.

Health officials say the virus is now attacking young adults, 18-34 years old.

There are also new



strains of the virus. At the same time, though, more and more people are getting vaccinations. As of Monday, those who are 16 years old and older can get the vaccine.

While presenting bad news, COVID-wise, Majewski reminded viewers that it is also "Dyngus Day," which is a Polish tradition where people throw pails of water at each other – and don't get arrested for it.

The tradition is in good fun, of course. The practice goes back a few centuries, with the water representing life and renewal, and yes, there is even a mating ritual part of it – throwing water on someone can be a sign of affection.

There is another sign of spring's return to Ham-

tramck, Majewski noted. And that's the seasonal re-opening of Burk's Igloo on Conant, where you can get ice cream treats.

Fun and games aside, Majewski stressed the need for residents to get a vaccine.

Locally, the Wayne County Healthy Communities clinic is offering vaccinations by appointment only. The clinic is located at 9021 Jos. Campau (in the Town Center Plaza). Call (313) 871-1926 to schedule an appointment.

This latest outbreak has delayed the public schools from returning to in-person classroom learning this week. The mayor reminded folks that the district is now scheduling students in grades kindergarten

through 6th to return this coming Monday, April 12.

Students in 7th through 12th grades will return on April 19. However, the mayor stressed that parents and students should check this week, to see whether that schedule is still current.

The pandemic has also caused the Wayne County Health Department to issue a directive instructing city public meetings – including city council meetings – to continue to be held via Zoom until at least through May 31.

That means that city hall is still closed to the public.

Majewski also went through her weekly listing of financial assistance and grants available to individuals and businesses. To find out more, go to the city's Facebook page.

And, just like last week, the mayor said that her weekly broadcasts to the community will continue while the COVID crisis refuses to abate.

"We're not out of the woods yet," she said.



City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on March 9, and all councilmembers were present.

A proclamation about former city official Robert Zwolak was read out loud.

It said, in part: "No matter what was going on in Hamtramck for the last 50 years, one thing has always been constant – Bob Zwolak. Bob is a fixture of Hamtramck life and politics.

"Whether functioning as a local business owner, City Clerk, or City Councilmember, Bob has been through it all and never stopped caring about Hamtramck. A long and varied career brings with it a wealth of institutional knowledge that simply cannot be replaced."

Mayor Karen Majewski said the proclamation was given to Zwolak days before he died. His son, Dan, said his father greatly appreciated the gesture.

"In his final hours, it meant the world to him," Dan Zwolak said. Later, in a lighter moment, he said: "He will haunt you in city hall."

Councilmember Saad Almasari said he considered Zwolak "a valued friend."

Councilmember Mohamed Hassan said Zwolak was his "political advisor," and noted that Zwolak was always "hard-working" for

the city.

Councilmember Fadel Al-Marsoumi said he was "the epitome of being active and being vocal."

The council also supported another proclamation, a memorial to COVID-19 victims. It read, in part:

"The City of Hamtramck officially recognizes and remembers those who have lost their lives in the past year of the COVID-19 pandemic. And we ask that all our residents join us in remembering those who have lost their lives and those who continue to suffer from the impact of this terrible virus."

Moving on, the Building Department gave its yearly report.

The department said it issued 1,290 permits in 2020, and collected over \$245,000 in building fees.

Also, during the past year, there were 705 new rental properties registered, and \$170,000 collected in rental certification fees.

A discussion was held on a proposed alley/parking lot repaving program. The council had earlier OK'd allocating \$500,000 for the project.

A bid for the project by Great Lakes Contracting Solutions came in at about \$439,000.

The project includes re-

Hamtramck is ready to rebuild its housing

Hamtramck has its financial challenges, but there is one bright spot. The city is serious about bringing back housing. For decades, Hamtramck has been unable to unload its many vacant lots because of a housing discrimination lawsuit. The reasons for that are complicated, but the case has largely been settled. That has allowed the city to develop dozens and dozens of empty lots that once were filled with housing. Over the years, as residents moved out to the suburbs, the housing stock fell into disrepair, or became victims of arson. The city is now auctioning off a portion of these lots, but with one important requirement: The people who purchase these lots have to build new housing. Hamtramck desperately needs to rebuild. In the 1950s, the city boasted of a population of over 50,000. We now have a population of about 22,000 – roughly half of what the city used to be in its heyday. The city needs additional property taxes, as well as the income tax revenue, that will come with the rebuilding. This is a tremendous boost that the city has long needed. And it also promises to boost our local businesses with more customers. We can't wait to see construction crews out there, building new housing.

Odds & Ends

Campaign trail... The deadline to file to become a candidate for city council or mayor is fast approaching.

There are three council positions on the ballot. The terms for both mayor and council are four years.

So far, the following have thrown their hats into the ring: Saad Almasmari for Mayor; and for council, Adam Albamarki and Amanda Jaczkowski.

You must file by April 20. You have to be at least 18 years old, and a resident and a voter in Hamtramck, to file.

To get an application form, go the city's website (<https://hamtramck.us/>) and click on "Clerk" under the Departments tab.

Free money... Here's another scholarship opportunity to be aware of.

It applies to Michigan college undergrad juniors or seniors, or grad students, who are on a public administration career track.

The Michigan Townships Association, headquartered in Delta Township (just west of Lansing), offers one statewide scholarship, the MTA Robert R Robinson scholarship, annually, to just such a future leader.

They point to how, to quote their press release, "the past year has shown us how critically important community leaders, programs and services are in helping to support Michigan residents."

Applications for this annual scholarship are being accepted now, and are due by May 31.

The press release reveals more pertinent details:

The scholarship is awarded on a competitive basis, and applicants are considered on several factors including academic achievement, community involvement and commitment to local government administration.

Extension... The redemption date for the final payment of property taxes on foreclosed Wayne County properties has been extended through May 14, 2021.

This is relatively in line with extensions that have been granted by federal and Michigan governments for filing personal income taxes.

The county may be hoping that some people will recoup enough from their federal and state returns to be able to pay their property taxes?

In any case, it's a welcome forestalling of unpleasantness. Here's hoping it will help at least a few folks out.

Reminder... Detroit City Football Club has released a spring schedule of games to be played in May and June.

"Le Rouge," as they are sometimes called by their fans, will open their season at home – aka Keyworth Stadium – on May 1 at 7:30 p.m.

Some of their fans will actually be allowed to attend the game in person. Exactly how many is difficult to say this early, as such things are continuously being updated by the governor's office.

However, attendance figures will likely vary at out-of-state games, depending on that state's COVID restrictions at the time.

The club will travel to their first away game six days after their opener, facing New Amsterdam in Warwick, NY on May 7.

paving the following:

- Alley 1 – West of Jos. Campau between Belmont and Yemans
- Alley 3 – West of Conant between Trowbridge and Belmont
- Alley 4 – West of Conant between Belmont and Yemans
- Alley 5 – West of Conant between Yemans and Evaline
- Parking lot at Caniff and McDougall

Councilmember Ian Perrotta was opposed to the project because of the inclusion of the city parking lot.

He said that the parking lot was being done for Review Publisher John Ulaj, in a deal where the paper would provide “favorable coverage” to the administration.

The Review building is located across the street from the parking lot, which is located in the heart of the Jos. Campau business district.

The project was approved.

In another project, the council took the first step toward approving a sidewalk replacement plan.

The council had previously turned down a proposal to have a citywide program in which property owners would be billed for any replacement slabs.

This revised proposal would spend \$100,000 from a state road repair fund that the city gets every year. Homeowners will not be charged under this new plan, which is greatly scaled back.

This initial council step approved an engineering study to identify which slabs need to be replaced, starting in one section of the southend.

In another revisit to a proposal, the council was divided on whether to ask voters, for the second time, to approve a property millage increase in order to fund the city's pension obligations for firefighters and police officers.

The city wants to raise up to 10.5 mills to cover the \$2.2 million cost of the pension.

Councilmember Al Marsoumi said a recent financial audit of the city showed that if the city were to miss a payment – which is a strong possibility – there would be a lawsuit – and it is likely a judge would impose a millage rate increase to cover the expense.

Fadel warned that a judge's millage increase could be far more than what the city is seeking from its millage proposal.

Councilmember Perrotta said it comes to “let the residents decide.”

Councilmembers Saad Almasmari, Mohammed Alsomiri and Mohammed Hassan rejected the proposal, causing a 3-3 tie. Mayor Majewski broke the tie, and voted to allow a millage election, which will happen in August.
