Ukraine: a personal perspective

Missiles are raining down on golden-domed Kyiv and across Ukraine. Air sirens are going off.

An oil depot burns and flames rise to the sky. Ukrainians are huddled in metro stop bomb shelters.

Women are giving birth here too.

Orphanages, buses and apartment buildings are struck indiscriminately.

Scores of innocent people, including children, have been killed.

My family in Kyiv huddles in their apartment, and we can hear a loud boom in the distance as we talk to them in a video call. Their faces are ashen, and they have aged in the space of a few days.

My 79-year-old mother-in-law tells us that she never imagined living through something like this. When we end the call, she speaks as though it may be for the last time. Another friend and her family flee the capital and sit in their car for hours, trying to get to safety.

The Ukrainian Armed Forces is repelling Russian troops on its own for days now, fighting for Ukraine's very survival. Ordinary citizens are joining the fight to protect their land.

A beer factory suspends normal operation and starts producing Molotov cocktails to thwart the invading Russian troops. A woman sees Russian soldiers standing in the street in her village and confronts them.

"Why are you here?" she demands. When they tell her to move on, she gives them sunflower seeds to put in their pockets so that when they die on her land, at least something will grow.

The United States offers to evacuate the president of Ukraine. He responds by saying: "I need ammuni-

**SUPPLEMENTAL BOND RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE ISSUANCE OF
ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS**

Minutes of a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, held in the City Hall, 3401 Evaline Street, Hamtramck, Michigan, on February 22, 2022.

PRESENT: Alsomiri, Choudhury, Refai, Albarmaki, Jaczkowski

ABSENT: Hassan

The following Resolution was offered by Member Refai and supported by Member Alsomiri:

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted on May 26, 2015 (the "2015 Resolution"), the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan (the "City") authorized the issuance of its Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2015 (Michigan State Revolving Fund Program) in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$6,525,000 (the "Series 2015 Bonds") under Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), to finance sewage disposal infrastructure improvements to the City's water supply and sewage disposal system (the "System," as further defined in the Resolution); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the 2015 Resolution, the Series 2015 Bonds were issued on September 17, 2015 and remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$5,185,000; and

WHEREAS, by supplemental resolution adopted on June 11, 2019 (the "2019 Resolution" and together with the 2015 Resolution, the "Resolution"), the Council authorized the issuance of its Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2019 in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$1,100,000 (the "Series 2019 Bonds") under Act 94 to finance water supply infrastructure improvements to the System; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, the Series 2019 Bonds were issued on August 30, 2019 and remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$580,000; and

WHEREAS, the Resolution authorizes the issuance of Additional Junior Lien Bonds (as defined therein) of equal standing with the Series 2015 Bonds and the Series 2019 Bonds for, among other things, the acquisition and construction of repairs, enlargements, extensions, additions and improvements to the System in the discretion of the City; and

WHEREAS, the only Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) outstanding on the date hereof under the Resolution are the Series 2015 Bonds and the Series 2019 Bonds; and

WHEREAS, this Council does hereby determine that it is necessary to design, purchase, acquire and construct additional water supply infrastructure improvements to the System, including, but not limited to the replacement of lead water service lines, the replacement of water transmission mains, and improvements to related facilities as well as all work necessary and incidental to these improvements, including without limitation the restoration of property, streets, rightsofway, and easements affected by the improvements (the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the aggregate cost of designing, purchasing, acquiring and constructing the Improvements is estimated to be approximately \$8,765,573; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to supplement the Resolution at this time and to authorize the issuance of one or more series of Additional Junior Lien Bonds to defray the eligible costs of designing, purchasing, acquiring and constructing the Improvements, and to sell such Additional Junior Lien Bonds in one or more private negotiated sales to the Michigan Finance Authority (the "Authority") as authorized by Act 227, Public Acts of Michigan, 1985, as amended ("Act 227"), in order to enable the Authority to provide assistance with respect to the Improvements from the proceeds of the Drinking Water Revolving Fund ("DWRFF") (the "Program").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, as follows:

Section 1. 2022 SUPPLEMENTAL RESOLUTION. This resolution (hereinafter referred to as the "2022 Supplemental Resolution") is adopted in accordance with Section 22 of the Resolution and pursuant to the authority in Act 94.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS. Except as provided in the preambles hereto and except as hereinafter provided, all terms which are defined in Section 1 of the Resolution shall have

the same meanings in this 2022 Supplemental Resolution. In addition, the following terms shall have the following meanings in this 2022 Supplemental Resolution:

(a) "Authorized Officer" means the Mayor, City Manager or Controller of the City, or any one or more of them.

(b) "Issue Date" means the date on which the Series 2022 Bonds are delivered to the original purchaser thereof.

(c) "Contract Documents" means the Purchase Contract between the City and the Authority, the Supplemental Agreement by and among the City, the Authority and the State of Michigan acting through the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, and the Issuer's Certificate for the Series 2022 Bonds, or such other closing documents required by the Authority for the issuance of the Series 2022 Bonds.

(a) "Series 2022 Bonds" means the Bonds authorized in Sections 5 and 6.

(b) "Tax-Exempt Bonds" means bonds the interest on which is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

Section 1. NECESSITY, PUBLIC PURPOSE. It is hereby determined to be necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the City to acquire and construct the Improvements in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications therefor prepared by Hennessey Engineers, which are hereby approved.

Section 2. ESTIMATED COST; PERIOD OF USEFULNESS. The cost of the Improvements has been estimated by the engineers not to exceed \$8,765,573, including the payment of eligible legal, engineering, financial and other expenses, which estimate of cost is approved and confirmed, and the period of usefulness of the Improvements is estimated to be greater than forty (40) years.

Section 3. ISSUANCE OF BONDS. To pay all or a portion of the eligible costs of designing, purchasing, acquiring, and constructing the Improvements and to pay the eligible legal and financial expenses and all other eligible expenses incidental to the issuance of the Series 2022 Bonds, the City shall borrow the aggregate principal sum of not to exceed \$9,500,000 and issue its revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be issued in one or more series of bonds in the aggregate principal sum of not to exceed \$9,500,000, as finally determined by the Authorized Officer by written order or other document as authorized pursuant to this 2022 Supplemental Resolution, or such lesser amount thereof as shall have been advanced to the City pursuant to the Contract Documents.

During the time funds are being drawn down by the City under the Series 2022 Bonds, the Authority will periodically provide the City a statement showing the amount of principal that has been advanced and the date of each advance, which statement shall constitute prima facie evidence of the reported information; provided that no failure on the part of the Authority to provide such a statement or to reflect a disbursement or the correct amount of a disbursement shall relieve the City of its obligation to repay the outstanding principal amount actually advanced, all accrued interest thereon, and any other amount payable with respect thereto in accordance with the terms of the Series 2022 Bonds.

Section 1. SERIES 2022 BOND TERMS. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be designated "Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds" with such appropriate series designation as is determined by the Authorized Officer. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be issued as one or more fully registered manuscript bonds, shall be sold and delivered to the Authority in any denomination. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be dated the date of delivery to the Authority, or such other date approved by the Authorized Officer, and shall be payable on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale provided the final maturity shall be no later than forty (40) years after the date of issuance. The Series 2022 Bonds shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 3.00% per annum as determined by the Authorized Officer, payable semiannually on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale.

Notwithstanding the above, the final amount of any maturity and terms of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be as provided in the Contract Documents and will be finally determined by the Authorized Officer.

Section 1. PAYMENT OF SERIES 2022 BONDS; CONFIRMATION OF STATUTORY

LIEN. The principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Series 2022 Bonds shall be payable solely from the Net Revenues, and, to secure such payment from the Net Revenues, the statutory lien upon the whole of the Net Revenues established by Act 94 and the pledge created in Section 6 of the Resolution is hereby confirmed in favor of the Series 2022 Bonds as follows: such lien shall be a second lien of equal standing and priority with the Series 2015 Bonds and the Series 2019 Bonds, but junior and subordinate to the lien of all to be issued First Lien Bonds.

The Series 2022 Bonds, including both principal and interest thereon, shall not be a general obligation of the City and shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City for the purpose of any debt limitations imposed by any constitutional or statutory provisions.

Section 1. PRIOR REDEMPTION. The Series 2022 Bonds issued and sold to the Authority shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity upon the terms and conditions set forth in the form of Series 2022 Bonds contained in Section 11 hereof.

Section 2. PAYING AGENT AND REGISTRATION.

(a) Appointment of Paying Agent. From time to time the Authorized Officer shall designate and appoint a Paying Agent, which shall also act as transfer agent and bond registrar. The initial Paying Agent shall be the City Treasurer. In the event of a change in the Paying Agent, notice shall be given in writing, by certified mail, to each Registered Owner not less than sixty (60) days prior to the next interest payment date. The Paying Agent shall keep the official books for the recordation of the Registered Owners of the Bonds.

(b) Registration of Bonds. Registration of the Bonds shall be recorded in the registration books of the City to be kept by a Paying Agent. Bonds may be transferred only by submitting the same, together with a satisfactory instrument of transfer signed by the Registered Owner or the Registered Owner's legal representative duly authorized in writing, to the Paying Agent, after which a new Bond or Bonds shall be issued by the Paying Agent to the transferee (new registered owner) in any denomination, in the same aggregate principal amount as the Bond submitted for transfer. No transfer of Bonds shall be valid unless and until recorded on the bond registration books in accordance with the foregoing. The person in whose name any Bond is registered may for all purposes, notwithstanding any notice to the contrary, be deemed and treated by the City and the Paying Agent as the absolute owner thereof, and any payment of principal and interest on any Bond to the Registered Owner thereof shall constitute a valid discharge of the City's liability upon such Bond to the extent of such payment. No Bond shall be transferred less than fifteen (15) days prior to an interest payment date nor after the Bond has been called for redemption.

(c) Authority's Depository. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Resolution, this 2022 Supplemental Resolution or the Series 2022 Bonds, so long as the Authority is the owner of the Series 2022 Bonds: (a) the Series 2022 Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States; (b) the Series 2022 Bonds are payable as to principal, premium, if any, and interest at U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the City by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository"); (c) the City agrees that it will deposit with the Authority's Depository payments of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Series 2022 Bonds in immediately available funds by 12:00 p.m. (noon) at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise; in the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the City's deposit by 12:00 p.m. (noon) on the scheduled day, the City shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment; and (d) written notice of any redemption of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be given by the City and received by the Authority's Depository at least 40 days prior to the date on which such redemption is to be made.

Section 1. SALE OF BONDS. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be sold to the Authority. The City determines that a negotiated sale to the Authority is in the best interest of the City

because the terms offered by the Authority are more favorable than those available from other sources of funding.

Section 2 BOND FORM. The Series 2022 Bonds shall be in substantially the following form with such completions, changes and additions as may be required by the Authority or as recommended by the City's Bond Counsel and approved by the officers of the City signing the Series 2022 Bonds:

The City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan (the "Issuer"), acknowledges itself indebted and, for value received, hereby promises to pay to the Registered Owner specified above, or registered assigns, out of the net revenues of the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City (the "System"), including all appurtenances, additions, extensions and improvements thereto after provision has been made for reasonable and necessary expenses of operation, maintenance and administration of the System (the "Net Revenues"), the amounts and on the Dates of Maturity set forth on Schedule I herein, together with interest thereon from the dates of receipt of such funds, or such later date to which interest has been paid, at the Interest Rate per annum specified above, first payable on _____ 1, 20__, and semiannually thereafter on the first day of _____ and _____ of each year, except as the provisions hereinafter set forth with respect to redemption of this Bond prior to maturity may become applicable hereto.

The Issuer promises to pay to the Michigan Finance Authority (the "Authority") the principal amount of this Bond or so much thereof as shall have been advanced to the Issuer pursuant to a Purchase Contract between the Issuer and the Authority and a Supplemental Agreement by and among the Issuer, the Authority and the State of Michigan acting through the Department of Environmental Quality.

During the time funds are being drawn down by the Issuer under this Bond, the Authority will periodically provide the Issuer a statement showing the amount of principal that has been advanced and the date of each advance, which statement shall constitute prima facie evidence of the reported information; provided that no failure on the part of the Authority to provide such a statement or to reflect a disbursement or the correct amount of a disbursement shall relieve the Issuer of its obligation to repay the outstanding principal amount actually advanced, all accrued interest thereon, and any other amount payable with respect thereto in accordance with the terms of this Bond.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Bond, so long as the Authority is the owner of this Bond, (a) this Bond is payable as to principal, premium, if any, and interest at U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the Issuer by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository"); (b) the Issuer agrees that it will deposit with the Authority's Depository payments of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on this Bond in immediately available funds by 12:00 p.m. (noon) at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise; in the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the Issuer's deposit by 12:00 p.m. (noon) on the scheduled day, the Issuer shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment; and (c) written notice of any redemption of this Bond shall be given by the Issuer and received by the Authority's Depository at least 40 days prior to the date on which such redemption is to be made.

This Bond, being one fully registered manuscript bond, is issued in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan,

1933, as amended and a resolution adopted by the City Council of the Issuer on May 26, 2015, as supplemented on June 11, 2019 and February 22, 2022 (as supplemented, the "Resolution"), for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the System. This Bond is a self-liquidating Bond, and is not a general obligation of the Issuer within any constitutional, statutory or charter limitation, but is payable, both as to principal and interest, solely from the Net Revenues of the System. The principal of and interest on this Bond are secured by a statutory lien on the Net Revenues.

The Issuer hereby covenants and agrees to fix, and maintain at all times while any of the Bonds shall be outstanding, such rates for service furnished by the System as shall be sufficient to provide for payment of the principal of and interest upon all such Bonds as and when the same become due and payable, to maintain a bond and interest redemption account and to provide for the payment of expenses of administration and operation and such expenses for maintenance of the System as are necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order, and to provide for such other expenditures and funds for the System as are required by the Resolution. [If bond issued as Junior Lien Bond: The statutory liens securing any First Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) issued by the Issuer will be first liens that are and shall remain superior to the lien on the Net Revenues securing this Bond and any and any Additional Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution). The Bonds of this series shall have equal standing with any Additional Junior Lien Bonds that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution, and additional bonds of superior standing to the bonds of this series may be issued pursuant to the Resolution.] [If bond issued as First Lien Bond: The Bonds of this series shall have equal standing with the Issuer's First Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution and the lien securing this Bond is superior to the lien on the Net Revenues securing Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) that may be issued pursuant to the Resolution.] For a complete statement of the revenues from which, and the conditions under which, this Bond is payable, a statement of the conditions under which additional bonds of equal or superior standing may hereafter be issued, and the general covenants and provisions pursuant to which this Bond is issued, reference is made to the Resolution.

Bonds of this series may be subject to redemption prior to maturity by the Issuer only with the prior written consent of the Authority and on such terms as may be required by the Authority.

In the event of a default in the payment of principal or interest hereon when due, whether at maturity, by redemption or otherwise, the amount of such default shall bear interest (the "additional interest") at a rate equal to the rate of interest that is two percent above the Authority's cost of providing funds (as determined by the Authority) to make payment on the bonds of the Authority issued to provide funds to purchase this Bond but in no event in excess of the maximum rate of interest permitted by law. The additional interest shall continue to accrue until the Authority has been fully reimbursed for all costs incurred by the Authority (as determined by the Authority) as a consequence of the Issuer's default. Such additional interest shall be payable on the interest payment date following demand of the Authority. In the event that (for reasons other than the default in the payment of any municipal obligation purchased by the Authority) the investment of amounts in the reserve account established by the Authority for the bonds of the Authority issued to provided funds to purchase this Bond fails to provide sufficient available funds (together with any other funds that may be made available for such purpose) to pay the interest on outstanding bonds of the Authority issued to fund such account, the Issuer shall and hereby agrees to pay on demand only the Issuer's pro rata share (as determined by the Authority) of such deficiency as additional interest on this Bond.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law, precedent to and in the issuance of this Bond, exist and have been done and performed in regular and due time and form as required by law and that the total indebtedness of the Issuer including this Bond, does not exceed any charter, constitutional or statutory limitation.

In the event the Order of Approval issued by the Department of Environmental Quality (the "Order") approves a principal amount of assistance less than the amount of the Bond delivered to the Authority, the Authority shall only disburse principal up to the amount stated in the Order. In the event (1) that the payment schedule approved by the Issuer and described below provides for payment of a total principal amount greater than the amount of assistance approved by the Order or (2) that less than the principal amount of assistance approved by the Order is disbursed to the Issuer by the Authority, the Authority shall prepare a new payment schedule that shall be effective upon receipt by the Issuer.

Section 12. SALE, ISSUANCE, DELIVERY, TRANSFER AND EXCHANGE OF SERIES 2022 BONDS. Each series of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be sold at a private, negotiated sale to the Authority, as authorized by Act 227. The Council determines that the sale and delivery of each series of the Series 2022 Bonds to the Authority as provided in this 2022 Supplemental Resolution will provide the City with the lowest cost of borrowing money for the Improvements. Each sale shall be made pursuant to the terms and conditions to be set forth in a Purchase Contract (the "Purchase Contract") and a Supplemental Agreement (the "Supplemental Agreement") related to such series. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute and deliver each Supplemental Agreement and each Purchase Contract in

such forms as shall be approved by the Authorized Officer, with such approval to be evidenced by the Authorized Officer's signature thereon. Notwithstanding any other provision of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution, each series of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be initially sold to the Authority as one bond, numbered 1, in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$9,500,000. In addition, the Authorized Officer and other City employees and officials are authorized to execute and deliver to the Authority and such certificates and documents as the Authority or bond counsel shall require and to do all other things necessary to effectuate the sale, issuance, delivery, transfer and exchange of each series of the Series 2022 Bonds in accordance with the provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute any orders, receipts, agreements, pledge agreements, documents or certificates necessary to complete a transaction authorized pursuant to this 2022 Supplemental Resolution, including, but not limited to, any issuers certificate, any certificates relating to federal or state securities laws, rules or regulations, and any revenue sharing pledge agreement. The Authorized Officer is authorized to seek a credit assessment, or similar, from a nationally recognized statistical rating organization and to execute and file any applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury, including an Application for State Treasurer's Approval to Issue Long-Term Securities and any other applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury and to seek any waivers from the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Section 13. TAX COVENANT. If any of the Series 2022 Bonds are issued as Tax-Exempt Bonds, the City covenants to comply with all requirements of the Code necessary to assure that the interest on such Series 2022 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. The Authorized Officer and other appropriate officials of the City are authorized to do all things necessary to assure that the interest on the Series 2022 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

Section 14. EXECUTION OF BONDS. The Mayor or the Mayor Pro Tem, and the Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the City, are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Series 2022 Bonds, either manually or by facsimile signature, on behalf of the City. Upon execution, the Series 2022 Bonds shall be delivered to the purchaser upon receipt of the purchase price or upon compliance with the terms and conditions of the related Purchase Contract.

Section 15. CONSTRUCTION FUND. The City Treasurer is hereby directed to create and maintain one or more construction funds for the Improvements (collectively, the "Construction Fund"), into which the proceeds of each series of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be deposited. Such moneys shall be used solely for the purpose for which the Series 2022 Bonds were issued. Any unexpected balance in the Construction Fund remaining after completion of the Improvements may be used for such purposes as allowed by law. After completion of the Improvements and disposition of remaining Series 2022 Bond proceeds, if any, pursuant to the provisions of this Section, the Construction Fund shall be closed.

Section 16. SERIES 2022 BOND PROCEEDS. The proceeds of the sale of the Series 2022 Bonds shall be used solely to pay the eligible costs of the Improvements and any eligible engineering, legal and other expenses incident thereto; provided that the City Council shall not authorize the payment of any such moneys for acquisition and construction of any part of the Improvements until there shall have been first filed with it by the consulting engineer in charge of such work, a written statement to the effect that the sum so to be paid is in full or partial payment of a contractual obligation in connection with the Improvements and that the City has received the consideration for such payment. The statement of the consulting engineer shall also show the cost of acquisition and construction of the Improvements that has theretofore been approved by him for payment and the amount of the balance that will be required for completion of the Improvements.

Section 17. DEFEASANCE. In the event cash or direct obligations of the United States or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by the United States, or a combination thereof, the principal of and interest on which, without reinvestment, come due at times and in amounts sufficient to pay at maturity or irrevocable call for earlier optional or mandatory redemption, the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on any of the Bonds, shall be deposited in trust, this 2022 Supple-

mental Resolution shall be defeased with respect to such Bonds (the "Defeased Bonds"), and the owners of the Defeased Bonds shall have no further rights under this 2022 Supplemental Resolution except to receive payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the bonds from the cash or securities deposited in trust and the interest and gains thereon and to transfer and exchange bonds as provided herein. Defeased Bonds shall be treated as if they have been redeemed for all purposes under the Resolution and this 2022 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 18. CONTRACT WITH BONDHOLDERS. The provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall constitute a contract between the City and the Bondholders from time to time, and after the issuance of any of such Bonds, no change, variation or alteration of the provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution may be made that would lessen the security for the Series 2022 Bonds. The provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall be enforceable by appropriate proceedings taken by such Bondholder, either at law or in equity.

Section 19. STATE REVENUE SHARING PLEDGE. If required by the Authority, as additional security for repayment of the Series 2022 Bonds, the City Council agrees to pledge the state revenue sharing payments that the City is eligible to receive from the State of Michigan under Act 140, Public Acts of Michigan, 1971, as amended, to the Authority as purchaser and holder of the Series 2022 Bonds. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute and deliver a revenue sharing pledge agreement between the City and the Authority.

Section 20. PUBLICATION AND RECORDATION. This 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall be published once in full in a newspaper of general circulation in the City qualified under state law to publish legal notices, and the same shall be recorded in the records of the City and such recording authenticated by the signature of the City Clerk.

Section 21. RESOLUTION SUBJECT TO MICHIGAN LAW. The provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution are subject to the laws of the State of Michigan.

Section 22. SECTION HEADINGS. The section headings in this 2022 Supplemental Resolution are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be a part of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 23. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this 2022 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 24. RATIFICATION OF RESOLUTION; CONFLICTING RESOLUTIONS. The 2015 Resolution, as supplemented by the 2019 Supplemental Resolution and this 2022 Supplemental Resolution, is hereby ratified and confirmed. All resolutions or parts thereof, insofar as the same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict; provided, that the foregoing shall not operate to repeal any provision thereof, the repeal of which would impair the obligation on the Series 2015 Bonds, the Series 2019 Bonds or the Series 2022 Bonds.

Section 25. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RESOLUTION. Pursuant to Section 6 of the Act, this 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall be approved on the date of first reading and this 2022 Supplemental Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption and publication pursuant to Act 94.

aide. Eventually, his life goal is to become a Civil Engineer.

DWIHN and its providers have "helped Edward become a better him," according to his mom.



looking into hiring someone.

The council unanimously adopted a resolution recognizing "World Hijab Day," which is on Feb. 1.

The proclamation read, in part:

"(The) purpose is to encourage women of all religions and backgrounds to wear and experience the hijab for the day.

"World Hijab Day was started to fight discrimination against women in hijab after hate crimes against Muslims hit an all-time high after 9/11. As women around the world gather to celebrate World Hijab Day, support our Muslim sisters' freedom to express their belief without fear.

"As Americans, we value our freedom of expression without hesitation or influence from others. We celebrate diversity and learn to accept people from all different cultures and backgrounds and make everyone an important part of the community.

"Unfortunately, our Muslim sisters fear for their own safety for their personal choice of wearing a hijab. They endure unwelcoming stares on the streets for their expression of devotion to their religion. No instances of hate should be tolerated if we wish to live in a peaceful society.

"Let's stand up for their right to cover and let's stand up against racism, misogyny, and prejudice. Our actions must emerge from compassion, invite understanding, include listening and moving toward connection through shared values. Let us come together and celebrate our unique differences."

A sub-committee was created on the recommendation of the city administration to review all city council meeting rules and procedures. Mayor Amer Ghalib appointed Councilmembers Amanda Jaczkowski, Adam Albarmaki and Mohammad Hassan to the committee.

Also, upon the recommendation of the city manager, Mayor Ghalib appointed Councilmembers Mohammad Alsomiri, Khalil Refai and Nayeem Choudhury to an

other sub-committee that will review metered and non-metered parking in the city.

During public comment, Lynn Blasey urged the council to extend the time limit a member of the public can address the council from two minutes to four.

Linda Ward said the metered parking system needs to "work for" small businesses. She said that there are "inadequate" directions on how to pay for parking on the meters and on the city's website.

Kit Parks said she is in favor of a proposed resolution on the agenda to return Zoom council meetings to allow more public input.

Later in the meeting, the proposal to reinstall Zoom meetings, presented by Councilmember Adam Albarmaki, was postponed for further review.

Albarmaki was the sole vote opposing the postponement.

Councilmember Jaczkowski proposed the postponement because the newly created sub-committee that will review council meeting procedures is also looking at several other issues, including whether to extend the public comment time limit for speakers.

She said that adding "another stream for comments" could result in meetings going until 1 a.m.

Councilmember Choudhury said that while he agrees with postponing the proposal, the council owes it to the public to offer another way to address the council – especially with Covid still infecting people.

"Folks are not ready to come out," Choudhury said.

Councilmember Albarmaki said the council is here "to represent the residents." He said it's also about "transparency."

to adopt an annual poverty exemption guideline for those claiming hardship in their ability to pay property taxes for the year, Michelle Oberholzer said the city is violating the law on its guideline to allow exemptions.

In some cases, some property owners can be exempted, or given a reduction, on taxes.

Oberholzer said that there some residents who are going to lose their homes because they can't afford to pay their property taxes.

City Assessor Konrad Maziarz later said that the city can't set the guidelines below federal guidelines, and that Hamtramck is in "full compliance with the state."

The council later approved the new guidelines.

Bill Meyer said that there are some business owners who are opposed to the city's new parking meter system. He said that some are telling him to "get rid of the meters."

The business owners, Meyer said, complained that they were never consulted before the meters were installed.

A proposal to censure Hamtramck 31st District Court Judge Alexis Krot was approved. Krot came under widespread criticism over how she handled an elderly cancer patient who was ticketed for not clearing out weeds around his garage facing the alley.

Krot shamed the man, and said that she wished she could put him in jail. The man said he was too sick and old to take care of the matter at the time he was ticketed. (The weeds were later removed.)

After the incident received national and international attention, Krot issued an apology.

Councilmember Hassan said the apology came too late.

Councilmember Jaczkowski said that despite her apology, it does not "eradicate accountability."

The resolution read, in part: "Judge Alexis Krot made extreme remarks to a 72-year-old man, who is both an immigrant and cancer patient, during court on January 11, 2022, stating that she wishes she could sentence him to jail time over a citation for overgrowth and lack of maintenance of the back yard."

It also went on to say: "Judge Alexis Krot's callous actions has shined a negative light on the city of Hamtramck and tarnished the image of Hamtramck globally."
