Yemen fundraiser to be held

Now here's something a little different, and for a good cause to boot.

Ukraine isn't alone, unfortunately, the only country in the world where war rages today. Yemen, on the southern part of the Arabian peninsula, has also been ravaged by the issue – and since 2014.

And it is a civil war, one fueled moreover by outside interests, that has boiled over there.

It's batter-up time for fans of a Hamtramck sports star

Detroit Tigers fans of a certain age should remember Ike Blessitt.

And Hamtramckans, of that same certain age, certainly should.

Blessitt, a four-sport star at Hamtramck High (Class of 1967), was a member of one of the more memorable Tigers teams of the past half-century, the American League East-winning 1972 squad.

Alas, he only managed five at-bats over the course of four games, striking out twice and not getting a base hit.

But he made it all the way to the majors – something many players who are drafted, even high-level draft picks, never manage to do.

Now 72 years old, diabetic and with a prosthetic leg, having endured a triple bypass last year followed by a stroke mere months later, Blessitt is struggling.

His housing situation is also a struggle, as it's said to be in rough shape, in need of some repairs.

To that end, a crowd-funding effort has been put in place, spearheaded by Dave Mesrey, one of the Hamtramck Stadium Grounds Crew and a Detroit-based writer.

To donate, go online to gofundme.com and search for Ike Blessitt. The goal is to raise at least \$50,000, and as of Thursday, when The Review went to press, over \$3,000 had been pledged.

The problems stem from the fact that Blessitt played in the majors prior to 1980, before the establishment of player pensions.

Blessitt was drafted by the Tigers right out of high school in '67, and did end up playing in the minor leagues for several years, as well as for many years in the Mexican leagues.

But he certainly wouldn't have made a fraction of the cash he could have in just one full season in the bigs.

Alas, it was not to be.

In spite of being a star in football, basketball and track, along with baseball, at HHS, and in spite of how things have gone since, sources say that his true sports love remains baseball by far.

He still takes part in Tigers Fantasy Camps, and uses a homemade batting cage, set up in his yard, to have a place to serve as a hitting instructor for local teen hopefuls wishing that they, too, could one day reach the major leagues.

Tom Derry, also of the Hamtramck Stadium Grounds Crew, had this to say about Blessitt on his own Facebook page: "I briefly met Ike Blessitt back in 2014, when I had the pleasure of standing on the old Tiger Stadium mound for a few minutes during the opening ceremonies of the 'Bird Bash' party at Nemo's."

"I remember him as a sweet guy with a warm, infectious laugh, whose love for the Tigers and for his hometown of Detroit was immediately palpable. "Ill health and hard times have unfortunately

Mayor begins changes

Mayor Ameer Ghalib is living up to a campaign promise to make the city's various boards and commissions more ethnically and racially diverse.

Recently, he notified three Hamtramck Public Housing Commissioners, Tom Stackpoole, Richard Hyska and Isaac Reeves, that they are being replaced.

Stackpoole and Hyska are white, and Reeves is an African-American.

Ghalib also noted in his campaign that he would be replacing various board and commission members who have spotty attendance records, which Reeves apparently has.

The new appointees are: Kamal Rahman, Motahar Fadhel and Frances Ann-Tyler Sims.

Rahman ran for mayor in the last election, and has unsuccessfully run for the same position in previous elections. He is also a former President of the Hamtramck NAACP.

Fadhel is a local business owner, and Sims is a tenant in the Col. Hamtramck apartments, which is under the control of the commission.

Stackpoole, who has been on the commission for five years, told The Review that he told the mayor "I am disappointed we've never met or spoken."

But he told The Review that he accepts the mayor's action, and that he will advise Ghalib on matters concerning the commission.

In previous years, Hamtramck would have been filled with live music the first weekend of March.

That's when the Hamtramck Music Fest normally took place. Covid canceled that event last year. But organizers made up for that cancelation by hosting it last August.

A festival organizer told The Review back in August that there was a tentative plan to return the festival to its traditional March setting.

The festival did take place, just not in Hamtramck.

Instead, festival organizers took it to Detroit's

sion.

Neither Hyska nor Reeves could be reached for comment.

Ghalib said that some people had questioned his authority to make the changes without cause, and in his weekly address to the community on Facebook, he cited the city charter, chapter 5, section H, where it gives him that authority.

The mayor makes all appointments to the housing commission while, on some other commissions and boards, he shares appointment duties with the city council.

Housing Commission Executive Director Kevin Kondrat said he accepts the mayor's decision.

"We've worked with new

commissioners before, and we will work to be our best," he said.

The commission has come a long way since Kondrat was hired.

The housing commission now enjoys a "high performance" rating with the federal agency HUD, which oversees all public housing commissions.

Kondrat is hired by the commission, and has a five-year employment contract.

The commission operates both the Col. Hamtramck apartment complex on Dequindre St. and the Hamtramck Senior Plaza on Holbrook Ave.

In all, there 954 housing tenants - 797 in the Col. Hamtramck housing, and 157 at the Senior Plaza.

Music festival organizers are now soliciting bands and performers to apply for this year's event. For more information, go to their Facebook page.

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

In wide-ranging interview, mayor shares his experiences

The first thing that Mayor Ameer Ghalib had to get used to as Hamtramck's newly-elected mayor was the media spotlight.

Ghalib beat former Mayor Karen Majewski, who had been in office for 16 years, in last November's General Election.

He took office on Jan. 1. It wasn't just local media that took notice of this victory. The whole world was watching this past mayoral election.

Why? Because Ghalib was the first Muslim elected to be Hamtramck's mayor, and he is now presiding over a city council comprised of all Muslims – believed to be a national first.

"I did not expect to get the focus of the media," Ghalib said, in an interview hosted by local journalist Omar Thabet, in his podcast called "Table Talk."

Some of the media outlets, Ghalib said, had an agenda, and asked him "tricky questions" such as what God does he believe in, and whether Sharia law would be imposed in Ham-

tramck. The mayor said he learned quickly that he had to choose his words carefully.

In the approximate hour-and-a-half interview, Ghalib talked about a wide-range of subjects.

One focus was what it has been like to be the mayor while Ramadan is being observed.

He said he expects to be busier than usual during this month-long holiday.

(During this period Muslims fast daily from sunrise to sunset, and break afterward.)

Other topics included: What's going on in the city?

"Everything is going

smoothly," he said. He is also "impressed" by those he reached out who didn't support him for mayor.

"That was not expected," Ghalib said.

While he said the city is running "smoothly," he admitted that the city is in deficit spending, which is but one of other "chronic problems" facing the city.

"People have high expectations. We cannot solve them in a month, or two, or a year," he said.

As for the deficit, Ghalib said that it's a matter of looking for new revenue sources – something city officials have been chasing after for many years.

The city's new parking meter system has generated controversy in recent weeks, with a number of people complaining that the meters are too complicated, and that some of them don't work, and that they end up getting tickets they don't deserve.

Ghalib said he's talked to several business owners who say they have lost about 30 percent of their customers because of the meters.

The mayor said there is

a city council sub-committee looking into the matter.

He also noted that the city has a five-year contract with the meter company, although there could be some wiggle room to get out of it if the company doesn't receive its projected revenue.

The mayor campaigned on making the city's various commissions and boards more ethnically and racially diverse, and he took that first step by informing three Housing Commission members that they will be replaced.

Lastly, Ghalib addressed a proposal by community activist Nasr Hussain to sell city lots simply to the highest bidders with no strings attached, instead of requiring successful bidders to build housing units in the lots.

(The idea behind requiring housing units to be built is that it will bring in more tax revenue.)

Ghalib said Hussain's idea is "a good idea."

"I'll take it into consideration," he added.



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Mayor: A short report on this week's activities

As the Covid crisis fades, or so it seems, Mayor Ameer Ghalib's weekly report to the community continues to get shorter.

On Monday, he zipped through the latest Covid numbers for the past week in Hamtramck: there were just five new cases, bringing the total number of cases for the past two years up to 4,672, and the number of deaths in Hamtramck from Covid for this period remains at 73.

Moving on, the mayor

then reported, via both the city's Facebook page and his own, that he received two awards for community service last week: one from the Arab American Organization for Civil Rights, and another from the Detroit City Council.

Locally, Ghalib said that he has notified three Hamtramck Housing Commission members that they are being replaced, and that he thanked them for his service.

He also named the three replacement appointees to the commis-

sion. For those who may question his authority to make that change, he cited a city charter: chapter 5, part H.

"This is just for the people questioning my decision," he added.

As for the new commission make-up, he had this to say:

"They will work together and make a great team."

Eid Mubarak. Have a blessed Ramadan.



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

Reminder... For those of you who missed this last week, there is good news for Wayne County homeowners who are facing tax foreclosure.

Wayne County homeowners who fell behind on their 2017-19 property taxes have been given further reprieve from losing their homes by a recent court filing by Wayne County Treasurer Eric R. Sabree.

There is now a moratorium on county foreclosures for property tax delinquen-

cy (from those three specific years) for another year, through March 31, 2023.

This was done due to the continued economic impact being endured by residents from the COVID-19 pandemic.

But it was also able to be done because of the availability of federal funds for the purpose.

Note: This order does not spare homeowners whose tax debts are from 2016 or before. And, it is only for owner-occupied houses.

Sabree said, in the Treasury Department press release announcing the move: "Our number one priority remains keeping people in their homes, and too many Wayne County taxpayers are still suffering significant economic hardship due to the COVID-19 crisis."

He also cited the fact that many homeowners are still struggling to see their tax relief paperwork make its way through the process, including some who applied to the Michigan Homeowners Assistance Fund (MIHAF).

Putting children first – rise to the challenge

Putting the needs of our children first is a priority that we must all take responsibility for.

According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, 1 in 6 young adults age 12 to 17 experience depression, 3 million have had thoughts of suicide and there has been a 31% increase in mental health-related emergency department visits.

The Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) is focused on ensuring the healthcare needs of our children are being met by providing quality mental and physical healthcare, housing and educational supports and programs.

By working with our provider partners and community stakeholders, it is time that we rise to the challenge of caring for the next generation. these formidable years of adolescence. According to Dr. Shama Faheem,

DWIHN Chief Medical Officer and Child Psychiatrist "Young people in the foster care system have complicated and severe medical, mental, oral, and psychosocial health issues; trauma rooted in childhood experiences are common and can be linked to serious impacts in adolescence and adulthood."

The ability to be a reliable person in a foster child's life can be rewarding; by providing coping mechanisms, you are offering hope and guidance on how to deal with stressful situations. As these young adults age out of the system they will need these tools to prepare them for the real world. Where will they live, work, go to school?

DWIHN is committed to providing hope for these young children as they age out of the foster care system working with our community partners and offering job training, educational opportunities and housing accommodations so they can focus on their future.

They don't have the family or financial support systems that the thousands of other teenagers have to help make their mark on this world. We will continue to offer stability and be the consistent presence in their lives into adulthood.

Many of our children are dealing with situations beyond their control; mental illness, abuse and neglect. It is time that we accept the challenge of putting our vulnerable children first. Making quality healthcare and educational services a priority to guarantee their opportunities for success.

City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Feb. 8, and all councilmembers were present.

Councilmember Amanda Jaczkowski announced that the Special Olympics will be held in Detroit in July and August, and some of the events will be held at Hamtramck's Keyworth Stadium.

The council recognized Black History Month in a proclamation. It read, in part:

"Black Hamtramckans have served as employees, City Council members, School Board members and City Commission members since 1920, and Hamtramck is a better place for it.

"A knee to the neck of justice opened the eyes of millions of Americans and launched a summer of protest that resonated not just in Hamtramck, but all over America and around the world. Here at home,

work has begun to restore our Historic Negro League Stadium, on dedicating the new Sarah Garrett Park and finishing the decades old lawsuit of the same name.

"Historically the City of Hamtramck has not fully lived up to the founding principles of this Nation - that all people are created equal and have the right to be treated equally throughout their lives and this City Council and administration are and have been dedicat-

ed to fulfilling this promise now and in the future."

In another proclamation, the council recognized International Mother Language Day, which was held on Feb. 21.

That proclamation read, in part:

"The date represents the day in 1952 when students demonstrating for recognition of their language, Bangla, as one of the two national languages of then Pakistan, were shot and killed by police in Dhaka, the capital of what is now Bangladesh....

"The City of Hamtramck with its rich tradition of cultural diversity

agrees with the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural

Organization (UNESCO) that languages are the most powerful instruments of preserving and developing our tangible and intangible heritage.

"All moves to promote the dissemination of native languages will serve not only to encourage linguistic diversity and multilingual education but also to develop fuller awareness of linguistic and cultural traditions throughout the world and to inspire solidarity based on understanding, tolerance and dialogue."

Annual reports were presented from the Zoning Board of Appeals, Plan Commission and Historical Commission.

City Manager Kathy An-

gerer said that the city's historical museum "is a real community center."

Mayor Amer Ghalib noted that he "would like to see more diverse names" on the city's historical commission.

Commission Chairman Greg Kowalski said he and fellow commissioners welcome diversity, and encouraged anyone interested in serving on the commission to apply.

In another presentation, an update was given on the Joe Louis Greenway project, which is a biking/hiking trail that is 27 miles in length and goes through Hamtramck, Detroit and Dearborn.

A representative for the project said it's more than just a trail.

"It's economic viability," the representative said.

In other words, there is an expectation that people using the trail will also be visiting the city's businesses.

Councilmember Khalil Refai said he welcomes the trail.

"I can't wait for it to happen here," he said.

The project's representative said that there is still fundraising ongoing for the trail, and that its creation "will be popping up in stages."

In new business, the first step was taken in adopting amendments to the city's zoning ordinance.



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
