Hamtramck's refurbished baseball stadium is rededicated

Leave it to Hamtramck Historical Commission Chairman Greg Kowalski to put Monday's rededication ceremony for the historic Hamtramck Stadium in perspective.

"We are making history today," he said. "We are finally seeing this stadium restored."

On Monday, about 200 people, many who appeared to be from outside of Hamtramck, came to celebrate the rebirth of the stadium, and also to pay tribute to Negro League player Ron Teasley Sr., now 95 years old and still as sharp as they come.

Teasley was there with his family, and sat front-row center by the lectern that faced the newly-installed bleachers.

He spoke briefly.

Teasley said that, in the stadium's heyday, it was "jammed" with people, especially after church services on Sundays.

Organizers hope that the stadium's new life will also attract thousands of visitors.

The stadium's history was not fully realized until several years ago, when it was discovered that it was built in 1930 for the Negro baseball league — which was back in a time when African-Americans were barred from playing in the then-all-white Major Leagues.

The stadium is one of only five such stadiums still standing.

Greg Kowalski said that

this part of history was not known when he was growing up and playing in the stadium himself in the 1950s.

"It was buried in Hamtramck's history," he said. "Hamtramck Black history is simply amazing."

Once the stadium's historical significance was discovered, the city was able to attract various government and private grants. Over \$2 million

has been spend on rebuilding the stadium and grandstands, as well as on replacing the field.

It is hoped more grants will be awarded to turn the area into a full-blown entertainment site — one where various sports can be played, as well as concerts and other activities.

A former student of Teasley said that while there were two separate base-

"It's unfortunate to see her leave," Ghalib said. "We worked well with her over the past five months or so, but I guess she found a better opportunity, as she said, and we thank her for her sincere work with us in serving our city, and we wish her luck in her future endeavor."

"However, we will make this loss an opportunity for a change to the better as well. There are different opinions among city council members about the next step, but we all agree that the process should be based on fair and equal opportunity for all, and then go from

Piast starts nutrition program

The Piast Institute continues to pile up the achievements.

Their latest is the garnering of a grant for almost \$50,000 toward the establishment of a nutritional program being called "Family Table," which is targeting underserved youth and families within several local zip codes.

The grant comes from the Wayne County Commissioners, with special support from Commissioner Martha G. Scott.

As the press release noted, the zip codes of 48203, 48205, 48212 (which includes Hamtramck) and 48234 have some of the highest levels of poverty in the entire metro Detroit area. The grant is meant to supply the families and children of these area with better nutrition.

It was noted that these areas have 100 percent free lunch programs for schoolkids, a statistic which impacts some 16,000 students.

CEO and co-founder of the Piast Institute, Vignia Skrzyniarz, said of the effort, "Food Security, Food Justice, and Food Equity are some of the most important items we are trying to address in this area."

Among some of the initiatives, for example, will be the introduction of families who receive

ball leagues at one time – one for whites and the other for blacks – the Negro League was superior.

“The Negro League was the Major League,” the student said.

Baseball historians back that statement up, saying the Negro League had far better talent.

State Rep. Abraham Aiyash, a Hamtramck resident, perhaps summed

up the rebirth of the stadium best.

“We are the crown jewel of the Midwest,” he said.

After the rededication ceremony, two all-black baseball teams, one from Chicago and one from Detroit, squared off and played a game.

Both teams were wearing uniforms from the era of the Negro League.

Baseball is back in

there.”

Angerer took over control as city manager after former City Manager Katrina Powell left – but first, as interim city manager, in 2017.

In a contentious city council meeting, she was appointed as city manager in 2018.

During her tenure, various improvements to the city were made, thanks, in many cases, to county, state and federal grants. Those improvements included; new sewer lines in some portions of the

city, increased street repaving, and major improvements to Veterans Park and to the historic baseball stadium.

But also, due to increased costs and dwindling revenues to the city, Hamtramck has been forced to operate in deficit spending.

Federal covid pandemic grants have helped stave off some budget shortfalls.

Financial crises are nothing new to Hamtramck. Over the past 20 years, there have been two state-appointed city managers who temporarily took over financial control of the city.

While they were eventually able to balance the city's budget, it came largely from the help of state loans that the city has been repaying.

Neither state-appointed

city manager solved the city's long-term financial problems. The main financial drain is the city's pension obligation – which only keeps increasing, while the city's revenues decrease.

It will now be up to the city council to decide who will be interim city manager until a new one is hired.

management and government.



Covid: New cases hold steady here, and children can now get vax

Covid appears to have had another uptick during the past week.

According to Wayne County health officials, there were 45 new Covid-19 cases, bringing the total covid cases up to 5,091 for the past two years, since when the pandemic started.

The number of deaths for that period is 74 –

which went up by one from the week before.

About 17 percent of the city's population has now come down with covid. There are over 29,000 people living in the city.

Hamtramck is one of more than a dozen metro communities considered to be a high-risk area to catch the virus.

There are a few things

you can do to reduce your chances of catching covid. The main ways are to mask up when going out in public, limit your exposure of contact with others, and keep your distance from one another.

Those precautions seem to be getting largely ignored by the public, at least lately here in the metro area, from what we've seen. Restaurants and bars have been packed with people, virtually none of whom are masked.

Major events, such as sports events and concerts, have also returned, with people sitting or standing side-by-side.

The only good news is that the latest covid variant seems to be less deadly, and many have reported experiencing only mild symptoms.

However, covid is still killing people – over 300 a day nationally – more than

the average for car crashes or suicides.

The latest update nationally about covid is that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has OK'd covid vaccinations for children under 5 years old, starting now at six months and up.

In a press release by the CDC's Dr. Rochelle P. Walensky, she said:

“Together, with science leading the charge, we have taken another important step forward in our nation's fight against Covid-19.

“We know millions of parents and caregivers are eager to get their young children vaccinated, and with today's decision, they can.”

- A Dodge Day PowerPoint on the history of the Dodge Main plant, September TBD.

- A school essay/vid-

eo contest: "What Hamtramck means to me" - fall.

- A celebration of great Hamtramckans, and a history of Hamtramck display and presentation at the Hamtramck Historical Museum - October TBD.

- A New Year's Eve Celebration - TBD.

Kowalski added that, without the Dodge Main plant, which attracted tens of thousands of people to move here for employment, "We (Hamtramck) wouldn't be here today. We would have been absorbed by Detroit."

Dodge Main closed in 1980.

Lynn Blasey of the Arts Commission said that street banners promoting the centennial will be going up on Jos. Campau Ave. She added that the logo will be free for anyone to use to promote an event or item.

Two proclamations were read honoring Hamtramck Police Reserve members, and another honoring National Police Week.

During public comment, Bill Meyer criticized the city's new parking meter system. He said Royal

Volunteers have to do this, not city officials.

Detroit's Care Center is the first of its kind

The Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) held a groundbreaking ceremony on Wednesday, June 22, for the City of Detroit's first Clinical Care Center.

"We are pleased to transform this building into a Clinical Care Center in which people that need short term crisis intervention whether it's for mental health or substance use disorder, get the help they need and get connected to services and support," said DWIHN President/CEO Eric Doeh.

"The goal is to alleviate taking someone who is in crisis to jail or the emergency department and get them the appropriate help



they need. This Care Center is unique because all the services are all under one roof, Crisis Stabilization, Crisis Residential and Crisis Sober Living."


The facility scheduled to open early 2023 will be a place where adults and children can be evaluated to determine their medical necessity for crisis level services. It will add 39 beds to DWIHN's Crisis Continuum and will be a 24-hour Clinical Care

Center. "Wayne County has approximately 1.6 million people, with a population like that, we should have at least 3 crisis centers," said Doeh.

"This is an opportunity to provide access to quality behavioral healthcare services in the community and continue to erase the stigma that comes along with mental health. There is no shame in asking for help. We want services to be accessible for all, no matter zip code, age or race."

DWIHN is compassionate and committed to the 75,000 children and adults it serves in Detroit

Oak has the same system, and their residents are "pissed" about it.

A lengthy discussion was held on new housing being built on city-owned lots. City Manager Kathy Angerer said that pre-fabricated housing will be coming here.

The council also approved the sale of two lots, 11738 Sobieski for \$10,000 and 3964 Prescott for \$10,500. Proceeds from the sale will go toward paying the city's pension obligation.

A developer, Dream New Home Builders, will be building two-family houses on each lot.

A tree-trimming contract was awarded to Limb Walkers Tree & Snow.

The city accepted a \$195,800 grant from the State of Michigan Department of Treasury in a special grant for "Financially Distressed Cities, Villages and Townships."

The money will be used for "Technology Project-Financial Security and Public Safety Improvements."
