## Crystal ball gazing at what's in store for the coming year

So, here we are in a new year.

What can Hamtramck expect over these coming 12 months?

Let's clear off our crystal ball and take a look.

First up is the hiring of a new city manager. The deadline to apply for the position was this past Tuesday, and over 100 people have applied. Unfortunately for most of them, their applications were weeded out because they didn't come close to having the qualifications the city was looking for.

That left just a handful of candidates for the city council and mayor to consider. It's expected that a decision will be made fairly quickly.

As for other key department positions that became vacant in the past few months, those positions have been filled.

Development-wise, there has been a steady stream of small businesses opening lately, which has helped fill in some of the long-vacant storefronts that a certain

property owner had stubbornly kept empty.

Word is, that property owner has sold a number of his buildings.

Over on Conant, the former Missant site will be getting a major redevelopment this year, now that the city finally OK'd a tax abatement deal that clears the way for a \$19 million investment.

A number of the existing buildings, many of them dilapidated, will be knocked down, which will be that much less indus-

trial blight we all have to suffer with.

Those vacant city lots have been selling at a pretty good clip. Those lots had to be held back from development because they were tied up in a complicated housing lawsuit the city struggled had with for some 40 years.

That lawsuit will finally be settled with the construction of three housing units – the last three out of 200 that had to be built.

The lots are being sold with the requirement that housing units are built on them. All of this means more housing, more people, and more people paying property and income taxes.

The new housing also comes at a time when there is a general housing shortage in the metro area.

In other development news, the ongoing repairs and improvements will continue at Veterans

## City OKs animal sacrifices

In an expected move, a majority of city councilmembers and the mayor voted at Tuesday's council meeting in favor of allowing animal slaughtering to be conducted at homes.

The council had been wrestling with this issue for several months.

The practice of animal slaughtering is allowed in the context of a religious observance.

At Tuesday's meeting, which ran for over three hours, a number of residents spoke both for, and against, the practice.

Those who are for it argue that it's their First Amendment right to practice their religion. For those of the Muslim faith, animal slaughtering happens at Eid, the festival held at the end of the Ramadan fasting month, and the sacrificed animal's meat is consumed.

The general practice among Muslims is to slaughter lambs or goats, but there is nothing in the city ordinance that bars the slaughter of cows or pigs.

The new city ordinance is also open to those of other faiths to also be allowed to slaughter animals, which could conceivably happen at any time of the year.

Noir Ali of the organization CAIR (Council on American-Islamic Relations) threatened to take legal action if the city prohibited the custom.

"Muslims are protected in other cities, and deserve to be protected here as well," Ali said.

Those against the practice say they fear that public sanitation will be compromised, from animal waste, because of the city's dense housing.

Mohammed Islam said that allowing home animal sacrifices will be “catastrophic.”

“It’s not safe nor humane,” he said. “Our city is dirty enough. We don’t want to make it more dirty.”

Others have argued that home butchering must be done carefully because its easy to contaminate the meat.

Mayor Amer Ghalib stressed that he is trying to avoid a lawsuit being filed against the city. He voted in favor of allowing the practice.

City Attorney Odel Meroueh said that a 1993 U.S. Supreme Court decision prohibits banning the religious practice.

That decision came out of a case in Florida, where

those of an obscure religious faith challenged a local law outlawing the practice.

While many have pointed to that court decision being decisive on the matter, there are others who argue that it’s not that cut and dry.

In a paper published by the Michigan State University College of Law, attorney Shannon L. Doheny argued that the decision “may be the most misunderstood legal precedent in recent history.”

“The decision is often cited for the proposition that religious practitioners have a constitutional right to engage in animal sacrifice,” Doheny said.

“This is far from the truth.”

In passing the update to the city’s animal ordinance, there was still one noted prohibition, based on state law, which is that the animal slaughtering must be done humanely.

However, it has been argued that, in order to prosecute someone for not following state law, incidents must be reported.

Residents here will also be required to properly dispose of the animal waste.

The council’s action Tuesday attracted Detroit-area news outlets. The reaction from many in the metro area has been one of dismay at the decision.

In this most recent vote, those in favor of allowing animal sacrifices were

Councilmembers Nayeem Choudhury, Mohammed Hassan, Amanda Jaczkowski and Mayor Ghalib.

Councilmembers Mohammed Alsomiri and Muhith Mahmood voted against the ordinance because they wanted to postpone the matter for further research.

Councilmember Khalil Refai was absent.

Park, and at the historic baseball stadium. The city has received millions of dollars to bring both back to life and, so far, there has been an amazing transformation.

The baseball stadium was once home to the old Negro League, and plans call for not only hosting baseball games, but also for the stadium to become an entertainment complex.

Think live music performances. Could Hamtramck be the next Pine Knob? Anything’s possible.

One key piece of the puzzle to putting the park and stadium back in shape is finding a new director for the city’s parks conservancy. That position became suddenly vacant a few months ago.

Who likes to go bike riding?

Believe it or not, not everyone. But despite some protestations, the city now has bike lanes along Jos. Campau that will eventually hook up with a walking/biking trail that will run through Hamtramck, Detroit, Dearborn and Highland Park.

It’s called the Joe Louis Greenway.

One of the more exciting aspects of the Hamtramck trail is that a sizeable portion will run through the Campau alley, on the west side, from Caniff to Holbrook.

The city recently hired a design firm to sketch out the details for just how that will look – and some of the preliminary models suggest it’s going to be a

cultural treasure.

Health-wise, the replacement of old lead water lines at homes will continue. The city recently was awarded \$300,000 from the federal government to continue that program.

Eventually, either this year or next, the repaving of Caniff will continue. Last year, the repaving was completed from the I-75 service drive up to Jos. Campau.

Soon, the rest of the avenue will get dug up and replaced. Yes, that will cause a major traffic headache, but hey, that’s all part of progress.

In cultural developments, the city’s Arts and Culture Commission presented a number of events last year, and it’s

expected even more will be offered this year.

Last year, it seemed that the city’s 100th anniversary made the Hamtramck Labor Day Festival extra special. We expect to see that civic pride continue this year.

The highlight of the festival was Hamtramck’s very own parade, and it was a smashing success. This parade will return as it replaces the Polish Day Parade, which high-tailed it to Warren after making Hamtramck home for decades.

Well, the images in the old crystal ball are beginning to fade, but there is still plenty more waiting to happen this year, so get lots of rest, and be prepared to have some fun.

## Mayor says he lived up to his campaign promises, and more

Hamtramck Mayor Amer Ghalib took a few minutes – 11 or so, to be exact – to address the community on the highlights of last year.

Ghalib has just finished the first year of his four-year term, and he talked to the community via his Facebook page.

He pointed out that he was able to deliver on his campaign promises.

“Some people thought I could not fulfill my duties,” he said, because of his work schedule as a “health care professional.” Ghalib is a licensed nurse.

“I actually proved them wrong,” he said. “I was able to continue serving people in the healthcare field” and fulfill his duties as mayor, which included attending every meeting, and representing the city in events held outside of Hamtramck.

Ghalib also said that this schedule came at a personal sacrifice of time away from his family, and said that he is also taking a 25-30 percent income reduction.

“But that’s OK,” Ghalib said. “It was expected. ... The only thing not accepted is to fail in performing my duties and responsibilities ... toward the community.”

He pointed out that, during the past year, the city hall workforce has become more culturally and racially diverse, as has the makeup of city com-

missions.

Ghalib also boasted that under his leadership “Only in Hamtramck can you see the mayor appoint his (political) opponents to boards and commissions.”

His example of this spirit of cooperation included appointing former Hamtramck mayor Karen Majewski, who he defeated in the 2021 election, to the Downtown Development Authority, and Kamal Rahman to the Hamtramck Housing Commission.

Rahman also ran for mayor in 2021, but did not survive the primary election to move on to the runoff between Majewski and Ghalib in the general election.

Ghalib said that Rahman became one of his advisors.

Under his leadership, Ghalib said, there’s been a string of investments into the city from the opening of large and

small businesses.

One of the key investments, he said, is the e-commerce company, Xbox, which is redeveloping the former Missant plant site on Conant. That project will cost \$19 million, and promises to be in 75 new jobs, the mayor said.

The city is also involved in development with the ongoing sale of city lots. For the past couple of years, the city has been selling lots to would-be developers, who are then required to build housing units on them.

That, in turn, will bring in more residents and more property taxes, he said.

The state also gave Hamtramck a financial helping hand by granting about \$17 million to shore up its pension fund. That influx of money will take the fund to 60 percent of being fully funded.

That payment is expected this coming summer.

Recently, it was announced, by former U.S. Representative Brenda Lawrence, that Hamtramck will receive \$300,000 to continue the replacement of lead water lines leading into residences.

The city also secured almost \$1 million to build that last three housing units the city was required to construct in order to settle a long-standing housing discrimination case.

Ghalib pointed out that, with the completion of that housing, the city will also save what has amounted to millions of dollars for attorney fees for the past 40 years while this lawsuit dragged out.


Other highlights include:

- Ongoing grant money to upgrade and repair Veterans Park and the historic baseball stadium.
- Hosting a major international soccer match at Keyworth Stadium.

- A better deal on the city parking meters with the company that controls them – by shortening the hours of operation, and increasing the grace time to pay the meters for those wishing to quickly rush into a store to purchase something.

- Election ballots are now printed in Arabic as well and Bengali and English.

“These are just some of the accomplishments of our team,” Ghalib said in conclusion.

## Covid update: New variant is more contagious and it's spreading

Covid's newest variant, XBB, continues to spread fast in the country, and is especially aggressive in the northeast region of the U.S., say media reports.

Health experts are saying that anyone not vaccinated is susceptible to getting the virus, as are those who have not received the latest covid variant booster shot.

But even those who are up to date on booster shots can also get this virus – you just won't be as sick as others, health officials say.

U.S. health officials are concerned that China has opened its borders to travelers despite undergoing a mass outbreak of covid.

China is also upset over the U.S. policy requiring that those travelling from China must first test negative for covid before entering the country.

The U.S. is experiencing a sudden spike in the number of new covid cases, as well as an uptick in hospital admissions. Some hospitals have reported that they are running critically low on available beds for patients.

Since the pandemic started three years ago, here in the U.S. there have been 101 million reported covid cases, and 1.1 million deaths from the disease.

In Hamtramck, there have been 21 new cases reported for the past week, bringing the total number of cases here to 5,811.

The number of deaths locally for this time period remains at 81.

This latest outbreak of covid has prompted Ann Arbor schools to require masking for students and staff. Wayne County is also advising schools to bring back masking.

## Other Voices: Guest Editorial

### Helping children one family at a time

Positive and healthy mental health is critical to everyone especially to children and youth and it includes overall well-being such as their emotional, physical and behavioral health. It can affect how they think, feel, and act and it can affect how they handle stress and make healthy decisions.

The Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) serves 75,000 individuals in Detroit and Wayne County who are struggling with mental illness, substance use and disability related concerns.

DWIHN also has a robust Children's Initiatives Department serving children and families and providing them with the help they need at home, at school and in the community.

"There's a wide spectrum when addressing mental health problems in young people," said DWIHN Director of Children's Initiatives Cassandra Phipps.

"For example, some youth might present with something called "adjustment disorder" where they are having a hard



time adjusting, and we have to figure out if it is something on that level or more serious like a mood disorder."

DWIHN manages several different grant opportunities and programs. One very successful program is called "Parenting Management Training Oregon Model" (PMTO), where parents can

learn the skills they need to provide adequate care for their kids.

This program is designed for children from preschool to adolescents and it helps parents promote positive change in their families.

DWIHN also offers early childhood infant mental health services for mothers struggling with pregnancy or addiction and may be experiencing a high-risk pregnancy. In addition, services are

offered to youth involved in the investiga-

tion or abuse of parents or children who are considered mentally ill.

"There are many different aspects of the young person's life that DWIHN can assist with whether it is a mental illness or disability-related concern," said Phipps. "We have providers, clinicians, therapists, school-based programs that can help children and parents flourish and learn how to cope with what is happening in their lives."

For parents, grandparents and guardians who may be raising teens and young adults, DWIHN offers many resources and programs through its Youth United program. These young people are advocates and ambassadors for mental health and they are out in the community every day spreading the word about stigma and mental health.

DWIHN also has providers including Black Family Development that offers Leadership and Training by preparing young adults to transition out of the home.

# At this thrift store, it's the workers who are in charge

they had to say about their store:

**The Review: So, can you give us a short, capsule history of how it all began, and has come to this? The who, how, etc.?**

Public Thrift: Public Thrift started as a pop-up in 2019, and had a short-term space through the Build Institute's Pilot Program in early 2020.

The goal was to re-create a thrift store into a model that is community owned, affordable, and inclusive. The store was dormant for two years due to the pandemic, and because it was difficult to find affordable space to lease. We started working towards opening a storefront.

**The Review: When, and why, did you decide to locate your second, much-larger, store in Hamtramck? Are you renting the space, or did you buy it? How long did it take you to get the store open after you acquired the space?**

PT: Hamtramck was a good location because of its affordable commercial space, and because of the relatively easy city start-up process for resale stores.

When we were offered this space by the building's owner, we saw it as an opportunity to become a part of other re-sellers in the corridor, including Tekla Vintage, Rat Queen Vintage, and Detroit Threads.

The Owner of Oloman Café was also very encouraging, and we felt excitement in that location

from our customers in Hamtramck.

Also, down the street are fellow worker-owned co-ops Book Suey and Detroit Iyengar Yoga, which was also a huge plus for us – to be near other co-op businesses.

**The Review: How long have you been open now, in the Hamtramck space? What types of items do you mostly have right now? What are you looking for more of, if anything?**

PT: We've been open for just a month. It took over a year to get the building ready, but we are happy to finally be open!

We sell mostly adult clothing and accessories, household items, books, and jewelry. We always have random items, some furniture, and vintage items too.

**The Review: How do you decide who does what job in your collective approach? Does everyone, for example, get a chance to price things on a given day or shift? Or do the more desirable jobs fall to those with, e.g., more seniority or experience?**

PT: We each have a day that we work, and some members do computer work at home such as bookkeeping and social media.

We each have a manager role, such as Donations Manager or Finance Manager, and we meet weekly to check in and give updates about the store.

The way we have shared work is mostly based on who is interest-

ed in what, and, if someone needs training, other members support that person in learning what they need to succeed in the role.

**The Review: I noticed that you may (re)start taking consignments at some point in the future. I've had bad luck with places in the past, "losing" items, etc. – what kind of a system will you have to keep track of everyone's things that they bring you, if you start doing this?**

PT: We have racks, in the front of the store, that are only for one or two consigners at a time, so we work closely with each consigner and track their sales.

At the end of the month, they get a portion of what is sold, and they take the rest of the items back with them. They have to tag their items with their logo; so far, it's been easy to keep track of their items and what sells.

**The Review: Do you have any immediate (or soon-forthcoming) plans to expand even more? If so, where would you want to open the next store, and why?**

PT: We would love to get more space. It's very hard to keep our donations organized, and it would be great if we had more space for that.

For now, we love our little storefront, and will probably invest in better storage. At some point, multiple locations would be a dream for us!

**The Review: Do you**

**get many people wanting to barter price with you? Do you, in fact, barter?**

PT: We mostly get people saying our prices are very cheap, so no one has asked us to buy something for less. We try to sell things for 20% of retail value or less, so, even if the item is brand new, it's a very good deal.

**The Review: Your hours are, right now, Wednesdays through Sundays. Any plans to expand the hours you are open, or are you content with things as they are in that regard?**

PT: So far we are content with our hours – we like having a few days off!

**The Review: Feel free to add anything else you would like to about your interesting business concept!**

PT: We've had a really positive reception from the community and local neighbors. We look forward to meeting everyone, and hearing stories of the other stores that used to be in our space, and seeing regulars visit the shop. We feel really lucky to have opened in a place like Hamtramck.

A couple of other points:

- The first Friday and Saturday of the month are \$10 Days: Fill a Bag with items for \$10, it's a great way to get a bargain!

- We love community partnerships; please contact us if you are interested in partnering, or have an idea about how we can support community work or be more inclusive as a thrift store.


- We have lots of items to donate, if there is a community group that is looking for clothing donations, please reach out!
