Jihan Aiyash said it's within her authority as president to create the agenda.

"That's your opinion," Hadwan shot back, to which Aiyash replied: "No, that's my role."

The Review reached out to Aiyash and district Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed by email for an explanation on how the law firms were chosen to be on the board's agenda,

but they did not respond. It is the board's own policy to keep the public informed of its operations.

The Hamtramck Board of Education recently hired a new team of attorneys, but

it's not saying how those attorneys were selected to take over legal duties.

According to policy section 9120: "The Board of Education believes that all reasonable means should be employed to keep the public informed on matters of importance regarding District policies, finances, programs, personnel, and operations."

Since 2020, the dist-

rict has spent almost \$1 million on legal fees. The district is facing about a dozen lawsuits, most of which have been filed by former employees, and also by some current employees who are out on paid suspension.

Included in that list of lawsuits is one filed by Superintendent Ahmed against the district, the teachers' union and se-

Election investigation is ongoing

For weeks now, Hamtramck's rumor mill has been swirling with speculation about an investigation into last fall's city council election.

This week, it's been confirmed by multiple sources that, indeed, the state's Attorney General's Office is interviewing residents about who handled their ballots.

There have been accusations that some candidates conducted ballot harvesting, even potentially going so far as to fill out ballots for some unsuspecting residents.

According to one source who is knowledgeable of the investigation, there is surveillance footage from city hall showing a person, or persons, dropping off bundles of ballots in the city's drop box.

"They (AG agents) are adamant, and pushing through with this," said the source, who asked not to be identified.

The Review reached out to the AG's Office for comment, but no one responded.

Councilmember City Mohammed Hassan, who was one of three candidates elected last November, said he has also heard that there is an investigation going on, but knew of no details, and added that he has not personally been interviewed by AG agents. On Hamtramck social media, it has also been reported that agents are knocking on doors, and that residents should cooperate. Accusations of ballot harvesting is nothing new in Hamtramck. In just about every city election across the last several years, there have been rumors of police investigations. Back in 2014, four local men were convicted of illegally handling absentee ballots. And while they only received minor fines and court fees, they each had felony convictions on their record for five years.





Prescription drop-off...

Once again the Hamtramck Drug Free Community Coalition (HDFCC), in collaboration with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Hamtramck Police Department, is participating in National Prescription Take Back Day on Saturday, April 27.

Here's what the Coalition has to say about the event:

"This initiative aims to provide a safe and convenient way for individuals to dispose of their unused or expired medications, helping to prevent misuse and abuse while safeguarding the environment.

"Residents are encouraged to bring their unwanted prescription medications to the lobby of the Hamtramck Police Department on April 27th. A disposal box is available to collect and properly dispose of all medications in a secure and confidential manner. This event is free Of special interest is and anonymous, with no

questions asked.

"According to the 2019 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 9.7 million Americans misused prescription pain relievers, 4.9 million misused prescription stimulants, and 5.9 million misused prescription tranquilizers or sedatives in 2019."

Lara Girdwood, Executive Director at the Hamtramck Drug Free Community Coalition, had this to say:

"The National Prescription Take Back Day is an important opportunity for our community to safely dispose of unused medications and prevent them from falling into the wrong hands."

In addition to the event at the Hamtramck Police Department, HDFCC will be hosting a medication collection event at the Senior Plaza on April 24 from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

Residents who are unable to attend the event on April 27 are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to safely dispose of their medications. Free Narcan training will also be provided on-site at the Senior Plaza.

The City of Hamtramck is proposing several new and the replacement of one Neighborhood Enterprise Zone (hereinafter "NEZ") districts in the City of Hamtramck for new and rehabilitated facilities. The NEZ was established by Public Act 147 of 1992, as amended. The program provides a tax incentive for the development and rehabilitation of residential housing. A qualified local unit of government may designate one or more areas as a NEZ within that local unit of government. The program was established to spur the development and rehabilitation of residential housing in communities where it may not otherwise occur. The program also encourages owner-occupied housing and new investment in communities.

The City of Hamtramck is proposing to set up three districts the city on streets with vacant lots that could use new housing developments, including but not limited to Danforth Avenue, Andrus Avenue, Grayling Avenue, Alice Avenue, and Denton Avenue; Oliver Avenue, Dorothy Avenue, and Miller Street; a portion of Trowbridge Street and Belmont Street.

A new facility is defined as a new structure or portion of a new structure that has as its primary purpose residential housing consisting of one or two units, one of which will be owner occupied as a principal residence. This definition includes a new individual condominium unit, in a structure with one or more condominium units, that has as its primary purpose residential housing which will be owner-occupied as a principal residence. A new facility may receive a tax incentive for a period of between 6 and 15 years. The City of Hamtramck is looking to establish districts where a tax incentive will not exceed a period of 15 years.
