# Future of school district superintendent is still unknown

Did Hamtramck Public Schools Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed return to her job this week?

That was the week's burning question.

According to sources, Ahmed was expected to return from her paid medical leave this week, after having been on it for the past two months.

The Review reached out to Interim Superintendent Michael Williamson as to whether he knows when – or even if – Ahmed will return, but he did not respond to an email.

Neither Ahmed nor school board president Jihan Aiyash responded to an email.

Toni Coral, President of the Hamtramck Federation of Teachers, said she was not aware of Ahmed returning.

Ahmed took a leave after getting a poor work performance review by the board of education last February. The board did not say why they gave Ahmed a poor review.

This is the second medical leave Ahmed has ta-

ken since becoming superintendent in 2019.

In October of 2022, Ahmed took her first paid medical leave, citing pressure from dealing with the covid pandemic.

That leave turned into a paid suspension that lasted until January of 2023, when the board not only brought her back, but also gave her a salary raise and extended her contract.

It was never explained by the board why Ahmed was suspended, other than to say there was an ongoing investigation. The board never explained the nature of the investigation.

During that suspension, Ahmed filed a federal lawsuit against some school board members, claiming discrimination, while suing the teachers' union for allegedly trying to get her fired.

Ahmed's tenure has been rocky. A number of veteran teachers and staff members resigned during her time as superintendent, saying that Ahmed and some of her ad-

ministrators had created a "toxic" work environment.

Several of those former staff members subsequently filed lawsuits against the district, which are still pending – as is Ahmed's.

On top of that, the school board has become increasingly divided over a number of issues, and one boardmember, Regan Watson, has not attended a meeting for about a year

since her fellow board members removed her as treasurer.

The board itself struggled last year to even hold their state-mandated monthly meetings. During last year, the board did not hold its monthly meeting in three separate months.

The board was scheduled, this month, to hold its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, after The Review went press.

# Pride flag fight seeks support

It's flag season in Hamtramck.

Last week, the city once again raised flags on the 18 flagpoles on Jos. Campau, between Caniff and Carpenter.

And once again, the city is displaying only the American flag.

But two former members of the city's Human Relations Commission want the city to also go back to displaying the flags of those countries from which Hamtramckans originally

Catrina Stackpoole and Russ Gordon are hosting a GoFundMe to raise money for the legal fees for their lawsuit against the city. Their campaign is called "Celebrate all of us. Raise all the flags."

Both were removed from the Commission after defying a city council resolution last year banning the display of pride flags, as well as international flags, on city property.

They were protesting the city council's decision to allow only the American flag, the city and state flags and the prisoner of war flag to be displayed on public property.

Stackpoole and Gordon raised a pride flag on one flagpole on a Sunday afternoon, which was removed by the city about an hour after it went up.

That council resolution came after heated debate in the community over the display of a pride flag on a Jos. Campau flagpole earlier last year.

Those opposed to the display of a pride flag objected on moral and religious grounds. The issue attracted substantial media attention, here and nationally.

Both Stackpoole and Gordon were subsequently fired, by Mayor Amer Ghalib and city council, from their unpaid positions on the commission for their act of defiance.

Up until then, Gordon volunteered to collect donations for the flags, and put them up each year, for no charge to the city.

Stackpoole and Gordon are saying the mayor's and

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

council's action is unconstitutional, and that the city's decision was based on religious beliefs.

The mayor and council are all Muslim, and currently all-male. They justified their ban as a way for the city to remain "neutral" in the debate of pride flags, as well as other potentially controversial ones.

"One of Hamtramck's greatest strengths is its unique diverse population, from all over the United States and the world. In recent years, as Hamtramck's population shifted from mostly eastern European immigrants to inclu-

de folks from Asia, Africa and the Middle East, we have enjoyed great food and culture and made new friends."

It continues:

"Sadly, in 2023, Hamtramck's new Mayor and Council decided to reverse all our hard work to make Hamtramck a welcoming city. The Council, with the Mayor's approval, passed a resolution prohibiting flying the pride flag on city property.

"We believe this law is both unconstitutional and goes against the spirit and intent of the flag project on Joseph Campau, that was meant to celebrate our diversity, recognize the beauty of our different backgrounds and make everyone feel welcome and included here in Ham-

Currently, depositions for the lawsuits are being conducted.

The city has, for now, taken over the purchasing, maintenance, and raising of the flags.

**Reminder...** The city is giving its citizenry a chance to weigh in on the Hamtramck ambitious Recreation District (HRD)

Well, two chances, actually: the easiest way, by far, is to attend an open house on the matter, on this Saturday, April 27, from 2-5 p.m., at the Kitab Café, 2727 Holbrook Ave. (on the first block west of Jos. Campau).

The other way is to go online and take the survey at: hamtramckparks.

The HRD is a proposal to "radically transform 26 acres of under-utilized open space, recreation fields, and disconnected historic sites into a community-invested, inclusive, and world-class park."

The artist's rendition of the area looks quite beautiful, the old historic stadium separated from what would be the new "arena" area, with a halfmile-long greenway path connecting it all.

The plan was actually developed in 2020, but of course the pandemic added time to its implementation schedule. Feedback had also been sought from the public at that time, with 436 community members having been engaged over a seven-month stretch.

Five themes emerged from that first feedback session as most-important to the respondents: Care and attention for the park; Safety throughout the park; Space and programs for women; Visibility, branding and signage; and the celebration of all cultures through events to be held there.

**Helping hand...** The good folks at Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) are part of the exciting NFL Draft happening in downtown Detroit.

They have set up response teams with Detroit police to deal with those suffering a mental health crisis.

"DWIHN is actively playing our position by providing critical supports and services during such an historic time in Detroit history and Detroit sports," said Eric Doeh, DWIHN President and CEO, in a press release.

Also DWIHN's mobile

crisis units will be stationed in hot spots like Ford Field, and various hotels. restaurants and bars.

DWIHN will be spreading the word of their services to people attending a number of other events including "Party off Park," a three-day NFL Draft party that the agency is sponsoring, by raising awareness and providing access to services while attendees enjoy the

DWIHN also joins a host of community leaders and organizations to honor Wally Triplett, the first African American drafted in the National Football League by the Detroit Lions in 1949. DWIHN is sponsoring the tribute event happening today, Friday, April 26, at Beatric Buck/ Paradise Valley Park.

"Trailblazers like Triplett are why we are here doing what we do, in sports and in life," said Doeh.

### Federal assistance...

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) wants to give you money. Maybe.

Reminders keep coming in from the FEMA office that they have extended the deadline to apply for federal monies to compensate those who suffered damage from the severe storm outbreak of Aug. 24-26, 2023.

That deadline is looming, with no guarantee that it will be extended again: As of right now, you need to have your application in by Wednesday, May 8, which is in less than two weeks.

These monies may cover home repair bills and property losses, but also bills that resulted from needing to be re-homed, whether temporarily, long-term or permanently. Other disaster-related needs may also qualify you won't know for sure until you ask.

The office will be closed, but will be open once again for business on Monday.

I get a lot of credit for founding the Hamtramck Historical Museum. Too much, really, because I didn't found the museum. No one person could accomplish something that complica-

In fact, the museum has been a collective community project from the start and a variety of people have played a role in its creation and growth. They rarely get the credit they deserve, and I have embarked on an ongoing project to highlight them in this newsletter.

This time around I must



ask Marcus Colona to take a big bow. Marcus is a professional architect who actually has designed museums. For years he has been working largely behind the scenes helping design the Hamtramck Historical Museum in a variety of whys ranging from floor space layout to complex

structural improvements. This is highly specialized work that frankly is not cheap. Yet Marcus has done his tremendous work on a volunteer basis. I don't know how we could have achieved what we have done without his services. But I do know that we would not be nearly as far along in creating a professional mu-

seum without him. I can't stress enough that we have a professional, experienced architect who works for a major New York-based firm helping us in Hamtramck. Marcus is a Hamtramckan who has been active in the community for years, even though he largely is in New York. But he has our community at heart, and you can see that every time you walk

into the museum.

It's that kind of spirit that has made this museum a reality. When the museum opened 10 years ago I remember being told by a local politician that we would be bankrupt and closed in two years. And he would have been right, except that he didn't take into account the dedication of a host of people who were determined to make the museum successful.

I have to admit that sometimes even I am surprised at the great support we have received. But I never stop appreciating all that they have done and continue to do. We can hang a plaque a museum wall thanking Marcus and the others who have helped us. But the real tribute to their efforts is the museum itself. The museum will outlast all of us.

And if it could, it too would say Thank You.

# City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on March 26, and all council-members were in attendance.

A proclamation was read in recognition of April being Arab-American Heritage Month. It went, in part:

"...Arab American Heritage Month provides an opportunity to honor and recognize the achievements, resilience, and diversity of Arab Americans, highlighting their positive impact on American society and their enduring commitment to the principles of equality, justice, and democracy; and the City of Hamtramck is home to a vibrant Arab American community, whose members have made significant contributions to the city's cultural heritage, economic vitality, and civic engagement; and Arab American Heritage Month serves as a reminder of the importance of embracing diversity, fostering inclusion, and promoting understanding and appreciation of all cultures within our society. ..."

Another proclamation was also read in to the record, and it was for "Autism Awareness and Acceptance."

During public comment, several residents complained about a hike they received in property taxes.

One resident said he did an extension of his house, resulting in his tax bill went from \$1,800 a year to \$6,500. He said the city manager reduced that to \$5,000, but that is "still a lot of money."

Mayor Amer Ghalib said that he has talked with the city manager and city assessor to adjust the housing values "to make it reasonable."

Ghalib also noted that he talked with officials in Dearborn and Dearborn Heights and that they are experiencing the same issue. said the delay in charges is making some believe

"You just don't hear those complaints," Ghalib said

Phill Kwik, a former city councilmember, said that a proposed city plan to cut space into Veterans Park to create diagonal parking will require 3/5ths of voter approval, per a city ordinance requirement.

A few residents spoke in favor of a proposal to create Neighborhood Enterprise Zones (NED) in some areas of the city. NEDs would greatly reduce property taxes for new housing construction or renovation of existing housing.

"This is going to be a great benefit to the city," said one resident.

A Jos. Campau commercial property owner complained about her buildings getting marred with graffiti.

"It's a consistent problem," she said. "It doesn't stop."

Nasr Hussain questioned how much revenue the city's parking meters generate.

Hassan Khan of Warren complained about the delay in charging a suspect who assaulted a person during a recent Bangladeshi event in front of city hall.

He said a suspect was arrested and released without being charged.

It was explained to him, and to several others in the council chambers with the same concern, that evidence was turned over the Wayne County's Prosecutor's Office, and that it's up to the prosecutor to file charges.

It was also explained that the Prosecutor's Office is greatly backlogged.

Later in the meeting, Councilmember Abu Musa said the delay in charges is making some believe Hamtramck is no longer a safe community. Musa also said that there might be a protest staged in front of city hall.

It was again explained to Musa that the matter is in the hands of the Prosecutor's Office, and that there is nothing the city can do about the matter.

It was suggested that a protest would be better served if it was held in front of the Prosecutor's Office in Detroit. Mayor Ghalib said the

matter involved a single incident over a dispute about politics.

Bill Meyer said the city

should print a notice for residents that explain how taxes work.

"It's a problem happe-

ning across the country," he said.

Regarding the new po-

lice chief, who is a Yemeni-American, his hiring "will make a big change" in the city, said Meyer. In new business, the

council approved an employment contract with Jamiel Altaheri, who will be the city's new chief of police.

He has been employed with the New York City Police Department, and is an "at will" employee here in Hamtramck. Altaheer will be paid a salary of \$118,000 per year.

Altaheer has not started employment yet with the city.

Moving on to an update on the city's budget, City Controller Syef Hamir Ahsan said the budget is on track to meet earlier projections.

Councilmember Mohammed Hassan questioned if there were any concerns about projected revenues.

Ahsan said he over-estimily units on each lot.

mated how much revenue income tax would generate, and that the city spent \$1 million more than expected on alley repaying.

The council agreed to cancel the April 9 council meeting in order to celebrate the end of Ramadan.

- Also approving, for the police department, the purchase of portable radios, at a cost of \$48,482, which will also be paid from the drug forfeiture
- Approving the purchase of a utility vehicle for the Building Department, at a cost of \$25,649.
- Allowing the city to sell three lots -2237 Andrus, 2471 Faber, and 11332 Lumpkin for \$30,000, to developers. The developers are Dorota Maternia and Andrew Kotlarz. They plan to construct two-family units on each lot.







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# **Book giveaway**

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# The sound of breaking glass at St. Florian Parish

An old crime trend reared its head Friday night.

Someone smashed out about a dozen windows at the former St. Florian school on Poland.

While property damage is still ongoing, and common, in the city, the act of smashing out windows doesn't happen too often. It used to be that a suspect would go down a block and smash out car windows.

Those motives often range from looking for items to steal, or even to steal the car itself, to doing it just for kicks.

As of now, the police department is still investigating the matter.

The pastor of St. Florian, Fr. Tomasz Pietrzak, didn't have much to say about the matter, other than calling the situation "very sad."

Pietrzak said he has not determined the cost of replacing the windows, most of which have been bordered up.

Although there is no good time for such a thing to happen, the parish is getting ready to host its annual Strawberry Festival on May 4-5, when thousands of parishioners, former students and friends will be attending to dine on home-cooked Polish dinners, dance to polkas and enjoy each other's company.

With the return of warmer weather, crimes like this tend to return, along with a few other weather-related trends.

This past week, there were numerous complaints about noise in town, although the exact nature of the noise is never explained in a police log. But it could include:

- Loud music
- · Loud people
- Kids making a ruckus
- Dogs barking
- Loud cars

Anyone who has lived in Hamtramck for a certain length of time also knows that there is usually a neighborhood crank on your block who can't stand to hear anything fun – or otherwise – going on.

If there is anyone new to city living – where people live in houses that are just a few feet apart – get used to it. You are going to hear a lot of pleasant and unpleasant things.

The daily incident reports also never go into detail about what police officers do about the complaints. But, every once and awhile, there is an arrest made in such a matter.

Also, with more people outside, there is always an increased chance that some hot heads will get into fights.

This past week, there were several separate complaints about assaults, gunshots, family trouble, and even a home invasion – all happening in the 12000 block of Selfridge.

That block contains the Col. Hamtramck housing project, which has long been a source of various kinds of trouble.

The Hamtramck Housing agency has a stern policy, however, of kicking out troublemakers fast.


