Mayor accused of interfering in CM search

It appears the city's newly-hired city manager had a helping hand getting the position.

And that assistance came from Mayor Adam Alharbi, according to emails he sent to the city's director of the Human Resources Department.

The Review obtained emails between Alharbi and the HR Department via a Freedom of Information Act request. The director of Human Resources, Mashana Burton, accused the mayor of trying to steer the hiring of the city manager toward Adel Al-Adlani.

"The only person(s) being interviewed (are) the applicant you like from Dearborn and Alex (Lagrou), who is already interim city manager. Currently, we have 8 applicants with great resumes, and no sub-committee member has reviewed them," Burton said, in one email exchange with Mayor Alharbi.

Alharbi responded, saying: "I think you should stay out of politics and follow the hiring process."

Alharbi defended his role in the selection process, telling The Review that "email chains obtained through FOIA requests can easily be misinterpreted or misunderstood when viewed without the context of the larger, ongoing discussions happening at the time."

In another email, Councilmember Hassan, who chaired a council sub-committee tasked with overseeing the hiring of a city manager, complained about the mayor rushing the interview process, saying on Feb. 4 that the sub-committee had yet to meet.

"Please let the process finish, then we will let the council and mayor call for an interview," Hassan said.

The Review reached out to Hassan for comment, but he did not respond.

Despite that plea from Hassan to slow down, the council voted to hire Al-Adlani just six days later, on Feb. 10.

On Feb. 6, Mayor Alharbi, in an email to Burton, said that the search for a city manager was over, despite having only interviewed one candidate for the job — Al-Adlani.

"We will not be holding additional interviews, as we need to avoid further delays in city business," Alharbi said.

But other interviews did take place, despite what Alharbi initially said.

The city's then interim city manager, Lagrou, was later interviewed. He had been on the job for only a few months.

also eventually interviewed, a night shift superintendent in the New York City Sanitation Department.

Another candidate was The applicant with the

most experience was the city manager of Royal Oak Twp.

That candidate was given a one-day notice to be interviewed, but she was unable to adjust her schedule in time, according to sources.

Alharbi and Al-Adlani have one thing in common that the other candidates didn't have: Both are Yemeni-Americans. None of the other city manager candidates were Yemeni-Americans.

Alharbi told The Review that, while it appeared he was pushing the matter, "my insistence on a robust process might be perceived as stepping over a line, my goal was actually to prevent favoritism toward the incumbent and

move away from the status quo. Ultimately, when all candidates sat down at the table, it became clear to everyone involved that Mr. Al-Adlani was the most qualified individual for the job."

The "incumbent" in question was Hamtramck's interim city manager Alex Lagrou, who was apparently favored by the

council sub-committee.

The city whittled down over two dozen applicants for the job to a final four.

Al-Adlani has a doctorate degree in public administration. He came from Dearborn, where he worked for the mayor's administration in the economic development department.

In total, the council spent only six weeks in its

search for a city manager. When it came to a vote before council a few weeks ago, Councilmember Nayeem Choudhury objected to being "rushed" into a decision.

The previous city manager was Max Garbarino, who also had no prior experience being a city manager. He was fired for his handling of the matter of former police chief Jamiel Altaheri.

Altaheri eventually reached an agreement with the city to leave his position voluntarily.

Garbarino has since filed a lawsuit against the city. He is now City Manager and Zoning Administrator for the Village of Lexington, which is located in Sanilac County.

What is our City Council up to these days?

We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Jan. 27, and all councilmembers, except for Muh-tasin Sadman, were in attendance.

Timothy Price of the city's Arts & Culture Commission said the commission has taken on a request by Mayor Adam Alharbi to oversee a new design of the city's logo/seal.

Price said the commission is seeking public input.

The Downtown Development Authority submitted its annual report. The DDA gave a recap of developments in 2025.

"As members of the com-

munity will have noticed, improving the physical space along the Joseph Campau corridor has been a top priority of the DDA over the past few years.

"Where 2024 saw replacements of the old banners lining the streets, the accelerated pace of improvements in 2025 included upgrades to holiday décor, more consistently maintained planter boxes and new hanging flower baskets. This winter,

as snow falls have been heavier than in recent years, the DDA and City are collaborating to provide a more robust snow removal and salting service along Joseph Campau. ...

"Additionally, in 2025, the DDA's Discover Hamtramck social media campaign continued to serve as an effective voice across and beyond Hamtramck's two square miles.

"Whether through promoting the Hamtramck

Night Bazaar, advertising the new Hamtramck Amanah Financing program, or highlighting specific local businesses, the reach of Discover Hamtramck remains a major benefit to our local business and Downtown community. As is the Hamtramck Night Bazaar, the much-loved DDA-sponsored event, which completed its first full season in 2025 and drew thousands of visitors to the City."

During public comment, a resident emailed their opposition to a proposal to allow property owners

After decades of asking for help, state is stepping in

Hamtramck's main business district on Jos. Campau has been struggling for decades.

The glory days of the district ended in the 1970s, with the 1980s seeing the fading away of most of those businesses that had still managed to hang on.

Consumers had fled to suburban malls – leaving Hamtramck's business district mostly just a memory.

Since its heyday, there have been a few brave entrepreneurs who have attempted to breathe some life back into what was once

known as Hamtramck's jewel.

Now, after decades of the city seeking help, the state is stepping in and offering assistance. It's not a total cure for the district's ills, but it's a start.

We applaud the city's Community Economic Development Department for bringing the state to the table. And, we thank the state for finally hearing our S.O.S. after these many years.

We don't expect a miracle turnaround, but, with the state willing to give some businesses a financial boost, well,

it's a start.

Also – in every government program, there is a certain amount of red tape.

For business owners, there will still be some cumbersome paperwork to fill out – typical of any state program – and there will be a requirement to use your own money upfront, with reimbursement coming after your project is completed.

Look at this as a beginning – one which may lead to more state assistance down the road.

And, for that, we are thankful.

to install shipping containers and large sheds to be used for dry storage.

The council later approved the proposal.

In another email, a resident said there is an "urgent need for improved snow removal" in the city.

The resident said other cities are more aggressive in clearing streets when it snows, and this need should take priority over the council's attention being focused on approving honorary street names.

"Currently, streets remain difficult and unsafe to use," said the resident.

Interim City Manager Alex Lagrou said the city's Public Works Department has been "working relentlessly to get this (snow removal) all done."

Hassan Aoun of Garden City said he is in favor of a proposal to hire Hussein Farhat as police chief for Hamtramck.

"He will engage with everyone in Hamtramck, no matter your race, your ethnicity, your religion, or your neighborhood because he does not discriminate," Aoun said.

"He treats people equally, and focuses on doing the job right," Aoun added.

Later in the meeting, the council hired Farhat as acting police chief.

During that council discussion, interim City Manager Lagrou praised Farhat, who is retired from

the Romulus Police Department, and is the former police chief of Dearborn Heights.

"I don't think I've met anybody who could be more qualified for this job," Lagrou said.

Farhat said he is honored to be offered the job.

"Hamtramck is a unique and diverse city, and serving this community – especially in this leadership role – is something I do not take lightly," Farhat said.

"I am here not to cause chaos. I am here to run this Police Department efficiently."

Councilmember Yousef Saed took issue with his hiring, particularly with Farhat serving as "acting" police chief.

"Calling this 'Acting' just sends a mixed message," Saed said.

He accused Lagrou of trying to "sneak in" Farhat's appointment by designating the position as "Acting Police Chief."

Saed also questioned why the city is hiring someone from outside the department. He was the sole vote against the appointment.

Continuing on in public comment, Naji Chowdhury urged the city not to cooperate with ICE agents and their round-up of suspected illegal immigrants.

He said city officials need to "calm" the fears some residents have about ICE.

Choudhury also said the city needs to do something about high property taxes "before people are forced to leave Hamtramck."

Ibrahim Aljahim said he has noticed that a number of city commission members don't live in the city. And he said that some commission members have attacked the mayor and some candidates.

"They should live in the city," he said.

Aljahim also said that the state attorney general and Hamtramck Police Department are working against current elected officials.

He added: "This is not a joke."

Bill Meyer said he "celebrates" a proposal to rename the Human Relations Commission as the Unity Commission.

He also said that Hamtramck was once dominated by a "white power structure." Meyer said that he has worked to "even things out so that everybody could be treated equally, but it was a big struggle."

Meyer said the city now has an administration that is "willing to open jobs for everybody – not because of your color."

In new business, the council honored Gary Gillette for his "sustained and instrumental efforts in preserving, restoring, and securing historic designation for Hamtramck Stadium."

In the council's resolution honoring Gillette, it said:

Here's what the Conservancy has to say:

"Bring items that no longer excite you, and refresh your wardrobe. Contribute to a circular economy – where we reject fast fashion, and help keep usable clothing out of landfills. Please only bring clothing that is clean and with life still in it (no holes or stains please)."

"We are excited to partner with Hamtramck Mutual Aid. Look forward to announcements here for additional partners and instructions!"

Reminder ... The Hamtramck 31st District Court is once again looking to give folks a financial break.

This time, it's an amnesty for overdue parking tickets, civil infraction tickets, and disposed misdemeanor cases.

Driver license clearance fees will not be waived

or discounted, so if you need to have your license reinstated, there will still be the normal charges.

The grace period begins this coming Monday, March 2, and runs through Friday, May 29, 2026.

The court paints it as a win-win in its press release: It allows people to clear their outstanding cases, and save some money while doing so, and it also helps the courts by clearing out a lot of the backlog of open or stalled cases.

Payments can be made in person at the court, on the third floor of City Hall at 3401 Evaline, Mondays-Fridays from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Call (313) 800-5248 first to make sure they're open.

Alternately, you could elect to pay online. It is recommended, if you do, that you contact the court administrator by phone first, at (313) 800-5248. They can look up your exact due balance to let you know how much to bring with you, after the amnesty discount is figured into it.

The Power of Diversity; How Hamtramck stands out in a crowd

I grew up in Hamtramck. I spent my childhood pitching balls in Pulaski Park. I loved to haphazardly rollerblade down the streets of Joseph Campau, Norwalk, Edwin, Conant, and Com-

mor. My friends hailed from all over the entire world. One moment, I would talk to my girls from Bangladesh, Yemen, Poland, Albania, and Macedonia and the next moment I would find myself conversing with my boys from Bosnia and Herzegovina, Senegal, Pakistan, India, and Mozambique. I would eat bits of cevapi, samosas, paczki, Polish kielbasas, curry, French fries, turmeric, and tacos over the course of a day.

The entire planet seemed to be packed into two square miles. Every single day felt like a walk through an airport. A multitude of nations, cultures, religions, and eth-

nicities surrounded me at every corner. It was a truly magical upbringing and I treasure it dearly.

I was born in Bosnia and Herzegovina. My family escaped the Bosnian Genocide in order to find a place that would accept us and provide us with the opportunity to live in peace among our neighbors.

Before we relocated to Hamtramck, Michigan, my mother and I lived in Croatia, a refugee camp in the Czech Republic, and in Paris, France. I was reunited with my father at the age of four in Malaysia.

He was shot in his leg by a Serbian Chetnik sniper and narrowly evaded death. Since my father had to have extensive surgical operations performed on his leg, he stayed behind in Bosnia. He helped to arrange an emergency escape through the Children's Embassy in Sarajevo (the capital of Bosnia and Herzegovina)

convoy for my mother and I. There were only women and children onboard. The convoy was not shot at by the Serbian Chetnik snipers. We did not have any direct contact with them. We were exceptionally lucky.

It's important to have access to different ideas, attitudes, lifestyles, and perspectives. They are valuable assets that can effectively guide one through their life journey.

Formidable and clever problem-solving techniques can be learned when one has awareness of multiple possibilities. Hamtramck is truly a unique city.

It is the only Muslim-majority city in the United States of America. It is the first city to have a Muslim-majority city council in the history of the United States. It is also the first city in the USA with an all-Muslim city council.

“In 2008, Gary Gillette identified discrepancies in published historical sources regarding the history and location of Hamtramck Stadium. Through his research, he discovered that the original stadium structure remained intact, despite reports that it had been demolished and replaced by Keyworth Stadium.

“Beginning in 2009, Mr. Gillette worked to correct the historical record. In 2010, following public discussion and an editorial in The Hamtramck Review calling for demolition of the stadium’s grandstands, he met with the Mayor and addressed the Hamtramck City Council regarding the site’s historic significance and its potential eligibility for federal preservation funding.

“In 2011, Mr. Gillette, together with professional preservationist Rebecca Binno Savage, conducted extensive historical research to support an application to the Michigan State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). In 2012, Mr. Gillette presented the findings in Lansing, resulting in Hamtramck Stadium being approved as a State of Michigan Historic Site.

“Following SHPO’s recommendation, the National Park Service approved Hamtramck Stadium for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places, after which Mr. Gil-

lette formed the nonprofit organization Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium to support preservation efforts.

“Subsequent milestones included approval of a state historical marker in 2014; securing a \$50,000 National Park Service African American Civil Rights Grant in 2016 in partnership with then-City Planner Melanie Markowicz; a successful 2019 fundraising effort that raised \$115,000; and collaboration with Wayne County to secure \$409,000 in funding from the Detroit Tigers Foundation.

“In 2022, the stadium restoration construction project, managed by Wayne County, was completed, ensuring the long-term preservation of this nationally significant historic and cultural landmark.”

The council then approved accepting a \$100,000 grant from the U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The funding will be used to create a fitness station in Veterans Park.

Tom Habitz, the executive director of the Hamtramck Parks Conservancy, which oversees management and development in the park, said: “It’s going to be great for aerobics classes. ... We don’t have a thing like it in Hamtramck.”

The council also approved a \$108,699 grant

from the Council of Michigan Foundations.

The money is part of a \$1 million project connected with the “Campau Cut.”

That project, according to a note to council, “will allow for the installation of traffic calming measures, pedestrian amenities, and public art that prioritizes safety for pedestrians.”

That funding will convert nine blocks of a Jos. Campau alley to be pedestrian friendly, and transform the alley in order “for people to walk or slowly

ride bikes. The city plans to incorporate public art into the redesign, either on building murals or on street art installed directly on the alley itself.

“At several spots there is potential for green infrastructure design, which will add natural elements to the alley that it is currently lacking. The green infrastructure will help collect storm water runoff while also providing shade and the extra benefit of wildlife attraction.

“The project will also install ‘BICYCLES MAY USE FULL LANE’ signs

along Joseph Campau, which runs parallel to the alley. This will provide fast cyclists or bike commuters with the opportunity to continue onto Joseph Campau, allowing slower pedestrian traffic.”

In round two of public comment, Ibrahim Aljahim spoke, saying that he used to work for a “school department, and that we have a lot of mental illness in our community.”

(Aljahim was once employed by Oakland International Academy. In 2024, he pleaded guilty to a second degree sexual as-

sault charge involving an 18-year-old mentally disabled male.)

Aljahim, a Yemeni-American, continued: “I can tell you every Yemeni family – I don’t know about the Bengali – has a son or daughter that has mental illness, and I’ll say it very loudly.”

He said the police department needs to be trained on how to deal with those with mental illness.



Crime watch ... Car theft crime ring busted in late-night patrols

Hamtramck's Police Department has busted a ring of suspects who have been stealing items from vehicles, and, in some cases, the cars themselves. And they are teenagers from next-door Detroit and Highland Park.

The Hamtramck Police Department issued a press release on Wednesday, explaining what had happened.

The break in this crime wave started in the early morning hours on March 8, when officers responded to a call from the 2400 block of Commor

While searching the area, officers spotted a stolen vehicle from which four suspects then fled on foot. Officers were able to catch all of them, and the teens were taken to the Wayne County Juvenile Detention facility. Their parents were also issued tickets for the teens' cur-

few violations.

Two days later, on March 10 at about 5 a.m., officers checked out a report of suspects breaking into vehicles in the area of Lumpkin and Edwin.

Once again, officers located a stolen vehicle being driven by the suspects, and once again there was a foot chase.

Only one suspect was apprehended, a 14-year-old from Detroit, who was taken to the county juvenile jail.

In the police department's press release, it said that, going forward, there will be a "zero-tolerance approach toward curfew violations and criminal activity in order to ensure the safety and security of the community."

The department has also stepped up patrols. In the meantime, residents are encouraged to report any suspicious activity by calling 911.
