Health Hike is right around the corner

The Hamtramck Drug Free Community Coalition (HDFCC) is gearing up for its annual Hamtramck Health Hike, which is now celebrating its 17th year.

This 5K run/walk is coming up on Saturday, May 16, as a way to promote health and fitness.

And, while it's still a week away, you are encouraged to sign up now, with the incentive that the first 400 people who do so will get free giveaways.

It's a fun event where the whole family can enjoy a different view of the city.

In past years, hundreds of folks have participated each time.

There will also be an opportunity for attendees to learn how to save a life. Participants can receive on-site training in the use of Naloxone (commonly known as Narcan), a life-saving medication that can reverse opioid overdoses.

Those who complete the training will receive a free Naloxone kit to take home, "empowering community members with the knowledge and tools to respond in an emergency," as the organization says.

City wary over planned protest

Hamtramck is bracing for a possible visit by an anti-Islamic group promoting a book burning this Sunday in front of a Jos. Campau mosque.

And Hamtramck police are preparing for, and coordinating with other police agencies on, any potential conflict.

"We are coordinating all efforts with the Detroit Police Department and Wayne County Sheriffs to see if this is a credible threat..." said Hamtramck Police Chief Hussein Farhat.

Farhat said no burning of books will be allowed on public property. The "book" in question would almost certainly be the Koran, a sacred text for millions of Muslims.

Hamtramck is a Muslim-majority town.

At this point, it's not clear whether this is a mere publicity stunt, or something that will actually take place.

On the Facebook page of the Americans Against Islamification (which has been described by critics as a Christian nationalist network and as being Nazi-like), the apparent leader of the organization, Jayden Scott, of Michigan, said:

"Crusaders will march through downtown Hamtramck, Michigan — the Islamic occupied city, and we will declare America is a Christian nation."

Scott continued in his Facebook post, saying: "We are at a cultural war — a spiritual war. It's time we reclaim our society, and we reclaim America."

So far, there has been little reaction from the public, and little comment on social media, although that could change in the coming days.

Mayor Adam Alharbi said the community is preparing in case the protest does take place.

"We're working with the police to make sure, if it does happen, everyone is safe," he said.

He declined further comment, saying he did not want to give the group publicity.

But former mayor Karen Majewski spoke out aga-

inst the group.
“The organizer is a well-known provocateur who is targeting Hamtramck after failures in other communities,” Majewski said.
“Our city officials and police department are aware, and equipped to deal with the situation. And Hamtramck residents will have no tolerance for Nazis trying to use our community as a platform and photo op for

their anti-American hate.”
An organization called Hope in Action plans a counter-protest.
Scott has a checkered past, once falsely claiming to be the CEO of Harmony Investment Group in Troy. The company has vehemently denied any connection with Scott or to any prior employment.
In the past, he taunted Minneapolis protestors –

in the wake of the shooting death, by an ICE agent, of Renee Good, a 37-year-old mother of three –yelling: “We executed one of you.”
This isn’t the first time the metro area has experienced an outside group threatening to burn copies of the Koran. Last November, in Dearborn (another majority Muslim city), Jake Lang, of Florida, attempted to hold a book burning but

was repelled by protestors. The skirmish didn’t amount to much, although recently Lang was sentenced to five years in prison for damaging an ice sculpture in front of the Minnesota State Capitol which said: “Prosecute ICE.”
He had kicked over part of the word “prosecute” so it read “Pro ICE.”

Jamestown: The first permanent English settlement in American was established on May 14, 1607 at Jamestown, Virginia, by a group of royally chartered Virginia Company settlers from Plymouth, England.

These are certainly uncertain times in this country.

Here in Hamtramck, we are experiencing a deepening political divide between some members of the city council and the mayor.

What we prefer to have happen is that residents ignore these folks, denying them the attention they crave. Our police department is already coordinating with other agencies to deal with these radical nutjobs.

Code enforcement ... On the city’s Facebook page, the city’s code enforcement department has this message to property owners:

“As we head into spring and summer, the City of Hamtramck’s Code Enforcement Department will begin checking neighborhoods for common exterior issues – like overgrown grass and weeds, unfinished fences, and garages with graffiti.

“The goal isn’t to ticket residents, but to keep our community clean and safe. If something needs attention, you’ll first receive a warning, and then have 14 days to fix the issue.

“Please note: if the issue isn’t resolved within that timeframe, it may result in a citation. Let’s work together to keep Hamtramck looking its best this season!”

This message also brings up the number of complaints we have heard over the past year about super-aggressive enforcement.

We’re sure there is a middle ground here the city and community can reach, but in Hamtramck, it seems this issue never really goes away.

Puck luck... Detroit got lucky and got a new hockey team – a women’s team, at that.

And that fact did not escape Governor Gretchen Whitmer, who is, as you may by now have noticed, also a woman.

Whitmer put out a short congratulatory press release this past Wednesday, celebrating not only the new team, but the fact Detroit will host some other aspects of the league’s calendar this inaugural year, namely the awards ceremony and the annual player draft in mid-June.

The governor’s statement began: “I’m so excited Hockeytown is now home to the newest team in the Professional Women’s Hockey League, as well as the 2026 draft.

“From selling out stadiums to setting attendance records, our fans show out when women’s hockey shows up,” Whitmer said.

She continued: “Detroit sports fans are the best in the world. Michiganders already make up so much of the PWHL’s talent, as well as much of the Olympic gold winning teams, and we’re ready to build on Michigan’s hockey momentum.

“This will inspire more young girls and women who play hockey in arenas and backyards across our state to follow their dreams right here in Michigan.

“Welcome to Detroit!” she added.

Tick, tock, time for a bite, or not ... Two Michigan health agencies, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) and the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) are urging residents to take precautions against in-

sect- and arachnid-borne diseases while cleaning up after flood situations.

True, much of the state’s worst recent flooding occurred up north, particularly in the northwest lower peninsula, but goodness knows we’ve also seen our share of heavy rains lately, and there’s been plenty of standing water, and spring’s not nearly over yet.

That said, here are some of their bullet-pointed tips:

Eliminate mosquito and tick habitats:

• Remove standing water, and fill in areas where water pools, to reduce areas that support mosquito breeding.

• Trim back tall grasses and brush around homes, barns/sheds, and along lawn and pasture edges.

• Create a three-foot barrier of wood chips or gravel between property and wooded areas to limit tick movement.

• Keep lawns and pastures mowed, and regularly remove leaf litter.

• Stack firewood neatly, in a dry area, to deter rodents, which are common tick hosts.

Use insect repellent:

• Apply an Environmental Protection Agency-registered repellent on exposed skin.

• Always follow label directions, and wear personal protective equipment or clothing when specified by the label.

• Store all pesticides in original, labeled containers, out of reach of children and pets.

• Wash your hands and clothes thoroughly after use:

Bathe, or shower, as soon as possible after spending time outdoors, to more easily find, and then wash off, ticks.

Wash clothing in hot water, and dry on high heat, to kill any ticks left on clothing.

• If hiring a professional to spray for the pests, find a licensed pesticide applicator at Michigan.gov/MDARDPABL

“Preventing tick and mosquito bites is the best way to avoid disease, including Lyme disease, West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis,” said Dr. Natasha Bagdasarian, chief medical executive of the MDHHS.

Added Dr. Nora Wine-

land, state veterinarian, DVM, MS, DACVPM, "The standing water created after flooding and excess rain makes for ideal breeding sites for mosquitoes, and (also) increases the likelihood that ticks will move into new areas. "Taking a few simple steps now can go a long way in keeping Michigan... healthy and protected," W-neland said.

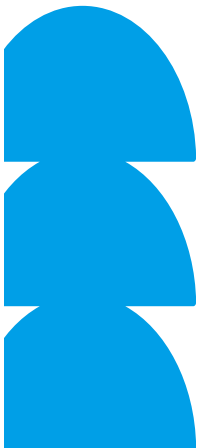
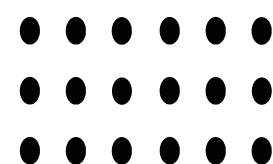

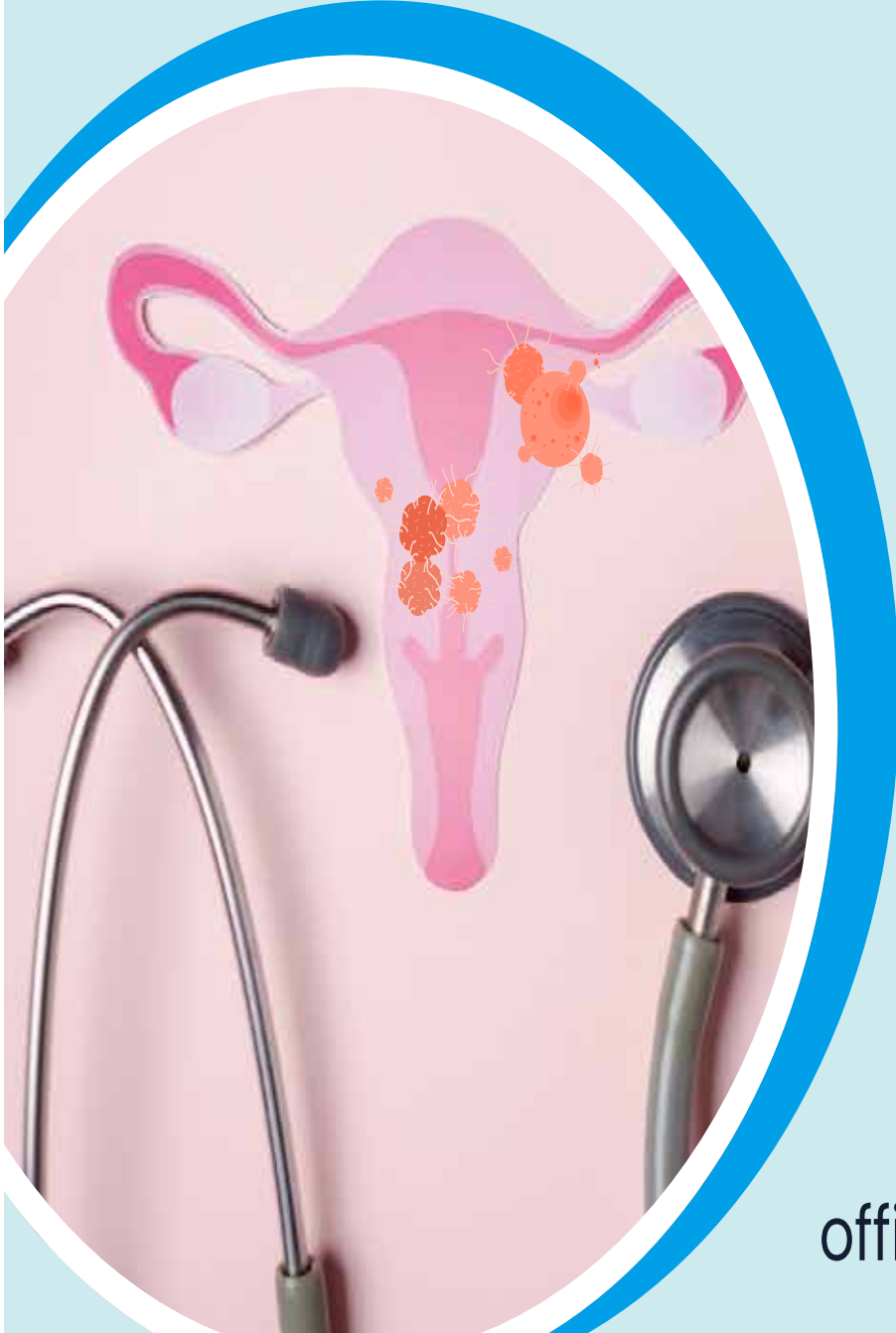
