Prom scene drinking 'accident' drives home a lesson for students

Hamtramck High School students got a valuable lesson recently – a lesson educators hope saves lives.

The police and fire departments put on a "Mock Prom" accident scene outside the high school to drive home the message that driving while drunk or high on drugs can end terribly wrong.

Prom season is a prime time for celebrating high schoolers to make some bad choices - such as drinking and driving. For too many, it ends up in tragedy and for some, jail.

Teen drinking and driving isn't just a prom night phenomena. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2011 one million drunk teens got behind the

wheel during that year. Before students arrived outside the high school building, a car that had been in a crash in Ham-

tramck was positioned to look like an accident scene.

Inside the car, four students, dressed as if they were out on prom night, played their part as driver and passengers. Some were made up to look severely injured, and one played dead.

The scene unfolded as had been involved. An

it would in real-life, first with the arrival of police cars racing — sirens blaring — to the scene of the "accident" and then the arrival of firefighters and an ambulance.

What became immediately clear at the beginning of the accident scene was that drinking

empty bottle of liquor was pulled out of the car and placed on the roof for all the students to see.

The driver of the car was the only one of the students who was not injured in this scenario. Police officers walked the student driver through a field sobriety test, and the

It now looks like City Manager Katrina Powell will not get a contract extension.

Mark Stema, a member of a state-appointed financial review board overseeing Hamtramck, confirmed with The Review that the state Treasury Department will heed whatever the city council wants to do about filling the position.

The issue of extending Powell's employment contract has resulted in a couple of heated council meetings. A bare majority of councilmembers Anam Miah, Abu Musa, Saad Almasmari and Mohammed Hassan have opted to seek an interim city manager while a search is conducted for a permanent

Two councilmembers, Andrea Karpinski and Ian Perrotta, have vehemently opposed that move, saying Powell has done a good job and the city needs continuity.



It's final for city manager

Powell was hired by the city's former emergency manager two-and-a-half years ago. Her contract expires on June 30.

For the past several weeks there has been speculation that the Treasury Department might step in to extend her contract. At the April Receivership Transition Advisory Board meeting there was a discussion that implied the Treasury Department was indeed going to get involved in the contract by modifying the emergency manager's final order.

At that meeting Stema asked if the board could do anything about "Katrina's situation." At that time the four councilmembers who have moved to seek an interim city manager also had rejected a proposal to have the city attorney negotiate a contract extension with Powell.

A representative from the Treasury Department, Patrick Dostine, replied: "Well, I guess what I can say is that the order's been revised, and it's under review now."

He was speaking in reference to the emergency manager's final order.

The Chairperson of the RTAB, Deborah Roberts, also spoke on the matter and expressed her frustration with the city coun-

"I just think we're in an that many believed was unfortunate circumstance. ... The RTAB was put in place to help the city transition back to local control," Roberts said. "We've been here for two years. For some reason, the council is having an issue with taking that control, and wants to keep throwing it back at the RTAB.

"I think that's a sad situation that they've put themselves in, so I guess we'll all see what goes forward. I mean, it's too bad that the local control has not come into place at this time. We tried."

It is not clear why the Treasury Department decided to back off from taking action on Powell's contract, but the mission of the RTAB was to only react to financial decisions by the city - not take an active role in decision-making.

Powell's relationship with some councilmembers has been rocky during her stay. Councilmember Miah has been the most vocal opponent of her.

His main beef has been that she makes decisions without fully conferring with the council.

He was also angry over her investigation into former Police Chief Max Garbarino, which resulted in his sudden resignation - a resignation forced upon him.

Powell never disclosed what she was investigating, and Garbarino never explained why he resigned.

Her supporters, which includes Mayor Karen Majewski, have argued that not keeping Powell is reckless and will jeopardize the progress the city has made.

The city went from a deficit budget to one with a \$4 million surplus under Powell's management. She has also put into place a long-range street repair program, among other improvements.

manager come July 1? There is speculation that the four councilmembers already have someone in mind. They have denied that.

The leading guess, though, is city Treasurer John Gabor will be tapped. Gabor was put on paid administrative leave last week by Powell after he openly criticized her proposed budget for the year at a budget meeting with the council.

No matter who it is, according to a special resolution that aforementioned four councilmembers agreed on, that person will have to meet "charter-mandated qualifications."

The process of removing the car roof can take some time, but in the long run it ensures passengers are carefully removed without causing further injury.

In cases where it is clear that immediate extraction is required, those passengers are removed without waiting.

Hamtramck finds itself a 'house divided' over CM issue

It's time to move on.

City Manager Katrina Powell will not be saved by the state Treasury Department and allowed to remain after her employment contract expires on June 30.

There had been speculation that the state would step in. Instead, we are told the state will abide by the will of the city council. A bare majority on council - which includes Councilmembers Saad Almas-Anam Miah, Mohammed Hassan and Abu Musa – has decided to not extend her contract and to hire a new city manager.

But before a permanent city manager can be found in time before Powell leaves, the same councilmembers voted to find an interim city manager.

There has been a lot of criticism heaped on the council over how they handled this situation, including accusations that they violated the state's Open Meeting Act.

Powell has a number of

supporters as well as detractors. She can leave with her head high knowing she put the city in a better place financially.

She and her administration also put forth a street repair program and won a grant to install a much needed sewage drainage system that so far seems to have made a major impact in preventing basement floodings.

There are a number of other accomplishments. But what has been done is done. The state is transitioning from overseeing the city's finances to returning local control.

Four years ago the governor declared the city was in a financial crisis and appointed an emergency manager to take over. By law the EM could stay here for no more than 18 months.

After the EM left Powell was hired as city manager but the city was still under the supervision of a stateappointed financial advisory board.

That advisory board is those words.

about to begin the process of stepping down and returning local con-

The last few weeks have been pretty rough going for the council and the community. There is a lot of division on which way to go: keep Powell on or look for someone new.

One thing is for sure, and that is the majority of the council decides what will happen. It's unfortunate that the council is divided, but that is nothing new for this city.

However, political division has also led to previous financial meltdowns here and ultimately state intervention.

Hamtramck cannot afford to find itself in another crisis requiring the helping hand of the state. City officials need to find a middle ground and come to terms.

President Lincoln once famously said: "A house divided against itself cannot stand."

nance Manager with the Great Lakes Water Author-

One of his key accomplishments, he said, was building the department up almost from scratch. When he came on board there were only two employees in the field, and now there are four fulltimers and a foreman.

In a way it's the exact opposite of a certain philosophy in government circles to outsource work instead of hiring employees. The thinking is, by outsourcing jobs municipalities can save money in health benefits and pensions.

But Ragsdale's old school approach has reduced costs by about \$500,000 compared to last year's budget - simply by doing away with some contracted work and bringing it back inhouse.

For example, the city got rid of its snow plowing service and then bought some trucks and assigned employees to the job on overtime. What had cost \$48,000 for a snowplowing and salting now runs the city about \$4,000.

There was also another contractor, which we won't name, that Ragsdale was

determined to get rid of that had been doing what he said was poor work and charging top dollar.

"That saved the city so much money, it's unreal," Ragsdale said.

Another major project Ragsdale pointed to was the installation of a new sewer system in the southend, all thanks to a federal grant.

That work was prompted by a lawsuit several years ago by residents who were fed up with frequent basement backups of sewer water during heavy rain storms.

So far, according to southend residents, the new system has done just what it was supposed to do, fingers crossed.

And then there was the adoption of a systematic street repair plan, which is something past administrations failed to ad-Once dress. again, federal funding helped pay for some of the costs.

Coming this year will be a major reconstruction of a part of Holbrook, and also the kickoff of an eventual citywide alley repaving. Ragsdale's biggest

praise is reserved for City Manager Katrina Powell, who he says "is the best thing to happen to this city in a long time."

But with Powell not getting a contract extension, that prompted Ragsdale to seek a new job. Powell's employment contract with the city expires on June 30, and there is a bare majority on city council who did not wish her to

That drama of will she stay or go weighed on his mind considering that Ragsdale is an "at will" employee - meaning he can be fired by the next city manager.

"That was all I needed to see," Ragsdale said. "That was the writing on the wall."

He lashed out at those on city council who refused to extend her con-

"Your actions reflect on everyone," he said.

Although the political side of what has been happening in city hall left a sour taste in his mouth, Ragsdale also leaves with a deep affection for the city – an impression that the many people who have served the city also talk about.

"Hamtramck is not like any other city," he said. "The thing I'll miss most are the people."


