Hamtramck voters overwhelmingly remained true to their Democratic Party and supported roots Hillary Clinton for presi-

New era for School **Boardmembers**

Two incumbent school boardmembers lost their bid for re-election to two newcomers in Tuesday's election.

The results also usher in a historical moment for the school district and the city: The new makeup of the school board will now consist of a Muslim majority.

That development mirrors what has happened in the city council as well.

School Boardmembers Hedy Shulgon, a 13-year veteran, and Jackie Starr, who has served for two years, were ousted by Moortadha Obaid and Showkat Chowdhury.

Obaid has not run for office before but Chowdhury had previously run for city council without

Hamtramck has long been known as a Polish enclave, but the city's population makeup has changed dramatically toward those of the Muslim faith in the last several years.

That development has attracted national and international media attention. The school board election will no doubt attract more media focus.

Boardmember Salah Hadwan ran unopposed to fill a partial term of four years. Hadwan ran

dential results were: Hillary Clinton (D): 5,307

Donald Trump (R): 709 As usual, most voters took the easy way to vote by voting a straight ticket, which required filling in a single oval.

State Rep. Rose Mary Robinson and Congresswoman Brenda Lawrence easily beat their Republican rivals here as well as in their entire district.

Voters here were more generous than voters in other communities in supporting a regional transit

authority. That millage was ultimately defeated.

Voters here also supported a school millage to help public schools in Wayne County. That millage also squeaked by in the countywide vote. The millage will bring in \$1.1 million a year to Hamtramck's Public School District for the next six

In other election news:

Normally the weather for the November General Election is chilly and sometimes downright cold and nasty. Not so on Tuesday. The metro area has

experiencing warmer fall with temps in the 60s.

An early rain chased some voters away, but the skies soon cleared.

By 7:30 a.m., voters were already lined up outside polling places. At the Hamtramck High School Community Center there was a steady stream of voters all day.

The wait was about 15 minutes on average.

Election results were expected to come in late, and they were released at about 11:30 p.m.

Voters took advantage of early voting on Saturday and Monday by voting absentee. Over 300 voters took that option on those days.

At least one school board candidate took advantage of that gathering. Showkat Chowdhury was seen approaching voters in city hall and even helping them to fill out their ballot - all perfectly legal according to City Clerk August Gitschlag.

His work paid off. Chowdhury won a seat on the school board, at the expense of one incumbent boardmember, garnering 1,665 votes. He will now serve a six-year term.

Democratic Party volunteers came from the state and even as far as Kansas, such as M.D. Rabbi Alam who was sporting a Trump trademark red cap that said:

at Trump, who he said was too "risky and reckless" to become president.

"Michigan is a battle-

ground state," Alam said.

Indeed it was. It wasn't until Wednesday that it was determined that the state - normally a blue state – went for Trump by a slim vote margin of 13,000 votes.

School Boardmember Salah Hadwan, who ran unopposed for a partial four-year term, earned 2,979 votes. But curiously, there were also 165 write-in candidates in that



Three years ago Hamtramck lost one of its most iconic bar owners, Virginia Szymanski.

Her family had owned Jean's Bar since 1971. "Virg," as everyone called her, ran the bar for a good portion of those years. She died three years ago at the age of 86.

Last Saturday, beloved bar on Jos. Campau and Commor ended its long run.

The bar's license has been sold, to whom it is still not immediately known, and the last call was made with her old buddy Cathie Gordon holding down bartending duties.

Although Gordon owns New Dodge Lounge, the two didn't consider themselves rivals.

They became close friends 20 years ago when they began organizing the now-defunct "Fun Train" – a bar-hopping promotion that attracted new visitors to the city. Jean's Bar has also been part of the Metro Times Blowout from its inception.

"Our friendship blossomed from there," Gordon told The Review three years ago.

Gordon said she considered her "the sister I never had."

Hamtramck changed a great deal since Virg passed, and the dive bar scene, which she enjoyed, has mostly passed away.

The Review profiled her in 2011 when Virg was celebrating the bar's 40th anniversary.

Virg had a saying that "characters always welcome." One of the biggest characters, she admitted, was herself.

"The bar is my stage. I'm a ham, this is where I perform," she said.

The bar is closed for good now, and Virg is a distant memory. Hamtramck still offers an exciting nightlife, but somehow it's a little less

The city council met on October 25 and all councilmembers were present except for Mohammed Hassan. Mayor Karen Majewski was also absent.

Before the regular council meeting a work session was held. During that meeting City Manager Katrina Powell said

that new water meters are being installed, starting with industrial sites.

She said the installations must be completed before a scheduled study on water rates.


Councilmember Anam Miah questioned the cost for police service for the Hamtramck Labor Day Festival. Police Chief Anne Moise said it was

\$9,000.

Regarding a recent engineering study on the condition of city alleys, City Manager Powell said it will cost \$12 million to repair all of them, and \$3 million for the "major alleys."

She added that the condition of most alleys is "below grade."

Water rate study is much needed and long overdue

A few weeks ago it was announced by the city manager that there is going to be a study of the city's water/sewerage rates.

The question on City Manager Katrina Powell's mind is: How did the city arrive at the rates?

Or in other words what determined the rates?

Yes, believe it or not, no one knows what the charges are based on. It's outrageous, but understandable. The city has long hummed along on a number of assumptions.

No one knows how the charges were determined, but those in charge took it on faith there was solid reasoning and research backing the charges.

That's called dysfunction. And it's not just city officials who missed this, but also past stateappointed emergency managers.

Everyone just sumed the rates were justified.

It took an outsider like City Manager Powell, who has been on the job for over a year, to ask a simple question.

This is no small matter because water sewer services are not cheap. For the average Hamtramck household it is at least \$50 a month.

Now while the public is certainly owed an explanation, there is the possibility that the city isn't charging enough. Some of you may already be thinking this is the real reason for the study.

The study's results should be looked at very carefully. At the very least, we will have a starting place to determine what is accurate and fair.





Hamtramck, have come since late September.

To do research to write an article for another publication. I walked. with an old urban hiking buddy, from River Rouge to Wyandotte and back to Rouge again, a total distance of around 8.5 miles.

That was on an uncommonly warm early fall day. Walking through one of the world's most impressive industrial corridors, on paths alongside railroad tracks, cemeteries and boardwalks on the riverfront. was well worth a little unseasonable discomfort.

I did two more walks in Wyandotte in early October and discovered that downriver's oldest community (it was incorporated in 1866) has a network of unpaved alleys, much like those just east and north of Hamtramck. I crisscrossed the city via green alleys bathed in golden light, as the afternoon grew long and dusk fell on the river. Not before I got some pictures of Fighting Island, now being remediated after a century of toxic waste dumped on it from the chemicals industries in Wyandotte.

October was a busy month for walks in Hamtramck as well.

I led a tour during the Michigan Historic Preservation Network's annual fall benefit held at Bank

tramck before. That's a big group. We only had an hour to walk before dinner so we had to hustle if we wanted to experience а fair representation of city I do what I call an inter-

active mobile workshop, not a typical historical tour filled with facts and dates. Hamtramck is almost too rich in that regard: newcomers could get lost in the history and fail to experience what's happening here and now.

So I opt for an approach that attempts to keep everyone alive and alert in the moment, sprinkled with a few fun factoids. It also doesn't hurt to pay rapt attention to motorists, who need respectful but persistent reminders that pedestrians have the right of way.

I believe in a shared streets philosophy, meaning the streets are public places that belong to all of us, not the sole province of the car, truck or bus. Motorists, cyclists, walkers and runners are all partners in public life. It's part of the mission of this column to bring this message home, helping to make Hamtramck streets available and safe for all.

A week later I did a 15hour "performance" walk the Hamtramck Neighborhood Arts Festival. I called it Everything Starts Now.

The name is derived

the past, "You can look back there to explain things but the explanation disappears. You will never find it there. Things are not explained by the past. They're explained by what happens now."

I was accessible via social media throughout the day and night. People sent me texts and asked where I was, joining me in my adventures if they were close enough to meet. In each arranged meeting, in every chance encounter, all the places I visited solo or with others were new chapters in a bigger story.

My walk was not continuous. I stopped at several locations throughout the day and night, to see artists perform, to eat and drink, to talk to old and new friends.

I started before noon at Bumbo's for the kickoff brunch and ended it at the festival after-party at Trixie's. In between I met newish Hamtramckan Simon Ray, an electronic musician originally from Australia; dropped into the splendid nearlyready for public opening Oloman Cafe espresso; and heard artists and writers read the works of local author Steve Hughes at the Stupor newly-dubbed

House on St. Aubin. Bleary-eyed, I walked up the stairs and into my kitchen. The clock on the wall said 3 a.m. Today's story was over.

It's said that whatever to 61 percent. happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

Detroit Animal Care and Control (DACC) has begun moving in to its new facility, the old Michigan Humane Society building at 7401 Chrysler Dr. The building was a gift from MHS, which itself moved to a new facility at 7887 Chrysler Dr., just two blocks north of the building it called

home since 1931. The new headquarters is being heralded as a dramatic improvement for DACC in a year that has already seen its fare share. Since 2016, DACC began working with MHS, Detroit Dog Rescue, other local municipal shelters, and a number of additional partners to improve the city service, which is a division of the Detroit Health Department.

In 2015, the DACC live release rate was 26 percent. Since its new partnerships at the start of the year, the DACC live release rate has increased

DAAC was previously located at 3511 W. Jefferson Ave.

"This move will enable us to better serve the City's residents and their pets," Melissa Miller, Director of DACC, said in a statement. "We're really thankful to our partners who have made this possible, including MHS for donating the facility, and we look forward to the day when we are fully operational in our new space."

DACC will offer reduced services during the transition but will keep field units on city streets. Its dispatch line, reached by phone at (313) 224-6356, is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Michigan Humane Society left its longtime Detroit headquarters for its new campus in Spring of 2016. The new building is a 35,000 sq. ft. animal care center and is located on a five-acre campus off of the I-75 service drive. Its features include an expanded veterinary center, animal cruelty investigation and rescue center, and dog play yards.

spot, and the next person that came told us it was in the wrong place."




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

A plan to begin fixing the alleys will be produced soon, Powell said. She added that the city cannot tap into a state road repair grant that is received each year for alley repairs.

"But at least we have a plan to move forward," she said.

The \$12 million price tag will have to come out of the city's general budget over time, Powell said.

Councilmember Miah said there is an alley at Prescott and Ellery that is not even paved. He said the alley is impassible.

"It's so bad the garbage trucks won't go down it," he said.

Powell said she would get a truckload of gravel to spread in the alley to smooth it out.

In another matter, Miah said he had heard that Powell was "writing her ticket" to get out of the city. Powell said she had no idea what Miah was talking about.

"That's what I heard," Miah said.

During public comment in the regular meeting, Kamal Rahman thanked the city for removing debris from a former party story that burned down on Carpenter. In another matter he said Detroit's Water Department has a plan Hamtramck can "opt in" that would help reduce water bills for low income residents.
