The Hamtramck Goodfellows are taking to the streets today to raise funds to help the needy and brighten the holi-

They have been doing this for decades. Exactly how long the Hamtramck Goodfellows branch has existed isn't clear. The original Detroit Goodfellows was founded in 1914 by James Brady, who was disturbed by

the poverty he saw in the city and the thought that so many children faced a Christmas that would bring no gifts.

He organized the Old Newsboy Goodfellows of Detroit Fund. It was a simple concept. In those days, most people bought their newspapers from kids who peddled them on the streets (remember hearing "Extra! Extra! Read all about it,"

Police get new contract

After waiting for a little over a year, Hamtramck police officers and their bosses now have an employment contract.

But it will expire next June.

The new contract was tailored that way to help smooth out the transition of whoever will be hired to be the city's next city manager.

"This paves the way for the next negotiation that will follow," said Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer, who began negotiating the contracts a couple of months ago.


The next round of contract negotiations is where things will get tricky. According to the final directives of the former state-appointed emergency manager, the next police contract must contain all of the recommendations made in a recent study on how the police department functions.

Former City Manager Katrina Powell said previously that she could not move forward with police contracts because the study had not been completed yet. Although the study was submitted several months ago, Powell's employment contract ran out last June, leaving her no time to start contract negotiations.

Officers and their bosses probably won't like the changes to come, if past negotiations are any indication. The study, performed by the Center for Public

shouted in old movies?). During the holidays people were asked to pay whatever they could for the papers, with any extra money collected going to the poor.

Early records indicate that the Hamtramck Goodfellows founded in 1927 by possibly the most unlikely pair to ever share a cause: Paddy McGraw and Dan Minock.

A book could be written on Patrick "Paddy" Mc-Graw, who was one of the most notorious yet beloved characters in Hamtramck's history. Although he operated one of the biggest brothels in the Midwest, which was located on Hamtramck's south side, he also was known for his contributions to charity, including organizing the Goodfellows.

Minock was an early Hamtramck village official, and there's nothing to indicate he was remotely as colorful as Mc-Graw. He lived on what is now Dan Street - which was later named for him - just east of Jos. Cam-

Despite their varied backgrounds, McGraw and Minock saw what Brady witnessed

years earlier - rampant poverty. In 1927 Hamtramck was essentially a Its explosive growth beginning in 1910 turned a small farming village into a major industrial city so quickly that it was impossible for the town to adapt to the radical change. The housing stock was poor, roads weren't paved and for a time there weren't even any playgrounds in the city for the kids to use.

Organizations like Tau Beta and the churches tried to improve the quality of life for the residents but they were overwhelmed. And the situation only got worse in the Great Depression that struck in 1929. The auto industry essentially collapsed and Hamtramck was so heavily dependent on it that the city experienced an astounding 60 percent unemployment rate.

What welfare system that existed at the time, and it wasn't much, quickly was pushed to the limit. Soon, you had to have at least two children to even qualify for any form of assistance. People were desperate. Suicides became more common as did cases of domestic violence and alcoholism.

It was an especially challenging time. But a bright spot was the Goodfellows, brought at least a little joy to the needy. The Hamtramck Goodfellows have been on the streets every holiday season since then, braving the cold and the traffic to do something that is unquestionably good.

Things are much better today but the need, and the needy, still are pres-

School district hopes to carry on past tradition at new school

The Hamtramck School Board reached back into history to name their new school building.

The district's new buildcently home to a charter school that closed down in the summer. It happened to be located in one of the most important buildings in the city's history: The Tau Beta Community House.

In the early part of the 1900s and onwards the site served generations of Polish immigrants who learned how to operate their household and transition into their newly adopted country.

According to a press release from the school district, that tradition will continue at what is now going to be called the Tau Beta School.

The district purchased ing on Hanley was re- the building for \$3 million, and will open it up on Jan. 29. It will house students in kindergarten through eighth grade.

About 300 students will be enrolled there.

The district asked the community for suggestions on what to call the school.

"Thirty people sponded in writing via google docs. Numerous others responded verbally. Thanks to all that did respond," the district said in its press release. "After much debate and serious thought, the Hamtramck Board of Education passed a resolution by a 7-0 vote to name the school Tau Beta School on November 21."

The district further explained its reason for adopting the name.

"The name was chosen based on historical reasons. In 1916 the Tau Beta Association established a Community House on Hanley Street in Hamtramck to help immigrant families," the dis-

trict said. "The Community House provided a day nursery, clinic and the first and only library in Hamtramck at the time. The Community House became one of finest in the country and was studied, copied and praised by many civic leaders."

Safety Management, calls for sweeping changes.

The Review received a copy of the study from Powell, but it was heavily redacting. Powell told The Review the reason for the blacked out parts is because much of the information about how the department performs, such as response times to calls, is sensitive.

A source in the police officers' union said their copy of the study was also heavily blacked out. But officers were able to view a copy of the study that was not blacked out.

Some of the study's recommendations include having more civilians take over jobs

officers are performing, and for officers to not respond to some calls that are non-emergency in na-

One example is a traffic accident where there are no injuries or significant damage to vehicles or property. Those involved in the accident would instead file their own report online to the department.

In the past, the city has attempted to bring in civilian dispatchers but met resistance from the police unions. That change was eventually made several years ago, but it took decades to finally occur.

Corporal Anthony Gonzales, the vice president of the police officers'


union, declined to talk at length about the study's recommendations, but said the union is taking a "wait and see" position until new contract negotiations take place.

There was no similar study done for the fire department, but it's not clear why that department was overlooked.

In the meantime, the new contract gives each police officer and their bosses a payment of \$1,500 and a one percent pay raise. A new perk gives officers a yearly \$500 allowance for gun maintenance.

A new city manager is expected to be hired sometime in January.

Metro news ...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

After you read this, you may never think of Hamtramck's alleys in the same way.

Dave Roberts remembers when the alley behind his Midtown workplace, Motor City Brewing Works, was what he describes as "horrifying." But that changed seven years ago.

In 2010, the alley between Canfield and Prentis streets was renovated as a green alley, thanks to a collaboration between the brewery and its adjacent businesses, the Green Garage. Existing cement was excavated and replaced with a central brick walkway, bordered by permeable pavers and Michigan native plants

"Now it's pleasant," Roberts says. "It adds ambience to the neighborhood."

Beyond the alley's cosmetic appearance, Green

Garage cofounder Peggy Brennan says there was also a dramatic change in the usage of a space that previously "most people would avoid because it was so bad."

"It really was significant to see the difference in the number of people who were using the alley – people walking babies down the alley, a lot of people walking their dogs," she says. "That regular use was really gratifying to see."

The people behind Detroit's repurposed alleys also share a creative approach to finding function in spaces that are generally written off. When the Z parking garage opened at Gratiot Avenue and Library Street downtown in 2013, Anthony Curis says he was "a little cautious" about how the project might affect the area and his own nearby gallery, Library Street Collective.

Curis worked with the Z's owners, Bedrock, to install 27 murals in the garage, making it a public art project in its own right.

But Curis was also concerned about rethinking the alley on the northeast side of the garage, which he says was "pretty much a potholed dirt road" at the time.

So Bedrock and Library Street Collective collaborated to repave and redesign the alley, adding lighting and benches and commissioning public art. The alley officially reopened to the public as the Belt in late 2014. In 2015, cocktail bar Standby opened on the southern end and outdoor bar Skip made its debut right in the middle of the alley.

Both establishments are co-owned by Curis and business partners Joe Robinson and David Goldman. The Belt is now a bustling destination, especially in the summer months, fulfilling Curis' vision of creating a fully public "24-hour neighborhood."

"Instead of just having the alley capped and calling it a day and it becomes the back of house for the neighborhood, we were interested in trying to figure out ways we could re-envision what was going on there and create a pedestrian-friendly public space," he says.





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City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Oct. 24, and Councilmembers Mohammed Hassan and Ian Perrotta were absent. Before the meeting a work session was held. At that meeting Fire Chief Dan Hagen gave an update on a house fire that happened earlier in the day on Trowbridge.

He said the house was fully engaged in flames when firefighters arrived at the scene, but the occupants were able to get out safely. Hagen said the cause of the fire was

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being investigated.

Councilmember Saad Almasmari complained that the city's contractor who does street patching is not sweeping up leftover loose pebbles from the street. Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer said that job is not included in the contract over the project. with the city, but could be made part of the next contract.

Almasmari said the spillover is "making the city look bad."

A discussion was held on a deal the city and county made with Habitat for Humanity to build housing for refugees. The Habitat organization says it can't handle the scope of the project as originally agreed on.

The city will now turn to another agency, Wayne Metropolitan Community Action Agency, to take

It will take about one year to build six houses, and work will start in nine months.

City Clerk August Gitschlag said the city will soon have birth records from the 1900s to the 1960s available online.


He said the Michigan Polish Genealogical Society gathered the data.

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
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
