## A Christmas sketchbook of true tales

Whether by design or by chance the human story of Christmas played out on the front page of the Hamtramck Citizen newspaper on Dec. 23, 1936.

No one could have planned it better, for this wasn't just a Christmas tale, it was the story of humanity tied together by the theme of Christmas. And it wasn't just a story but rather a tapestry of

stories that formed a moving mixture of the best and worst

To begin with was the banner headline that stretched across the top of the page: "Goodfellows to Give Out 2,100 Baskets." the streets selling 16,000 copies of the Detroit Times and Detroit News and raised more than \$5,100 to ensure the children would have a happy

This was a time deep into the Great Depression when Hamtramck was still suffering deeply from that economic catastrophe. Unemployment and poverty abounded and many children faced the prospect of a toyless – and even hungry Christ-

But the Goodfellows vol-

copies of the Detroit Times and Detroit News and raised more than \$5,100 to ensure the children would have a happy Christmas. Each gift basket had a box of candy and some much-needed clothing, which was given to the families by Hamtramck firefighters on Dec. 24.

All the prominent local officials sold papers including Mayor Rudolph Tenerowicz and his bitter political rival, ex-Mayor

who, fittingly, stood on opposite corners from each other. Tenerowicz, incidentally, vastly topped Lewandowski in sales by a margin of \$1,095.29 to \$79.86.

It wasn't the only sample of the soul of the season. Another article on the front page captures the gift of giving. "Two Modern Magi Respond to Appeal of Luckless Shutins" was the story of how two stores – Lendzon's 5 cent to \$5 store and Adam's

things are happening more than ever before. In here in Hamtramck!

To give one example, City Manager Katrina Powell has just announced the first phase of alley repairs, slated to begin in the spring of 2017. Construction crews will begin work on those alleys most in need — the ones just off either side of Joseph Campau. Soon after that alleyways east and west of Conant will also get their badly needed repairs. The cost to revitalize all the alleys is \$12 million. Funding will come from the city's budget surplus.

But not all is well in matters of governance.

Now that the presidential election is over, I find myself astonished at how emotional and divisive this election was. Even afterward, the dissension continues, but is it healthy for either "we the people" or our great country?

That included Christmas parties for kids, a presentation of the play "Toinette and the Elves" by the Monday afternoon dramatic group, dinner for nursery children and the Mothers and the Junior Girls Cooking Class party. Tau Beta had a long history of pro-

viding a wide range of serv-

ices to Hamtramckans at its Community House, which now houses Hanley Academy.

But paired with the story was a bitter-sweet Christmas tale entitled "Children Get Yule Present: Judge Spares Mother from Christmas in Jail."

Nicholas Judge Gronkowski took pity on the poor woman who was facing her fourth drunk and disorderly charge in seven months. She had six children ranging in age from 6 to 23 and her husband was in the hospital.

She had been arrested on the most recent charge just a day after being released after serving 15 days in the Detroit House of Correction. She promised to quit drinking, and rather than tossing her in jail through Christmas Judge Gronkowski placed

her on six months' proba-

However, the courts were not as kind to Charles Lark, John DeGuitis and Bruno Nowicki who were sentenced to different periods in Jackson prison and the Detroit House of Correction for their role in fraudulently counting votes in a 1934 election. The case had been appealed to the State Supreme Court, which ultimately ruled against them just before Christmas.

Recorder's Court Judge W. McKay Skillman was sympathetic about sending them to jail so close to Christmas but said there was nothing he could do as the Supreme Court ordered them to report to jail "forthwith," which legalese for right now.

Still another story reported on why it was better for Hamtramckans to do their Christmas shopping

in Detroit. "You won't feel like peace on earth and good will to man, not when your shins are banged up. your ribs bruised and teeth loosened (by the throngs on Detroit's sidewalks), not to mention pickpockets," the paper reported.

And the whole season was brought into perspective with the story "Real Meaning of Christmas Kept in Mind." Along with listing when Christmas Masses would be held at St. Florian, St. Ladislaus and Our Lady Queen of Apostles, the story quoted Fr. John Wasielewski, of St. Florian, who noted, "On Christmas we rejoice in the greatest gift God ever gave to us - His sinful children -- the gift of God Himself. We must remember that Christmas is primarily a sacred feast, and only secondly a day upon which we exchange presents."

So there it was. A remarkable page of a newspresenting paper sketchbook of Christmas tales 80 years ago, yet which are just as meaningful today.

So too were the closing words of Fr. Wasielewski, who said, "We must remember, too, the great lesson of Christmas Day, the lesson of love and charity for all mankind. If God was so generous that He gave Himself to us, his completely unworthy creatures, should we not try to be at least a little generous, understanding and forgiving towards our fellowmen?"

# Nothing is wrong

On the first Saturday of this month I went out for a couple long strolls, one early in the day of about two total miles and then in the evening and late night I did more walking of undetermined length.

During both walks I recall thinking, "this looks and feels like November in Michigan. Most of the leaves have fallen, the sky is a milky-granite color both day and night, the air is crispy, not bitter."

My evening walk was to the preview party for Oloman Cafe, the splendid new business on Jos. Campau that combines espresso drinks with fine art photography.

The renovated space that once contained the Belmont Bar was packed from the time I arrived just before 8 until leaving at around 11. Owners Zlatan and Indira Sadikovic and their adult children are wonderful hosts.

The place has a contemporary urban European vibe: very chill, very hip, friendly and welcoming to all. I saw a few familiar faces but most were new to me. This is not surprising since Hamtramck is at the crossroads of modern America - rich with ethnic and demographic diversity, a magnet for the creative and the curious - and all roads from all directions lead here.

Not knowing everyone and blending into a local social universe we might call "21st century Hamtramckana" is a healthy sign. Some people pass through and leave. Those who like it, stay longer, move here, buy property and become part of the tapestry of city life. Increasingly, we are seeing the latter: people who want to stay and invest in the community.

At the bar, while talking to some people that I'd met before, I caught myself again saying something to the effect that it was an "ideal Michigan November kind of day" before making a quick correction. That mistake would

be hard to make during December walks can be this week's snowstorm and dipping temperatures that could not be mistaken for anything but December, or even January.

At Oloman, I met up with old friend Steve Shaw, a musician and photographer who recently moved to Hamtramck after years living in the Cass Corridor. Steve has work up now through April in the Detroit Art Institute's "Detroit After Dark" exhibition, and was part of a Detroit group art show earlier this year in Lille, France. He is also a founding member of the Detroit Cobras and the Fondas, two bands that had a major impact on the local garage and indie rock scenes of the late 1990s and early 2000s.

Steve is the younger brother of Jim Shaw, a collector, a connector, a social entreprepreneur (before anyone even coined that description) and prime mover on the Detroit music scene beginning in the 1970s until his death six years ago this month.

Jim was a good friend of mine and husband to Sandra Kramer, whose business Barberella is in the same storefront where my mother operated Edwin Beauty Salon from 1963 until her retirement in 2001. My family has a historic sweet sentimental atand the Shaws.

So what do two reconnected rock 'n' roll buddies do but decide to walk over to Painted Lady, where Steve says a band he likes called Primitive Parts was playing. Unfortunately, we missed the band, which apparently went on earlier, but we did catch a cool boy-girl/guitardrums duo from Savannah, Ga.

It was a great night, much of it happening unplanned, just moving around an active city on foot.

On another, much colder night, I walked to Public Pool, where I have been part of a collective of artists and curators since 2011. The show up for the past six weeks was called "Girlfriend Material," curated by arts writer/visual artist Rosie Sharp. I was to do a reading for the closing night event, Hamtramck writer Steve Hughes' literary arts series "Good Tyme Writers Buffet."

I read something based on journals I've been doing that are kin to what I attempt to do in this column. That is, walk, discover, experience and participate in real life, allowing stories the freedom to create themselves.

This is my last column of 2016. I thought I'd share with you an abridged version of the piece I read an essay in the form of questions I call "Nothing is" - as my seasons greetings to you all:

"What is wrong with holding someone you love? What is wrong with being held by someone you trust? What is wrong with watching a movie together, touching shoulders and talking in whispers?

"What is wrong with finding love and friendship in the same person? What is wrong with finding love and friendship in more than one person?

"What is wrong with playing sad music that makes you happy? What is wrong with starting a conversation that lasts until the end of your life? What is wrong with sharing awkwardness and absurdity between consenting adults? What's wrong with everybody kissing everyone?

"What is wrong with eliminating sarcasm, cynicism, arrogance from verand written communication? What is wrong with including tenderness, sincerity and em-

pathy instead? "What is wrong with being luminously sensual, lighting up a room when you enter it? What is wrong with being a little too hot sometimes, or a lit-

tle too cool? "What is wrong with creating an outline for a living diary, a narrative open to all possibilities, going for walks in your own diary, discovering what you thought you knew already but you don't know?"

## Former city official dedicated himself to civic service

During his 70 years here in Hamtramck, Alan Shulgon had worn many hats.

He was a Hamtramck police officer, a detective, a boardmember, president of the Housing Commission and a member of city council. He also worked as a Health Care Fraud investigator for the State of Michigan – a job he had for many years and was still employed at.

His wife, Hedy, also served with Mr. Shulgon on the school board.

Mr. Shulgon died Friday, Dec. 9, while at his cabin in Lapeer, Michigan.

Before he started his career in the Hamtramck Po-Department, Shulgon served in the Navy during the Vietnam War.

Mayor Karen Majewski said Mr. Shulgon was "one of the people who first introduced me to Hamtramck politics."

"Though we sometimes disagreed strongly on issues, he could always be trusted as a man of honor who followed his convictions and did what he

was compassionate towards animals - which says a lot about a person. ... I will always remember Al with respect and affection," Majewski said.

Shulgon guished his many roles in public office with a keen eye on finances, and making sure budgets remained

Ten years ago, when he was appointed to the Housing Commission, there was financial trouble at the agency.

"As President Mr. Shulgon has presided over the Commission's rise from a severely 'troubled' agency to what is now the largest 'high performing' agency in the State of Michigan," said Housing Executive Director Kevin Kondrat.

Although he kept a close eye on budgets, he was also compassionate about the needs of housing tenants, Kondrat said.

"I have known Mr. Shulgon to take his stewardship very seriously, and he has always put the needs of the residents first while adamantly insisting on fol-

Development (HUD) regula-

Kondrat also worked with Mr. Shulgon in the Hamtramck Police Department.

Mr. Shulgon retired from that department after serving 20 years. Kondrat said Mr. Shulgon also had an eye for solving crimes - especially ones with "bizarre turns to them."

A case in point, Kondrat said, was one of the biggest fires in the state in the mid-1980s.

"One case I distinctly remember was the Acme Ida Windows warehouse fire," said Kondrat.

"Al through dogged determination and persistence was able to solve the case. Al handled arson investigations along with Detective Joe Harjay back in those years.

"An extreme amount of scientific and technical law enforcement tools were utilized to perform complex chemical and forensic evidence on the remnants of the burned building which took up several city blocks. Al and Joe in conjunction with investigators from several agencies including the Michigan State Police and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF) were stymied by what exactly was the cause and origin of such a conflagra-

"In the end, Al cracked the case by reverting to good old-fashioned 'gumshoe' police work when he found a reluctant witness who mentioned two young boys near the building prior to the fire.

"It was found that the boys were playing with paper airplanes that they set on fire and then 'flew' into the building, one of which caused the massive fire and millions of dollars' worth of damage. In the end I believe Al's patience and stoicism served him well and certainly sculpted his working persona."

Besides his long commitment to public service, Mr. Shulgon is part of the city's most treasured collective experience: He was a member of the Hamtramck Pony League team that won the 1961 World Championship – two years after the Hamtramck Little League team won the Little League World Series.

In a Review article a few years ago about the team's 50th anniversary, Mr. Shulgon remembered

Here is what The Review had to say about Shulgon's experience:

remembers "Shulgon that season as a 'long, hard grind. It took a lot of discipline,' he said.

"Compared to today, Shulgon said, there is no comparison to how the game is played. Back then, there was no rule that forces today's coaches to make sure every kid plays in every game.

"'You'd go out there to win,' Shulgon said. 'Today, it's become goody twoshoes."

Mr. Shulgon is survived by his wife, Hedy; sons, Alan (Carol) and Paul (Jennifer); grandchildren, Brandon and Jaclyn; sister, Christine (late Dwight) Randolph. He is also survived by many nieces and nephews.

Funeral arrangements were made by Jurkiewicz & Wilk Funeral Home. Funeral Service was held on Dec. 14 at Holy Trinity Orthodox Church and interment was at Great Lakes National Cemetery in Holly, Michigan with full military honors.


