After correcting the reporter's mispronunciaof her name, Majewski calmly replied that not only is she not afraid, most residents are more concerned about potholes in the streets rather than who runs city government.

"The issues for most of our residents are: Can we fix the streets? . . . The streetlight that's out in front of my house, can get that fixed? They're local issues," she said.

In a recent story by The Telegraph, a British publication, a headline about the city cried out in alarm: "Refugee debate stokes tensions in Hamtramck, America's Muslim capital"

Refugees?

Hamtramck is "America's Muslim capital"?

When did all this happen? And what tensions?

Mayor Majewski blasted the report, calling it "sensational."

"Some members of the media have tried to exploit our differences to make a sensational story," she said in an email to The Review. "We ARE sensational, but not because we are afraid of each other. We are sensational because every day we work to live out the great lesson that binds the world's religions and frames our moral principles: strive to live peaceably and respectfully with each other."

Although the headline of that story was over the top, the story itself was fairly balanced and gave an accurate snapshot of Hamtramck's diversity.

And as for the refugees in question, there are indeed six families from Syria who are now living here thanks to the graciousness of a local Syrian businessman and landlord who immigrated here over 40 years ago.

In some of the rightwing stories on the election, it was erroneously claimed that the Muslim Sharia Law immediately took effect. proof? Their claimed that alcohol can no longer be consumed or sold within 500 feet of mosques.

No such thing has been enacted.

But what they are likely referring to is a state law - yes, state law - that has such a restriction for any religious center or school. But, there are always exceptions to this rule, which can be found no further than the liquor store located on Caniff and Charest, just across the alley from Hamtramck High School.

While you'd think every angle has been picked over here in Hamtramck, Majewski said there are still reporters and photographers stopping by her store looking for an interview.

"All the attention given to Hamtramck in the last two weeks has been

somewhat of a surprise — we thought we were just living our normal lives here, but evidently the world thinks we're a pretty interesting and significant place!" she told The Review.

"While all the attention can get unnerving, we all need to take advantage of this opportunity to get Hamtramck's story out there. What is our story? That Hamtramck has always welcomed people from all over the world, and that that essential part of our legacy continues. That although we have our differences, overall we manage to accept and get along with our neighbors. That while you can isolate yourself in the suburbs, in Hamtramck we live close to each other, we interact with our neighbors on our streets, in our shops, in our schools, in city hall, and on our own front porches. This is what binds us as a community, and what forms our identity."

While Hamtramck is in the limelight now, so to speak, one wonders if reporters will circle back once the Muslim majority on council take their seat.

A discussion was held Before the regular on what date should be scheduled to swear in the three councilmembers starting a new term. City Clerk August Gitschlag said traditionally the event it is held on Jan. 3.

During the public comment section, Bill Meyer gave his condolences to Councilmembers hammed Hassan and Robert Zwolak "for their car injuries."

He congratulated City Manager Powell for bringing back work to the Public Works Department that had been previously outsourced by former Emergency Manager Lou Schimmel.

Powell is bringing back street snow plowing.

Meyer went on to criticize Powell and the mayor for being selective in setting the council agendas. He accused them of leaving out items and issues championed by their political opponents.

When Meyer's time ran out to address the council he asked for one more minute. The council voted on the matter, and the motion lost in a 3-3 tie. Councilmembers Abu Musa, Hassan and Anam Miah voted in favor, and Councilmembers Perrotta, Karpinski Zwolak voted and against it.

Asked what he wanted to talk about, Meyer said he wants council to expand how long an individual member of the public may talk.

Councilmember-elect Almasmari thanked voters for supporting him in the Nov. 3 election. He said he was interviewed by about 15 media outlets since the election and asked about the council now being a Muslim majority. He said there is no reason to inject religion into the equation.

The lore of Hamtramck ...

Remembering Peter Similuk

Hamtramck has produced a number of movie stars. John Hodiak was an A-list star appearing in many movies including Alfred Hitchcock's "Lifeboat."

Gail Kobe was known more for producing programs than acting, but she was in dozens of TV shows and movies in the 1950s and 1960s.

But almost nobody remembers Peter Similuk, yet he carved his own niche in Hollywood. Similuk was born in 1916 in Canada, and it isn't clear when he came to Hamtramck. But he did live on Lumpkin Street with his parents before heading off to Tinseltown where he found at least a degree of

You probably have seen him in a few old movies. He never had a real starring role, but he played in

some memorable pictures, including the "classic" science-fiction film, "The Hideous Demon," which isn't nearly as awful as the title sounds.

He also appeared in some classier productions, such as "A Foreign Affair," a 1948 film starring Jean Arthur and Marlene Dietrich.

It was about at the time when "A Foreign Affair" was released that Similuk wrote a letter to The Hamtramck Citizen in which he gave his philosophy of act-

"My achievement was not an easy one," he wrote. "I face many obstacles which at times seemed difficult to overcome. To gain success in the theatrical world, the individual must prepare to face bad as well as good. There is no such thing as smooth sailing. I encountered many people in Hollywood who came here to 'break into the movies.' The individual achieves by one method - hard work - the only formula for success."

But sometimes even hard work can't make you a star, yet Similuk made a big enough dent in the movie world that he is listed in movie files and can be found on Google. That, at least, is a tribute of sorts. Similuk died in 2003 at age 86.

Similuk didn't have the looks of a leading man and it's hard to gauge his acting ability since his roles were fairly small. But they are preserved in his

Ironically, films. Hideous Sun Demon." despite its reputation as a terrible movie, is probably his most lasting film. It still shows up on TV and is available on DVD.

Check it out.
