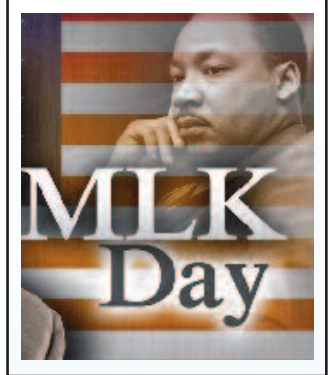

School board declares Boardmember Huda’s seat is vacant

Hamtramck School Boardmember Mohammad Huda’s residency status finally caught up with him.

At Wednesday’s board meeting, Huda’s seat was declared vacant and the board will now seek a replacement.

Last year the board authorized an investigation into Huda’s residency after a Review investigation revealed he was claiming a 100-percent Homestead tax exemption for a Warren house. That exemption means Huda lives in that house.

Huda had claimed to live in a house on Fleming, but in repeated visits to that house there was never anyone home.

The school district’s investigation, conducted by private investigator David Adamczyk, confirmed The

Review’s findings uncovered more evidence that Huda did not live in the city.

The findings were sent to the Governor’s Office. The district had asked the governor to remove Huda.

A representative from the governor’s office sent the district a letter saying removing Huda was not necessary.

“On the advice of the Attorney General, we will not pursue removal action because, if all the allegations you provided are true, then Mr. Huda does not reside in the district and thus has voluntarily vacated his seat effective immediately,” said Travis Weber, a Deputy Legal Counsel.

“If the office is vacant, then removal proceedings are neither proper or

But in January the days begin to stretch as evening approaches: you can almost feel the sun straining to pour more light onto the milky sky above. It’s a simple beauty, best experienced in a mobile state, hustling close to the ground, one foot in front of the other.

I spent a good part of my holidays walking around the city, for fun and exercise. My favorite winter exercise walks go something like this: I head north to Carpenter using various routes, but usually begin by going through Zussman Park using the diagonal sidewalk from Evaline to Yemans. After I pass city hall I either take the northbound alley (one

of my favorite cut-throughs when I was a kid) or go straight to Conant.

I love Conant, always have from an early age. Hamtramck’s secondary main street has undergone a remarkable transformation over the past 50 years, which roughly corresponds to my conscious life.

I remember walking this way with my mother as early as 1963, to the PNA Hall at Belmont or to mass at Our Lady Queen of Apostles. The intersection of Conant and Caniff had commercial buildings on all four corners. There were apartments upstairs at the building on the southeast corner, where

City tackles first snow clearing on its own

The city was able to test out its new snowplowing strategy this week.

And according to Mark Ragsdale, the Director of Public Works, the plan not only worked, it saved the city a ton of money.

The cost for plowing and salting every street, he said, was \$3,000. Had the city relied on its contractor, he said, the cost would have been about \$45,000.

Recently, the city purchased four trucks and outfitted them with snowplowing equipment. The cost was covered by a state grant. The work is being done by city employees.

Prior to this year Platinum Landscaping was the city’s contractor for snow plowing. In the winter of 2013-14 the city paid the company over \$800,000 for snow plowing and salting. Platinum is contracted to only plow the city’s main streets and emergency routes, which amounted to about a dozen streets.

The company is still technically a contractor for the city. City Manager Katrina Powell said it will be used in cases where there is heavy snowfall and a backup is needed.

Speaking about doing the work with city equipment and employees, Powell said: “We’re trying really hard to do it in the most economic way.”

Under a former state-

necessary. Instead, if a vacancy exists then ‘the remaining school board members shall fill each vacant office by appointment’ pursuant to Michigan Election Law, MCL 168.311(1).”

Voting in favor of removing Huda were Boardmembers Maggie Srodek, Dennis Lukas, Evan Majors, Jackie Starr and Hedy Shulgon.

Voting against that action was Ataur Kahn. Huda was not present at the meeting. Khan did not comment on his objection. Khan and Huda were the only Bengali-

Americans on the board.

Huda was elected to the board in 2014.

At press time it was not known if the board has anyone in mind to take Huda’s seat.

The evidence on Huda’s residence was presented to the board last summer.

Adamczyk, a former Hamtramck police officer who runs a private investigation company called Michigan Investigators Group, laid out the following pieces of evidence:

- Huda had changed his address from Hamtramck to Warren and back again several times

since 2011.

- On his 2014 candidate application to run for school board he claimed to live on Fleming while at the same time claiming a 100-percent Homestead tax exemption at a house on Omar in Warren.
- On that same application, called an affidavit, he said he had been a resident of Wayne County for nine years, which contradicted his previous moves to Warren, which is in Macomb County.
- Huda established three organizations that bore his Warren address as their headquarters.

- While claiming to live at 11813 Fleming, the city’s Water Department sent a letter to that address saying there was a problem with the water meter and they needed to look at it. Huda did not respond to that letter, and subsequently the city shut off water service.
- Huda is married and has children. Adamczyk said there is no court record of a divorce or separation.
- The school district also sent a package of material to Huda at the Fleming house but the district received notice that it was not picked up. The package sat on the porch of the house for 16 days.
- Neighbors at the Fleming address said they knew of Huda because he picked up mail there, but they said he did not live there.
- Adamczyk also spoke with neighbors who live near the Warren house who said Huda lived there with his wife and kids for the past 18 months.
- Adamczyk went to the Warren house where he encountered Ruhul Mumen, who identified himself as Huda’s brother and his attorney.
- Mumen said Huda was not there, but during that conversation Huda drove by but did not stop.
- Mumen asked to meet Adamczyk along with Huda, but Adamczyk said that despite three attempts to schedule a meeting he never received a call back from Mumen.
- During that visit in Warren Mumen called Warren police and admitted Huda lives in Warren.

Councilmember responds to city manager’s explanation

Last week we published an open letter to the public from City Councilmember Anam Miah regarding the process in which the city manager took to hire a new police chief.

We also ran a response to Miah’s letter from City Manager Katrina Powell. This week, we have a response from Miah to Powell.

Dear City Manager Powell:

I have read and now re-read your latest email and the orders from the former emergency manager that I believe you referenced in your email responding to mine.

I must say that I am terribly concerned about your ability to respond truthfully to my legitimate concerns. While I concede your point that the prior emergency manager entrusted you with the weighty task of appointing certain personnel, there is not one word in those orders or in Public Act 436 which says you should ignore best practices OR completely disregard the elected representatives of the people you are supposed

to serve.

Indeed, you have said nothing that would lead me to conclude that you did anything other than appoint the new chief without any consideration of other candidates. That does not speak well of your managerial abilities. The fact that you ignored this criticism altogether in your petulant display of raw power speaks even less well of your character.

Perhaps most importantly it does a disservice to the new chief who deserved the vote of confidence that would have come from a fair, open, and transparent search process that could have included input from community stakeholders (starting with the elected representatives of the people).

Other communities under state supervision have survived such open processes and placed good candidates as a result – candidates that the community embraced and empowered because they had a voice in the process.

I am going to give Chief Moise my support notwithstanding your deaf, dumb,

and blind approach to community engagement. I will encourage other residents to do the same.

I am not going to penalize her because you blew an important opportunity to tell the people of our city that their votes and their voices matter. I won’t mire the police department in controversy because you chose to select its leader in secret according to criteria you haven’t bothered to share with its members or the people that they protect.

All we can do now is hope that our community’s tremendous ability to rally will sooth the hard feelings that many of us have regarding your secretive approach to selecting our top community police officer.

Yes, we all understand, you are the lord and master of our community. For now. But I am a patient man. And, I know that there will come a day in the not-too-distant future that your powers as the governor’s viceroy will be removed.

Understand that in the interim and beyond you will get the cooperation that you give. The funny


thing about the Internet age and the nature of public administration is that my words will have a tendency to follow you to the next job interview where the next city council will see your history of disrespect and disregard of best practices and simple common courtesy.

This new Hamtramck City Council has done absolutely nothing – hasn’t even had an opportunity – to demonstrate that it lacks the ability to engage in the dialogue and leadership necessary to carry out its charter-mandated function to vote on your selection of a police chief.

You’ve decided to take an adversarial and disrespectful position out of the gate and lie to me with a claim that the emergency manager’s final orders required you to circumvent the Charter and required you to hire a chief without so much as even a perfunctory search process.

You insult, not just my intelligence, but the intelligence of every person that votes in this community. We both know, your crafty and deceitful response

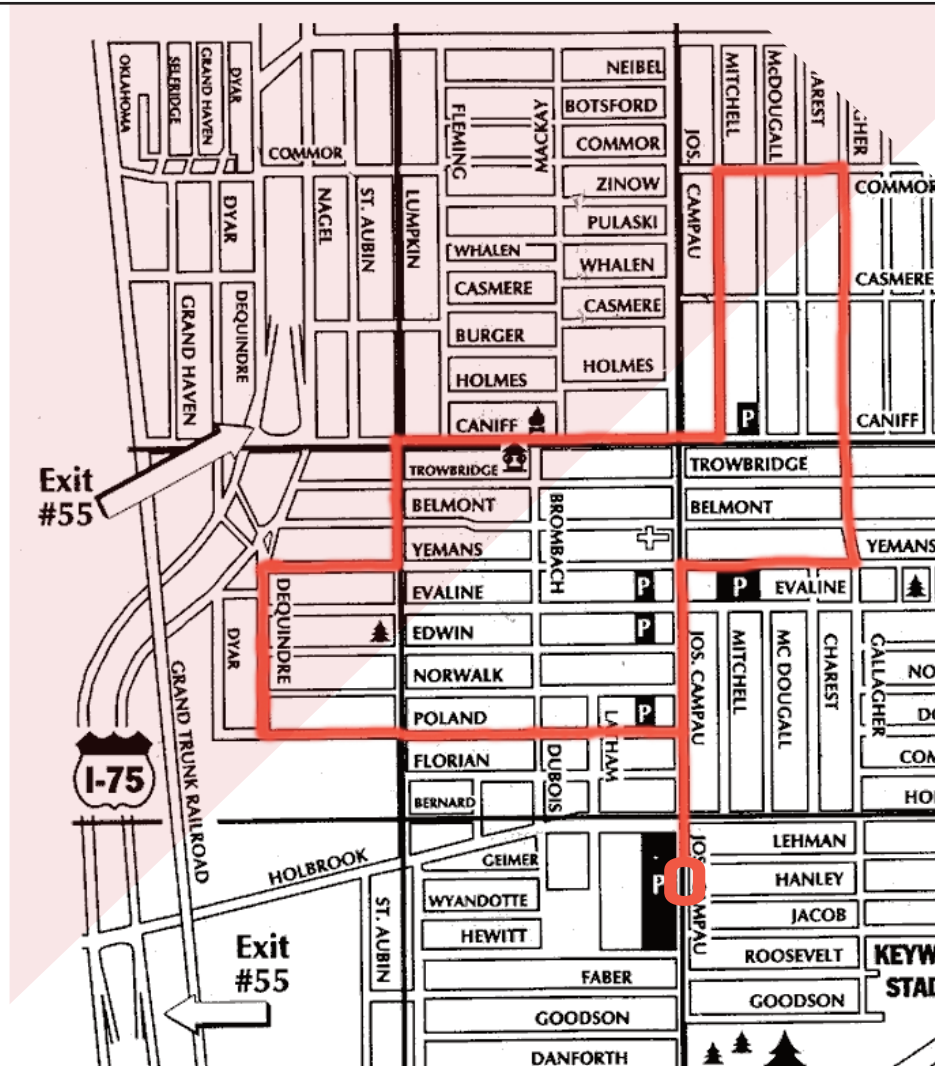

Change in election law will hurt Hamtramck voters

It's not often we talk about issues outside of Hamtramck.

But recently Gov. Rick Snyder, a Republican, signed into law two very bad pieces of election law that will negatively affect Hamtramck voters.

Both laws were driven by Republican legislators in an ugly display of partisan politics.

The first to be signed into law does away with allowing voters to vote a "straight ticket" – a method of voting that allows in certain races to fill in one circle on the ballot that allows either voters to vote straight Republican or Democrat.

It is a major time-saver for many voters and also helps avoid spoiled ballots.

Now, voters have to carefully read the ballot and vote for individual candidates. City clerks statewide are complaining that this needless change will lead to longer waits at the polls and the increased possibility of spoiled ballots.

No one had been clamoring for this change other than Republicans.

Why?

Republicans insist it forces voters to consider the merits of individual candidates.

The real reason is that according to studies reported by local media outlets those most likely to vote the straight ticket format are Democratic voters.

The next piece of legislation Snyder signed into law prohibits government and school agents from informing voters on ballot proposals two months leading up to election day.

That means if you want to know the meaning of a ballot proposal and ask the city clerk within that prohibited time period the clerk cannot answer your questions.

It also means school officials cannot hold informational meetings about their ballot proposals during this 60-day period.

We're guessing Republicans want voters to remain ignorant of ballot proposals — many of which are usually about special taxes to help fund projects — and vote against them.

For a party that professes to favor government backing off on our lives these two pieces of legislation are awfully intrusive.

As for barring government officials from talking about ballot proposals, that's just plain unconstitutional to muzzle their right to free speech.

Our guess is that it will be struck down by the courts, but what a waste of time and money.

There seems to be a fight going on nationwide for the soul of our country. Taking away our rights is not the direction we think is the right path for our country's future.

Jos. Campau business owners who are thinking about getting a new sign this year have a helping hand waiting.

The city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA) is once again offering financial assistance to businesses seeking to update their business sign.

The DDA has a pool of \$5,000 to dip into. Some 10 lucky business owners will be able to receive \$500 in support.

The grant will target eligible applicants who are commercial property owners, as well as business owners (with the property owner's written permission) whose businesses are located in the DDA district. Applications are available at the Department of Community and Economic Development office in City Hall or by calling Kathy Angerer, (313) 876-7700, extension 326.

The DDA district is located on Jos. Campau between Hamtramck Dr. and Carpenter.

"This grant program is one more way that the DDA is using the revenue collected from businesses in the district for the good of the city," said Hamtramck's Director of Community & Economic Development Kathy Angerer in a press release.

Angerer also said that at the DDA's recent meeting a "year in review" presentation was held.

During 2015 the DDA accomplished the following:

- The painting of Jos. Campau curbs
- Replanting planter boxes and providing water cans for merchants to take care of the planters

- Repainting of fire hydrants and parking meters
- Banner installations
- Installing holiday lighting on Jos. Campau
- Sponsoring a number of events, including Paczki Day and the Paczki 5K run
- Offering tours of commercial real estate
- Veterans Park and Pope Park renovations
- Promote Hamtramck Labor Day Festival
- Becoming a member of the Detroit Convention & Visitor Bureau

The DDA Board is led by Chairman Vince Szymborski, and meetings are held at Hamtramck City Hall, on the first Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. Any member of the public or business community is welcome to attend.

the BP station is now. Some friends of my parents lived there and I recall visiting them once back then.

Where Small's is now was another bar, later closed and in disrepair until the late 1990s. The buildings on the northeast and northwest corners are but vague, ghostly memories for me. They have long been demolished.

Oddly, I have occasionally dreamed of this corner as it was when I was boy. It made a big impression on me. Perhaps there is someone reading this column who recalls what those buildings were and what they looked like?

My walk up Conant is like a journey through time. Much of it looks exactly the same as it did in the 1960s. Physical Conant today, the built environment, resembles physical Conant then. But culturally and economically, it is far different. After years of disinvestment and abandonment – the 1970s and the 1980s were decades of commercial decline – the avenue now is a colorful, vibrant business strip, dotted with largely Bangladeshi-owned shops.

It is a food district, among other things, that draws people to it from the immediate neighborhood on foot and from greater distances by car. As I walk, up to Carpenter and turn the corner (either into Detroit, where the street leads east to Buffalo, or left as far as the Col. Hamtramck Homes beyond I-75), I have premonitions of more activity to come along this route. There is momentum here, the start of even better things to come.

What will it look like in five years? Or 10?

This past Tuesday, during a daylong winter advisory, I spent the morning at Cafe 1923, where I was interviewed by a German TV crew. They were here to report on the Detroit Auto Show downtown but also interested in how Hamtramck manages to maintain its cool despite the city's constantly changing ethnic and cultural demographics.

The interviewer was smart. She had done her homework and understood that the city was long a landing spot for settlers, refugees and immigrants: from France, Germany, Poland, the American south, Ukraine, Yugoslavia, Yemen and

Bangladesh.

It's long been a welcoming place, I offered, one of the first townships in Wayne County when it was organized in the late-1700s.

"But how is it that everyone appears to get along?" she asked me.

I told her, among other things, that people have an affordable opportunity to better themselves in Hamtramck, whether they are Muslim families or agnostic artists. People can achieve a humble form of prosperity and contentment here, enough to take care of themselves and those they love. The cost of living is low, the quality of life high.

I also admitted that there is something else at work in this town that is hard to put into words. Some of us have tried, over the years, to describe it. Yes, it is hardscrabble and hardworking, the people here historically no-

nonsense and direct, never a stranger to the changes that come with new neighbors, new community members, new politicians.

One of the major differences now is that our neighbors want to be here. You can feel that kind of momentum, too. This was not always the case. Most, if not all, of my peers growing up are gone.

My mother's generation, nearly all gone. There is a future here for those that choose Hamtramck to create a business or to create art or music. Or simply to live and work in a real life place, as I do. The future is a place where you should want to be. Perhaps more than ever, Hamtramck is that place.
