The regrowth has happened so rapidly that the district found itself in the unique position of needing more classrooms. An opportunity came knocking when a local charter


school closed and the building it was in became available.

Water bills prompt a review

By Charles Sercombe

Some homeowners have received a shocking surprise in the mail over the last several weeks.

It's the city's water bill for past use.

Not surprisingly, the new bills have caused a flurry of concern from customers. One business, which asked not to be named, received a bill for over \$70,000. That business is taking a waitand-see position until the city decides what to do about collecting.

Others had a more immediate reaction

Homeowner Sabur Ghazi received a bill for \$10,000 for his two-family house on Danforth.

"I thought I was going to have a heart attack," Ghazi said.

The bills are the result of new devices being installed throughout town. According to the new reading devices, many households received bills in the past that did not correctly reflect their actual water use.

In other words, the old meters were recording the correct amount used, but the device that electronically sent that information to the city was faulty and underreporting actual usage.

So far, no one has had to pay the back bills. A city council sub-committee is studying the issue and will come up with a recommendation what do. The options are: Demand full payment, ask for a percentage of the bill or - the least likely, wipe the

community. The former Tau Beta building on Hanley once served Hamtramck's rapidly expanding Polish immigrant community back in the 1920s.

At the Tau Beta Center, immigrants were taught how to assimilate into their new country.

Many old-timers have fond memories of the building.

This rebirth came under the guidance of Superintendent Tom Niczay and the School Board.

Asked how the district managed to make this dramatic turnaround, Niczay said it all had to do with sacrifice and determination.

"The turnaround is because of a supportive Board of Education who work together extremely well," said Niczay. "Their decisions are based on what is best for the district as a whole."

As for the financial comeback, Niczay was quick to credit the district's chief financial officer, Sherry Lynem, and her staff.

Helping out, too, were school employees, including teachers, who all had to take a financial cut to see through the rough times.

"We were extremely happy to make up lost wages and unfreeze salary steps during the most recent contract negotiations," Niczay said.

The district's success story didn't stop there in recent years. For the second year in a row the district enjoyed a partnership with the Detroit City Football Club, which experienced phenomenal fan attendance last year.

The soccer team leases Keyworth Stadium, which the district owns, and in turn it has pumped hundreds of

thousands of dollars into renovating the 1930s-era stadium.

Not only has the team attracted wild fan support, local businesses have also seen spillover from fans. Our local bars and restaurants have enjoyed upticks in business on game days, and there is reasonable suspicion to believe there has been an increase in investments locally from this fan interest.


The district also embraced the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation, which aims to get kids more active in sports and health activities. The program was presented at Keyworth Stadium last July, and it was met with open arms here.

Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. was the former owner of the Buffalo Bills football team. He died a few years ago, but his wife, Mary, is carrying on the foundation's mission.

She was on hand at the event and said her husband's foundation is prepared to donate millions of dollars to local programs across the country that promote kids being more physically active.

Hamtramck school officials are hoping to partner up with the Wilson Foundation down the road.

The future for the school district is now looking brighter than ever before.



"There is one story about my father that was often told in the bars and social halls of the city, and it was told long after his passing. Many of those who retold the story are gone too. I fear it will disappear unless I keep the memory alive in living archives like this column.

"The story goes like this: In June 1957, Democrat John F. Kennedy, then junior U.S. Senator Massachusetts, traveled to Detroit for an American Relief Poland dinner. He was beginning to build his candidacy for a run at the presidency in 1960 with a series of targeted visits that would help build momentum with important groups of voters.

campaign strategy was to appeal to Eastern European ethnic communities in cities across the Midwest. An overwhelming percentage of Polish-**Americans** were Democrats in cities like Chicago, Milwaukee, Cleveland, Buffalo and Detroit. Energizing a voting bloc that large could mean the difference between winning and losing the election.

"A big part of JFK's

"My father was then the Detroit/Hamtramck president of a Clevelandbased organization called the Alliance of Poles of America, which was on Caniff at that time (in the building that now contains B&H Bar & Grill). Someone needed to pick Kennedy up from fell to him.

the airport, my dad was stunned to see what he said was 'just a kid wearing Levi's' getting off the plane. He was carrying his suit on a garment hanger and needed to change. They went into the men's room to look for a stall, which cost a dime then to enter and lock. But Kennedy didn't have a dime.

"So my father fished out a coin and opened the stall. When Kennedy emerged, he was said to 'look like a million dollars.' Which, of course, he was worth – and then some beyond that."

To this I will add a recommendation for anyone interested in politics of that era to seek out the documentary film "Primary," which follows Kennedy and then-rival Hubert Humphrey as they campaign in Wisconsin in the fall of 1960. It's available as part of the Criterion Collection's DVD/Blu-Ray box set called "The Kennedy Films of Robert Drew & Associates."

After attending several playoff soccer games this summer, I was inspired to write about what I call the Hamtramck hospitality economy:

"One big takeaway from this weekend experience on two perfect July evenings was how welcoming Hamtramck has become. Hospitality is the city's greatest asset, and in aggregate, its largest employer.

"Food, drink, football; art, music, theater; multiculturalism and diversity; affordability, walkability and street life: all are magnets for people seeking urban adventure, day and night. It's all part of the new Hamtramck economy, and it is humming, understated and modest, on multiple fronts. If you have a good idea you can convert it to action and make it work here.

"It's no surprise that Detroit City Football is a smash hit in Hamtramck. The city was built for public life, for strangers to the airport and the task meet and become friends; or, more proba-"When he arrived at bly, enjoy each other's company for a night and never see each other again. Chance meetings and accidental discoveries are the law of the land within these two square miles of city life."

One of my favorite pullout quotes of 2017 was from Hamtramck Public Schools superintendent Thomas Niczay. After the school district purchased the building that housed the Academy of International Studies, Niczay told the Detroit Free Press that the school will serve the immediate neighborhood, saying:

"They (will) walk. It's like a classic American situation here - families walking their kids to school."

In City Life, I ran with picture Niczay the painted of what should be commonplace in a city built for basic pedestrian activity by digging up another quote:

"In a city the size of Hamtramck, walking is the best first option to reach your destination. Cycling is second best, getting there by car a distant third. The superintendent's message to children and parents is an important one.

"Children that walk to school perform better in the classroom. From an article I found at irishtimes.com: 'A Dutch study of 20,000 children aged 5-19 proved that those who cycled or walked to school performed better on tests demanding concentration, the effects of which lasted up to four hours after they began the school day.'

"Now think about this, an idea sure to be considered absurd only a few years ago: today you can live in Hamtramck, not own a car and enjoy a high quality of life. I have a car, which I seldom drive, but I am currently imagining my life without it.

"I would save between \$1,200 and \$1,400 a year in insurance costs (that number is reasonable compared to others that pay much more), another \$500-\$1,000 in gas and basic maintenance (that number could be higher if serious repairs or replacement parts are needed).

"So let's say without a car I save around \$2,500 per year. Ride sharing options, like Uber and Lyft, are available usually within minutes if I need to go to the greater downtown area; and for longer out of town trips I can do Zipcar (available Hamtramck zipcar.com/detroit). I am also open to sharing rides with friends who have cars. Otherwise, I walk or ride my bike (I need an upgrade, will be



looking for a new or used cruiser this winter)."

Update: I am still looking for that cruiser, but by the looks of it the winter will be a long one and I will have plenty of time to find one.

In addition to walking as a way to benefit health of body and mind, I also integrated the relationship between two of my current passions: walkable discovery and creative economy advocacy.

As part of the latter I work with artists and entrepreneurs from Berlin who are making Hamtramck a destination for food, lodging, academic inquiry and social exploring when they are in Detroit.

Last winter, I met Martin Knispel, a German filmmaker doing a documentary he is calling "Detroit Diaries." Не found a place to stay just

Hamtramck, along the Plymouth/Caniff DDOT coach line, but he spent a good deal of time here - at Oloman Cafe, Bumbo's and Detroit Threads.

Part of that column, which discusses techno as a catalyst for ecoand cultural nomic growth, went like this:

"It is a cultural and social movement that has its origins in Detroit, in the 1980s, and is considered a high art form in Berlin. A German court ruled last year that popular techno spots like Berghain and Kraftwerk, where the Detroit-inspired Tresor clubs (there are four in one building and a larger performance space on an upper floor of a decommissioned power station) and label are housed, are not simply entertainment venues but on par with concert halls where sym-

phonies, philharmonics and modern classical dance companies perform.

"Martin and I talked about that over a Bangladeshi/Indian buffet at Zam Zam on Conant, one of three Hamtramck commercial districts that could benefit from techno tourism. He says the difference he sees between techno in Detroit and Berlin is that it is not taken seriously as a business or industry here, despite its storied local origins.

'"In Berlin, it's what drives the economy, by bringing tens of thousands of young people to the city each weekend," he said. 'People come for other things too, for art and food and other kinds of music, but it is the excitement of participating in techno culture that is the key to it all. The city itself under-

stands this and markets Berlin as a place where creativity has economic value."'


There is a lot to digest in that excerpt, but I want to highlight the last of words Knispel's quote: "A place where creativity has economic value."

He's talking about Berlin, but we are focusing on tactics and strategies that can work closer to home. Hamtramck can benefit by acknowledging it is creativity above all else that can lead the way to future cultural and economic growth.

It is a theme I will return to in future columns.




