School Boardmember is fighting back to regain his seat

In an expected move, former Hamtramck School Boardmember Mohammad Huda is suing the public school district to get his job back.

Huda was elected to the board in 2014, but was removed several weeks ago after a majority on the board agreed that he does not live in the city. Based on an opinion by the state Attorney General's Office, if the board believed there was evidence to support that claim, Huda's seat was then automatically vacated.

Last week the board voted to replace Huda with Salah Hadwan, who will fill the seat for one year until the next election is held.

In his lawsuit, Huda insists he is a resident

and that the board overstepped its authority to remove him.

Huda is seeking reinstatement as well as reimbursement attorney fees and "disbursement" to himself.

Huda did not return no authority to remove

calls for comment. But attorney, Mark Brewer, the former Chairman of the Michigan Democratic Party, called the board's action a "coup-d'état."

"The School Board has

somebody," Brewer said. "Mr. Huda was voted in by the people."

Loophole in water bills plugged

Are you one of those people who finagle your water bill to keep it right below the minimum threshold to avoid a shutoff notice?

Well, forget about that ploy because the city is on to your tricks. And it's putting a stop to it.

Last week a number of property owners were surprised, and in some cases outraged, when they received a shutoff notice even though they owed just a few dollars or even just a few cents.

"Previously, customers would just pay portions of their bill and allow it to accumulate until it met a certain 'shut off' threshold and then they would pay another portion, never paying the entire bill," said City Manager Katrina Powell.

"Unfortunately, the city doesn't get the option of paying a portion of its bill to the Great Lakes Water Authority. It must pay its bill in its entirety, monthly."


So, what that means is gone are the days when the city would allow property owners to run up bills of \$1,000 before a shutoff notice was sent out.

Powell said the city further reduced the threshold over the past year to \$500, then \$200 and once again to \$50. In instance. each threshold level abused by too many customers.

So, now the new threshold level is \$5.

Lessons from the past

Back in the 1920s 1930s. Hamtramck's public school system was growing at a furious rate.

Enrollment in the junior and senior high schools skyrocketed from 879 in 1924 to 4,225 in 1931.

That prompted a flurry of building new schools expanding programs. We tend to think

today that education back in those days was fairly primitive. In fact, it was remarkably progressive, at least in Hamtramck.

You can find great examples of that in the series of school bulletins the district issued periodically. Produced by the teachers 10 times a year and printed in Hamtramck High School,

neys are still reviewing the lawsuit.

The lawsuit was filed last Friday, Feb. 12.

school board investigating began Huda's residency status last summer following a Review story about him claiming a 100-percent Homestead property exemption for a house in Warren.

At the time of the encounter the investigator saw Huda drive by but he the investigation, Huda did not stop.

In the lawsuit, Brewer points out that the Secretary of State office, the Hamtramck City Clerk and the Governor's Office declined to take action on removing Huda from office.

But the governor's response was a little more nuanced. It said that based on an opinion by the state Attorney General, there was no need for the governor to remove Huda.

Instead, the state said that if the board believed

there was enough evidence that indicated Huda was not a resident, all it had to do was to declare it vacant.

During the period of did not talk about his residency nor put up a defense. He was not present at the board meeting when his seat was declared vacant.

Brewer said it was not Huda's "responsibility to defend himself."

Brewer added that there might be an issue with Huda being a Bengali and a Muslim.

"If the lawsuit goes forward we will investigate that," Brewer said.

There is one other Bengali on the board and there has been a Yemeni-American who served a partial term before resigning voluntarily.

The boardmember appointed to fill Huda's seat is a Yemeni-American.

The issue comes at a time when the school district is seeking a millage renewal for the Recreation Department. That election is on May

Burning cigarette and candles likely cause of apartment fire

A Trowbridge man narrowly escaped serious injury - or worse - in a house fire Wednesday night.

At about 11:20 p.m., Hamtramck firefighters, with the assistance of a Detroit fire crew, were able to quickly put out a fire in a downstairs apartment in a fourdwelling house at 3152 Trowbridge.

Fire Chief Paul Wilk said the man who lived in the apartment said the fire likely started from a burning cigarette and possibly burning candles. The man fell asleep with the cigarette and candles burning and woke up to a thick smoke.

He was able to escape from his apartment with just some of his hair burned. Wilk said that because firefighters were able to extinguish the fire quickly, the other

apartments were spared serious damage and residents in them can still live there.

Wilk said that he was impressed by the outpouring of concern from neighbors.

"The neighbors were awesome," he said. "They asked if everybody was OK. That's Hamtramck."

Wilk added that one neighbor told a resident in the house that: "We have to help each other it's 2016."

This was the first significant house fire in the city in the last few months.

Cracking down on water customers is nothing new. Last year the city was owed \$1.1 million in overdue bills. Shutoff notices went out and property owners had 10 days to pay up.

Dozens of households and businesses still ignored the warning and had their service cut off.

It cost them \$50 to get service restored on top of whatever was owed.

For those who dare to restore water service illegally, there is a \$500 fee to legally restore service.

Hamtramck's newest Public School Boardmember has planted deep roots in the community.



these were sophisticated mini-magazines.

The June 1931 issue is typical.

On the cover is a cute photo of kids at Holbrook Elementary School participating in a wedding, complete with bride and groom, bridesmaid, best man and a mini-priest. It carries the caption, "June comes to the Holbrook School kindergarten in an atmosphere of brides and roses."

Inside, the content varies from whimsical to serious. Much of it is fascinating, especially today.

There is a long piece by legendary coach Hal Shields on "Senior High School Health Education."

It opens with the impressive statement: "Health Education, with its present outlook and aspirations, as an integral phase of general education, is defined as the contribution made to the complete education of the child by the basic psychomotor activities or the big brain-muscle movements."

It goes on to outline the physical education program offered by the school.

There's another extensive piece on "Just What is a Visiting Teacher?" These were essentially school social workers who helped students deal with a spectrum of problems, including absenteeism, health issues and poverty.

Another article looks deeply into the physical problems that children faced at that time and how the schools dealt with that.

In those days, the schools often offered the only contact kids would have with doctors and provided treatment for a variety of problems. This included conditions that are rare today, such as tuberculosis and polio.

In those days, the schools had clinics and dental offices to serve the kids.

The bulletin also has an impressive piece on the then-new Copernicus Junior High School, which was under construction and nearly complete.

And there was much more: A review of the district's spelling classes (spelling was important back then); the school clerks' basketball team and a section on "It Is Interesting to Know," listing a collection of short items such as: "Mr. F.H. Kinney resumed his duties as Principal of the Playfair School May 5, after absence of two weeks, caused by an attack of the mumps."

There's also a fascinating item about Mrs. Carol Sage of Dickinson School, who made an appearance on television in New York. This was about 15 years before network TV was born, and televisions were almost unknown.

She paid a visit to the Bell Telephone Laboratory where she sat in a small booth and saw and heard the image of another person "twoand-one-half miles away."

In all, the public school bulletin remains an impressive achievement even by today's standards. In some respects it is even superior. The grammar, spelling, and design are impeccable. That's often not the case on many Internet websites we see today.

Those educators so long ago truly were professionals.

Metro news ...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

A new report released by the Detroit Greenways Coalition highlights five bike and trail projects that the bicycle and pedestrian advocacy group is most looking forward to in 2016.

According to the DGC, Detroit will see a number of improvements to its cycling infrastructure in 2016, including the official completion of the Dequindre Cut, upgraded biking conditions along Cass Avenue, and the introduction of the much-anticipated public bike share program. The report also hints at an indoor velodrome that could be in Detroit's future.

Coalition works with both public and private entities, including city and state governments, and an array of foundations, to improve the quality of non-motorized transportation and recreation in Detroit. Todd Scott is the group's executive director.

Highlights from the DGC report include the following:


- The Link Detroit project will officially be completed in 2016. Link Detroit connects a number of communities, from Hamtramck to Midtown to Eastern Market to the Riverfront, through a series of bike lanes and the Dequindre Cut.
- Biking from Midtown to downtown should prove easier in 2016 as improved biking conditions along Cass Avenue are completed this year. Upgrades are designed, in part, to discourage bikers from using Woodward Avenue and the accompanying safety concerns of the M-1

Rail.

- Automated counters will be installed along the Dequindre Cut and Cass to provide the DGC with real-time data as they look to better understand and utilize bicyand pedestrian trends throughout those corridors.
- · 2016 could also be the year that a public bike share program is introduced in Detroit. Though nothing is definite, the DGC says the Detroit Downtown Partnership is hopeful that the first phase of the program will open this
- Bike lanes along a four-mile stretch of Livernois Avenue are being installed by the city of Detroit and will run from Grand River Avenue to W. Vernor Highway. Popup bike lanes, intended for viability tests, will also be installed along Livernois from McNichols to 8 Mile Road.

week some notice has now been home and business owners received a rude shock.

They were sent water service shutoff notices for owing the city money. That's nothing new, but there was one unusual twist. Many of the overdue bills were for very small amounts of money - some a few cents to a few dollars.

That was a glitch on the city's part, said City Manager Katrina Pow-

But, she warned, the threshold for the city to generate an overdue money when it comes

lowered to \$3.

Get used to it, folks.

The city is no longer in the business of paying your bill and continuing to provide service if you are overdue.

That's the reality residents in other cities face as well. It just so happens that here in Hamtramck, where we seem to live in a bubble all our own, we've been getting away with a lot of sloppy leeway.

We're trying to figure out why folks would short the city any

to paying a water bill. The bill is what it is. You can't pay whatever you feel like.

If your bill is \$60.82 you have to pay the full amount, not a few dollars or few cents less than that.

It may seem like chump change, multiply that by several thousand accounts and you can see how a little here and a little there quickly adds up for the city.

The lesson here: Pay your bills in full and on time.

City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

By Charles Sercombe

The city council met on Jan. 25. Councilmembers Abu Musa and Saad Almasmari were absent.

Before the regular council meeting took place a work session was held. During that meeting Councilmember Ian Perrotta commented on the cost removing illegally dumped tires.

"We seem to be having a problem," he said.

City Manager Katrina Powell said it's been an ongoing problem.

On a resolution that many communities are considering, Powell spoke in support of requiring employers with 10 or more employees and a payroll of at \$500,000 be required to

withhold local community income taxes.

Powell said this would save the city money by not having to track down who works here but fails to file an income tax.

On another resolution, Powell said many communities are urging the state to abolish a new law prohibiting government officials from talking about ballot proposal two months leading up to election day.

"This is not a good thing for us," Powell said. "We'll have to police what you're saying."

Clerk City August Gitschlag said the "real rub" to the new law is that it prevents government officials from explaining what a ballot proposal means.

Powell also talked about setting up a Beautification Commission to award businesses that make improvements to their building's appearance.

She said this has proven to spur competition among businesses in other communities.

"It really did to wonders for the community I came from," Powell said.

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski said she would like to see the program expand to involve residences.

Powell talked about how the city had previously repaired sewer leads in the alleys at no cost to homeowners. She said under her administration that

changed a year ago to where it is now the homeowner's responsibility to pay for the repair.

The average cost to make the repair is \$4,600.

She said the city had been paying \$100,000 a year in making the repairs.

Powell said there is now an insurnace program for homeowners in which they pay \$7 a month to cover the cost of the repair.

"We absolutely need this program," Powell said. "Our residents are struggling."

It's a program being offered by the National League of Cities.

During the regular meet-




