Councilmember behind in water and tax bills

Councilmember Saad Almasmari is known to be a stickler when reviewing city expenses. no matter how small or routine.

But when it comes to his own properties' financial concerns, it appears he is not so vigilant.

In a review of city, county and records, Almasmari is facing foreclosures on two homes he owns at 2261 and 2267 Faber.

He is also behind in property taxes for a commercial building at 9723 Conant where he runs his ice cream distribution business.

He has also consistently been threatened with water shutoff notices from the city for his two Faber residences. At times he has owed up to several hundred dollars.

At his Conant building, his water service is billed at a nearby address at 9735 Conant, which is owned by Almasmari Investment. That address has received several water shutoff warnings for over

Fire Chief Danny Hagen is no longer the Interim

Last week Hamtramck Interim Fire Chief Danny Hagen got a new job.

He was promoted to be the city's actual, permanent Fire Chief. His appointment was made by City Manager Katrina Powell and authorized by the state-appointed Receivership Transition Advisory Board, which is tasked with overseeing all city financial decisions.

We asked Hagen to in-

troduce himself to the community.

Hagen: I grew up in Eastpointe (then East Detroit), both my parents were Police Reserve Officers; I grew up in a civicminded household. After high school I went to Macomb Community College and obtained an Associates of Applied Science Degree in Fire Science.

Shortly thereafter, the summer of 1978, I first

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

first week of March. All 'hot' events.

People were on the streets, in the alleys, walking to their destinations. I see more end of winter walkers every year, a great sign that people are buying into Hamtramck as a place where foot transit can be the number one option. And why not? The city has a classic, yet simple early 20th century grid plan, a design that makes it easy for pedestrians to navigate any course of their choice.

When the city has a party it's time to leave your cars at home. If you don't own one, no worries: save some money, get a bicycle and use Lyft, Uber, Zipcar (you can find it in the public lot on Yemans, east of Jos. Campau) or share cars when you need to.

Trust me, one of the current selling points of Hamtramck residency is that you don't need a car. Not all the time, anyway. A high non-motorized lifestyle can be had here. I

have a car but I keep it in the garage and only use it when I leave the city. That's a good place to start in modifying your motorized transportation diet.

Last Thursday, I walked to the opening night party at Ant Hall. The renovation work done at what recently was BHA Hall, and before that an old Polish-American (P.R.C.U.) social hall, is impressive.

There are two bars, a small one in the back that pays homage to 7 Brothers, which adopted Planet Ant actors and technicians beginning in the 1990s, and Ghost Light, a spiffy space that once contained Taj Mahal, Hamtramck's first Bangladeshi-Indian cuisine restaurant.

There are two stages: a big one in the hall for theatrical or musical performances and a smaller, but ample stage down the hallway and through the door into Ghost Light.

If you missed the opening HMF party you can still make the grand opening night ceremony for Ant Hall. That's March 24 and features a performance of 'The Detroit Musical' in the big hall and music by the Scrappers and Drinkard Sisters at Ghost Light. Food is from Polish Village

Doors open at 6 p.m. Tickets are \$21.

On the Saturday of the music festival I helped organize a dance party at Oloman Cafe. I DJ'd with Franki Juncaj, better known to international techno fans as DJ 3000. After a few years away from live performing (his last Detroit appearance was at the Movement Festival 2013) and concentrating on running his Motech label, Franki took over a darkened cafe and had kids of all ages dancing until after midnight.

Franki, who lived on Oliver St. between Conant and Mt. Elliott when he was a boy, has put together dates in Europe this spring to celebrate 15 years of Motech releases. Do yourself a favor and search for his music, a tasty blend of Detroit and southern European styles.

Aside from the community festivals, events and parties of the last few weeks, I did some long walks, including one with Marcin Szczepanski, a Polish-born photographer now based in Ann Arbor who is interested in doing a future project featuring Hamtramck people and places.

a year, according to city records.

As of Wednesday of this week, Wayne County Treasury property tax records show that Almasmari owes \$4,600 in property taxes for both Faber properties and \$569 for his Conant building. He has until the end of March to make payments.

After The Review talked Almasmari Thursday morning, he said he went to the county treasury office and paid the full tax owed at 2261 Faber and half for the house he owns at 2267 Faber.

At press time on Thursday, The Review was unable to confirm that payment.

On top of that, despite claiming to be a resident, Almasmari does not have a Homestead tax exemption for either of his two Faber houses.

A Homestead exemption is for homeowners who live in the house they own. However, although it is not mandaclaim to Homestead exemption, Almasmari is losing a substantial savings.

When he filed to run for council two years ago, Almasmari said he lived at 2261 Faber, but there has been no Homestead tax exemption listed for that property since at least 2015 according to city assessment records, which can be accessed through the city's official website.

However, last June he sought a Homestead exemption for his house at 2267 Faber, but was denied by the state Treasury Department. That denial was retroactive to the year 2013.

In a Freedom of Infor-Act request made by The Review, the Treasury Department said in a letter to Almasmari his request was turned down because the department "did not receive a completed questionnaire or other requested information."

Almasmari, according to the department's letter of denial, did not respond to the request for additional information within 30 days.

Almasmari admitted that he has fallen behind on water and property tax bills.

"I'm living paycheck to paycheck," he said. "I'm not Donald Trump. Everything will be paid in a month."

Almasmari added that he sits on city council for no pay, which is not accurate. He is paid a stipend of \$245 a month.

He added that bringing up these issues serves only to "divide the community."

As for his delinquent water bills, Almasmari brought up the issue at last week's city council meeting. Almasmari was responding to a comment made by Mayor Karen Majewski on her Facebook page where she let it be known that a councilmember, who she did not name, was behind on his water bills.

Almasmari said at last week's council meeting that he got behind on his water bills because he renovating house at 2261 Faber, which is the address he supplied to the City Clerk's Office as his official residence when he ran for office two years

Water service at that household was shut off in January of this year but was turned back on a little over a week after. The city charges property owners to turn off and turn back on water serv-

It was not entirely clear why he would stop making water payments while renovating his house. The city continues to bill for water and sewerage service no matter if a house is vacant, unless the owner requests a water shutoff.

Almasmari's delinquent water and property taxes raise a question of whether he is qualified to remain on council.

According to the City Charter, Section 6-08, an elected city official who is in "default" to the city is not qualified to hold

That's a predicament Councilmem-Mohammed Hassan found himself in three years ago when he fell behind on water bills. At the time Hamtramck under the control of stateappointed Emergency Manager Cathy Square.

Square declined to take action to remove Hassan from council, saying wanted to avoid legal

City Manager Katrina Powell said she is looking into the city charter section in question.





Rejection of ZBA appointments underscores city's political instability

It's back to square one for the city council.

Last week the Receivership Transition Advisory Board (RTAB) rejected the council's appointments to the Zoning Board of Appeals, largely because a bare majority on council who passed the appointments failed to follow the recommendation of a department head.

Instead, Councilmembers Anam Miah, Abu Musa, Mohammed Hassan and Saad Almasmari voted in a ZBA alternate member who showed up for only one meeting in three years.

Worse yet, the ap-

pointee, Mohammed A. Rahman, failed to show up for his first meeting as a full member of the ZBA a couple of weeks ago.

The four councilmembers did not give clear reasons why they disregarded the recommendation of the City Planner, Melanie Markowicz. Councilmember Hassan was the only one who gave something close to a reason, saying he didn't think Markowicz was competent.

That statement was bizarre on a number of levels considering Markowicz has been on the job only for a couple of months.

While the RTAB rejected

the four councilmembers' appointments, there were no follow-up directions.

So, it appears the whole appointment process begins again.

Let's hope common sense prevails the second time around because just as it appeared the RTAB might be inching toward returning local control, the council does something illogical and capricious.

The botched appointments only showed why the city, at least politically, is not anywhere near ready to regain local con-

offend anyone. Another challenge is the different firefighting style in this city due to the close proximity of houses.

Q: What would you like to do with the department? Any significant changes?

Hagen: I would like to enhance the school fire education programs. The goal is to get into the schools more, talk with the students and provide them with a better understanding of both fire behavior and fire personnel (us). The goal is to touch a young life that may later on pursue becoming a firefighter.

I will be bringing into the department experts on cultural diversity, to improve our relationships with all 26 different backgrounds. I would also like to use today's technology and have either laptops or pad, in the engines that store all business pre-fire survey information (floor plan, exits, storage, and identifiable hazards).

When responding to a certain address, the officer would have all necessary information with him and use the proper tactics and strategies, along with knowing what the firefighters may counter.

Q: Is there any special training you would like to see the department take

Hagen: We are going to continue joint training efforts with both Detroit and Highland Park Fire Departments. There will be more survival training, i.e. what to do when something goes wrong in a fire, like being trapped.

This is for both the rescuers and the one being rescued. I hope to bring in on-line firefighter training that would elevate their knowledge on all aspects of the fire service.

Q: What can the community expect from your leadership?

Hagen: Honesty, transparency, caring and compassion; everyone will be treated with respect and dignity.

Q: Down the road, federal funding will be cut off for the department. Any recommendations on

where to find funding to replace that revenue source?

Hagen: This is an area I wish I had a crystal ball. Will the state increase "state-shared" revenues that have been tragically underfunded? I would recommend having a "Town Hall Meeting" with our State Rep/Senator along with local politicians to work on increasing state funds for public safety services, both fire and police.

It is my understanding the city has maximized any future millage requests. Another possible option is either joining or forming a "fire authority."

Q: Anything you would like to add?

Hagen: I am a firm believer that knowledge is king. I had a sign hanging in my office that read "Ancora Imparo" meaning "I am still learning." Arabic lessons, for me, are on the horizon, and I ask for patience while I'm learning. Lastly, I am truly blessed for this opportunity to return to a profession I love and to give back. Thank you.

Strong winds caused citywide damage to power lines and trees

Much like the rest of the metro area, Hamtramck experienced its share of damage from Wednesday's windstorm.

Wind gusts of up to 50-60 miles per hour ham mered the area.

At press time on Thursday, there was one house fire on Gallagher caused by a power line surge.

"Fortunately, we got a good stop on it," said Fire Chief Danny Hagen. "That was the first call of this adventure."

At least three large trees fell, on Goodson, Hanley and Carpenter, two of which rested on live power lines.

A street light pole toppled over on Hanley, exposing a rotted out core. That pole also was wrapped up in a live wire. Behind Mostek Paint

and Glass on Jos. Campau a utility pole threatened to fall over, held up by wires. Despite police tape blocking off the area, pedestrians were seen walking casually past the pole.

On the other side of Carpenter on the Detroit side another utility pole was about to fall down.

The winds started a little before noon and did not let up until about 10 all, p.m. sponded to 21 calls here

In the late afternoon

honking geese. ..."

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
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




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
