

'Whistleblower' lawsuit settled for \$75,000

Rather than rack up a huge legal bill, the city "Whistlesettled а blower's" lawsuit filed by a former department head.

The city has agreed to pay Steve Shaya, the former Director of Public Works, \$75,000, said City Attorney Travis Mihelick.



Former Director of Public Works Steve Shaya settled one of two lawsuits he filed against the city.

"This was a business decision made by the city's insurance company," Mihelick said.

He added that the city's insurance company will pay the entire settlement. The deal must still be approved by the city's Receivership Transition Advisory Board.

The board was appointed by the state to oversee all city financial decisions, and it next meets this coming Tuesday, March 28.

The RTAB is expected to accept the settlement. Shaya was initially seeking \$10 million in damages.

The attorney for Shaya,

your house caves in. The likely cause of that depression is a leak in the homeowner's sewer line that caused a washout below the pavement.

Ragsdale said many more sewer lines will be repaired this year to coincide with the beginning stage of a citywide alley resurfacing.

The first alleys to be resurfaced will be those along Jos. Campau.



Mark Koroi, said that although the city won't have to pay the settlement, it spent over \$200,000 in attorney fees on this case and another one involving Shaya.

"The city could have settled earlier," Koroi said. "We're glad the federal case has been settled – it's been three years."

Mihelick said there was a principle behind fighting Shaya's allegations.

"It was important to defend this to show Mr. Shaya's claims had no merit," Mihelick said.

He added a magistrate did exactly that.

"The city and all defendants were vindicated," Mihelick said.

As for the fees, Mihelick said that is inevitable.

"As with any lawsuit any

by the city and insurance company jointly," he said. In his lawsuit, which was filed in Federal Court in 2015, Shaya accused several city employees and department heads in his lawsuit of using ethnic slurs regarding his Chaldean heritage and re-

taliating against him after

he made several accusa-

gency Manager Cathy Square after Shaya admitted he was the uncle of a contractor who did work for the city and whom he supervised and authorized billings to the city.

His relationship with the contractor had not been known. Shaya filed a separate lawsuit in Wayne County Circuit Court regarding his firing. That case is still pending.

Prior to the settlement a magistrate judge recommended to the federal judge overseeing the law-suit to have the lawsuit dismissed. The judge overseeing the lawsuit ordered both sides to hold settlement negotiations.

At that time Mihelick said the city would have considered a settlement "if it makes financial sense."

Shaya's lawsuit had claimed he was subject to a hostile work environment created by former Police Chief Max Garbarino, former Acting City Manager Eric Tungate, former city administrator Kyle Tertzag and various city employees.

The magistrate judge who recommended dismissing the case noted that none of Shaya's allegations of ethnic slurs or other comments and actions failed "to rise to the

level he perceives them to be."

Citing case law, the magistrate said Shaya "has simply failed to show conduct 'so outrageous in character, and so extreme in degree, as to go beyond all possible bounds of decency and to be regarded as atrocious and utterly intolerable in a civilized community."

In one instance he was allegedly called an "Arab prince," in another he was called "ghetto," and in another he was chastised for being "too busy with your sand meetings."

The magistrate said the comments – if they were truly made – were "mere insults, indignities, threats, annoyances, petty oppressions, or other trivialities."

Shaya's lawsuit also included allegations of retaliations for actions he took.

In one instance he alleged that two water department employees shut off water service to his sister, who at the time lived in the city, in response to his allegation that one of them committed water billing fraud.

As it turned out, Shaya admitted in a deposition that his sister had been behind in paying her water bill at the time.

Emergency manager law fails to address core financial issues

It comes as no surprise that a majority of community leaders in the state have problems with the state's emergency manager law, according to a recent University of Michigan study.

One of the main beefs, which Mayor Karen Maemergency managers, who are appointed by the state, don't deal with the core financial problems a municipality faces.

The biggest structural problem is the result of reduced state financial contributions and rising legacy costs - meaning pension obligations.

The governor and state legislature are currently wrestling with the prob-

lem many communities are having in keeping up with pension payments.

The former Hamtramck emergency manager, Cathy Square, left the problem of fixing the city's pension costs with the city's administration. The state is also paying jewski shares, is that for financial experts to help out in this issue.

> We're left scratching our head wondering why the emergency manager didn't lift a finger in tackling this subject while she was here for 18 months.

That was a serious loss of an opportunity because the emergency manager law gives EMs special powers to force change. In Hamtramck's

case, it was an opportunity that was squandered.

Now, local officials, especially the city manager, must tackle this issue head-on and all alone.

What is particularly concerning is that Hamtramck has twice now been placed under state supervision because of a financial crisis. The root of each instance was a loss in revenue and an inability to pay for services – including pension obligations.

If our legacy costs do not come under control, it is inevitable that Hamtramck will be thrown into another financial meltdown.




