Local control returns

That didn't take long. Just days after the stateappointed Receivership Transition Advisory Board decided to end oversight of the city's finances, the Michigan Department of Treasury announced last week that local control has been fully returned to Hamtramck.

In other words, the city has been "released" from receivership.

At the time the RTAB decided to dissolve it was unclear how long it would take for the state to followup and restore local control. The RTAB met on Tuesday, and on Friday the state returned local control to the city.

The state stressed that the main goal for the city was to have financial stability. The city now has a budget surplus of \$6.5 million.

"Today marks an important achievement for Hamtramck residents, the city and all who have contributed to moving the city back to a path of fiscal stability," said State Treasurer Nick Khouri in Fridav's press release. "I am pleased to say the city is released from receivership."

The city has been under state oversight since 2014. That's when an emergency manager was appointed to take control of the city. Emergency Manager Cathy Square stayed for 18 months and then appointed a city manager to take over.

That city manager, Katrina Powell, ended her relationship with the city when her employment

fruit is the "Step Forward" program created by the Michigan State Housing Development Author-That's what regular ity. Because of strict rules and standards in the application process, every year the program "denies assistance to hundreds of applicants."

> Similar issues plague applying for the poverty exemption. retroactive poverty exemption could annul foreclosures for hundreds or thousands of at-risk Detroit homeowners who are losing their houses for taxes that they could have had waived," Oberholtzer writes.

She also thinks proownership programs like Right of Refusal are being underutilized. In 2017, this program saved 80 homes from the tax auction, allowing homeowners to buy them back for \$2,000 to \$5,000.

"If this program was expanded to include all occupied foreclosed homes, this would mean that 2,000 homes might be diverted from the grips of foreclosure onto a common-sense affordable path to homeownership."

Oberholtzer also wrote a column for Model D last year proposing that city-owned homes be sold back to their occu-

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Jan. 9, and all councilmembers were present. Prior to the regular meeting a work session was held.

Mayor Karen Majewski said there is a challenge in getting people to volunteer for various city commissions. She said she has 12 positions that need to be filled.

In a discussion about changing the council's rules of procedures,

Mayor Majewski questioned if it has to be in the form of an ordinance or, as she preferred, in the form of a council resolution. City Attorney John Clark

said it can be in either form. Majewski also conceded that the council does not always follow its own rules. A discussion was held

A night dedicated to African American history in Hamtramck turned into a celebration of song, food and fellowship at the Hamtramck Historical Museum.

The event was standing room only. But it was better to stand while listening to a choir sing traditional hymns often heard at neighborhood church services.

Museum director Greg Kowalski talked about the deep roots the black community has in Hamtramck, citing that migration from southern states began in the 1800s, then swelled when auto factories like Dodge Main were built in the first decades of the 20th century.

There were slides of African American leaders on both the village council and the first city council in 1922; police officers and detectives: and members of the school board. Another source of pride mentioned was the current renovation of Hamtramck Stadium, where Negro League games were played in the 1930s.

Kowalski pulled no punches in describing the history of discrimination against blacks in the city, including an over-40-year legal battle won by plaintiffs displaced from a southend neighborhood in what the city argued was an urban renewal project. Black residents said it was more about "Negro removal."

ilies also lost homes when the dig that became I-75 began in the mid-1960s.

Also cited was a fight over residency at the

over residency at the Col. Hamtramck Homes, which had a "whites only" policy when the projects were built in 1942. It took 12 years to break down those racial barriers, Kowalski said, "but it showed the local community was up for the fight. African Americans resisted, their voices were heard and they won out in the end"

The final slides of the program had simple but powerful messages, including these: "Yet (all) that was not enough to tear the fabric of Hamtramck, (which) has remained а strong community that in many ways is better than it has ever been. We are together as a community. Hamtramck is home for all of us."

contract ran out last June.
Another goal of the state intervention was to somehow change the city's volatile political climate. That task, however, proved to be elusive at best. There is still plenty of political division in the city.

That division rose up sharply when a bare majority on city council refused to extend Powell's employment contract, and then most recently when almost the same bare majority on council refused to hire a city manager two weeks ago.

Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer has been running the city in the meantime. Angerer told The Review previously that she has been working with state officials closely since she took the acting city manager role last July.

She said her main objective was to return local control to the city.

In the state's press release, Mayor Karen Majewski said she is optimistic about the city's future.

"Hamtramck is in a great position for solid growth in the future," Majewski said. "I am pleased with the progress the city has made and ready to move forward."

Not everyone wanted local control to be returned. At last Tuesday's RTAB meeting, Councilmember Andrea Karpinski pleaded with the board to remain.

"We're not ready to govern ourselves," she said, as she began to tear up.

Karpinski added that she is "disgusted" to be on council.

"It's a mistake if the state leaves us right now," she said.

Councilmember Saad Almasmari also spoke at the RTAB meeting, and in answer to Karpinski he suggested she should resign if she doesn't like being on council.

As for the future of the city, Almasmari said the city is in good hands.

"I think you'll see some amazing work in the future," he said.

RTAB member Mark Stema, who was one of two Hamtramck residents appointed to the board, said the board was not created to "fix the problems the city has."

Just what problems he was referring to was not made clear.

This is the second time in recent history that Hamtramck came under state receivership.

The financial problems facing the city are similar to what many other communities are facing: Rising health and pension costs.

Neither of the two previous emergency managers touched the problem of pension costs, and it is predicted that within a few years, Hamtramck won't be able to meet its pen-

City officials have to agree to disagree and then move on

Did Hamtramck blow a from hiring a city manager chance to hire a highlyqualified city manager?

That's been a matter of debate in city hall during the past few weeks, and it's an issue that has sharply divided the city council.

Recently, the council interviewed a candidate for job, Stephen Duchane, the former city manager for Sterling Heights and Eastpointe. He has 37 years of experience and boasts of many significant accomplishments.

But he was the only candidate that the city's search firm recommended out of 38 people who applied for the job. Most of the people didn't qualify for the job because of the stringent city charter qualifications.

Four councilmembers – a bare majority – decided they wanted to hold off

until a change in the city charter is made. The council has been in agreement to reduce the qualifications for city manager, but that could take several months because it will also need voter approval.

Changing the charter, they said, will give the city more choices.

Two councilmembers and the mayor thought not hiring Duchane was a wasted opportunity, considering his experience and reputation. To underscore their displeasure, they walked out before a vote was taken on Duchane.

That stunt is an old one in Hamtramck when one political faction can't get what they want. It's something that needs to stop because it only adds to the city's reputation of

Councilmember Anam Miah was correct in saying that it comes down to the simple fact that the majority rules - even if it's a bare majority.

Hamtramck will not fall apart because Duchane was not hired. The city is humming along just fine with Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer. In fact, a lot of the tension felt during the tenure of the previous city manager has largely disappeared.

And if you need proof that the city is under good management, look no further than the state's recent decision to end its supervision of Hamtramck. If state officials have faith in the city, the least our elected officials can do is find a way to acknowledge there will be differences of opinions, but at the end of the day we move on and still

While our police officers and detectives are always working hard to keep the community of Hamtramck safe, some notable arrests were made in the month of February.



City and school officials held a joint meeting recently at the public library to take the next step to apply for a grant that will renovate parks and create more spaces for kids to be active.

The grants being awarded by the foundation go to communities in southeast Michigan, where Wilson was from, and to Rochester, New York.

School Superintended Tom Niczay said it will cost about \$100,000 for a master plan to be completed. He said funding eventually could be in the millions of dollars to act on the plan.

On top of the wish list is to further improve Keyworth Stadium and to totally renovate Hamtramck's historic baseball stadium in Veterans Park.

The baseball stadium was once home to the Detroit Stars of the Negro National Baseball League in the 1930s. The plan is to make it a multi-purpose stadium that will host a number of sports activities as well and host entertainment events, such as contion, the public schools and the city must join together.

That partnership has been rare throughout the city's recent history.

Niczay said applications are due by August and the city and school district should know by next October if they will be awarded a grant. Both Niczay and Angerer met with foundation representatives recently for about three hours, going over in detail what the foundation is looking for in a grant appli-

Councilmember Ian Perrotta noted that the foundation is "tailor-made" for the school district and city.

"I think there's ... very little chance this will fail," he said.

Councilmember Anam Miah added that it's not a "two body effort - it's a one-table effort."

sion obligations.

There are a number of police and fire retirees making upwards \$40,000 a year. One fire retiree is being paid over \$100,000 a year.

During the state's supervision of the city, it paid for consultants to examine the pension obligation, but

those consultants could not find a solution to the problem.

State legislators have also tackled the issue without success. A number of other communities are also on the brink of financial collapse because of their pension costs.
