A new model in firefighting

Back in October Hamtramck firefighters entered a deal that would guarantee more work for them.

The department agreed to expand its already existing mutual aid plan with Detroit and Highland Park. The plan called for Hamtramck to continue to respond to Highland Park when needed, but expanded the call for help in Detroit to fires within a onemile radius from Hamtramck.

Those two cities also agreed to help out with any fire that occurs in Hamtramck. All cities were required to send a crew and a fire truck to assist.

That means if Hamtramck has a fire, a total of 15 firefighters and two extra trucks would be on hand.

With a new labor contract in place for Hamtramck firefighters there are no more than six on duty at one time, and if any call in sick or take the day off, the department is not required to call in replacements.

In other words, there is no longer a minimum staffing requirement.

This groundbreaking contract is saving overtime costs for the city, lowering the amount from \$300,000 a year to \$50,000.

At the time of the new mutual aid agreement, there was concern whether Hamtramck would get the raw end of the deal, especially considering the poor condition of Highland Park's department.

So how has the new plan worked out?

Not as bad as you would think, but Hamtramck firefighters are definitely busier than they had been.

Nine candidates file for upcoming city council election

The field of nine candidates means there will be a runoff in the Primary Election held on Aug. 4. Out of that field, the number of candidates will be reduced to six.

The final three will be decided in the November General Election.

This is one of the smallest field of candidates to file for office in recent years. The reason for that might be that the council has very little power to do anything.

The city has only recently emerged from a financial emergency that required a state-appointed emergency manager to take control of the city. The EM left her position over three months ago, but through her final directives left the city manager pretty much in total control.

A state-appointed Transition Advisory Board will also be overseeing the city's finances for at least the next two years.

The complete return to local control will be decided once local officials prove they can manage the city without falling back into a financial crisis.

By the looks of things, that could be quite a while. Some of the current city councilmembers, including

Miah and Zwolak, have butted heads with City Manager Katrina Powell, and it doesn't look like that will ease up soon.

There are some interesting tidbits so far about the candidates. Woodman is a rock and roll musician who goes by the name "Woodman Caveman."

Almasmari previously ran for school board but lost.

Dunn has had a colorful past dealing with elected officials, and has been thrown out of council meetings for verbally attacking Mayor Karen Majewski. At one such meeting she called the mayor a "bitch" as she left the council chambers.

She was also part of the successful mass lawsuit filed by residents against the city for damages from basement floodings. Property owners were forced to pay the lawsuit settlement through a court-ordered tax.

Dunn also accused Emergency Manager Cathy Square of assaulting her. That charge was investigated by the Michigan State Police but no further action was taken.

Gordon decided to resign from council two years ago in order to challenge Mayor Majewski. She came in fourth place out of four candidates who took on the mayor.

Majewski won her re-election bid and is now serving her third term.

Candidate Alsomiri is the owner of the former Shopper's World on Jos. Campau and Yemans. The building has been vacant for several years. It is not known what he plans to do with the building.

Candidates take note: The City Clerk's Office will be conducting a thorough background search of candidates, including their residency claims and whether they owe property taxes.

According to Wayne County Treasurer's records, Councilmember Abu Musa was behind a little over \$4,000 in property taxes for his house at 11632 Gallagher. He settled that bill shortly before filing for re-election.

According to the City Charter, elected officials can be kicked out of office for being a "defaulter" to the city or any other government body.

Finally, spring thaws enough to allow pothole repairs to begin

Fed up with dodging Hamtramck's potholes?

The wait for the city to begin fixing the hundreds of potholes that have popped up during winter is over.

Mark Ragsdale, the Director of Public Works, said repairs will begin next Tuesday, starting on Charest near Holbrook, which has been deemed by the Detroit Free Press as the worst street in the metro area.

The city had been waiting for winter's frost to go away, which it did officially last week.

Instead of just shoveling in asphalt, which lasts only a few weeks at best, the city will be using a more long-term solution. It's a method the city last used several years ago until



funding ran out.

Ragsdale said the patch material will be sprayed in the potholes and will have a sealant to help keep the asphalt in.

Contrary to what former City Councilmember Cathie Gordon has been saying at city council meetings lately, this method

does not harm the environment nor leak into the sewers, said City Manager Katrina Pow-

Gordon has been saying that's why the city stopped using this method. That's also not true, Powell said.

"The reason the spray patch-

ing was ceased in 2008 was due to funding, not for any other reason," Powell said in an email. "The city used this contractor to repair the potholes from 2005-2008. There are no more contamination or environmental issues than with the conventional method of paving a street."

While the city has no shortage of potholes, not all will be treated equally. Ragsdale said an engineering study will be conducted on all streets to determine what type of repairs to make.

That could range from spray patching, to cutting out whole sections of the street to a total

Ragsdale said that although Charest was the focus of media attention, there is a section of Goodson that is far worse. He said about 200 feet of that street will be cut out and repaved.

According to City Manager Powell's report to the city council, that will cost \$80,200.

In other road repair projects, Powell said Hanley St., from Jos. Campau to Gallagher, will be milled and filled at a cost of almost \$192,000. Further on Hanley, from Gallagher to Conant, there will be a complete reconstruction at a cost of \$358,000.







As for the future of the museum, "We have a long way to go," Kowalski said.



Wilk has nothing but praise for how things have worked

"We're getting a lot in return," he said. "We get security that they are coming."

He said prior to this agreement, Hamtramck would have no more than seven to eight firefighters to respond to a fire – no matter its size. Sure, Wilk could have called for help from Detroit and called firefighters for overtime, but that meant waiting for them to respond.

It took a few months for this new agreement to swing into action. Wilk said the departments had to familiarize themselves with equipment and procedures. A new dispatch service had to be worked out, too.

"There was a lot of training that had to happen," Wilk said.

As it has worked out. Hamtramck has not had to respond to a Highland Park call. He said Detroit has taken on that workload.

than vice versa. The program didn't start until January of this year. Here are the monthly breakdowns for the exchange between Hamtramck and Detroit:

In January, Detroit helped Hamtramck in three fires and 10 other runs (which included alarms and false alarms). Hamtramck assisted in five Detroit fires (and five other runs).

In February, Detroit came to Hamtramck five times, and Hamtramck responded to 13 Detroit fires (and six other runs).

In March, Hamtramck runs to Detroit spiked up to 39, and Detroit came to Hamtramck four times.

Wilk concedes that this expanded mutual aid agreement means more wear and tear on equipment. But the arrangement will also lead to an increased likelihood of winning grants to replace trucks and other equipment.

> "You're still risking your life," Wilk said.

Still that risk is worth it, he says, considering what the city gets in return - especially if there is a major fire.

Wilk says Hamtramck gets this backup: "Two fire engines, one ladder truck, one squad, and a battalion chief, and 15 people. The goal for the response is to have a short response time to an emergency, and enough people, and resources (equipment) safely, effectively, and efficiently perform our jobs."

No matter how many firefighters he has on hand, he knows Detroit and Highland Park have Hamtramck's back.

So far, the new mutual aid arrangement has been a work in progress. Two years ago, Wilk said, he never would have predicted this

"We had very little communication with Detroit," Wilk said.

In fact, there were some in the Detroit command, he said, who sharply questioned Wilk's motives.

Wilk had to point no further than to Gov. Snyder who demanded from the onset of his first term in office some five years ago that communities begin to share serv-

This mutual aid model fits in with that mandate and preserves Hamtramck's independent fire department.

It's not been an easy process, though. Wilk says it takes "weekly meetings, constant monitoring of the responses, the input of the firefighters and dispatchers."

This, he said, "is a sign of a management team that is dedicated to the cause."



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

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

In wars, Sojourner Truth had an ineffable creed that 'truth is powerful and it prevails." Therefore she, with her charismatic character, helped to recruit black troops for the Union Army under the motto of 'freedom and unity.' Her support for the Union Army

explained that her concern was not just for African-American and women, but of social and economic equality in general. She was an egalitarian who transferred the inequality she experienced as a Black Woman into the inequality that poor white men faced. This level of empathy is what makes her even additionally great.

The traveler for truth her name means. A truth which was distinctly depicted in her life. She drew a masterpiece, its ink is struggle, its brush is racism, its color is 'black.' She composed a symphony out of the cacophony of injustice and gender inequality. Thanks Isabella Baumfree for paving the way for generation to come to stand for freedom and egalitarianism.


