In the past few weeks I've been busy walking in all directions. Though the weather the first half of April has been dispiritingly wet and cold, I've

still managed to step up my daily routine.

I walked all fall and winter, usually once a day at a minimum of two miles inside Hamtramck city limits and nearby Detroit neighborhoods. These are my constitutionals, akin to having an evening brandy by the fire. Now

I'm ready for something more. I'm taking morning walks to meetings at Cafe 1923; afternoon walks to Bangltown, like for a recent roundtable for the next Knight Arts Challenge grants; and night walks to art openings at 9338 Campau, Popps Packing and Public Pool.

There is a lot going on here, within a few miles of my house, enough to easily sustain a rich walking life.

I do have a car, a 2001 black Beetle. It has a turbo engine and runs on diesel. The mileage is fabulous, around 50 MPG for highway travel. My longstanding rule is that

I don't drive anywhere I can walk to. Since I work out of my home, and experiencing by foot the streets and alleys right outside my doorstep is the essence of my work, the Beetle often sits in my garage for a full week, or more, at a time.

I recently estimated that I might drive 30 days out of the year, maybe less. When I do drive, I prefer to do it for pleasure, like when I visit my friends who have a house on Lake Huron. I have friends in Detroit who have given up their cars and trucks entirely for bicycle and foot transportation.

Ethnic slurs and tire dumping alleged

By Charles Sercombe

Several months ago there were media reports of a police informant claiming he was forced by a Hamtramck detective to illegally dump used tires.

That informant, whose name has not been made public and and is being called by the alias "John Doe," has now filed a lawsuit against the Hamtramck and Highland Park police departments on April 8 in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The accusations in the lawsuit are lurid and a public relations nightmare for the city.

In a nutshell, the informant claims he was not paid money he was promised in exchange for providing information and carrying out assignments.

In the course of dealing with a detective from Highland Park and Hamtramck, he claims offiregularly used ethnic and racial slurs.

The Review is not identifying the detectives' names because they conduct undercover work.

Hamtramck Police Chief Anne Moise declined to respond to the lawsuit claims, saying: "It is not the city's policy to discuss any pending or current litigation, this would include comments from our employees."

Here is a breakdown of the informant's claims:



Cathy Square ended up staying here for 18 months, the maximum amount of time allowed by law

Day-to-day control was left in the hands of City Manager Katrina Powell, who was hired at the end of Square's tenure.

Since that time the city has accumulated a budget surplus, a modest \$800,000.

On paper the city's finances seem in order. But

down the road, in about four years, the city's pension obligation will far exceed what the city can afford to pay out.

That financial burden is still being worked out.

There is one other factor at play, one which the state said contributed to the initial financial crisis: the political atmosphere in city hall.

Hamtramck's politics have always been a blood sport, and the interplay between past city councils and the city manager has proven to undercut stability. Prior to the state declaring a financial crisis here, the council went through five city managers within one year.

The current relationship between some members of council and the city manager has not been good.

Will that weakness in the city's stability play a role in the TAB's recommendation to the Treasury Department?

That's hard to tell, if Pontiac's case is any guide. The state recently relaxed its control of Pontiac's financial decisions and eliminated a state-appointed city administrator.

Local control has pretty much returned there despite the mayor and city council generally being at odds with the city adminis-

In 2015, the informant's work lead to a raid of an auto dealership on 8 Mile in which 63 vehicles were seized along with \$6,000 to \$8,000 in cash. The cars were eventually redeemed for \$1,000 each.

The informant said he of the take. was compensated for In a raid that raid.

Last August the informant participated in an investigation into a Conant tire store. He was told by the detectives that they wanted to broom out "these f—ing A-rabs" from the community.

The informant's job was to get the owner of the tire business to sell him marijuana and guns. But to gain the trust of the owner, he first offered to take used tires and dump them for \$1 each.

The informant did this with the assistance of the detectives, who acted as lookouts and escorts. The Highland Park detective paid for a U-Haul to transport the tires.

An unmarked police van was also used in performing this job.

The informant at first thought the tires would be dumped in Hamtramck, but the Hamtramck detective said: "You must be out of your n— mind if you think we are dumping those tires in Hamtramck."

Instead, the tires were dumped in Detroit.

During the course of the informant's contact with the detectives the following slurs were used: "sand n---"; "towel heads"; "f-ing A- rabs"; "camel jockeys."

At one point the informant complained about the language and was told by the Highland Park detective: "A little n—never hurt anybody."

Eventually the police raided the tire store and confiscated \$30,000 but the informant was not given his 5 percent of the take.

In a raid of an insurance agent in Dearborn in which \$7,000 to \$8,000 was seized, the informant said he was also not compensated.

He reported this to Chief Moise, who told him she would "take care of it."

That didn't happen and the informant then told the FBI about the use of racial and ethnic slurs by the detectives. After that the detectives came to the informant's house in an unmarked car with their guns drawn, saying: "We don't give a f— if you call our bosses, we

aren't scared of any FBI, and now you are really going to wait for your money."

Other accusations include an officer putting thousands of dollars into his pocket from the raid of the 8 Mile auto dealership.

Officers converted seized televisions for personal use and offered seized property to people not with the police departments for their own use.

The informant's attorney, Marco Bisbikis, said he hopes the lawsuit will encourage others "to step forward and speak up if they have been victimized similar to what is stated in our suit, so together we can stop this oppression, discrimination and abuse."

"In doing so we must hold these officials accountable for their actions."

Perennial candidate sentenced to federal prison for falsely redeeming church bonds

For over 10 years Taras Nvkoriak of Hamtramck has run for Wayne County Sheriff, as well as for other public offices.

He never stood a chance of winning, considering he is largely an unknown running as a Republican in heavily Democratic Wayne County.

But now he is getting first-hand experience of a jail. He was recently sentenced to 16 months in prison.

Nykoriak, 28, was convicted in federal court for cashing in over \$70,000 worth of US bonds belonging to St. Andrew Ukrainian Orthodox Church located just outside of the Hamtramck border on Buffalo.

Nykoriak's involvement in the church took many twists and turns. According to news reports by WDIV Channel 4, Nykoriak ingratiated himself with the church starting back in 2014.

He apparently started a division in the church which pitted some newcomers against oldtimers. At one point he was living inside the church. At an-

other point, he was presenting himself as a priest to the public.

At a gathering last December in Zussman Park in which the Muslim community held a rally to protest against terrorism. Nykoriak wore a priest's collar and spoke at the event.

Last year at Nykoriak's urging, a longtime parishioner of St. Andrew was arrested by Detroit police for trespassing while attending a service. That parishioner was never charged.

But it was the start of though. Nykoriak's undoing.

According to charges filed against him. Nyko-

riak "misrepresented that he was acting on behalf" of the church. He did so by redeeming nine bonds belonging to the parish, totaling \$73,170.

There was also footage shown by WDIV of Nykoriak wearing a priest's collar as he redeemed a bond at a bank.

At first the federal government told the church to stop redeeming the bonds, and Nykoriak, acting on behalf of the church, agreed to repay what had been redeemed. He never followed up

The matter never went to trial and Nykoriak pled guilty to subsequent

Interestingly, the court noted that Nykoriak goes by several aliases. Those who know him also said he has been living in Warren, not Hamtramck.

Nykoriak filed a lawsuit against the Hamtramck Police Department on another matter, claiming he was falsely arrested.

When he was about 10 or 12 years old, Nykoriak would attend city council meetings, dressed up in a trench coat, and proclaimed he would one day become mayor of the city.

Several media outlets did feature stories on him.

Nykoriak was also interviewed while he was in Ukraine where he reported on the Russian military aggression going on at one time.

Part of his plea deal requires him to pay back the church. His prison sentence could have been much worse, up to 10 years for each charge, or in other words a total of 90 years.

A former parishioner, who asked not to be identified, described Nykoriak as a "real con artist."



Metro news ...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

For all of the stories about new businesses that have either opened in or moved to Detroit over the past few years, some of the more familiar refrains include popups and food trucks.

These relatively inexpensive venues provide entrepreneurs an opportunity to do business without the up-front costs of outfitting a permanent location. One local entrepreneur is taking those concepts to create a uniquely Detroit service in the process.

Lisa Waud owns Pot & Box, a fresh floral and horticultural service with studios in Detroit and Ann Arbor. She has purchased an old ice cream truck and, with the help of a \$10,000 NEldeas grant, is customizing the truck to become a mobile floral retailer.

The flower truck – nicknamed Scoops, a result of its previous life – has already scheduled three stops throughout the week and Waud plans on adding more. Waud will be selling flowers and plants in front of Shinola in Midtown every Wednesday, Astro Coffee in Corktown every Thursday, and Red Hook in West Village every Friday.

Waud says the truck provides her the opportunity to sell flowers without the cost and risk of opening up a permanent shop. With the flower truck, Waud can more accurately target her customers.

"I'm so excited to have this truck," says Waud. "As small business owners, we're in front of our computers a lot. I can't wait to talk to and meet customers and be out in the world."

Pot & Box has largely been an event-based service, outfitting weddings, dinners, and other occasions. But Waud also offers daily delivery and weekly subscription services. Her flowers are sourced almost exclusively from American farms, and once warm weather finally comes to Michigan, she'll focus more and more on Detroit-grown plants and flowers.

Waud is also known for creating the Flower House art installation in Hamtramck.



> Our city manager has been given resources from the state to tackle this issue and hopefully prevent another financial meltdown.


But still, the city is doing well. So, why are

Detroit geography is vast, but it becomes more accessible as connective neighborhood tissue grows.

Think of it this way: as neighborhoods directly south, southwest and west of Hamtramck (Poletown East, Milwaukee Junction and North End) rebuild and repopulate, more contiguous walkways are created that lead to Eastern Market, Midtown, New Center, Woodbridge and Corktown. One of the best stories from my youth is of my then family friend, Robert Kozaren - who later became the city's longest serving mayor, from 1980 to 1998 -walking from Hamtramck to Belle Isle for a picnic.

For those who remember Bob, who did not drive and walked everywhere, this 7-mile trek is easy to imagine. At 6feet-6, Kozaren had a legendary, loping stride ideal for marathon walks. I can close my eyes and see him turning left at the intersection of Mt. Elliott and Grand Blvd, lighting a cigarette as he crosses beneath the pedestrian bridge at the Packard Plant near Concord, then turning right (at the Frontenac intersection) as boulevard veers the

One is to visit friends who live in the North Cass Corridor. It's about 4.5 miles from my house to theirs, a doable walk on some future after-Third Records, opened by Jack White last year, is about the same distance, as is the bakery Avalon International Breads.

I'm on the board of a nonprofit organization called the Detroit-Berlin Connection. We meet at a building at E. Grand Blvd near Brush. That's about 3 miles from my house, a 45-minute stroll. I already have a route picked out for each these walks.

But I'm doing more than just walking, an action that requires full multidirectional alertness. By that I mean paying attention to the physical realities of city life: signage, motor traffic, occasional stray animals, sudden changes in weather.

As my heart rate accelerates so do the thoughts and pictures that make up my inner journey. My mind clears, leaving room for remembered conversations with family members now gone, yearnings for personal adventures come, ideas for stories to I have a few destina- start or projects to complete. It leaves room for everything, the sweetness and sadness of everyday life.

It's a healthy exercise, a practical application of the main principle of psychogeography, which has its roots in a Paris-based art movement of the 1950s and 1960s.

That movement, which called itself the Situationist International, created no art (though was credited for producing among the first graffiti artists), but contributed mightily to a critical view that suggests (quite accurately, it turns out, in articles written 60 years ago) that we live in a world of increasing inauthenticity.

They wrote much more than that, in fact reams of incendiary text over a 15-year period, and left inspiration in some odd places — perhaps most notably the "idea" that launched the Sex Pistols and punk rock culture as a social revolutionary force in the mid-1970s.

That inspiration is the fuel that gets me out the door and on the streets each day. I find something new in neighborhoods I have walked through my entire life a feeling, a memory, anticipation of something better still to come.

All of these things appear fresh and new as I move back and forth in familiar spaces I track from birth to the present in the blink of an eye.
