For immigrant students at Hamtramck High School, there's a helping hand

Barmaki Younis Αl started high school not knowing a word of English. Every day, he studies to

master his coursework in a language that he didn't speak for the first 14 years of his life. The 16year-old sophomore at Hamtramck High School hasn't lettered in any sports and doesn't participate in extracurricular activities.


Instead, he works every day after school at Hamtramck's Yemen Café owned by his cousin then spends two hours on homework before going to bed to start all over again the next school day.

His story may sound extraordinary for an American teenager, but it's typical of students in Ham-

More than half of the students at Hamtramck side of America. An even greater number speak a language other than English at home. On top of that, Hamtramck has the highest percentage of children living in poverty in any school district in the state, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Any of these factors alone could create a substantial barrier to education for students. Put together in one school district, they make the task of not only graduating Hamtramck students, but also equipping them with necessary cultural and language skills, sound insurmountable.

But Hamtramck High, a GM Network of Excellence school within United Way for Southeastern Michigan's High School Turnaround initiative, has seen four-year graduation rates rise from 65 percent in 2011 to 86 percent in High School were born out- 2015. And, nearly as im-

portant, school officials say the culture has improved. Students value their school's diversity and the advantage it will give them in life.

"A Miniature United Na-

Walking the halls of Hamtramck High School, you'll see students dressed like typical American teenagers next to young ladies in full burgas. You'll hear more than a dozen different languages spoken, including Arabic,

Bengali, Ukrainian, Spanish and English. And you'll often see students not only navigating their first day in a new school, but in a new country.

"Hamtramck High School is extremely unique," says United Way for Southeastern Michigan High School Liaison Caleb Boswell, who works to coordinate United Way partners within the school. "It's like a miniature United Nations."

Remembering a Hamtramck hero

by Greg Kowalski

The weather deteriorated badly that day in November, 1967, as the plane carrying 26 passengers was returning to Qui Nhon on a flight back from Pleiku in Vietnam.

It was in the depths of the Vietnam War, and fighting had been furious in Pleiku. There were so many casualties that

staff from the 67th Evacuation Hospital were called to help out, but it was the return trip to Qui Nohn that proved fatal to the staffers.

As the plane neared Qui Nhon it encountered bad weather. The pilot diverted the plane - but ran into the side of a mountain covered in clouds. All on board

died, including Hedwig Diane Orlowski, a 1st Lt. Army nurse.

She was one of 12 nurses to die in the Vietnam War and the only woman soldier from Michigan killed in the war. She also was from Hamtramck and a graduate of St. Florian High School.

Nothing is routine in city hall

It used to be that the city council was the first and last stop to get a contract signed for services that are needed.

That was before the state stepped in and declared a financial emergency three years ago. Since then, the council has had zero power to authorize or reject a contract.

But according to a final order left behind by former Emergency Manager Cathy Square, the city manager is still supposed to present contracts to the council.

Such was the case a few weeks ago when City Manager Katrina Powell's administration recommended a threeyear contract to hire a company to perform water and sewer line repairs.

Normally, it would have been a routine

But a bare majority on council rejected the contract. Councilmember Anam Miah led the resistance to immediately approving the contract, saying he needed more time to read it.

Despite the council rejection, the contract went forward to the state-appointed Transitional Advisory Board, which has final say on all contracts and expenditures.

At the TAB's March meeting, the council's rejection puzzled some of the members.

Orlowski was only 23 when she died. After graduating from St. Florian she attended nursing school at Hurley Hospital in Flint. It was while she was at nursing school that she joined the Army, and eventually was sent to Vietnam.

She was awarded a Bronze Star posthumously and is now buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery. She rests between the graves of her parents, Zuzanna and Bronislaw Orlowski.

Lt. Orlowski was one of 2,654 Vietnam War casualties from Michigan. In all, more than 58,000 Americans died in that war. What was achieved is debatable, but that doesn't matter now. What is important is that all died for the rest of us. Hamtramck has a long history of sending soldiers off to fight in foreign wars, and while their names are recorded and preserved they tend to get lost in the passage of time.

Lt. Orlowski's life was no more or less important than anyone else's who made the supreme sacrifice for our country, but its loss acutely highlights the tragedy of war, any war. Pages of old newspapers are filled with the accounts of Hamtramck soldiers who died in various wars. All deserve to be remembered. But what makes Lt. Orlowski's death especially tragic is the promise of the future that went unfilled, of a life that was cut far too short.

You can see a marvelous YouTube video "Honoring Hedwig Diane Orlowski" done by Ted Radzilowski, director of the Piast Institute in Hamtramck. He recounts her story and takes us on a visit to her grave in Mt. Olivet. It's quite touching and serves as a beautiful reminder of the life of Hedwig Diane Orlowski – a St. Florian graduate, a Hamtramckan and a hero of our country.

like this had not come up before.

"I guess I feel uncomfortable voting for something when the city council should take responsibility for it," said TAB member Al Bogdan, according to minutes taken at the meeting.

"I would prefer to see it sent back to council and ask them to take action on it before we (do)."

The chairman of the TAB, Deborah Roberts, was also taken aback.

"Well, the way it's supposed to work is they're supposed to take action. And then we approve it," she said. "They failed to take action, and decided to kick it to us. That's the problem. They kicked it to

This impasse between some members of the city council and Powell is nothing new. There have been many other disagreements and criticisms leveled against her and her management style.

Powell has repeatedly warned that the behavior of council is being watched by state officials.

"Whatever the council is attempting to do it's not working," she said when the contract was rejected."

Roberts also echoed that comment.

"I think council should have done their job. If they'd like us to leave, they need to do their job. Unfortunately they kicked this to us," Roberts said in response to fellow TAB member Peter McInerney's suggestion to send the contract back to council.

Despite some reservations by the TAB to move forward on the contract, member Mark Stema said contracts for basic services can't be held up.

"They don't want to

govern themselves, unfortunately," Stema said. "Part of the reason this board is even here is the past council didn't want to govern themselves, and make the hard decisions, so they voted to bring the state in so they didn't have to make the hard decisions."

He also said the council should consider this matter a warning.

"If they still want to govern themselves, decisions have to move forward and the city has move forward," Stema said.

Still, the TAB was reluctant to move forward because there was concern the TAB was overriding the city council. But as Roberts pointed out there was no choice since the service was needed for the "welfare" of the city.

Now the question that hangs in the air is what will happen in the future if the council continues to reject contracts.

The TAB is also about to make its recommendation to the state Treasury Department on whether to return local control to the city.

She said the present meters are over 10 years old and many have stopped functioning.

The cost to replace the meters will be about \$1 million.

On road repairs, Powell said she is seeking federal funding. She was asked about when Conant will be repaved. Powell said that since the county repaved the worst areas last year, "it's not going to be touched for a long time."

Councilmember Anam Miah said he wants to see the city parking lots repaved this year.

"Figure it out, find the funding," he told Powell.

Mayor Karen Majewski questioned when a pile of rubble on Carpenter, which is the remains of a party store fire, will be cleared.

Fire Chief Paul Wilk said there is a dispute over the removal of it.



However, their diversity, while celebrated by school leaders and students, also creates a strain on the school.

"You have students who are from all over the world, and Hamtramck High has this unique challenge," Caleb said. "They have a huge population where English is their second language, and they're getting students who just got their visa; just got to the States.

"But the school handles that very well," he added. The Joint Effort to Success

It takes a coordinated effort to help students do well at Hamtramck High from the school and students, and United Way and its partners.

The school works hard to teach students English while moving through their coursework: it has special classes for learning English, and many of the teachers and support staff speak several languages.

United Way and its partners help fill in the gaps, providing resources to help students apply for college and financial aid, gain literacy and SAT/ACT training, and help with learning English.

All of this is possible thanks to a \$27.1-million grant from GM that paved the way for the GM Network of Excellence - a cohort of seven schools that are part of United Way's High School Turnaround Initiative, with the goal of raising graduating rates above 80 percent while addressing any other issues the school may be facing.

"There are programs at Hamtramck that deal with behavior modification, mentoring (and) academic tutoring," Caleb said. "We offer programming that will improve the school culture overall. A better school culture leads to better students, which leads to better graduation rates.

"We're taking a holistic approach in regard to improving the school culture."

School Board News ...

The monthly Hamtramck Public School Board meeting was held last week on April 13 with all board members present.

· The School Board approved the request of Superintendent Tom Niczay to develop a citywide response system for active shooter scenarios in public facilities. The program is called ALICE and was developed by Dr. Sarena Shivers. It has been implemented in school districts across the state, including all of Washtenaw County. It requires a coordinated effort between law enforcement and schools to train all staff in a systematic response that will Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. Hamtramck charter schools have also been invited to participate since the safety of all children is our top priority.

 Hamtramck High School continues to make impressive strides in its turnaround plan. An extra English as a Second Language (ESL) class was recently added because of an influx of students arriving mostly from Yemen. Moving forward classes will be organized into three tiers by level of language acquisition to allow for more tailored language instruction. HHS, in addition to schools district wide, is also beginning to implement a Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program. "PBIS is a framework or approach for assisting school personnel in adopting and organizing evi-

dence-based behavioral interventions into an integrated continuum that enhances academic and social behavior outcomes for all students" (pbis.org).

 We are also sad to see the departure of HHS In-Principal Terry George at the end of this school year. As a former Principal and HPS Pupil Services Director, he stepped into the role at a critical time and drove many improvements to the school culture and structure, and is committed to the successful transition of a long-term replacement. Good luck Terry!

 Kosciuszko Middle School also made their quarterly report to the board on their turnaround plan. They focused mainly on Thinking Maps, which is a key instructional practice integrated throughout the curriculum. Developed on the research of Dr. David Hyerle, and detailed in "Thinking Maps: A Language for Learning," each map represents an essential cognitive skill that allows students to "become aware of the thinking skills that drive their learning, giving them explicit pathways for thinking about their thinking and improv-

ing their performance". KMS Alumni will also be holding a school reunion party for all former students, staff, and their families on May 21 from 5 to 9 p.m. The event will be a fundraiser to raise money for special activities for KMS students. Come see your old school and visit with your old teachers and students! 21 and older welcome. Dinner will be served. Contact the board office for details about purchasing tickets.

· A \$676,000 bid was awarded to Axiom Construction Services Group, LLC to renovate the KMS cafeteria and hallway, from the Cafeteria Fund. A \$215,000 bid awarded to Axiom Construction Services Group, LLC to install new pool filtration, ventilation, and water main repair, from the Sinking Fund. The next scheduled repairs from the Sinking Fund will be the Dickinson East roof and Hamtramck High School

dents learn language and cultural skills, as well as relating to them as fellow immigrants. Qanita Ali, the site leader at the ACCESS Success Center at Hamtramck High, emigrated from Iraq to Dearborn with her family and believes it helps in her work with students.

"I can say that I've gone through something similar to your experience," she says. "The way your family struggles is the way my family continues to struggle."

Being a United Way for Southeastern Michigan Turnaround High School, Principal Terrence George says, "has provided Hamtramck High School with a lot of things that we could not have otherwise afforded."

This includes connecting students with field trip and mentoring opportunities to help them see all the possibilities the future could hold for them.

Driven to Succeed

But all of this wouldn't mean much without a commitment from the students. Principal Terrence George gives them a lot of credit, saying he's always impressed by teens willing to help translate for someone who is still learning English, and by students like Younis, who are determined to do well in school.

Though he was always gifted at math, Younis knew he had to learn English to graduate and study engineering in the University of Michigan-Dearborn in a few years.

"With math, you do not need English," he explains. "If you know it from back home, you can do it here. But if you don't know English, you're going to face difficulty."

Qanita Ali says that she believes the drive Younis and other students have is, in part, because immigrant families know what it's like to face challenges.

"With immigrant families, there's a high motivation because they've come so far," she explains. "Something like a college application or high school course is not as difficult as changing your entire life situation."

Younis knows he has to work hard in school and at his job so that he can save for college and, hopefully, land a scholarship. Principal Terrence George says that level of drive is typical for students at his school. Many of them work jobs to save for college and even support their families.

"Our kids and their parents are not afraid of hard work," he says. "What trumps everything is that sense of 'I'm lucky to be here, and my family came here for us to make a life.' It's a much bigger thing than just going to math class."


