Mayor Karen Majewski spoke of Walters' fiery passion.


"Titus was not afraid – not afraid to speak his mind, and to do the hard

Next Tuesday is a special election for a recreation millage renewal. The millage has been in place for 20 years, and its renewal will last for 10 years before expiring.

Recreation programs are run by the Hamtramck Public School District.

Evan Major, the Vice President of the Hamtramck School Board, has been heading up a campaign committee to urge voters to support the renewal.

He said he has been getting good feedback from voters.

"The stories we have heard during the campaign detail 20 years of a vital community asset. I am confident that voters will vote yes to renew the recreation millage and continue to provide our families with quality, safe, and affordable activities," Major said.

cial election, voter turnout is likely to be low, if previous special elections are any guide.

One thing that has caused some confusion in the election is the recently enacted Public Act 269, which prohibits government officials and elected officials from speaking on ballot issues for 60 days prior to the election day.

School Superintendent Tom Niczay had asked for a city council resolution in support of the millage, but City Manager Katrina Powell said the law prohibited that action.

However, the law is being challenged in federal court, and in the meantime Federal District Court Judge John O'Meara placed an injunction on the law, meaning government and elected officials can talk about ballot ques-

tions.

Matt Bach, the Director of Media Relations for the Michigan Municipal League told The Review that government officials "can do what they did before" the law was enacted.

"The law is on hold," he said.

At Tuesday's city council meeting Powell, after talking with School Superintendent Tom Niczay before the meeting, put

the resolution request forward to the council.

Metro news ...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeld-media.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

City Lab recently summarized the data on population estimates for 2015 released by the U.S. Census Bureau. Buried among the larger population patterns was an interesting note about metro Detroit.

First the good news: our metro area is growing. The bad: it's at the 14th slowest rate in the country – an anemic 0.01 percent. That's not too surprising, given gen-

eral national trends of population movement to the south and west, and our still recovering housing market and economy.

But at least it's positive. As recently as 2008 and 2009, metro Detroit experienced the largest population losses in the country. The "winner" of this dubious distinction for the past six years running is the Youngstown, Ohio metro region.

Other statistics of note from the report:

- "Population is growing faster in the South and West than in the Northeast and Midwest, and faster in suburban areas than in urban counties"
- "Six of the ten fastest growing metros in 2015 were in Florida and Texas, while none were in the Midwest or Northeast"
- · Oil towns and metros, especially those in "micropolitan" regions like Williston and Dickinson, North Dakota, experienced some of the biggest increases

The metro area with the largest projected growth for 2015 was Cape Coral-Fort Myers, FL at 3.3 percent.

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
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

Citywide water meter replacement to begin soon

For several years there has been a water meter at the Wayne County Jail in Hamtramck unused and rotting away.

The city has either not collected a dime in water usage from the jail in all that time, or it has relied on estimates from when there was a working meter.

City Manager Katrina Powell said she is not sure what the case is.

The jail situation is not an isolated incident, Powell said.

It has been discovered that anywhere from 10 to 20 industrial customers do not have working water meters. Some of them may have been paying estimated bills for several years.

The situation is even more widespread when it comes to households. Powell said there are hundreds of non-working me-

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In a handful of cases, she said, there have even been some households with absolutely no meters.

How could this have happened?

That's a question Powell could not answer. Was it part of the overall past dysfunction of the city?

Maybe, and probably most certainly.

Hamtramck has twice been put under state supervision through an emergency manager after its finances hit a rock bottom. The diagnosis of the city's financial trouble has always included mismanagement of some kind.

But the causes to the city's fiscal problems lead to many reasons. Some, like the water meters, have had no immediate explanations.

It doesn't matter to some degree because Powell is not concerned about pointing fingers, but instead just wants to move forward. She is taking the first step in budgeting money to begin a meter replacement program. Companies will soon be hired to begin replacing residential and business meters.

Powell might even go after a low-interest loan just to take care of all the meters at one time. That would be anywhere from 7,000 to 9,000 meters to cover residential dwellings and businesses.

Powell said she estimates it will cost \$1.5 million to replace all of the meters. That's a hefty price and one would think property owners will end up eating that cost.

Not so, Powell said, promising there will not be a hike in water bills to

cover this cost.

However, if you have been receiving estimated bills, you can expect an increase in future bills because estimated bills usually underestimate actual usage.

The first to receive new meters will be the big ticket customers, including the county jail, public housing and some schools.

"We're going after them right out of the gate," Powell told the city council recently.

For homeowners, expect a notice saying someone will be coming into your house to replace your water meter.

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


The single stop on the island is located close to the island's conservancy, aquarium and giant slide.


