

Less than 24 hours from the time of her running away our daughter was located and safely back in our home.

Words cannot express the anguish our family experienced while daughter was missing, nor can they describe the joy we experienced as we tearfully embraced our child once more.

Having had time to process some of what transpired last week, one word does come to mind

that encapsulates the wide range of emotions experienced week: Thankfulness.

So many things to be thankful for: God for His faithfulness, the safety and well-being of our daughter, another chance to embrace our daughter and tell her, "I love you," the many friends who came to our side to love us and pray with us during those hours of anguish, and the community of Hamtramck, a community that responded with compassion to locate our daughter.

A community is defined as a group of people with a common characteristic or interest living together within a larger society. We are wired by our Creator to live in community.

Mayor: city faces **budget woes**

The state recently exited its supervision of the city saying it's in good financial shape, but Mayor Karen Majewski says there are still some issues.

In a recent interview with WDET-FM reporter Amy Miller, Majewski said the city will need to "dip into" its \$6 million budget surplus.

She blamed that on the state's handling of city finances when Hamtramck was under the supervision of emergency managers. Majewski said despite the legal power emergency managers had, they failed to "solve the structural problems" that have plagued the city.

The main "structural" challenges are rising pension and medical benefit costs. The issue of pension costs is a problem most Michigan communities are facing.

The state attempted to address the pension issue when the emergency manager left her post three years ago by assigning consultants to help the city manager.

That city manager, Katrina Powell, told The Review that the consultants said they could not solve the problem. State legislators and the governor have also failed to work out a solution for cities.

Hamtramck's \$16 million budget will also be further stressed if the federal government does not renew a \$1.5 million yearly grant that offsets the salaries of firefight-

The grant, known as the SAFER grant, is due to run out early next year. The grant is managed through the Federal **Emergency Managment** Agency (FEMA). According to media reports, officials from FEMA have not said whether the grant will continue.

Some city officials predict the grant will not be renewed. In the meantime, the mayor, city councilmembers and Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer have been meeting for the past few weeks to hammer out a budget for the new fiscal year, which starts July 1.

There have been no talks on what to do about financing the Fire Department at its current level

if the SAFER grant is not continued.

On an upbeat note, Mayor Majewski was optimistic in her interview with WDET's Miller about economic development and Hamtramck's housing market. She said housing values have greatly increased in recent years.

She said that is partly due to Detroit's downredevelopment. With Detroit's economic recovery, there are a number of people who are being "priced out."

That, in turn, has attracted some of those folks to relocate here and buy up Hamtramck homes, which has resulted in a red-hot housing market.





Fires made a mark on Hamtramck's history

When you hear a siren these days, it's usually coming from a speeding ambulance. Urban fires have become relatively rare, and when you hear a fire truck racing by with its siren blaring it's usually on the way to an emergency call.

In fact most community fire departments devote far more time to emergency situations, like responding to medical emergencies, than to actual fires. Building codes have vastly improved as have fire equipment and the training of firefighters. These days firefighters are often paramedics as well to make wider use of their skills.

It wasn't always that way. If you know the most fundamental historical facts about Detroit you know that it was destroyed by a huge fire in 1805 and reborn from its own ashes, as the city's motto attests.

That fire wasn't unique. Major fires occurred on a regular basis

throughout the 19th century. Whole blocks would be incinerated, and in some cases huge areas of Detroit or Hamtramck Township would be destroyed. One of the worst took place on May 9, 1848. It originated at "the old yellow warehouse" that stood on the Detroit River between Bates and Randolph streets, which is just about where the tunnel to Canada is today.

Sparks from steamship at dock ignited the fire and it spread fast and far, down along Jefferson and up to an area between Brush Beaubien streets, consuming some 300 buildings. For many years this area was commonly called "the burnt district."

Another spectacular fire occurred on Jan. 10, 1854, when First Presbyterian Church at Woodward and Larned streets burned along with a number of businesses. Silas Farmer in his classic book "The History of Detroit and Michigan" described it as a "sad but splendid site as the flames streamed up and enveloped the steeple; they illuminated half the city."

Closer to our time and place, the city of Hamtramck was the site of many major fires through the years.

A good portion of Jos. Campau was burned at one time or another. Significant fires included Holbrook-Campau the building that went up in flames in the 1990s. Dave Stober's clothing store next to Max's jewelry store was severely damaged, although rebuilt in the 1970s. The old Briggs factory at the southend burned as did many other buildings all over town.

Most were rebuilt. Tardie's Bar on Caniff at St. Aubin burned, but was rebuilt; the Polish Market at Commor and Jos. Campau burned several years ago but was not. In most cases, however, if the building that burned hadn't been vacant, it was restored.

And of course, there have been many home fires through the years, which are especially dangerous in Hamtramck because most of our houses are wood and on narrow lots separated by a mere five feet or so. Hamtramck firefighters are experts as containing fires in such close quarters.

The Hamtramck Fire Department has come a long way since it was formed as the Hamtramck Spouters in the 1850s. And so has Hamtramck.

Living in the city: Hamtramck's challenges

From cell-like apartments to grand brick houses, living in Hamtramck has taken many forms.

What started as a gentle farming community turned into a major industrial center with the opening of the Dodge Main factory in 1910. And Hamtramck saw its rustic farm houses replaced almost overnight with a flood of housing units.

Hamtramck, a town of only 2.1 square miles, went from a population of 3,500 in 1910 to 48,000 in 1920. The demand for housing instantly grew acute.

That was answered in a variety of ways, but most of the houses in Hamtramck were built on lots a mere 30-feet wide. Often each house would

The strains of merely living in Hamtramck became intense. But the people adapted.

And thrived.

You can see how, including the tools and fixtures they used as a new exhibits "Being Home: Living in Hamtramck" now on display at the Hamtramck Historical Museum, 9525 Jos. Campau.
