Voters say 'no' to road repair tax

Hamtramck voters joined with voters statewide in rejecting a ballot proposal to raise the sales tax to fix roads.

Statewide, voters gave the proposal a thumping by 80 percent - a margin of disapproval that hasn't happened in 50 years, The Detroit News reported. In Hamtramck the margin of defeat was equally bad, by 75 per-

Only 913 voters bothered voting on the proposal, one of the lowest turnouts in recent history.

Previous polls taken predicted the state proposal was going down by a wide margin.

If it had passed, Hamtramck would have seen almost an additional \$1 million in state revenue something that would have secured the city's finances for many years.

But in various media reports voters had two reasons for turning it down: the funding mechanism was too complicated and the inability of legislators to come up with a plan earlier.

Legislators have been arguing for several years over how to fix the state's increasingly worsening roads, and even Republican legislators disagreed with Gov. Rick Snyder's attempts to come up with a plan.

Snyder, a Republican, had





City council candidate faces questions over plans for shopping center

Mayor Karen Majewski has a question for one of the candidates running for city council.

She would like to know what Mohamed Alsomiri plans to do with a building he owns in the middle of the Jos. Campau business district, the former Shoppers World store.

"He has owned the building for about two years and in that time the building has done nothing but deteriorate," she said recently on her Facebook page. "Maybe voters should ask him what he is doing to revitalize Hamtramck. Feet to the fire."

The vacant building is the largest commercial structure in the city, and has fallen into disrepair.

At one time it was the city's largest store and part of a regional department store chain called Federal's.

As that chain began to go bankrupt a fire broke out in the building. It was later taken over by another chain, Shoppers World.

Under Alsomiri's ownership a small fire broke out in the building a couple of years ago but that caused just a small amount of damage.

Mayor Majewski said in her Facebook post that there is no reason for the building's continued shabby condition.

"Mr. Alsomiri supposedly has plans in the works for this building," she said. "That doesn't prevent him from maintaining it, proceeding with basic renovations, and keeping it cleaned up. He could even have art in the windows in the meantime. There is no excuse for the state it is in now."

The Strange death of Thomas X. Dombrowski

Thomas X. Dombrowski was a Communist. He never denied it. In fact he ran for U.S. Congress in 1940 on the Communist Party ticket.

It was a time before the Communists fell out of favor among the many laborers who initially supported them in America, including Polish immigrants.

Dombrowski was among those auto workers, at least for a while. Born in 1917, he grew up in Cleveland before coming to the Detroit area where he worked at the old Packard plant. He eventually left the assembly line and became editor or the Glos Lu-Communist dowy, newspaper that was banned from sales on the streets of Detroit.

Dombrowski apparently had become associated with the Communists while studying at the universities in Warsaw and Krakow. Back in America, he earned a degree in Ohio, and with the Communist Party was sent to work with the auto unions as an "Educational Director."

In those days, the Communists were viewed differently. Although they stood firmly against capitalism they also fought for workers' rights and demanded equality for women and minorities. The workers found them to be allies in their struggles for better pay and working conditions.

That view would change substantially after World War II, especially among the Poles, who watched the Soviets pillage and enslave Poland in the

wake of the Nazi occupation.

Before the full extent of the Soviet damage was done, Dombrowski ran for Congress on the Community Party ticket. He also ran for Hamtramck Common Council in 1944 and 1946 but lost both times, although once just narrowly.

By the mid-1950s, the Communists had largely fallen out of favor. They had been denounced by the auto unions and hounded continually by the FBI. Numerous raids were conducted at the old Workmen's Hall on Yemans, which was Dombrowski's election headquarters.

For Dombrowski the end came in May, 1956, while he was in New York at the Polonia Club, a social center where a group of 50 Polish-Americans were being welcomed after returning from a tour of Poland sponsored by the Glos Ludowy.

During the festivities, two armed men stormed into the hall and ordered the people at-

people, including Dombrowski, who was shot in the chest (or abdomen, accounts vary). Another man was also shot in the abdomen and a third was hit twice in the head. He and Dombrowski died.



Certainly The gunmen fled without the circumstances of the attack were strange, having occurred in a hall filled with people.

> There may be more to this case buried somewhere in the files of the FBI, but we likely will never see them, so his death is likely to remain clouded by questions.

> Adding to the odd circumstances is that Dombrowski was killed on May 31, 1956, exactly 26 days after he was married to Estella Nowakowski, who had worked at the newspaper.
