Marking an anniversary: Bobby Kennedy's visit to city precedes tragedy

A few years ago Greg Kowalski wrote about the anniversary of Robert Kennedy's visit to Hamtramck. This year marks the 50th anniversary of that visit. In commemoration of that visit, we are reprinting an updated version of Kowalski's story.

It was 50 years ago that Robert "Bobby" Kennedy drove down Jos. Campau on May 15, greeting thousands of well-wishers and just curious folks who wanted to see the famous member of the Kennedy clan.

Kennedy's trip to Hamtramck in 1968 elated his supporters. He was in the running for president, and he carried a lot of momentum just by being a Kennedy, the brother of John F. 

In the last couple of weeks the city shut off water service at his home and at a rental dwelling he owns, according to city utility records. According to the city's website, Almasmari was behind \$173 for his house at 2261 Faber, but he made a partial payment two days later.

On May 3, a house he owns at 2267 Faber had service shut off because he owed \$743. On May 4, he made a partial pay-



trip through town.

"Robert Kennedy was not a friendly as his brother," Tenerowicz said. "He was a more forceful politician - made more of a business of it. My impression of John F. Kennedy was that he was a softer spokesman. You felt more relaxed around him."

Yet Robert Kennedy was not a "distant" person. "He seemed to be trying to reach out to the ethnic groups in his speeches," Tenerowicz said. "Here he wanted to shake the hands of all the children who lined Caniff and Jos. Campau, as well as older folks..."

Those who met with Kennedy said he was in good spirits as he rode down Jos. Campau, where thousands of people lined the streets. Kennedy had come to Hamtramck after speaking at a youth rally in

downtown Detroit. He also toured Detroit's 12th Street area, where the riot had erupted less than a year earlier.

Because of heavy traffic Kennedy was late in arriving at Hamtramck. Mayor Joseph Grzecki and Councilmen Eugene Pluto and Edward Kondrat were parked at the railroad tracks at Caniff for 90 waiting minutes Kennedy to arrive.

It was an unusually hot day, and the wait became increasingly uncomfortable. Workers from the nearby Celanese plant, who were lined up along Caniff, began to give up and leave. Finally a worker from the plant brought out a tray full of cups of water.

When Kennedy did appear. Grzecki was hustled into Kennedy's car, and they sped into the city. The ride through town was fairly quick, culminating at a big gathering at the Dodge Main plant before Kennedy left for the airport and the next campaign stop.


Bobby Kennedy was just one of a host of presidents and politicians who have visited Hamtramck through the years. Presidents Roosevelt, Truman, Kennedy, Bush Sr., Clinton and Reagan (just before he was elected) all came to Hamtramck.

So did such political leaders as Hubert Humphrey, Thomas "Tip" O'Neill, Edmund Muskie, Michael Dukakis, Adlai Stevenson and many more.

But the visits by both Kennedys were special. Perhaps it was because both men were so legendary and their lives ended so tragically. The city was stunned after both Kennedys were shot but Bobby's death carried a special impact, as he had just been in Hamtramck.

ment to that debt. Almasmari said that bill should have been paid by the renter – not him.

On top of that, he is behind on his 2017 property taxes for his residence at 2261 Faber (\$498) and another house at 2267 Faber (\$883), according to the Wayne County Treasury Department.

He is also behind on property taxes for a commercial building he owns at 9723 Conant. He owes the county \$1,646 for 2017.

Almasmari told The Review he was going to pay his property tax bills on Thursday, the day The Review went to press.

Almasmari has a history of falling behind on water bills and property taxes. In 2017 alone, he faced water shut-off service four times.

If Almasmari does not pay what's owed for property taxes, the county will put his properties up for sale after three years.

Almasmari told The Review he makes no qualms about falling behind on his taxes and water bills. In fact, he said having financial troubles makes him uniquely qualified to hold office.

"I'm an example of everyone in the district," Almasmari said in reference to the residents who live in the House district he seeks to represent in Lansing state representative. "I don't have a million dollars in the bank."

The 4th District consists of Hamtramck, Highland Park and part of Detroit. The district indeed has many low-income residents.

"Everybody gets their water shut off,"

added. "It's normal to not afford your bills all the time."

The issue of a city elected official falling behind in bills to the city raises the question of whether Almasmari is a "defaulter."

According to the City Charter, any public official who falls behind on bills owed to Hamtramck or any other government agency is a "defaulter" and thus disqualified from holding office.

There have been instances in the past where elected officials fell behind on water bills and property taxes, but city officials have been reluctant to pursue the matter.

Last year Carrie Beth

submitted watchdog, documentation to the city showing that in 2015 Councilmember Anam Miah lost property he owned in Detroit to foreclosure after failing to keep on top of property tax payments.

But in a review of the matter then-City-Attorney John Clark said that since the issue happened before Miah was elected, he was not technically a defaulter.

Former first lady is remembered in library mural

America lost a first lady a few weeks ago. But Hamtramck still has her, in a way.

Barbara (nee Pierce) Bush, wife of 41st president George H. W. Bush, passed away on April 17 at the age of 92.

She had been second lady, the term given the wife of the vice president, when her husband was Ronald Reagan's veep from 1981 through 1989. She then assumed the mantle of first lady immediately thereafter for the next four years, upon her husband's inauguration.

Noted as a champion of reading and universal literacy, she founded the Barbara Bush Foundation For Family Literacy. This made her an obvious choice for inclusion on a mural in a library.

Well-regarded local muralist Dennis Orlowski, now 74 himself, received the go-ahead for the mural project while he was also in the process of becoming a dad.

"It was around 1990,

maybe 1989," Orlowski recalls. "It took me about six months to complete. more or less.

"I sketched some local kids that I would have pose in small groups. Then I mixed in the historical figures with them," Orlowski said.

His process included sketching the separate pieces of the work first on an artist's pad, and then transferring the drawing into the much larger work upon the wall.

A number of the people in the mural were then invited to its unveiling, in-

cluding the famous ones. Unsurprisingly, most were too busy to attend, but many responded with letters politely declining, including former Russian Chairman and later President Mikhail Gorbachev, and former U.S. Rep and civil rights and LGBT icon, the late Barbara Jor-

It is a well-documented fact that the Bushes first met in high school, and had a seven-decade-plus marriage. Known in later years for her distinct white hair, she was often derided for perhaps looking older than the president because of it. Despite this, she never wavered from keeping it its presumably natural shade, leaving her with the comfortable mantle of America's matron.

She was also noted for her grace and poise, as well as for producing her equally politically famous sons President George W. and John, aka "Jeb," among six children. A daughter, Pauline, aka "Robin," died at the age of 3 from leukemia. Ms. Bush was pregnant with that same daughter when her mother was killed in a car accident, and the child was named for her.

She was notably more liberal in some areas, stating for example that abortion and homosexuality were private matters.

"I hate abortions, but I just could not make that choice for someone else," she stated, while on the 1992 campaign trail with her husband.

In general, she was known to take fewer pub-



The city is now investigating whether a Detroit tow service has the authority to tow cars that are parked in the CVS parking lot after the store closes. The tow company has three signs warning car owners that unless they have business at CVS, their cars will be towed.

The company has been pursuing that policy aggressively in recent weeks.

Police report an increase in car break-ins and thefts

Warm weather has finally arrived – hooray!

But that also means criminal-minded folks are out and about - looking for something to steal.

During the past few weeks there has been a sharp increase of car break-ins and the theft of many items.

It happens in all corners of the city, including on busy streets like Caniff. The thefts are usually at night or early in the morning. Sometimes, though, it happens in the middle of the afternoon.

Hamtramck police have these words of advice to avoid becoming a victim:

"Please do not leave any valuables visible in your vehicle while parked and unattended. This would include but not be limited to your cellphone, wallet, purse, laptop computer, iPad/iPods, GPS,

"It is best to take them with you after you park your vehicle. If for some reason vou cannot. please secure them in your trunk. Thieves look

for these items to steal as they walk by your vehicle."

There has also been a slight uptick in mail packages being stolen from front porches. There is not much you can do about this other than install a security camera to capture a photo of the thief, or use a post office box for deliveries.

As always, the police department encourages folks to call 911 if you see anything suspicious.

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

Is Highland Park Michigan's community solar hub? At the very least, it's where the most innovative uses and plans for community solar come from.

That's not too surprising, given that the city's 1,000-plus street lights were repossessed in 2011. Soulardarity, a membership-based nonprofit based in Highland Park that installs solar street lights, founded in response. On May 12, a free "En-

ergy, Sustainability & Tech Fair" is being hosted in Highland Park. Presented by the Great

Lakes Renewable Energy Association, Parker Village, and Soulardarity,

the fair will engage participants in energy conservation and "best practices that you can take home and use," according to a press release.

work to activists, interests citizens, or those who just want to reduce their home energy bills, is encouraged to attend.

The Energy, Sustainability & Tech Fair takes place on May 12 from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. and is free to the public. The event will be held at 21 Highland St. in Highland Park.


The first 400 people to show up will each get a




