City budget meeting erupts into shouting, ends with treasurer's exit

What is usually a routine matter in putting together the city's annual budget turned into anything but that on Saturday morning.

Saturday's discussion in city hall with the city manager and city council took a sudden and unexpected turn when Treasurer John Gabor, who is also the deputy city manager, spoke out against the budget.

According to sources who were at the meeting, Gabor said the budget was full of "lies" and that City Manager Katrina Powell was setting the city up for "disaster."



Clinic owner charged

A prominent Hamtramck developer has been convicted of Medicaid fraud.

On Tuesday Bashar Imam agreed to pay the state \$250,000 to avoid prison. He could have been sentenced to four years in prison.



Local developer Bashar Imam, who runs three medical clinics in Hamtramck, recently pled guilty to Medicaid fraud.

Imam, who is 56 and lives in Troy, has three medical clinics in Hamtramck. He overcharged Medicaid \$100,000 by "upcoding" a patient's history, and charging a patient's visit at multiple clinics.

The case was handled by Attorney General Bill Schuette. According to the Lansing State Journal, he told the court "I'm sorry" for his offense.

When reached by telephone. Imam declined further comment.

In a Detroit News story he boasted of owning 61 properties in the Detroit area.

City Manager Powell was asked by The Review for comment on the incident, but as of press time on Thursday she did not respond. The Review was not at the budget meeting.

The Review reached Gabor on phone Monday, but he declined to comment, saying: "The city is in enough turmoil as it is. I don't want to add to it."

The incident sparked a heated debate on Facebook among councilmembers and the mayor.

Gabor's departure un-

sion among elected officials and those in city

For the past few months discord among officials has risen since a bare majority of councilmembers rejected a proposal to negotiate a contract extension with Powell.

Her employment contract with the city ends on June 30.

The same bare majority of councilmembers --Anam Miah, Abu Musa, Mohammed Hassan and Saad Almasmari - also called for a special meeting two weeks ago to post a job for an interim city manager.

That meeting raised accusations that the four councilmembers colluded behind the scenes and violated the state's Open Meetings Act.

The four also refused to release a copy of their resolution before the spemeeting. Councilmember Almasmari admitted on Tuesday at the monthly Receivership **Transition Advisory Board** (RTAB) meeting that he refused to provide a copy of the resolution to Councilmember Ian Perrotta prior to the meeting for fear that Perrotta would post it on his Facebook page.

That admission may have offered proof that the four councilmembers discussed a city issue and came to a decision privately, outside of a public meeting, in violation of the OMA.

Further complicating issues have been the departures in recent weeks of department heads. The directors of finance and public works have left employment with the city, but there are people in place to carry out their duties.

At Saturday's budget meeting it was revealed that Gabor would no longer be employed and he would be replaced by the deputy treasurer.

It was unclear if he was aware of this before the meeting.

Gabor was hired along with Powell over two years ago by the former emergency manager. Gabor was among a handful of other candidates seeking to become the city manager.

Although he didn't get the job, the EM decided to include him in the administration.

Powell has said she would not renew Gabor's contract because there might be a new city manager and it would be unfair to her successor to not have a say in appointments. She has said the new city manager should be able to pick their staff.

Powell's future with the city has been unclear for the past few months.

In April the RTAB, which oversees all financial decision of the city, appeared to be on the verge of extending Powell's contract but at its Tuesday meeting the matter was not addressed.

One RTAB member told The Review the state decided to allow the city council to decide what course to take. The state is in the process of returning full local control to the city.

Hamtramck came under state supervision four years ago because of a financial crisis.

As of now, it is unclear

if there will be a city manager in place when Powell's contract expires. It is believed by some who are familiar with the matter that the four councilmembers who blocked extending Powell's contract have a person in mind to hire and that the posting for city manager candidates is just a for-

Their disapproval of Powell has often flared into angry exchanges at city council work sessions and regular meetings.

Councilmember Almasmari has not held back on his Facebook page, accusing Powell of running a "dictatorship" in city

Powell's supporters, Councilmembers Andrea Karpinski and Ian Perrotta, as well as Mayor Karen Majewski, have said that the criticism of Powell is based on nonfactual allegations.

Perrotta said there are some councilmembers who have problems with Powell that are "personal and do not have any professional basis."

Powell told the RTAB that her budget proposal has nothing to hide, as Gabor seemed to imply during his outburst at Saturday's budget meet-

"There's nothing hidden in the budget," Powell told the RTAB. "Numbers don't lie. People lie."

Three HHS students win prestigious DECA award

Hamtramckans, have another thing to be proud of now.

Hamtramck High School won an international award last month at the DECA competition, held in Anaheim, California. Their presentation bested a dozen from other teams in other states and countries that participated this

Three female students, all seniors - twins Naida and Maida Ribic, and Selma Kaltak - represented the school, with considerable supporting work from the club's other numerous members. The entire process began in November, said advisor Rula Bilbeisi, and continued through their triumph on April 26-28.

"I had been involved with DECA when I was a substitute in Plymouth-Canton," Bilbeisi said.

She hoped the program would translate here in Hamtramck when she arrived eight years ago. Interest has indeed grown, from only five participants at first to the 65 who joined this year, the most of any year so far.

A crisis in city hall has led to a crisis in confidence

It's been four years now that Hamtramck has been under the control/supervision of the state.

Back in 2013 the state agreed with local elected officials that the city was under a financial crisis and then appointed an emergency manager, who was in place for 18 months.

After her term expired, as set by law, Katrina Powell was hired as the city manager by Emergency Manager Cathy Square to take over. Her contract was for two-and-a-half years. During that time the city manager reported all financial decisions to a state-appointed financial board.

Also during this time the city council and mayor had a severely limited role in directing the city man-

The city manager's contract expires on June 30. So far, there is no replacement in place.

In the meantime, the positions of director of finances and the director of public works are vacant, although Powell said the jobs will be covered.

This past Monday Pow- show up for meetings,

ell placed the treasurer on paid administrative leave after he spoke out against her budget at a work session on Saturday morning. His contract also is set to expire on June 30.

Folks, we have a crisis in city hall. It seems like we are worse off than when the state took over four years ago.

The situation feels like a run away train.

On top of that, the state financial board has given mixed signals whether it or perhaps the state Treasury Department will extend the city manager's contract. A bare majority on city council has refused to extend her contract.

Truth is, those councilmembers do not get along with City Manager Powell. They have not liked her management style, and accuse her of leaving the council out of critical decision-making.

Powell and her supporters say that is hogwash, that in fact Powell has tried to engage the council, but has been met with hostility when they do

and often don't show up for meetings, or arrive late.

Clearly, there is a problem here.

The top goals of the state were to make the city financially sound and to tame the political turmoil that for decades has haunted the city.

The city is supposedly in good financial shape, but the outgoing treasurer has cast some serious doubt over the city's finances.

As for the political circus, we are in worse shape that we were four years ago.

Something has to give here. Our residents and homeowners deserve order in city hall. They pay a lot of money in taxes and water bills and the least they should get in return is a functioning city

Perhaps more disappointing is a field of new candidates in the August Primary Election without any experience in city government.

Maybe it's just us, but this week felt like Hamtramck took some giant leaps backwards.

pau. The museum was organized in the late 1950s and has operated for decades in a building at the corner of Charest and Commor, across the street from Immaculate Conception church.

A few days before at Bank Suey, Ukrainian affairs expert Vera Andrushkiv presented a lecture on Holodomor, the genocidal famine that killed millions of Ukrainians in the early 1930s.

Andrushkiv was joined by daughters of survivors of the Holodomor who read accounts of their mothers' experiences. There was also a performance by Volodymyr Murha, a member of the Ukrainian Bandurist Chorus. The bandura is the Ukrainian national instrument, akin to the mandolin.

In a fast-moving talk that lasted just over an hour, Andruhskiv shared facts about 20th century Ukrainian history. The room was packed with people of all ages. Seats filled up quickly. Some stood, others sat on the floor.

She talked about Ukraine being the largest republic entirely within the borders of Europe, and how it became part of the Soviet Union when it was formed in 1922. In the late 1920s, she said, Soviet leader Josef Stalin introduced a program of agricultural collectivization that forced farmers to give up their private land, equipment, and livestock, and join state owned, factory-like collective farms.

According to docuhistorical counts the Ukrainian Union.

genocide began in 1929 with waves of deadly deportations of Ukraine's most successful farmers as well as the deportations and executions of Ukraine's religious, intellectual and cultural lead-

The genocide continued for several more years with the further destruction of Ukraine's political leadership, the resettlement of Ukraine's depopulated areas with other ethnic groups, the prosecution of those who dared to speak of the famine publicly, and the consistent denial of famine by the Soviet regime.

People were dragged from their homes, packed into freight trains, and shipped to remote, uninhabited areas such as Siberia. Up to 12 million Ukrainians died during the genocide, a staggering number.

When asked by an audience member to speak to Stalin's motives, Andrushkiv said the actions were initiated as a means to consolidate Soviet power, eliminating the threat he saw posed by increasing influence of the Ukrainian Communist Party.

For decades, discussion of the famine was forbidden by government officials: historians could only speak of "food difficulties" when talking about that period. Western governments, including the United States. were in denial as well, largely for political reasons, mostly in an attempt to build alliances with the emerging Soviet

Serious research into what happened in the early 1930s did not begin until the late 1980s, when a new era of openness, called Glasnost, began in the last years of the Soviet Union, which disbanded in 1991. Ukraine's independence came in August of that same year.

In an entry in a two-volume dictionary of the Ukrainian language, published in 2004, Holodomor is described as "artificial hunger, organized on a vast scale by a criminal regime against a country's population."

Scholarly research continues into the causes and consequences of the genocidal famine, Andrushkiv said, as well as an attempt to place it into a historical context of other acts of genocide. past and present.

The lecture was part of "The Wall Speaks," an installation by Polish American visual artist Wojtek Sawa. The two monthslong exhibition, which closes this Monday, May 29, draws a historical line between the experiences of Polish children of World War II and those in contemporary, similarly traumatic situations in the Middle East and else-

where. Several special programs throughout the duration of the exhibition set out to illustrate Sawa's thesis that all are voices

of the unheard.

Examine the facts behind the city manager's job performance with the city

These past two weeks have been unfortunate and embarrassing for the City of Hamtramck.

Even more disheartening, the actions taken by some members of council have begun to have a direct financial impact and have precluded significant economic investment from occurring.

I have been working for seven years to try and revitalize the historic baseball stadium in Veterans Park, and just as we were on the precipice of landing a major sponsor the organization decided that pursuing the project was untenable and that they "simply can't commit infunctional city right now."

vestment in such a dys-Let me be clear. This is not a result of the opposition against the majority of

contract. We live in a democracy, and if that is what the people want then that is the way it should be.

Conversely, many constituents whom I represent feel that Ms. Powell has done an exemplary job and the discontinuation of her contract is unwarranted. I am simply representing their voice, as well as my own feelings.

In my opinion, Ms. Powell has performed incredibly well given the hostile work environment she has had to endure as a result of the conduct of some members of council. I do not feel as though Ms. Powell has ever been given a fair chance to succeed.

I believe the problems some members of council have with her are personal and not professional. That is the only logical explanation as to why they would be willing to risk spending \$2 million to violate the

terms of a state loan by re-

moving her from her position without having a qualified city manager to replace her.If the reticence of investment is not caused by the opposition to the discontinuation of Ms. Powell's contract it must be caused by something else. That something else is the conduct that the majority of council has displayed in going about the whole situation.

It has been apparent since my first day on council that some members of council had no intention of renewing her contract. This was in October of 2015.

Nothing Ms. Powell or anyone else has done prevented the council from taking timely and appropriate steps to replace her. If the council did not want to renew her contract then action should have taken much earlier than February 27 of this year, which was the first time that the coun-

cil attempted to manifest their intention of not renewing Ms. Powell's contract.

This was done by passing a resolution to find a firm that could conduct a search for a new city manager. Because the cost was over \$10,000 to do this, the RTAB had to approve it.

This was not placed on the RTAB's agenda until March 28. It has been less than two months since the RTAB approved resolution. months is not enough time to conduct a search for a qualified City Manager. It's barely enough time to put the Request For Proposals out for bid to even find a firm to conduct a search for a City Manager, let alone complete the entire process.

The council either does not understand how the RTAB works or does not care, because if they did they wouldn't have initiated a process that can take up to six months (or more because of the RTAB approval turnaround time) with a mere three months' worth of lead time.

As a result of the incompetent way of going about replacing the City Manager, members of council have taken additional steps to try and ensure success in spite of their own ineptitude. Part of this was the special meeting of Friday May 12, held at noon with just 18 hours' notice.

The purpose of this kangaroo court of a meeting was to pass a resolution full of libel, half-truths, and factual inaccuracies. I attempted to find out the purpose of the meeting but was met by silence from the four members of council – a constructive quorum in violation of the Open Meetings Act – who called for the meeting.

When I asked the four councilman at the Budget Meeting on Saturday, May 20 why it was that I didn't get a copy of the resolution, I was told by Councilman Miah that he hadn't finished writing it. I didn't think to ask why he would call a meeting without first having a completed resolution until later, but it would have been a moot point.

Councilman Almasmari approached me after the meeting and told me that he had a copy of the resolution but didn't want me to see it because he was afraid I would "put it on Facebook and talk bad about it because Katrina is your girl."

I responded that of course I would have put it on Facebook and it is likely I would have talked bad about it, but that is how an open representative democracy works. Transparency matters. I also told him I don't defend Ms. Powell because "she's my girl," but because I think she is doing a good job and is being unfairly treated.

So that is where we are today. One Councilmember has apparently outright lied to me, and another Councilmember has admitted to withholding relevant and important information. This is not the hallmark of a functioning City Council.

Libelous statements are being carelessly thrown around on Facebook, and disinformation, half-truths and outright lies have become the norm. In the meantime, I have tried to remain as open, honest, and transparent as possible about my feelings and intentions.

I admit to being vocal and adamant about my feelings and positions, but I do not believe that that is the cause of concern of outside entities. Maybe they saw the Fox 2 news report where I was trying to make a valid point pertaining to the resolution at hand but was silenced by Councilman Miah. That would be unfortunate.

However, the real tragedy would be the fact that if that truly was the cause of the decision to not fund the project, then I would have been forced to choose from doing two important and impactful things, picking one at the expense of the other. Working to revitalize an important piece of Hamtramck history and trying to prevent the subversion of democracy should not be a mutually exclusive proposition. That is wrong.

It should never have gotten to the point that I was being silenced for voicing my opinion. As a council, we should not fear discussing our business out in the open and for everyone to hear.

We should be willing to hear opinions that are contrary to our own. And to that end, I agree with the majority of council that we should have heard what Treasurer Gabor had to say. However, I disagree with the manner in which he conducted himself at the meeting, and I believe Ms. Powell acted responsibly by removing him from the meeting.

In agreement with me are Councilman Musa and Councilman Hassan, who both told Ms. Powell that Mr. Gabor's behavior was out of line and would not have been tolerated in a professional setting. While it was difficult to understand what was being said by Mr. Gabor and others as there was much talking over one another, I do know that Mr. Gabor indicated that the problems he

spoke of were apparent months ago. If that truly was the case then it was incumbent on him as a professional in his position to make his concerns known at that time.

At very least he could have prepared a memo or even bullet points outlining his concerns to have ready for the budget meeting. Because he didn't there is no real record of what his concerns were. However, I do know that the budget was put together by the City Controller and I do not believe she would allow for any inaccuracies. Indeed, several members of the public and council have commended the Controller for a job well done.

As for Mr. Gabor's placement on administrative leave, that was a personnel decision and Ms. Powell's to make. In light of the circumstances - which include Mr. Gabor's imminent departure from the city coupled with his pugnacious attitude at the budget meeting - it was a prudent management decision that would likely have


