Just in case you missed this last week in our special public schools issue, the city's pothole repair program is back on track.

But before we get to that, prepare to be inconvenienced this week.

The Detroit Water Department needs to shut down Jos. Campau today, Friday, June 19, at 7 p.m. for a full week. Repairs need to be made to a water main at Jos. Camat Caniff to Holbrook.

Last week we reported the work was going to begin on June 12, but that was pushed back to this week.

The road is owned and maintained by Wayne County and the city has no say in the matter.

Mark Ragsdale, the Director of Public Services in Hamtramck, said the road repair is what will take longer. That's because Jos. Campau has

# It's fix up time for homes

For decades Hamtramck has run hot and cold when it comes to enforcing housing codes.

You can now say the city is in its hot mode.

Barbara Cotter is one of possibly dozens of homeowners who have received a letter from the city's Department of Community & Economic Development detailing repairs that need to be made, and completed within two weeks.

The letter also says that failure to comply with the city's demand can result in a misdemeanor ticket and the possibility of 90 days in jail.

That threat is what particularly upset Cotter.

"The rebellious side of me said 'OK, take me to jail because I didn't fix my porch," Cotter said.

More problematic was the two-week deadline and coming up with the money to fix the needed repairs.


"The house needs lots of repairs we can't afford," Cotter said.

But Kathy Angerer, the Director of Community Development, said there was no need for alarm. She said the city is willing to work with homeowners and grant extensions.

She said the point of the letters is for homeowners to start taking action to-

weight of heavy trucks, and that means special care has to be taken.

In the meantime, all side streets leading into Jos. Campau will remain

Truck traffic will be redirected to Conant and the I-75 Service Dr.

Jos. Campau will be reopened on Friday, June 26 at about 6 p.m., or maybe as late as 7 p.m.

Now, back to pothole repairs.

A few weeks ago the city was forced to halt the repairs by the state-appointed Transition Advisory Board. The board was created after the city emerged from its financial emergency last December and it has ultimate authority in overseeing the city's financial decisions - including contracts.

In what was considered a routine matter, City Man-Powell ager Katrina sought approval of the city's contract with a company that was performing pothole repairs.

But Boardmember Cathy Square, who had been the city's emergency manager for 18 months, raised an objection, saying the city failed to follow its ordinance on contract proce-

Based on Square's objection, the four-member board agreed that the city's contract was no good, forcing the city to halt pothole repairs while it sought new bids.

As it turned out, Square's contention may have been wrong, but that came to light too late to reverse things.

It took a couple of weeks to fast-track a request for bids.

The city ended up hiring the same company, Highway Construction, for the same price it had been paying.

Repairs will have to wait until next week when the Transition Advisory Board gives its expected approval of the contract.

And while we're repeating some of last week's news, here's another reminder about planting trees in that space between the sidewalk and curb.

Don't do it, says City Manager Powell.

Powell said that some people have planted inappropriate-sized trees in that space, which is technically the city's "right of

Powell said folks are planting maples and other trees that are going to become too big for that

Powell said the city will be asking households to remove those trees, so be prepared.

Before you plant anything in that space you'll need to get permission from the city. For more information on this call Mark Ragsdale, the Director of Public Services, at (313) 876-7700, extension 1.

# Metro news ...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

On the long block of Caniff between Jos. Campau and Gallagher streets in Hamtramck, there is a smorgasbord of food offerings.

Michigan's only full service Bosnian cuisine restaurant, Palma (3028 Caniff) is about five storefronts away walking east on Caniff, though some Bosnian food can be had at the B&H (as in Bosnia & Herzegovina) Bar and Grill on Caniff closer to Conant.

Anchoring the corner of Gallagher and Caniff is Royal Kabob (3236 Caniff), a Yemeni-American restaurant serving Middle Eastern food. On the opposite corner is Al Haramain, the city's premier

Campau on the same side of the street is Delite Cafe & Deli (3135 Caniff), which serves sandwiches made with Boar's Head products and coffee from Great Lakes Roasting Company. That's quality stuff. There is a sizable area in the back with tables and comfy chairs, perfect for reading, studying, conversation, and meetings.

The newest kid on the block is Ali Baba (3124 Caniff), which made a bit of a media splash last month by promising to give away 1,000 shawarmas to its first 1,000 customers. We missed the promotion, but went in last week with a camera to meet the guys in the kitchen chopping parsley,

ward code compliance.

"The goal is to have homeowners improve their properties. As long as forward progress is being made we work with the homeowner," Angerer told The Review.

"If property owners ignore the notice, we list the action that will be taken. Some homeowners state that repairs are too many for a short period of time. We give them more time, but follow up regularly to make certain that issues of 'health and are addressed safety' promptly."

In the case of Cotter, she was given a month extension to make repairs.

homeowners upset with the city as more letters are mailed out.

"Building inspectors walk the neighborhoods on both the front sidewalk and down the alley doing inspections," Angerer said.

"They note items like broken garage doors, windows, peeling paint, roofs in disrepair, broken or missing handrails or any of a variety of other 'property maintenance' issues. A letter is sent to the property owner listing the violations and asking them to contact the department. "

In the past when the city cracked down on code violations there would inevitably be a backlash from homeowners. Past administrations would eventually back down.

But this is a new era for Hamtramck. The city recently emerged from a financial emergency and being under the control of a state-appointed emergency manager.

Although there is no longer direct state control of the city, the roles of the mayor and city council have been greatly curtailed until a state-appointed Transition Advisory Board, which overlooks all financial decisions made by the city manager, is dissolved.

That situation has left the city administration pretty much immune from political pressure to reverse things like code enforcement.

In other words, don't expect code enforcement to go away any time soon.

Angerer said despite the city's past history, the main message should be this:

"You should voluntarily take pride in home owner-



# Candidates are all up to date on city bills, says city clerk

City council candidates are good to go.

A few weeks ago the City Clerk's Office mailed letters to all of the nine candidates reminding them the letter. that in order to hold office. they must be up-to-date on all bills owed to the city.

That means couldn't have unpaid bills for property taxes, income taxes, water service or anything else. In fact, according to the city charter, Hamtramck elected officials and appointees can't owe money to any government agency.

Clerk August Gitschlag said there were

three candidates, Saad Almasmari, Mohamed Alsomiri and Frank Woodman, who were behind on property taxes, but they paid up after receiving

Gitschlag said he sent all city departments a request to review their files to see if the candidates had overdue bills. The request was not extended to any other government agency.

Gitschlag said he sent out the letters of reminder to avoid repeating past instances where some office holders owed the city thousands of dollars in back taxes or for water service.

"I wanted them to take care of it," he said.

The nine candidates will be on the Aug. 4 ballot. The top six vote-getters will then go on to square-off in the November Election. That election will determine who will fill three seats on council for the next four years.

Six candidates are challenging incumbents Anam Miah, Abu Musa and Robert Zwolak.

Besides Almasmari, Alsomiri and Woodman, the other challengers include Cathie Gordon, Susan Dunn, Monzurul Karim.

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on May 26, and all councilmembers were present. Before the regular council meeting a work session was held.

A discussion was held on a proposal to have the state of Michigan take over income tax collection as a way to streamline the process.

City Clerk August Gitschlag said at this point it is only a proposal being made by other cities.

Another discussion was held on the city issuing financial bonds to raise \$7 million to fund sewer repairs. The bonds will be paid off by an increase in the water service rate.

It was not said how much of an increase will be passed on. Construction is expected to begin in October.

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski questioned why some sidewalk slabs are marked in pink spray paint. There was no clear consensus on the reason.

but it was suspected that it had to do with DTE Energy work being performed throughout the

During the public comment portion of the regumeeting, retired firefighter Bill Kinsman complained about his water bill. He said he is being double-charged.

"I don't feel like I'm being treated fairly," he

made on the upcoming sewer repair project.

Councilmember Robert Zwolak said he prefers to have voters decide on


whether to seek bonds to fund the project since homeowners will be faced with paying increased water rates.

Zwolak also objected to A presentation was a \$7 fee being tacked onto water bills for sanitation collection.

> "The sanitation fee has nothing to with water-sewerage," he said.

For that reason Zwolak said he won't support seeking bonds for the sewer repair project.

City Manager Katrina Powell said she was instructed by the Transition Advisory Board to seek bids for pothole repairs, which will mean a disruption in the repair project.



# The lore of Hamtramck ...

# Care to dance?

### By Greg Kowalski

You may not do it, you may not like it, but there's no denying that you were born to dance.

People of all cultures since the dawn of humanity have danced. Babies that can't even stand up will swing their butts in time with a rhythmic tune.

People still go dancing, but not on the scale they used to. At one time it was a primary form of entertainment and a variety of places hosted dances.

Almost any reason would do to hold a dance. Consider the Pre-Lenten Balloon Dance, sponsored by the Progressive 100 Club, held Feb. 6, 1932, at PLAV Post No. 1 hall on Holbrook. Admission was 35 cents and the fun started at "8 p.m. till... ?" And everybody got a balloon.

The Progressive 100 Club was one of the dozens of social clubs in Hamtramck that flourished prior to World War II - and the advent of television, which kept many people at home.

The PLAV hall on Holbrook was one of the prime dance venues. Hundreds were held there through the years.

On the other side of the political aisle, the 1st **District Young Democrats** held a Spring Frolic on a more conventional Saturday, May 14, 1938, at the Knight of Columbus Hall on Conant. Not the hall that's here now. That was built later.

Another popular venue was St. Ladislaus Hall. On Oct. 24, 1937, the Dandies (another club) held "Rhythm-Mania" featuring Mike Falk and his Orchestra, with vocalist Bert D. Jerkiss.

An especially popular dance venue was the old Kanas Hall at Conant and Evaline. It hosted perhaps hundreds of dances through the years. Typical was the Pre-Labor Day Dance put on by PNA Group 2623 on Sept. 4, 1932. Admission was only 25 cents and it featured music by W. Bab-

bish Orchestra. St. Florian also hosted dances, as did other churches in Hamtramck. Even the notorious International Workers Hall on Yemans - home of the local Communist Party hosted dances.

On Saturday, March 19, Anyway, Phil's Harmony 1932, the Rev-Valliers Day dance there. It fea-"Real Dance Music" with Billy Richardson's Syncopaters. And admission was 35 cents.

Not all dances were held in town. Warsaw Park at 21 Mile Road and Dequindre was a popular spot. Our friends, the 100% Club, held a picnic there on July 31, 1938.

But the most exciting place may have been aboard the Steamer Tashmoo. This popular ship sailed the Great Lakes through the 1930s, carrying passengers up and down the Detroit River. It was on such a trip in June, 1936, that the Tashmoo, which was filled with partiers from Hamtramck, struck a rock and sank in the Detroit River. No one was hurt, but it was a real party pooper.
