Hamtramck's role in a major movie about the Detroit 1967 riot has now been scaled back.

A few weeks ago it was announced that a portion of Jos. Campau was going to receive a makeover to resemble a business district in Detroit from that era.

That was also going to include eliminating the pedestrian sidewalk bump-outs.

All of this was going to start in July.

Well, thanks to tax incentives that Massachusetts offers, much of that filming will take place in Boston instead.

But there will still be some filming in Hamtramck, which has been pushed back to Septem-



vised and authorized billings to the city.

His relationship with the contractor had not been known.

At the time of Shaya's firing Square declined to reveal her reason for taking that action.

The contractor related to Shava is Omar Nakash, who owns Platinum Landscaping, Inc. and who still performs work for the city.

The magistrate's recommendation for the lawsuit's dismissal is just that, a recommendation. The judge in the case can decide to override the recommendation and allow the case to move forward in its entirety or in part.

If the federal judge accepts the recommendations, Shaya's lawsuit will be over.

City Attorney Travis Mihelick said that in general recommendations from a magistrate are followed.

"It's a significant opinion, but it's not final," Mihelick said.

Those accused of creating a hostile work environment included former Police Chief Max Garbarino, former City Manager Eric Tungate, former city administrator Kyle Tertzag and various city employees.

The magistrate judge,

David Grand, noted that none of Shaya's allegations of ethnic slurs or other comments and actions failed "to rise to the level he perceives them to be."

Citing case law, the magistrate said Shaya "has simply failed to show conduct 'so outrageous in character, and so extreme in degree, as to go beyond all possible bounds of decency and to be regarded as atrocious and utterly intolerable in a civilized community."

In one instance he was allegedly called an "Arab prince." in another he was called "ghetto," and in another he was chastised for being "too busy with your sand meetings."

The magistrate said the comments - if they were truly made - were "mere insults, indignities, threats, annoyances. petty oppressions, or other trivialities"

Shaya's lawsuit also included allegations of retaliations for actions he took.

In one instance he alleged that two water department employees shut off water service to his sister, who at the time lived in the city, in response to his allegation that one of them committed water billing fraud.

As it turned out, Shaya admitted in a deposition that his sister had been behind in paying her water bill at the time.

This is the second time in recent weeks that a member of Shaya's family had a lawsuit involving a Hamtramck entity tossed out of court.

A few weeks ago a Michigan Appeals Court Shaya's rejected nephew's libel lawsuit filed against The Review.

His nephew, Omar Nakash, alleged that Review Publisher John Ulaj defamed him by comments he made while running for mayor three years ago regarding Nakash's billings to the

Nakash owns and operates Platinum Land-

scaping, Inc., which still performs work for the city.

Like Shaya's claims, the judges noted that Nakash failed to show he was harmed by Ulaj's comments. The court also upheld that Ulaj's comments were tected speech.

City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met in a special session on June 7 and in a regular meeting on June 14.

Before the special council meeting a work session was held. The subject of the meeting was to accept a budget for the new fiscal year, which starts on July 1, and to set the city's tax millage rate for property

owners. A fee schedule for some city services was also on the agenda.

The tax millage rate re-

mained the same as the 2015-16 fiscal year, which is a little over 19 mills. City Manager Katrina Powell said she will be looking at ways to reduce the rate.

"We certainly don't need to go up," she said.

The city's budget had a \$500,000 shortfall in revenue. The city also will end the current fiscal year with a shortfall.

Powell said she will dip into the city's budget surplus to make up the

deficit. The surplus still has \$2 million remaining.

During the regular meeting the new budget was adopted.

In the work session held on June 14, City Councilmember Anam Miah questioned why the city hired a Toledo company to detect water main leaks.

"You know I'm a big Michigander," he said in reference to using Michigan companies.

Public Works Director Mark Ragsdale said the company was less expensive than local companies.

Councilmember Saad Almasmari requested the total cost so far in legal services regarding lawsuits filed by Steve Shaya, a former Public Works director.

During the regular meeting, Robert Zwolak noted that it was Flag Day, but he was "disappointed" that few American flags were being flown in the city.

He also said he hopes the city does not eventually file for bankruptcy.

"Bankruptcy is not a solution for our problems," he said.

Later in the meeting City Manager Powell said that bankruptcy "is not even being discussed."



The portion of what will be shot in Hamtramck is reportedly some riot scenes.

Hamtramck was selected as a location because some of the businesses on Jos. Campau still retain the look of business districts of Detroit from the 1960s.

The film has yet to be titled, but it goes under the moniker of "Untitled Detroit Project." Director Kathryn Bigelow is behind this project. Her previous films include "Zero Dark Thirty" and "The Hurt Locker."

Hamtramck's reduction in the project is the result of Michigan legislators greatly reducing the tax incentive program for films it once had under former Gov. Jennifer Granholm.

The last major film shot in Hamtramck was in the 1990s, and was called "Polish Wedding."

The lore of Hamtramck ...

A chilling study of nuclear war

"Nuclear war is not a comfortable subject."

That may be stating the obvious, but it is on the mark and it was used to open an interesting document that caused a bit of a stir when it was released back in May. 1979.

The title was equally as simple and direct: "The Effects of Nuclear War," and it was prepared by the U.S. Con-Office gress Technological Assessment. Its purpose was to examine "the full range of effects that nuclear war would have on civilians: Direct effects from blast and radiation; and indirect effects from economic, social, and political disruption."

It did this in 151 pages of fascinating text, photos and diagrams that laid out the scenario of what would happen if an atomic war actually did occur. What makes it relevant here is that the city of Detroit (and nearby Hamtramck) were used as test subjects.

Three cases were proposed: a one-megaton surface blast, a one-megaton air burst and a 25-megaton air burst all

centered on the I-75 and I-94 freeway interchange.

A megaton is the equivalent of one million tons of dynamite. Just how big is that? Well, the bomb that destroyed Hiroshima in World War II was 15-kilotons (15-thousand tons of dynamite). There's a big difference between a thousand and a million.

In each case, the effects are staggering. The one-megaton surface blast would create a crater about 1,000 feet wide and 200 feet deep. Nearly everything within a distance of about a half-mile would be obliterated, and structures up to 1.7 miles (to about Caniff) would be severely damaged if not totally destroyed.

And everyone would be killed.

Bad as that sounds it's nothing compared to the one-megaton air burst, which would explode the bomb at an altitude of 6,000 feet. Although there would be no crater, the pressure from the blast would demolish all of Hamtramck. A 25-megaton air burst would essentially erase all of Detroit, Hamtramck and Highland Park and cause

significant damage from Taylor to Sterling Heights.

How many would die? It's difficult to estimate because of factors like which way the wind is blowing. Radioactive ash would drift for hundreds of miles eventually raining down with deadly results. But millions would die in the initial blast and possibly many more from the long-term effects of radiation.

The document also looks at similar attacks at Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) in Russia noting similar results. All through the Cold War

people feared the possibility of atomic attack, and we still do to a certain extent now.

But these days the real threat is not so much from nuclear weapons as it is from maniacs with high-powered rifles. Ironically they have done far more damage to the United States than any nuclear bomb ever has.

Owner occupants can enter in one of two unique tax payment plans that lowers the interest rate on past due property taxes and may eliminate some delinquent taxes. **June 30, 2016** is the deadline for both programs:

1. Interest Reduction Stipulated Payment Agreement:

An owner occupant can combine the total outstanding taxes into a monthly payment agreement at a <u>reduced interest rate of 6%</u>, for up to 60 months. Owners who have an interest reduction payment plan for the 2013 taxes should contact our Office to revise the plan to include the 2014 and 2015 delinquent taxes for a lower interest rate payment plan.

2. Tax Reduction and Foreclosure Avoidance Agreement:

Eligible owner occupants may be able to reduce and even eliminate delinquent property taxes if the total taxes owed are more than ¼ the value of the property. If the amount of past due taxes is greater than 50% of the 2015 state equalized value (SEV) of the property, the owner can enter into a reduced interest rate payment plan for an amount that equals only that 50% value for up to 60 months; the remaining tax amount is eliminated (Taxes reduced to ½ of SEV).

Both payment plans require:

Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) . Make 10% down payment . Make monthly payments . Pay current taxes as scheduled Interest reduced from 18% to 6%



Metro news

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

With their permission, here is an edited version of this week's story:

Heads up Hamtramck. The downtown real estate demand may end up coming this way soon.

In an analysis of greater downtown Detroit's rental market, the Detroit Free Press estimates that for 2016, 700 new units are set to open by the end of the summer. And the ones that have already opened are at or near 100 percent capacity.

"It is also giving landlords reason to continue raising rents, although the size of the year-toyear jumps could subside as more new

apartments hit the market," writes JC Reindl.

The article cites sevrecently-opened apartment buildings in the area that have already leased out their units. One case, profiled by Model D, is the Forest Arms Apartments. Rehabbed after a devastating fire in 2008, the Forest Arms rented out all 70 of its units the first month they became available, with rents for one-bedroom units going for around \$1,000 per month.

The very high end units and those reserved for low-income tenants aren't going at quite the same rate. The Waters Edge at Harbortown, also profiled by Model D, whose two-bedrooms rent for about \$1,700 per month, still has 42 of its 134 units unleased.

The Strathmore in Midtown has leased out all of its market-rate apartments, but only a handful of its lower-income ones. In the article, the building's property manager, Derrell Jackson, explains that the reason for the difference is due to the difficulty in proving one's income.

Who are these renters? "Those filling the new Detroit apartments are typically young professionals as well as some empty nesters, leasing agents say," writes Reindl.

These cases suggest that demand is far outstripping supply. The market is obviously still adjusting, so renters should expect fairly dramatic increases in rental rates (10 to 20 percent) in the near future.
