

State drought causes concern over allowing fireworks this weekend

This holiday weekend might be a little less noisy.

As of Thursday, the day The Review went to press, the state fire marshal was still considering a ban on fireworks in the state because of the ongoing drought.

According to a Detroit News report, the Village of Holly in Oakland County and Washington Township in Macomb have already declared a ban. Communities are allowed to enact their own

As of Thursday it was not known if Hamtramck would enact a ban.

The month of June has seen only an inch of rain, down by more than half of the normal amount of rainfall for this period. Weather forecasters are predicting warmer than average temperatures this summer for Michigan.

If there is no ban, state law allows fireworks to be shot off the day before the July 4th holiday, the day of and the day after.

Fireworks must be fired off from your property and not in a park or Continued on page 5

trash, and how to do it. This has been a pet peeve of Christine Komisarz of Florian St. for a number of years. Those who allow house-

hold garbage to pile high in their cans she calls "flaps."

That refers to the top of the garbage can flipped open to accommodate the overflow.

"I don't know what their issue is," Komisarz said of households that do this.

"How can you be so lazy as to not close the lid on your garbage container? If you have too

much garbage for one container, buy another! Seems like some people just don't care."

If it is a case of laziness, ignorance, or just not caring, allowing loose garbage isn't taken lightly by the city. If you allow garbage to accumulate in your alley you can be slapped with a ticket and charged a \$100 fine.

If it happens a second time, you will receive a \$250 fine, and a third time is considered a misdemeanor and will cost vou \$500.

Loose trash is not only

a code violation, it attracts the kind of guest Hamtramck doesn't welcome: rats and mice.

The city took a huge step several years ago when it issued garbage cans with attached lids to every household. Prior to that it was up to residents to decide what container to use. Often, those containers had no lids, or in many cases residents just threw out plastic garbage bags.

In both cases it was easy pickings for rodents, and the city had a massive rat infestation several problem for years.

It got to such a point that one former Hewitt resident - in an apparent attempt to draw the attention of city officials - propped up a homemade sign on his front lawn that called Hamtramck "Rat City."

Once the city issued garbage cans, the rat population decreased noticeably.

Still, there are too many households that flaunt common sense, and refuse to be the "good neighbor" the city asks everyone to be.

New fiscal year for the city brings in a shuffle in city hall

For the past couple of years Community & Economic Development Director Kathy Angerer has worn several hats in city

On top of economic development duties she has headed up the city's code enforcement department, the Downtown Development Authority and had several other duties.

All that is changing in the city's new fiscal year, which starts today, July 1.

Economic development will now be contracted out to a private company.

Angerer's role with the city has been redefined by City Manager Katrina Pow-

Angerer is now head of the newly-created Community & Government Affairs Department.

She is still responsible for code enforcement and now park development. special events, marketing, grant writing and being the city's liaison with Lansing lawmakers and government officials.

Angerer is no stranger to Lansing. She was a Democratic State Representative from 2005 to 2010, serving in a district that covered parts of Washtenaw and Monroe counties.

"Ms. Angerer's background is in communication and governmental affairs and she enjoys writing and taking on special projects, so I wish to exploit that talent," Powell said about her new role.

During Angerer's tenure in economic development she secured a major grant that allowed for vast improvements in the city's three parks.

Powell said she wants her to focus on promoting use of the parks.

"With the vast improvements to our parks, we need to direct some focus on promoting our parks, and planning special events for our residents, so that they can enjoy those spaces to their full

intent," Powell said. "Plus we need to look at growing our parks, if possible, with pocket parks in neighborhoods etc."

Just as important, Powell said, is the need to promote the city in gen-

"Public information and Marketing are currently non-existent in this City and both are extremely important in shining positive light on our community," Powell said.

"As stated by the mayor during our budget work session, 'The only way we are going to be successful is to grow our way out.' We need to let people know we are here and open for business."

As for Angerer's role in

Lansing, Powell said: "We need someone speaking for us on legislative issues that impact our community, and I'm told Ms. Angerer knows her way around Lansing and its politics, so I have high expectations on this front for Hamtramck. This is just the beginning of our climb and my hope is that we can continue to build on this department in the years ahead."

Angerer said she looks "forward to this opportunity to serve the residents of the City of Hamtramck and will continue to work to make Hamtramck a great place to live, work, visit and build a business."

Two teens at housing project accidently shot in dispute involving adults

The "no snitch" rule of the street is hampering a police investigation into a shooting that left two teens injured.

Last Sunday night residents in the Col. Hamtramck Housing project were spilled out into their lawns and street because of the extreme heat.

At around 11 p.m. in the 12000 block of Grand Haven two men suddenly got into a fight, one of whom had a gun.

According to sources, the man with the gun pistol-whipped the other man. After that, gunfire erupted, striking a 14year-old boy in the ankle and a 13-year-old in the buttocks.

It was not clear how

many shots were fired.

Both boys, who are Kosciusko Middle School students, were taken to Children's Hospital in Detroit and were released this week, said Schools Superintendent Niczay.

Police are seeking the identity and location of the shooter. The Review's source said witnesses have refused to cooperate with investigators.

Conditions in the housing project can be brutal during hot weather. There are no air conditioning units in the apartments because the electric wiring has not been updated to accommodate the energy needs.

There are over 200 apartments in the project,

which were built in the 1930s. The housing project is the fourth oldest in the state.

Hamtramck Housing Commission Director Kevin Kondrat said that regardless of the stalled police investigation, there will be evictions as a result of the skirmish.

"We're looking to evict people," he said.


The Housing Commission has a strict policy on residents toeing the law even if involves someone visiting their residence who causes trouble.

There is a five-year waiting list to get an apartment, which are federally subsidized.

Kondrat said although he understands that the apartments are hot, he will ask the Police Department to crack down on curfew violations.

In recent months there has been a rash of incidents in the projects, indomestic assaults, break-ins, thefts and large gatherings of unruly people.

Voters will head to the polls for Aug. 2 **Primary Election**

Hamtramck elected officials will be in the upcoming Aug. 2 Primary Election.

The election is held to reduce the field of candidates for the November General Election.

Councilmember Mohammed Hassan seeking to unseat State Rep. Rose Mary Robinson, who is seeking her third – and last – term.

He is joined by Hamtramck resident Matt Schonert who is running as a Republican in his bid to win Robinson's seat.

Also on the ballot is Councilmember Anam Miah who is also taking incumbent, an Wayne County Commissioner Martha Scott. Scott has been an elected official in one capacity or another since the 1980s.

Both councilmembers face a huge challenge in trying to beat incumbents. In the world of politics it's nearly impossible to beat out an office holder.

Hassan told The Review that he realizes he faces an uphill battle. But, he said, running in this election will give
