

## **ICE** denies it made a sweep

According to the Muslim civil rights advocacy group CAIR, federal agents with the Immigration Customs and Enforcement (ICE) agency have been active in Hamtramck looking for illegal immigrants.

According to CAIR (Council on American-Islamic Relations), community members called them saying ICE agents were pulling over cars and knocking on doors.

The story was originally reported recently in the weekly news and cultural publication, The Metro Times.

ICE, however, denied making a random sweep in the area.

"There is no truth we targeting Hamtramck," said Khaalid Walls, of the Detroit office for ICE, in a telephone interview with The Review. "Our effort is targeted to-

ward specific individuals." CAIR's attorney, Amy Doukoure, told The Review that residents here sent them Snapchat photos via email of agents in the city.

Doukoure said she was unable to share those photos because they could not be retrieved once they were viewed.

## Schools superintendent says this will be his last year on the job

perintendent 10 years ago. Niczay will be turning 65 this year. Asked why he is retiring now, he said: "I've reached the age when it's time to enjoy life."

During his tenure he and his administration faced a serious financial challenge.

Together, with the help of the school board and financial sacrifices made by teachers and school employees, the district climbed out of a \$6.5 million budget deficit to a budget that now boasts of an \$8 million surplus.

That achievement, he told The Review, was his biggest challenge. What he is most proud of, he said, "is being a Hamtramck Schools Public team player. Being able to work talented people throughout my career brings a smile to my face. I'm most proud of being a part of the team keeping Hamtramck Public Schools a place where kids can receive a quality education over many years."

Another challenge facing the district during Niczay's watch was an ever-shrinking student population. Students were being snapped up by local charter schools during the past several years.

At one point the district ended its lease of St. Ladislaus' former school and even considered closing one of its own buildings. But the district fought back hard with an aggressive campaign to attract students.

It got to the point where the district had to expand, purchasing a building from a failed charter school last year.

There are now over 3,000 students enrolled in the district, and it appears that number will keep growing.

Prior to Niczay being hired to take the helm of the district, the district went through several other

superintendents. For a number of years the relationship between the various superintendents and the board was rocky at best.

At other points there was a deep divide between the two and at other times it became belligerent.

With Niczay, the relationship with the board changed dramatically and there is now little disagreement.

Niczay is leaving after spearheading a deal with the Detroit City Football Club to move their home games to Keyworth Stadium. That marriage has led to vast improvements to the stadium.

The team attracts upwards of 7,000 soccer fans, and the influx has spilled over to local bars and restaurants, giving the local economy a tremendous boost

Niczay also arranged a first-time ever partnership with the city council, mayor and city administration to renovate the city's historic baseball stadium. There is a strong possibility that the partnership will result in winning a multi-million dollar grant from the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation to make the stadium functional.

The Wilson Foundation has been awarding grants to communities in an effort to get more youths physically active.

Niczay told The Review that winning the grant and

renovating the stadium, which at one time hosted the Negro National Baseball League in the 1930s, will be his focus in his last year with the district.

"In my last year I would like to see the Board of Education and the City of Hamtramck receive funding for a master plan to de-Hamtramck velop Stadium, Veterans Park, Playfair and Keyworth," Niczay said.

"The master plan must meet the recreational needs of community and we need to receive funding to implement the plan. It can be done because of the joint effort and cooperation of the school board and city council.

"Having city council and school working in unison is not happening in many cities. Funders have noticed and respect the cooperating spirit shown here in Hamtramck."

## Smoking may have been cause of Moran house fire

Two people who were asleep while a porch fire began to sweep through their upper flat on Moran last Thursday (July 5) have their neighbors to thank for saving them.

A porch fire broke out on the flat at about 11:30 a.m. and it took neighbors banging on the house to awaken the cou-

"A neighbor broke a window and that's what they heard," said Fire Marshal Bill Diamond.

As the pair escaped one grabbed a guitar to save. But it appears the fire

may have destroyed several of their other guitars, amps, DJ equipment and a drumset.

The fire heavily damaged the upper flat, but Diamond said it can be repaired. Water and smoke damaged the lower flat where a family lived. The father of the family was at work at the time of the fire, and his family members were out of town.

Both occupants in the upper and lower flat said they did not have renters' insurance.

The siding of a house next door was also damaged. The owner of that rental dwelling said he did not have insurance as well.

Diamond said he ruled out any problem with the house electrical setup. He said it might have been possible that careless smoking on the porch led to the fire, or perhaps a stray firework.

The fire could have been far worse. Hamtramck firefighters were returning from a call in Detroit when they noticed smoke coming down from Moran, near Caniff.

They were able to attack the fire within minutes. Crews from Highland Park and Detroit also later arrived on the scene.

Diamond said a smoke detector upstairs was going off, but it was located in the back of the flat and could not be heard by the sleeping cou-

There were no injuries, but firefighters did have to face battling a fire in 90plus degree heat on that day.

# It's all work and play with new Planet Ant podcast

Hamtramck's big purple house always holds new surprises.

Turning east onto Caniff from I-75, one soon sees what appears to be an enormous rectangular

grape looming on the left. It is, of course, Hamtramck's landmark local theater group, Planet Ant. And one thing we know about ants – they're always working, always moving forward.

And so it is with "The Ant," as they are colloquially known. The theater has been busy for two decades offering theatrical and improv works, many of them original.

Now, the theater is

marching forward with a new outlet – a comedy podcast network.

Executive Producer Mike McGettigan said this network is for both established podcasters seeking a home or stable platform, as well as for novices who don't know how to get started.

The Ant will host a launch party at their Ant Hall facility, 2320 Caniff (more or less across the street from the purple house), this Saturday (July 14) at 7 p.m. to introduce their introductory slate of half a dozen podcasts.

Those podcasts are: "25 Minutes to Say I'm Sorry" - a satirical audio "reality show" recorded in the vein of public radio's "This American Life" - "The Michael Duprey Variety Hour," an off-the-wall weekly podcast, blending comedy and the arts through interviews, musical performances, games, and skits and "Erie Canal Theatre," a semi-irregular, serialized slate of audio cartoons.

Also included are: "Fumblin' Around," a sports-centric comedy podcast with ridiculous guest interviews, "Planet Ant Filmcast," a weekly conversational podcast

website, its mission "is to enhance the understanding of Islam, encourage dialogue, protect civil liberties, empower American Muslims and build coalitions that promote justice and mutual understanding through education, mediation, media and the law."

Hamtramck City Councilmember Anam Miah said he was aware of the Metro Times story but had not heard from anyone in the community who witnessed ICE agents in the city.

Police Chief Anne Moise said her department was not contacted by ICE about any raids or arrests

Councilmember Saad Almasmari, who is running for state representative, said he has not heard of anyone having contact with ICE agents or seen them.

Hamtramck has a growing population of immigrants from Bangladesh and Yemen.

ICE agents have been accused before of conducting random sweeps throughout the country.

In March of this year the San Francisco Chronicle reported ICE agents conducted what some observers said was a sweep that netted over 200 immigrants in northern California.

ICE representatives insisted that all investigations are based on information about specific individuals. But ICE concedes that there are people who are arrested outside the scope of investigations and are considered "collateral arrests" of those who happen to be in the immediate area of an investigation

In an email to The Review, ICE spokesman Walls confirmed that on occasions there are additional arrests made.

"During targeted enforcement operations, ICE officers frequently encounter additional suspects who may be in the United States in violation of federal immigration laws. Those persons will be evaluated on a case by case basis and, when appropriate, arrested by ICE," Walls said.

In 2008 Hamtramck's city council passed an ordinance to give immigrants some protections, but did not go so far as shielding illegal immigrants.

The ordinance forbids police officers from profiling and does not allow officers and city employees to inquire about a person's immigration status.

It also allows undocumented immigrants to receive city services.

## The 'SOUP' fundraiser is on at Trixie's Bar

Don't be afraid of a little SOUP just because it's hot out.

Trixie's Bar will be the of а potluck fundraiser for a SOUP event on Sunday, July 22. For those unfamiliar with the concept, a tiny bit of history.

The Hamtramck part of SOUP is, in reality, just one aspect of Detroit SOUP, which also serves Hamtramck and Highland

Begun in 2010 after a local woman named Kate Daughdrill had attended a similar event in Chicago put on by their group In-CUBATE, the idea is to host a hopefully well-attended potluck dinner of mainly soup, salad, and bread for a \$5 donation, and then award the proceeds from the door to one proposed business, art project or the like that triumphs over three others.

Each of these projects presents their proposal, and the best proposal as

voted by the attendees gets the "pot."

One might be tempted to wonder how much of a difference a few five dollar bills can make.

Some quick statistics from their website help illustrate the scope of their assistance. Now in their eighth year, they have hosted 151 dinner events in a running count. These events have raised a total of \$132,687 dollars, meaning each dinner raises on average about \$878. Over 15,000 people have attended at least one of their events.

Over 800 ideas have been submitted for consideration in this time frame, and over half -450 - have been able to physically pitch their proposals at an event, with over 100 being awarding funding. That breaks down to 45 projects, 39 non-profits and 25 forprofit enterprises funded.

months ago, when persons representing 20 different local ethnic communities graced the museum, there will certainly be a sense of both completion and accomplishment.

The mural, titled "Coming to Hamtramck," is a tribute to the city's history as a hub for all manner of immigrants. The mural is about 175-feet long and 6.5-feet tall and is being installed along the upper walls of the main floor of the Hamtramck Historical

Cleverly, each panel illustrates a different ethnic or cultural group that has made the city its home in the past. Individuals from these communities offered suggestions and

even posed as models for the work.

Many figures who played prominent roles in Hamtramck's history are also incorporated into the scenes. "Today Hamtramck is

one of, if not the most, diverse cities in Michigan and even the world. Seemingly everyone lives here in peaceful respect and understanding. All that is reflected in the mural," said Greg Kowalski, the museum's director, in a press release.

The mural was funded with a \$15,000 grant from the Michigan Humanities Council.

Hamtramck is still an active destination for many new immigrants.

"That long tradition con-

tinues to this day as new immigrants arrive, bringing many new cultures and customs to Hamtramck, which has gone from wilderness, to farmland, to an industrial hub to a mainly residential commu-






