It was a bittersweet finale for the Detroit City Football Club last weekend.

But the team capped a sweet, sweet season by performing magnificently in the post-season, and also managed to set a record in attendance during Saturday's final game.

It was bitter, perhaps, because of the sudden death loss, but fans had little to complain about considering DCFC's playperformed like champs, winning all of their postseason outings.

Even in their loss the team played well.

Detroit's rival, the Texas Midland-Odessa club, came out on top after the two teams wound up scoreless during regulation time and two 15minute overtime periods. The DCFC lost its final


Choudhury is among several candidates who are newcomers to city politics.



"It's been a magical season and it's too bad it had to end when it did," Dwaihy said in an interview with MLive.com, an online news outlet. "It's been a lot of fun to be a part of it. A lot of fun to be around the guys at the end here. It was a really great group and a great dynamic."

Also watching the game Saturday was Michael Rehfus, the former owner of Urban Break coffee house on Jos. Campau. He now lives in Columbus, Ohio with his wife and two children.

He made the four-hour drive here with his son, Milosz, who is a big soccer fan, and still feels connected with Hamtramck. Milosz moved from Hamtramck when he was 3 years old.

"He's 13 now and incredibly passionate about soccer, playing goalie for club soccer teams around Columbus year-round – indoor soccer; a fast-paced variant called Futsal; and regular outdoor soccer," Rehfus said of his son. "He loves Hamtramck, and dreams of moving here and playing for DCFC."

Rehfus described his experience last Saturday:

"We marched through the streets and into the stadium with the supporters and cheered along the whole match. I lived on Jacob Street for years, and marching past my old place with the cheering, chanting supporters put a lump in my throat.

"By the end we were hoarse from singing and bleary-eyed from the smoke bombs. It was such a fun, exhilarating experience, it almost made up for the loss-almost.

"I used to run the steps at the stadium with the Detroit Threads running team, and it was always a dicey proposition with the crumbling concrete and splintering benches. It's amazing seeing it all restored to what it may have been back when it was new."

Also part of the game experience is watching the fans.

"The size and composition of the crowd was stunning. Clearly younger, and definitely drawn from a wider swath of Metro Detroit," Rehfus said.

"Part of our trip felt like a homecoming, though the crowd was filled with so many new faces, it made it hard to meet up with old friends. But we were able to text each other from across the mob, so that was worth something."

The Detroit club partnered with the public school district a few years ago, and school Superintendent Tom Niczay said it's been "a match made in soccer heaven."


The team has pumped hundreds of thousands of dollars into renovating Keyworth Stadium. Fans have also boosted local bars and restaurants after the games.

Voters made good choices in Tuesday's Primary Election

Hamtramck voters have spoken and wisely chose experience in Tuesday's Primary Election.

Mayor Karen Majewski handily beat her opponents by hundreds of votes, and council incumbents Andrea Karpinski and Ian Perrotta also easily won. Karpinski was the top vote-getter and Perrotta came in third, trailbehind second place-finisher Nayeem Choudhury by a handful of votes.

Majewski will now faceoff against Mohammed Hassan in the November General Election.

The top three council candidates will face three other challengers in November in which the top three vote-getters in that election will become councilmembers.

Our immediate impression of Tuesday's election is that voters did not vote strictly along ethnic lines. There appeared to be a lot of cross voting.

On the downside, there is an air of suspicion that some candidates manipulated absentee ballots because tallying absentee ballots at the end of the day produced some dramatic changes in who finished on top.

There is a good reason to be suspect because in the recent past several people were caught illegally handling absentee ballots and were convicted. City Clerk August

Gitschlag is aware of the matter, and let's hope appropriate steps are taken to clear up this issue.

On the upside, almost 3,000 voters participated in the primary, which is a surprisingly high number of voters compared to previous primary elections.

But we still have a long way to go to get more community involvement. There are about 9,000 voters who are registered, and many of them vote only during a presidential election.

Perhaps that could be something candidates work on in the coming months before the November election.

12 will be required to adhere to the following HPS dress code.

School Administrators will make the final determination of dress code compliance in case of disagreement or for items not mentioned below. The regulations following apply:

- 1) Clothing should be modest and avoid distracting influences.
- 2) Clothing with holes, tears, or inappropriate patches will not be allowed if obscene.
- 3) No skin is to be revealed between pants and tops. This must be true while the student is standing as well as when seated. Bare midriffs and bare sides should not show even when arms are extended above the head. Tops should reveal no more than a very modest amount of cleavage. Clothing that is too tight, sheer (see-through), or revealing is unacceptable.
- 4) Jerseys or tank tops with large armholes must have a shirt underneath if they are to be worn. Shoulders must be covered.
- 5) Shorts and skirts must end no more than 3 inches above the knee and may not be excessively tight. Absolutely no undergarments/boxer shorts will be exposed. The waist of the pants must be at hip level or higher. Yoga pants or leggings can only be worn

with long shirt or tunic.

- 6) Clothing displaying offensive or inappropriate pictures or writing which includes but is not limited to topics of sex, tobacco, alcohol and other drugs is not permitted. (Spirit wear is acceptable)
- 7) Outerwear, including hats and jackets, is not to be worn in school.
- 8) Clothing, jewelry, symbols, or other things that may be perceived as denoting membership in a gang are not permitted. Garments and/or jewelry which display or suggest sexual, vulgar, drug, alcohol, or tobacco related wording/graphics or may tend to provoke violence or disruption in school shall not be worn.
- 9) Jewelry, symbols, clothing, tattoos, or other things that can cause safety concerns are not permitted. Large chains with or without medallions/large charms are not to be worn in school. This includes wallets with chains.
- 10) No headwear allowed except for religious reasons. (for example hats, bandanas, hood, hoodie, head wraps and do rags)
- 11) Combs, picks, etc., are not allowed to be kept in student's hair.
- 12) Writing on one's own skin or allowing others to write on you is not permitted.
- 13) Solid dress or casual shoes are recom-

mended. Students may also wear athletic shoes. house slippers/ shoes, open-toed shoes, or flip flops are permitted.

14) Sunglasses may be worn only with the permission of a principal upon the recommendation of a doctor or health.

Prime Jos. Campau real estate is up for sale

Hamtramck's tallest office building is once again up for sale.

According to Crain's Detroit Business, Dennis Kefallinos is selling what is commonly called the Belmont Building, located at 10201 Jos. Campau - in the heart of the city's main shopping district.

The building is one of 30 non-residential buildings Kefallinos is selling. It was not immediately known what the asking price is for the four-story building.

Kefallinos has been purchasing properties for a few decades, but he has also come under criticism for neglecting them. In Hamtramck there were high hopes that the Belmont Building would be renovated for retail on the ground floor and a combination of living spaces on the upper floors.

Kefallinos bought the building three years ago for \$85,000. The city sold the building through an auction. At first there was an initial burst of work done, but soon renovations stopped. At one point the sidewalk in front of the building had to be

fenced off because part of the brick façade began falling off.

Since work stopped Kefallinos pays a \$300 yearly fee for keeping the building vacant.

The Review has attempted several times in the past to contact Kefallinos but no calls were returned.

The lore of Hamtramck ...

Recalling the village days

There are few reminders left of Hamtramck's village days -Holbrook School, for example - and almost no one from that period, prior to 1922, is still alive.

But back in 1972 when the city was celebrating its 50th anniversary of incorporation there were still many who recalled the old days. Some wrote down their memories, providing a valuable insight into Hamtramck's past.

of Norwalk Street sent their reminiscences to The Citizen newspaper, which published it in a special anniversary edition. It provides a rare personal look into the past. It reads:

"Mother used to tell me that when I was 2 years old we moved from Detroit to Hamtramck. It was in 1894. We lived on Danforth where there were only a few houses. My dad said that we paid them three dollars a month rent for a full

H.J. and Clara Delinski home and a vacant 30 foot lot next to it on which we planted all kinds of vegetables.

> "There were no basements at that time so my father put up a root cellar on one of the lots made of railroad ties and covered with a foot of

ground on top of it. Well water is all that we had to drink and rain water that we caught from the roof into rain barrels at the side of the house was used for washing clothes. My sister says that she can still hear the Holbrook School bell ringing summoning the neighborhood men to a meeting to decide the fu-

ture of the area. At one of the meetings it was decided that this area would be called the Village of Hamtramck. "Barney Whalen was a

one-man police force at that time. In the evening he would go out and light the corner street lights along Jos. Campau in a two-block area. Campau was then just a country dirt road with large trees in both sides

"Henry Jacobs was our one-man post office in a one-block business section. There were no mail deliveries. You picked up the mail yourself at the post office. Holbrook School was, at the time, one-room wooden school house located at the southwest corner of Campau Jos. Grayling. A blacksmith shop where they shoed horses was located right across the street. Farmers still worked the land

around us.

"There were no autos in those days and the only means of transportation between Detroit and Hamtramck was by horse and wagon or a trolley which operated from either end.


"Mother would send us to a neighboring farmer named Dolan for vegetables. We could buy a heaping basket of tomatoes for five cents.

"And what is now Jos. Campau and Holbrook was a huge county creek where you could row your boat."




