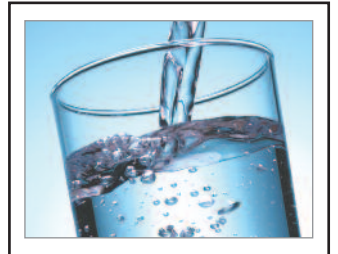

Quick Hits

Don't be alarmed, folks.

The city has recently posted a notice on its website that two out of five homes that were tested for water quality revealed that they tested high for lead content.

Our water is considered safe if the lead level is no higher than 15 parts per billion. The two sites tested a bit higher. During a second test, one of the sites tested safe, while the other exceeded the accepted lead level at 28 parts per billion.

We are not talking Flint-levels high – which in some places in that city the lead level spiked as high as nearly 14,000 parts per billion.

Nevertheless, the result here in Hamtramck required the city to take several steps to remedy the situation. One of those steps allows residents to have their home water tested by the city for free.

Street improvements will expand next year for cars and pedestrians

Holbrook isn't the only major street in Hamtramck slated for an upgrade.

City officials have federal and state grants to repave a portion of Caniff and create bike lanes and pedestrian-friendly improvements for Jos. Campau.

Here's a preview of what's to come:

The Jos. Campau project will create bike lanes and make pedestrian-friendly changes to the Jos. Campau-Caniff intersection thanks to a \$500,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Transportation. The city also has to kick in over \$100,000, which will be

taken from its annual state-funded street repair fund.

Work will begin in 2019, and the bike route will hook up with another bike lane that will go all the way to Dearborn. City officials have been kicking around the idea of creating bike lanes in the city for the past 15 years.

In a note to the city council, the grant's purpose was explained:

“When fully complete, the Joe Louis Greenway Pathway will provide a looped bicycle facility through the Cities of Ham-

School enrollment is steady

This year's student enrollment in the public school district is holding strong.

According to the recent fall student headcount, the district has only three fewer students than last year.

The official number of students enrolled is 3,320. Last year it was 3,323.

The district has seen a continued increase in recent years as more kids from Yemen move into the city.

The district has also been waging an aggressive enrollment campaign in recent years ever since charter schools have opened and drained off students from the district.

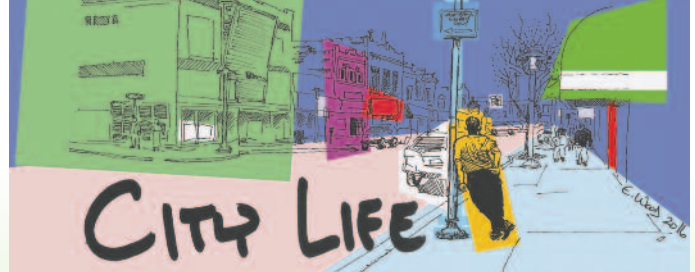
There are about a dozen charter schools operating in the city and just outside of it in neighboring Detroit.

With the continued increase in students, the district had to purchase an additional building last year. The Tau Beta Elementary School on Hanley had been a charter school, but that school was forced to close after losing its sponsorship.

That building is historical. It dates back to 1927 when four Grosse Pointe teens who were members of the Tau Beta Society founded a training school for new immigrants to better help them assimilate into American culture.

Most of the students at that charter school transferred to the public school district.

Schools Superintendent Tom Niczay said the district had expected 3,271 students to enroll this year. Each student

represents about \$7,000 in state funding.

Here is a breakdown on the enrollment in each of the district's schools:

- Early Childhood Elementary: 152
- Tau Beta: 267
- Dickinson East: 738
- Dickinson West: 426
- Holbrook: 235
- Kosciuszko: 359
- Hamtramck High: 1,013
- Horizon High: 130

tramck, Detroit, Highland Park and Dearborn. In addition, this route is also included in the Master Plan of the Iron Belle Trail Way which extends across the entire State of Michigan.

"MDOT has approved the grant application submitted earlier this year to provide for bicycle and pedestrian improvements within the 2019 construction season. Our city Master Plan calls for this improvement to Jos. Campau. Additionally, this bike lane construction will add to the friendliness of our community for non-motor-

ized residents and visitors."

The repaving project begins with an engineering study that will last through the remainder of this year and part of next year.

The repaving of Caniff from I-75 to Jos. Campau will start in 2020, and it is being funded by the federal government to the tune of \$1.5 million, out of which the city has to contribute \$300,000 from its annual state road repair fund.

The council agreed to also spend \$90,000 for an engineering study.

planned to see at the festival I replied “I don’t know, I never know: I just walk and stop at what looks interesting, then move on to somewhere else.”

I then hit the streets for a walk that would stretch as far as Davison on the northern edge of the Banglatown neighborhood, before looping back to the center of the city where I live.

It’s not about art or specific destinations for me at all, more an opportunity to serendipitously engage with people and place, all linked by streets, side-walks and alleys.

That’s what city life at its best can be: a series of interconnecting adventures, a way to exercise body, mind and spirit in the richness of social and cultural experience.

Think about it: What has greater positive impact on

our lives than being able to meet people who share the same geographical space? The present becomes a party, where conversations, contacts and relationships begin.

I headed for Public Pool, where Hamtramck sculptor Graem Whyte’s interactive sight/ sound installation, “The Yellow Lodge” is up through Oct. 27. It’s a simple and wonderful piece, large enough for a group of 5-6 people to sit in and talk – which is exactly what was happening when I walked into the gallery. Adding further color to the picture, programmed non-intrusive ambient electronic music is also part of the “Yellow Lodge” experience.

I then walked up to the former Jean’s Bar in Jos. Campau just north of Commor where I saw part of an improvised set of music curated by Ham-

tramck-based modern classical band leader James Cornish, and then went across the street to a new space called No Label Audio.

Cosmic Light Shapes, a band headed by Hamtramck Music Festival organizer Eugene Strobe, was playing heavy psych-rock jams, reminding me of the music made by Ann Arbor-Detroit groups (I used to call this the “I-94 Sound” when I was writing for punk rock publications in the 1960s-70s-80s).

I hung out for a couple more tunes then headed in the direction of Hamtramck Disneyland.

I had not been back there in a few years, not since joining a committee to help save and preserve this colorful folk art piece created by Ukrainian immigrant Dmytro Szylak, who died in 2015 with no concrete instructions on what was to become of it after his passing.

HATCH, the local art collective, stepped up and purchased the Szylak properties. I was happy to see renovations on the installation, which straddles two garages, and on the interior of the main house are progressing nicely.

From there I walked up Klinger and then Moran north of Carpenter to FILTER Detroit, where a museum curator originally


from the Netherlands and now based in Hamburg, Germany quietly established a residency program for artists in 2009.

I met Kimara and Riccardo, who are from Berlin, inside the house and talked with them about their videographic mapping project on the relationship between labor, space and capital, which was screening against the wall.

Next door at the Play House was the Border Blast, where Richard Newman of the Hinterlands was live-streaming “happenings” on the Detroit-Hamtramck border, also the staging area for the Porous Borders festival in 2015.

My last stop was up the street at the Sound House, where instrumental hip hop and casual conversation brought together what was probably the whole point of the day’s non-linear sequence of events, gatherings and happenings. Look, listen, experience, meet new people, make new friends.

My thoughts as I walked home as night began to fall: Art is not about objects. It’s about regeneration, the birth of new ideas, a love for what neighborhood means, the growth and sustainability of community life.

Dear Hamtramck Neighbor:

Every three years, the City of Hamtramck conducts testing of tap water in the City’s homes for lead and copper, as well as, other ongoing programs and actions to keep Hamtramck a great place to live, work and raise a family. As required by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ), lead and copper samples are collected from homes that are likely to have lead service lines or copper plumbing with lead solder, which is the metal that adjoins together two separate pieces of pipe.

This summer, we collected samples from five homes. The MDEQ evaluates compliance with the Action Level based on the 90th percentile of all lead and copper results collected in each round of sampling. The lead 90th percentile for the City of Hamtramck’s water supply is 28 parts per billion (ppb), which exceeds the Action Level of 15 ppb.

The “Action Level” is not a health-based standard, but it is a level that triggers additional actions including, but not limited to, investigative sampling of water quality and educational outreach to customers. Because two samples were over the Action Level for lead, the City Of Hamtramck has decided out of an abundance of caution, to facilitate sampling for any water supply customer who would like to have their drinking water tested.

While we gather more information through our sampling efforts, the City of Hamtramck would like to share some ways you can reduce your potential exposure to lead in your drinking water, since lead can cause serious health problems if too much enters your body. Lead can enter drinking water when in contact with pipes, solder, home/building interior plumbing, fittings and fixtures that contain lead. Homes with lead service lines have an increased risk of having high lead levels in drinking water.

Steps You Can Take to Reduce Your Exposure to Lead in Your Water

The most important thing you can do is let the water run to flush out lead. The more time water has been sitting in your home’s pipes, the more lead it may contain. Therefore, if your water has not been used for several hours, run the water before using it for drinking or cooking. This flushes lead-containing water from the pipes. Additional flushing may be required for homes that have been vacant or have a longer service line.



- Run your water to flush out lead-containing water.
 - If you **do not** have a lead service line, run the water for 30 seconds to two minutes, or until it becomes cold or reaches a steady temperature.
 - If you **do** have a lead service line, run the water for three to five minutes to flush water from your home of building’s plumbing and the lead service line.
- Use cold tap water for drinking, cooking, or preparing baby formula.
- **Do not boil** your water as boiling will not reduce the amount of lead in water.
- Check whether your home has a lead service line.

This is the first of several informational notices you will receive about lead in drinking water. Over the coming weeks and months, the City of Hamtramck will send a comprehensive public education document about lead in drinking water. We will be collecting 60 samples every six months and reviewing the results to determine if corrective actions are necessary to reduce corrosion in household plumbing.

Hamtramck’s district court race: Alexis Krot deserves support

One of the more interesting local races on the upcoming Nov. 6 ballot is the one for 31st District Court Judge.

and what steps for households to take.

By the way, the public school district recently had the drinking water at its schools tested and there were absolutely no signs of high lead levels. In other words, the drinking water at the public school buildings is safe for your child to drink.

One theory about why the one location in Hamtramck that showed a high lead level is that recent work in replacing nearby water lines caused the spike, or perhaps the homeowner did some work.

The city will be monitoring the situation. Eventually, all communities are being required to replace home lead service lines.

Not surprisingly, this government mandate comes without any funding to undertake this huge project.

In the meantime, you can take precaution by running your tap water for a

couple of minutes before drinking it or using it for cooking. Don’t, however, boil the water because that does not do a thing to eliminate lead.

Metro news...

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

This week, with their permission, we are sharing one of their features:

Some say that solar panels will be the wave of the future for green technologies.

There is one Detroiter who is making this prediction come true.

For as long as he can remember, Ali Dirul has been interested in science and computers. "It's something that's always been in my nature," he says.

But that affinity alone wouldn't have caused him to start Ryter Cooperative Industries (RCI). That decision had as much to do with his belief that communities have the capacity to build a cleaner, healthier, more empowering future through technology — RCI is just there to help.

"We're looking to change the framework of how com-

munities deal [with energy] in this current economy," says Dirul, founder and executive director of RCI. "And look towards shifting and growing this towards a newer type of sustainable economy."

Founded in 2015, the Detroit area project management company specializes in energy-oriented engineering solutions with a particular focus on solar power. It takes special pride in finding ways to make those resources useful and accessible to community residents and organizations.

For its most recent project, completed May 11, RCI installed a state-of-the-art solar smart pole at the Parker Village community resource center in Highland Park. The innovative device provides light, Wi-Fi, LED signage, and on-site security to the area around the community center. It's the first of a series of smart poles RCI wants to bring to Detroit and Highland Park.

Completed with some assistance from DTE in

2015, the three-kilowatt station, known as Dirul Energy Station, is Detroit's first fully off-grid solar power generation plant. Since setting up the station, RCI has also implemented solar technology throughout the farm and several substations for farm workers to recharge electrical devices.

As for RCI's direction, Dirul couldn't be more excited. He says the company has been growing, as has public interest in the

work they're doing. Right now, he's currently looking to acquire a building, so RCI will have a permanent space to conduct research and hold renewable energy demonstrations. Beyond that, Dirul also wants to expand the work the company is doing locally to include other areas of the United States and even other countries where people are dealing with energy disparities.
