Bengali community protest against shooting and ongoing crime

Members the Bangladeshi community say a recent shooting may be a hate crime.

Members of the community gathered last Sunday afternoon next to the Banglatown welcome sign on Conant to raise attention to the incident.

According to community leaders, Saleh Ahmed was shot in his house on Klinger in Detroit last Wednesday morning at 6

According to a press release issued by the community, someone knocked on his door. When he opened the door Ahmed was shot point-blank.

"Mr. Saleh Ahmed was getting ready for work and heard a knock on the door. As soon he opened the door he was shot in the mouth," said the press release.

Ahmed is in serious condition and is hospitalized.

The suspect has not been identified or arrested. The motive for the shoot-

ing is unclear. Some have speculated that the shooting was random, but others say the victim may have known the suspect.

At Sunday's rally, community members held up signs demanding justice. Speakers also lashed out at the Detroit Police Department for not responding to their calls for help in general.

Town hall meeting set for med pot

The public will have a second opportunity to let city officials know if Hamtramck should allow medmarijuana dispensaries and grow facilities to operate here.

"Upon receiving numerous additional questions about the city's proposed medical marijuana ordinance, we wanted to proresidents vide business owners an opportunity to have any concerns addressed," said City Manager Kathy Angerer in a press release.

"It is important to the administration that their voices are heard and the proposed ordinance be properly understood."

A couple dozen residents, mostly from the Bengali and Yemeni communities, attended a city council meeting a couple of weeks ago and said they were against allowing these operate in Hamtramck.

At that meeting the city council was preparing to set a public hearing to adopt ordinances that would license and regulate dispensaries and grow operations.

Because of the outcry, the council decided to hold a town hall meeting this coming Tuesday (Oct.

Some said it took Detroit police 50 minutes to arrive at the crime scene. In other incidents, community members said police often do not respond to calls.

"People are fed up," said Nayeem Choudhury. "A lot of people want to move out of the city. It's about safety first."

A speaker at the rally said community members are also frustrated because they pay high property taxes but do not get services from the city.

"Detroit is getting free money from our community. We get nothing back,"

said one speaker at the

Nazel Huda, spokesman for the community, said street crimes have been increasing and that Bengalis are being targeted.

"We have seen previously that people are robbed at gunpoint right in front of their houses ... and there are breaking and enterings in businesses," he said. "This is insane, enough is enough. Let's be united and fight against this open secret hate crime."

Dig history? If so check out this archaeological discovery

Hamtramck is a city with a past. Several of them, you could argue.

Now that past, or part of it at least, is being revealed. Or, re-revealed, if you like.

Archaeology students from Wayne State University, under the watchful eve of Associate Anthropology Professor Dr. Krysta Ryzewski, are excavating the old Village Hall down on Jos. Campau between Alice St. and Grayling St. According to Hamtramck historian Greg Kowalski, this is the first comprehensive dig ever in the city.

The key word in that statement is "comprehensive." There was some digging done in 1981 at the old Dodge Main plant during its demolition. But none before to this extent.

In its heyday, the building actually contained not only some city offices and the fire and police departments, but additionally some houses, an unidentified store, and the wonderfully named Nut House Bar. There

were also some small out-buildings on the property, one of which likely served as a stable for the police horses.

If all this sounds interesting to you, well then the best news is yet to come: not only can you observe the Monday afternoon digs through next month from the Jos. Campau sidewalk, this coming Saturday, Oct. 27, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. you can also participate in an "open day" at the site.

The Wayne State students will welcome you to view some of what they've discovered so far, and learn more about the

dig right there where it's unfolding. This event is free of charge.

Finally, on Dec. 10, the students will conduct a formal presentation of objects found during the dig, at the Hamtramck Historical Museum at 9525 Jos. Campau.



Public School and city officials are crossing their fingers in hope of winning a grant to replace the turf at Keyworth Stadium.

Medical marijuana dispensaries pose a minimal risk to the city

This coming Tuesday (Oct. 30) there will be a town hall meeting on whether the city should allow medical marijuana dispensaries and growing operations to be allowed in Hamtramck.

Medical marijuana is legal in the state, but the federal government still considers it illegal. A half dozen states have also legalized the recreational use of marijuana.

So far, the federal government has not put a stop to this, but of course this could change.

We have previously advocated for allowing medmarijuana businesses to open up here.

The reason: It's legal (in the state anyway), it's been proven to truly help people with certain medical conditions, residents should be able to shop locally, and it's a great tax revenue stream for the

Until just a few weeks there had barely been a word opposing this.

But at a recent city council meeting dozens of folks, mostly from the Bengali and Yemeni communities, came strongly against allowing these businesses.

Because of that opposition, the city scheduled a town hall meeting, despite the fact that there had been one on this subject just several months ago and there have been numerous discussions on the matter in is a calculated risk. city council meetings.

A lot of misinformation has been spread since then.

While we respect those who oppose this type of business, we still think it should be allowed.

Why?

Because it will be strictly controlled, contrary to what some folks have said. To even get a state license, one has to have over \$300,000 in assets and basically no criminal record.

This will not be a mom and pop operation.

And no one is going to risk losing their license by selling marijuana illegally to kids or out the back door to others.

If voters agree this coming election on Nov. 6 to make recreational use of marijuana legal in Michigan, that doesn't mean - as some claim it will be sold like packs of cigarettes.

No matter how legal marijuana gets, it will be strictly regulated, censed and zoned appropriately.

Will crime go up if we allow marijuana sales?

There is a lot of debate

on this, and there are a lot of conflicting reports and studies on the sub-

Everything a city does

One thing we know for sure, Hamtramck has a limited stream of revenue.

There won't be a marijuana shop on every corner. The proposed zoning law that the city council is considering will limit where these retail and growing operations can set up.

Fact is, only a handful will be allowed here.

And for those who have been insinuating that some elected officials and their buddies are in cahoots to monopolize this enterprise: that's plain slander.

You can bet there will be many eyes looking at who gets licenses and who are the business partners.

Again, we are empathetic to those who are concerned about the impact on the community and particularly kids.

We are confident that this business will be tightly controlled and that there will be minimal consequences. And, this will also greatly help the city financially.

But that's our opinion. What do you think?

Puppet performance blends traditional Bengali music and culture

Bangla School of Music founder Akram Hossein is showcasing a puppet show that explores Bengali culture. It's called "O Motherland!" and also has a subtitle of "Shadow Narratives Bangladesh."

The performance will blend traditional Bangladeshi music with modern shadow puppetry to create something "for viewers ages 5 to 105."

While the school itself is located at 12657

Moran St. in the city's northeast corner, the performances, scheduled for this coming weekend on both Friday and Saturday Oct. 26-27 at 8 p.m., will be held at the Carrie Morris Arts Production building at 2221 Carpenter St., near Lumpkin.

The show is based on songs actually composed by founder Hussein as well as the school, credited as a whole.

Impressively funded in part by a 2018 Family Grant from the Jim Henson (of Muppets fame) Foundation, the show aims to support diversity in the midst of a current era of sometimes open hostility to anything deemed different or outside of some folks' own cultural experiences.

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Aug. 14, and all councilmembers and mayor were present.

Before the meeting a work session was held. At that meeting there was a discussion on a \$13,100 grant from an organization called Can'd Aid Foundation Crush It Crusade, which is a recycling grant program.

The city applied for the grant, and it will be used to purchase six large recycling bins.

"With the interest in the city in recycling, this is one step that the city can take to continue the recycling program," said a background note with the council's proposed resolution to accept the grant.

Then-Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer said complete

she is still looking into a company to haul away recycled items.

"We'll make it work," she said.

The council later approved the grant.

Another grant the city applied for was discussed. This was worth over \$212,000 and was awarded by an organization called Financially Distressed Cities, Villages and Townships.

This grant will be used to repair the roof of city hall.

"Our roof has been patched over the years, but still leaks and causes problems to the building throughout the winter from melting snow and in other months when we experience heavy rainfall. This award will be for a renovation,"

said a note with the council resolution to accept the grant.



"When fully complete, the Joe Louis Greenway Pathway will provide a looped bicycle facility through the Cities of Hamtramck, Detroit, Highland Park and Dearborn. In addition, this route is also included in the Master Plan of the Iron Belle Trail Way which extends across the entire State of Michi-

"MDOT has approved the grant application submitted earlier this year to provide for bicycle and pedestrian improvements within the 2019 construction season. Our city Master Plan calls for this improvement to Jos. Campau. Additionally this bike lane construction will add to the friendliness of our community for non-motorized residents and visitors."

More improvements are coming.

The council agreed to spend over \$17,000 to create three outdoor volleyball courts next to the former ice rink in Veterans Park. The money is coming from Wayne County.

County Commissioner Martha Scott donated county funds to help make park improvements. The total county contribution - via Commissioner Scott - is \$50,000, which will be divided up for various park improvements.

The council agreed to set aside four city lots on Dequindre as a memorial park dedicated to those who were victimized by the city in a housing discrimination action that happened in the 1960s.

A largely African-American neighborhood on the southend was targeted years ago to be razed under the guise of "urban renewal" by city officials.

The residents there said the true purpose was to remove blacks from the city. The residents filed a federal lawsuit.

After a lengthy court battle, the city agreed to build 200 houses for the plaintiffs.

While there is no cost to dedicate the lots, located at 11361 Dequindre. 11355 Dequindre, 11369 Dequindre and 11383 Dequindre, the city will seek funding to develop the

In a note to the council on the matter, it said:

"Included in the park plans will be signage that commemorate and designate the space as a park and features that will provide space to sit and reflect and enjoy the space.

The council also agreed extend its alley repaving program, but this time to focus only on residential areas.

Eight alley sections were scheduled to be repaired this fall for a cost of \$750,000.

"I'm really excited," said Mayor Majewski. "It's about time we worked on residential alleys."

Coming up later this vear and next vear will be a study to see how to go about repaving Caniff from I-75 to Jos. Campau.

The city is once again seeking federal money to help with the project. The project will cost about

\$1.5 million, out of which the city has to contribute \$300,000 from its annual state road repair fund.

The council agreed to also spend \$90,000 for an engineering study.

Work will begin in 2020. The council agreed with an employment contract change with the city's fire-

fighters' union.

The new agreement will reduce the number of regular firefighters - which does not include ranking officers and special assignments - from 18 to


In exchange the firefighters will receive a 3percent salary increase. The deal will save the city a little over \$100,000 in salaries a year. There is also a savings in the cost of benefits for four firefighters.

Councilmember Ian Perrotta said the agreement will also help retain experienced firefighters.

During public comment in the regular meeting, Carrie Beth Lasley was not pleased about the upcoming improvement projects, calling "spending spree."


