Medical marijuana card holders will have to continue to shopping outside of Hamtramck to fill their prescription.

The city council decided to not vote on two ordinances that would allow dispensaries and grow facility to operate here.

The move was not unexpected. Since the ordinances were put together and proposed, there was a sudden outcry mostly from the Bengali and Yemeni community leaders.

ordinances were on the agenda for consideration.

Once again opponents said allowing dispensaries would lead to children getting their hands on marijuana and that the operations would attract more crime.

At Tuesday's meeting several people spoke out against allowing the sale and growing of medical marijuana in Hamtramck. One man warned the council and mayor to think hard before voting.

"Fear god because one day you will be questioned," he said.

Former school boardmember Nasr Hussain cautioned city officials to "not rush to judgment."

Others reminded the council that in the November Election, a majority of voters in Hamtramck voted against a state proposal to legalize the recreational use of marijuana.

While that proposal lost by 500 votes, state voters approved it. That means like it or not, recreational use of marijuana will be legal here – although Councilmember Saad Almasmari said the city should still make it illegal.

(Editor's note: the city cannot separately make it illegal.)

One resident, Robert St. Mary, tried sarcasm as a way to show the benefits of allowing the sale and growth of medical marijuana in Hamtramck.

(Editor's note: Readers may want to take note of the humorous slang word "sarchasm" – meaning: "the giant gulf between the sarcastic comment and the person who doesn't get it.")

The bar scene took a dip in recent years, but now there has been a resurgence of new bars opening.

When officers do find folks passed out drunk, they are taken by ambulance to a hospital - usually to Detroit Receiving Hospital. That's where most emergency runs

Some of them get ticketed for public intoxication.

What happens these folks at the hospital?

and found out that emergency rooms are fast becoming drunk tanks. Officers no longer arrest these folks and put them in the local jail to sober

These highly intoxicated folks take up a lot of resources and time.

The first thing that happens is to make sure all of their organs are working, and that they have not suffered a serious in-

In some cases there could be a serious underlying issue. Some folks drink to cover up pain from a disease or other medical condition. In other words, they are self-medicating.

If everything checks out OK, it's a matter of a waiting game for emergency room physicians to determine when a patient can be released. Usually, it takes several hours for folks to sober up enough to be released.

As for treatment, that's solely up the person to seek a way to stop drinking. But if they are at the stage where they pass out on the streets, it's unlikely these folks will ever seek help.

Market owner gives thanks back to customers for Thanksgiving

For 45 years Mike Kizy and his family have operated Sam's Market at Commor and Fleming.

It's probably not going out on a limb to say that this is the longest operating family market in town. Many of Hamtramck's longtime neighborhood grocery stores have closed during the past 10 to 20 years.

There is now a whole slew of new independently owned markets throughout town - most of which are owned by Bengali and Yemeni com-

group lawsuit filed against the city in the early 1970s.

The lawsuit accused white city officials from back then of targeting neighborhoods where mostly African-Americans lived for housing demolition in a thinly disguised effort to remove them from the city.

It was done under the guise of a federallyfunded program back then called "Urban Renewal" - which was supposed to help older inner cities clear out blighted areas.

Some called Hamtramck's version as "Negro Removal."

The city eventually agreed to build 200 housing units for the plaintiffs in the lawsuit. Some three housing units are all that is left to be built to complete the court agreement.

The federal judge who oversaw the case, Damon Keith, who is considered a civil rights hero, is scheduled to speak at Tuesday's ceremony. Keith is now retired.

It's said that whatever happens to Detroit, so goes Hamtramck. Our friends over at modeldmedia.com have been reporting on fascinating development projects for the past several years.

This week, with their permission, we are sharing one of their features:

Traditionally, there have been very few avenues for cooperatives to access financing. The Detroit Community Wealth Fund (DCWF) wants to change that.

DCWF offers loans to cooperative businesses in Detroit, while providing technical support along the way.

Its loans are non-extractive, meaning it doesn't ask for personal assets, only a portion of monthly profits until the loan is repaid. It also doesn't look at members' credit scores prior to approval, but instead works with them to develop a sound business

Once repaid, the coop-

plan.

erative is then able to participate in DCWF's process, helping to choose which other cooperatives get loans.

"We really believe in democratic financing," says Margo Dalal, executive director of DCWF. "That's because we believe in community control."

Dalal founded DCWF with others who have extensive experience in cooperatives: B. Anthony Holley (The Cooperation Group), Jackson Koeppel (Soulardarity), and Bryce Detroit (Center for Community Based Enterprise).

DCWF will also prioritize businesses from marginalized communities — cooperatives comprised of low-income people of color. "We believe in needs-based community development," Dalal says. "What does the community want to see in its neighborhood? What do they

need? And how can we

help develop a business

that meets that need?"

So far, the fund has given a loan to Cleaning in Action, an all-woman, all-minority cleaning cooperative in southwest Detroit. The \$25,000 loan went towards hiring a marketing specialist as well as startup capital to cover fixed costs for a year. Cleaning in Action has already repaid the

Beyond financing projects, the DCWF will also look to build partnerships in the co-op economy and educate the city about the benefits of the business democratic model.

The lore of Hamtramck ...

Labor vs. labor in city's only riot

Hamtramckans have pointed with pride to the fact that during the Detroit riot of 1967 there were no reports of violence in Hamtramck.

But the city's hands aren't completely untainted. The big disturbance in Detroit occurred almost exactly 24 years after a conflict that brought blood to the streets of Hamtramck. But in this case, race had nothing to do with the fight - it was all about milk.

The battle lasted only 15 minutes but several shots were fired and 13 people were hurt by the time it was over. The site was the Johnson Milk Co. plant that was located on Caniff at Gallagher. The time was about 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 17,

The tension had been growing there for weeks. Ironically, it didn't pit labor against management but labor against labor with management caught in between.

George A. Johnson, Or rather the guys that who owned the plant, bottled and distributed it. signed a contract with

the United Dairy Workers, a CIO (Congress of Industrial Organizations) affiliate. He had a contract with the AFL (American Federation of Labor) but he claimed that contract had expired. The AFL disagreed and said the contract was ongoing.

In any case, AFL picketers appeared outside the plant. Armed with 2x4s they were there to intimidate the workers. Instead they encountered police detectives were in plain clothes. The police earlier had been alerted

City Hall Insider ... What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Aug. 28, and all councilmembers except Saad Almasmari were present. Mayor Karen Majewski was also absent.

Before the meeting a work session was held. At that meeting there was a discussion about plan for 2019 in which the city will start ticketing cars that are parked on a street that is scheduled for street sweeping.

"We will work out an education program," said Acting City Manager Kathy Angerer.

A proposed resolution to hire Angerer as city manager was discussed. Councilmember Andrea Karpinski questioned why the council was not provided Angerer's resume.

the regular During meeting Angerer said the city has reached a settlement agreement with

housing discrimination plaintiffs who challenged the city's new housing assessments.

Some of the plaintiffs complained that their housing assessment increased their yearly property taxes by double, and in some cases tripled the bill.

They said the tax increase would result in them losing their houses. The city had previously agreed to build 200 housing units to settle a housing discrimination lawsuit that was initiated in the 1970s.

The plaintiffs were awarded affordable new housing. The housing assessments were made under the supervision of a previous city manager.

City Attorney James Allen said it was a "shame" it took a few years to settle the assessment challenge.

"The uncertainty hanging over these individuals for the last three years is unconscionable," Allen said.

He added that the housing plaintiffs were "victimized" again by the

Angerer said that a joint meeting with the city council and the school board will be scheduled to talk about park improvements and Keyworth Stadium.

During public comment, Robert Zwolak encouraged the council to hire Angerer as city manager. He said she has already "proven" she can do the job.

"She has been very effective," Zwolak added.

Carrie Lasley said the council should instead do a candidate search for city manager. She

said hiring Angerer without a search would be "sneaky and handed."

She added that hiring Angerer without a search would make the council look like "conniving little political jerks."

Bill Meyer complained that not enough minorities work in city hall. He said it's mostly white people who work for the administration and departments, and that makes it look like "white colonialism."

A proposal to use a search firm to look for a city manager was defeated, with only Councilmembers Karpinski and Ian Perrotta voting in favor.

Karpinski had argued that doing a search will keep the process "transparent."

Perrotta said Angerer

has done an "OK iob" as acting city manager, but wanted to do a search. He said hiring Angerer looks like a "backroom deal."

After the resolution to use a search firm to look for city manager candidates failed. Perrotta and Karpinski walked out of the meeting, thus causing a lack of a quorum to continue official council business.

Mayor Pro Tem Anam Miah allowed the remaining councilmembers to continue discussing matters, but no votes could be held.

Councilmember Fadel Al-Marsoumi said he voted against conducting a city manager search because it would cost money. Plus, he said, Angerer has been doing a good job as acting city manager.

there might be a confrontation and had been on the scene for a couple of days.

It isn't exactly clear what happened when the workers arrived that Tuesday morning, but there was a confrontation and shots were fired.

In the aftermath it was determined that only one shot was fired into the crowd of workers, but it hit three men. Several other shots were fired, but into the air. All the men who were hit recovered.

The detectives were treated for a variety of injuries, none of them lifethreatening. A number of workers also suffered broken bones, bruises and knocked out teeth.


"The police department has sought to take an entirely neutral attitude," Public Safety Director Joseph Wisniewski said. "All officers were instructed to protect everyone, regardless whether he belonged to the CIO, AFL or any other group." He said the officers fired only as a last resort.

Johnson said he was "satisfied with the police handling of the case."

Several workers were arrested and peace quickly returned to the site. Police monitored the plant for more than a week, including adding patrols in the area. But there was no repeat of the violence.

Ultimately the AFL and CIO declared peace and united as a single entity in 1955.


