# 'Newsmaker of the Year' dedicated his life's work to the community

As usual, picking just one event or person who made a huge impact on Hamtramck for the past year is no easy choice. During 2018 we have

seen the continuation of street and alley repaving, a new city manager got hired, the city's political landscape continues to morph, the city may be on the road to reinventing how fire suppression service is delivered and just a few weeks ago GM dropped a bombshell about the future of the Poletown Plant.

Despite all that heavy news, our choice for Newsmaker of the Year is Hamtramck Pubic Schools Superintendent Tom Niczay.

It's hard to decide where to begin with Mr. Niczay because he has enjoyed so many accomplishments.

### A breakdown on where the fires are fought

In a story in last week's issue of The Review it was pointed out that we incorrectly reported that out of the Fire Department's 800 service runs in 2017, most were in De-

In an email last Friday, the day The Review is published, Fire Chief Dan Hagen asked for a correction. He also provided a breakdown of runs for 2017.

Sure enough, according to the statistics provided by Hagen, most of those 800 runs were indeed in Hamtramck.

So how did The Review get that wrong?

Look no further than a discussion Hagen had with the city council last July. During that conversation, the talk was about how many runs were made to Detroit in an expanded mutual aid agreement that the department had entered into several years ago.

The number 800 was talked about and City Councilmember Anam Miah picked up on that.

Here is how we reported that conversation between Hagen and Miah back in the July 6, 2018 issue of The Review:

"A couple of years ago the department entered into a unique agreement with Detroit and Highland Park to answer calls to those cities, but the range for mutual service was supposed to be limited to one mile from outside Hamtramck's city limits. However, Hamtramck has been re-

provements and the continued renovation of Keyworth Stadium.

There is now a good chance that a grant application to replace the turf at Keyworth Stadium will be awarded by the Wilson Foundation. Word about this is expected to be announced soon.

While that grant – worth \$800,000 - is much needed and significant, it may likely foretell an even greater possibility.

And that would be funding to renovate the historical baseball grandstand and field in Veterans Memorial Park. The field is one of only a handful left in the country where professional Negro League Baseball was played.

It was home to the Detroit Stars in the 1930s when professional baseball was still segregated.

If we keep our fingers crossed, a proposal worth about \$18 million might be coming our way from the Wilson Foundation.

No matter what, the fact that public school officials and the city council have partnered up is historical. For too many decades the two public bodies have

largely steered clear of each other.

Hamtramck is too small of a city for that kind of indifference.

As for his upcoming retirement, Mr. Niczay, 65, had this to say when we asked him a few months ago.

"I've reached the age when it's time to enjoy life," he said.

Indeed.

And Hamtramck will forever be indebted to Mr. Niczay's dedication to the school district and the community.

"In all there were over 800 runs in 2017, which Hagen admitted was '10 to 1' in Detroit's favor. That prompted Councilmember Anam Miah to comment, 'That doesn't sound like mutual aid to me.'

"Hagen conceded 'it looks lopsided, and it is." Hagen did not object to that report back in July.

Last week we asked Hagen to clarify that comment, and he pointed out he was referring to the actual number of mutual and automatic aid runs not the overall number of service runs.

When you look at the stats Hagen talked about, that's where the "10 to 1" reference comes into play.

According to the statistics, Hamtramck firefighters made 283 mutual and automatic aid runs to Detroit and 15 were made to Highland Park.

In return, Detroit assisted Hamtramck firefighters 23 times, and Highland Park came here six times.

What were the nature of those calls?

The department's statistics do not provide that level of detail. But Hagen went through the department records and broke it down for The Review.

In 2017, the department reported 202 building fires. Hagen said Hamtramck had 27 fires, while Detroit accounted for 157 of the total numfirefighters responded to.

In Highland Park, we helped with 11 fires.

Hamtramck also responded to 31 false alarms in Detroit and one in Highland Park.

Finally, Hamtramck had 67 calls to Detroit cancelled while en route there, and three in Highland Park.

Building fire runs were the big-ticket item on the list of statistics for 2017.

Other runs ran the gamut of serious to mundane.

Here is a sample of some of those runs:

- Cooking fires 77
- Vehicle fires 17
- Dumpster or trash fires – 20
- Assist EMS crews -16
- Gas leak (natural gas)
  - Power line down 42
  - Canceled calls 80
  - Good intent calls 24
- · False alarms 68 · Smoke scare, odor of
- smoke 12 Service calls, other –
- 58

It should also be noted that we incorrectly reported the yearly cost of salaries for firefighters. We reported it was \$2.3 million a year. That is wrong.

Friday, December 14, 2018

The true cost is about \$1.1 million a year.

The \$2.3 million figure was what the department received from a federal SAFER grant to subsidize firefighter salaries for the years 2018 and 2019.

It is not known if Hamtramck will continue to qualify for the grant, but if it does, the grant will no longer cover the full salaries of firefighters, but instead a decreased portion.

The city will have to begin to kick in paying for part of the salaries if the grant continues.

Eventually, the city will have to resume picking up the tab for salaries, and that is what city officials are trying to figure out how to budget in the coming years.

City Manager Kathy Angerer has said the department's current cost to the city is "unsustainable."

# We'll take \$600, Alex, for Hamtramckans on Jeopardy

Alex Cervenak is a former Hamtramck resident who has put herself in jeopardy.

Well, on Jeopardy. As in, the television quiz show the one that's notoriously hard to score an appearance on. For the record, she is the second Hamtramckan to appear on the show. Hal Savage is the other resident to have survived the incredible challenge to get on the

We caught up with Cervenak by email for a quick chat about her experience.

(Editor's note: Cervenak was not allowed to say if she won.)

**Review: So how did the** process all go, in order for you to end up on the show? I assume you took their online test from here in Detroit. How did they contact you after that to let you know you were being considered?

Cervenak: I took the online test from my home computer back in the spring – you don't have to take the online test from a specific city, you can take it in the comfort of your own home on the

Jeopardy website. It's a set of timed questions, and at the end you aren't told what you got right or what you got wrong.

A few months later I was contacted via e-mail to come to an in-person audition – those do take place in a specific city -and mine was held in Detroit over the summer.

Review: So the next phase is to play a mock game or two? Apparently, you impressed whoever you needed to in order to move on to being in the pool of show candidates. And even then, you're not guaranteed to get on, correct? Cervenak: The mock

game stage is actually the one before you get called to go out to L.A. as a contestant, during the in-person auditions in the more-local cities. You're then entered in a pool of possible contestants, while you wait for them to call you if you've been selected.

But because you're only in the pool of contestants for a set time, you could also go to an in-person audition and then never get called during that time - that happened to me a few years ago. This time, I got called in October to hear that I would be taping my show about a month later.

Review: Is it true that they film a week's worth of episodes in one day? Is it usually a Monday? Without giving away how many days you were on, in general, it's got to be mentally taxing after a few games, is that fair to

Cervenak: It is true that

they film a week's worth of shows in one day, but I only know my filming schedule so I couldn't really comment that much on general Jeopardy filming practices (though I didn't film on a Monday).

You have to remember all of your trivia knowledge, pay attention to things like where the cameras are, and be charming for TV, so even filming one episode is taxing, let alone several!

Review: How was Alex? It must've been odd - and probably more than a bit intimidating to be standing there in front of him: he's been on there for so long; he's such an institution.

Cervenak: Alex is very personable and professional, and it was great to meet one of my heroes (who shares my name)!

Review: So, Alex, did you have anyone in the audience cheering for you? Did they announce you as being from Massachusetts, where you live now?

Cervenak: My parents and my brother made the trip out to L.A. with me. And my official residence is still Michigan, so they'll announce me as being from Hamtramck.

Review: That's great! So, in conclusion, then, what advice do you have for others who may want to get on the show themselves?

Cervenak: If anyone is thinking about trying out, I would say not to be intimidated. You probably know more than you think.

Filming the show was absolutely was one of the most fun and memorable things I've ever done.

# Holbrook construction zone expected to be open this week

By the time you read this, Holbrook should be re-opened for traffic.

For the past several months, Holbrook from Jos. Campau to Gallagher has been under construction.

New water and sewer lines were replaced and concrete was poured to make it a new road.

For the past couple of months no traffic has been allowed on that portion. Work on the road was suspended for about a month when construction workers attached to this project and the I-696 project went on strike.

That strike meant scaling back the Holbrook project scheduled for last summer.

Instead of completely repaving Holbrook from Jos. Campau to Conant, work had to halt at Gallagher.



Hopefully by today (Friday, Dec. 14) road barriers will be gone at Holbrook and Jos. Campau and it will once again be open for traffic.

There was barely enough time to complete it before cold weather prevented further work.

Hamtramck's Director of Public Works, Rodney Johnson, said earlier this week that all that remained to do is seal the joints of each concrete section and also stripe

the traffic lanes.

The street was expected to open by this Friday or Saturday.

The project costs \$1 million, of which the federal government is paying 80 percent. The city is kicking in the remaining 20 percent out of its yearly street repair fund.



### People make the place: **Oloman Cafe celebrates** anniversary with pictures

When I walked into the cafe on Tuesday there were 50 portraits hanging on the wall opposite the coffee bar. The wall had been freshly painted in an off-white tone to better show off the prints, all in color.

The sheer volume of pictures placed from end to end gave me an initial thrill. When I did a slow walk and took them in oneby-one I noticed all the faces had expressions of simple joy.





Each family received a good-sized turkey, each weighing about pounds. Also helping out this year were Bill and Patty Lockhart who donated food as well.


