Election deadline approaching

Hamtramck's election season is about to be off and running.

Next Tuesday (April 23) at 4 p.m. is the filing deadline for city council candidates.

Councilmembers Anam Miah, Saad Almasmari and Abu Musa are up for re-election.

As of press time Thursday, none of them have yet filed to run.

At press time, the only candidates to file are: Nayeem Choudhury and

Carrie Beth Lasley. The terms are for four years.

To file, you can either do it the easy way and simply spend \$100, or you can get nominating petitions. Candidates using petitions must get at least 40 Hamtramck registered voters to sign on, with no more than 100.



become. Many of us there chimed in on the conversation.

It was mentioned that people are not walking as much, and that a lack of sun could be contributing to many bodily ailments, as well as probably playing a significant role in depression. The sad thing about not taking part is that walking - and subsequently enjoying and absorbing the sun - doesn't cost a dime.

Getting solar exposure is thought to increase serotonin levels by triggering certain hormones, the process of which in turn elevates both your mood and energy level. The sun also provides a healthy dose of vitamin D, which helps fight against depression, in part because of its anti-inflammatory properties.

Of course, you still have to be smart and protect your scalp, face, and other exposed skin areas from too much sun.

We live in a culture that tells us to accumulate material things, yet we alltoo often neglect one of the most important parts

of life: health. Many have bought into the notion that one must be extremely wealthy in order to enjoy life's pleasures, but to the contrary, this is absolutely false.

The best things in life are free

Getting out in the sun, for example, is still free!

Depression is solutely a serious condition, and many go through it, no matter their race, culture or belief system.

I know that some are diagnosed with it clinically, diagnosed with it acutely or chronically, and that's unfortunate. A few may even use it as an excuse to not want to participate fully in life. That can include not enjoying the outdoor activities they once

I just recently lost one of my great friends, Jim Bialas, in a way that I didn't fully see coming. True, he had been suffering from progressive kidney failure, and underwent dialysis for some years. But, it was a so-called "widow-maker" heart attack that ultimately struck him down at the too-young age of only 58.

The shocking thing is that, before his passing, we had laughed and enjoyed great fellowship together just a few Sundays back. This shock brought on a formidable despair, and a profoundly depressed state of mind other than knowing about the issue with his kidneys, I still thought of him as reasonably healthy.

The blessed news that I carry with me, and believe me it did help me tremendously, is that God showed His mastery over death through the power of Christ on the Cross at Calvary.

This Sunday is EASTER, and so His message of hope comes around once again, just as do the seasons: God demonstrating His love for humanity, a reminder that we don't have to dread the inevitability of death and that Christ is always with you, for those who believe.

Budget crunch will require some hard choices

Last week's announce- company pays in lieu of ment that the Holbrook repaving project started back up will be about the only good news for street improvements this year.

It is likely that the city will have to halt its alley repaying project next year because there is going to be a serious budget shortfall in the coming months.

You've probably read this many times already, but it's worth repeating: It is expected that GM will close down its Poletown Plant this coming January, which will likely mean the city will no longer receive about \$850,000 a year the property taxes.

That alone is a huge blow to the city's budget. It gets worse, though,

It is also expected that when the new Wayne County Jail is completed in Detroit, the Hamtramck county jail will be closed.

That closure will translate into a loss of \$1.1 million a year that the county pays also in lieu of property taxes.

City officials are struggling to figure out how to survive these massive losses of revenue. You can bet the solutions will not be popular.

Something - maybe several things -- in the budget will have to be sacrificed.

Hamtramck has been in tough financial situations before, and sometimes the state has had to step in and take over management of the city. Unfortunately, the state never solved our longrange financial con-

There is already blowback from some city officials who say we can't do this or that. Unfortunately, they have not yet offered any solutions.

Brace yourself residents, it's going to get rough in the months ahead - and we're not just talking about our crumbling roads.

School board to interview six candidates for superintendent's position

The search for a new public school superintendent is ramping up next week.

Some 28 educators applied for the job, but the school board whittled that list down to six candidates to interview.

Interviews begin next Wednesday, April 24, and run through Friday, April

The public is allowed to sit in on the interviews, which will be held at the Hamtramck Public Schools Administration Building at 3201 Roosevelt, located next to Keyworth Stadium.

Current Superintendent Tom Niczay is retiring after 40 years in education, the last 10 of which as superintendent.

Niczay became superintendent during a financial crisis when the district was millions of dollars in debt. He and his administration managed to climb out of it, and the district now has a \$9.8 million budget surplus.

Niczay's team also grew the district's student population back up and now boast of having over 3,000 students.

The district had seen a dramatic drop in students because of a dozen or so charter schools popped up in the city and right outside in Detroit.

The district grew to the point that a couple of years ago it had to purchase a former charter school building on Hanley.

Niczay's last day is June 31 of this year.

According to a press release issued by the disfollowing trict, the candidates, which includes one current administrator, will be interviewed:

A second round of interviews will be held starting April 29 for candidates who make the cut. The school board is expected to make a decision on who to hire during the week of May 13.

The school board could also decide to pass on all of the candidates and start a new search.

WHEREAS, Hamtramck currently has one of the most diverse populations of any city in the United States;

WHEREAS, elected and appointed officials of the City of Hamtramck serve at the pleasure of all residents of the city regardless of their respective gender, sexual orientation, ethnic, racial and religious backgrounds and should set an example of how people of different backgrounds should interact with one another without regard to these characteristics:

WHEREAS, Councilman Perrotta made several disparaging remarks to CBS Detroit that were published on September 11, 2017, about recent immigrant arrivals to Hamtramck insinuating that, as a group, they lacked basic knowledge of and adherence to community norms related to sanitation and property mainte-

WHEREAS, Councilman Perrotta's bigoted comments relied upon and furthered harmful and hurtful stereotypes about European and Western cultural superiority over many of the immigrant cultures represented by members of this Council and the broader community;

WHEREAS, Councilman Perrotta's bigoted comments brought disrepute upon this body, held up members of this community and the city itself for

ridicule and scorn, are demonstrably false, and have no place in civil public discourse;

Spring is a time for autism awareness

It is finally spring! You take a walk through the park and notice two young children, about age

four, playing in the sandbox. They sit side by side, quietly pushing sand around, not interacting with each other but enjoying their time with the sand and the sun.

One of these children has an Autism Spectrum Disorder or ASD. Can you tell which one?

ASD often referred to as Autism, is a group of disorders usually characterized by challenges in social interaction, communication, and repetitive behaviors or interests.

Autism is usually diagnosed in childhood and does not currently have a cure. No two people with Autism are the same, just as no two people are the same.

which of the children above, or anyone for that matter, has Autism?

The simple answer is that just by walking past these two children in the park, you may not be able to tell at all. Many children, and adults are able to function in the world, thrive at school, maintain friendships, travel with their families, and work for a living.

They may be playing in the sand alongside another child in the park right now. There are other people with Autism, who will present with some uniqueness and challenges including behavioral concerns, learning difficulties, speech disturbances, and others.

As a child psychiatrist, I am often asked, everywhere from PTO meetings to quiet whispers in my office, how would one know How, then, can you tell their loved one

Autism?

My answer is simple.

Autism presents with unique symptoms for each person; there is no one size fits all. With that, I always recommend an evaluation by certified professionals, including engagement from parents and caregivers, child psychiatrists, psychologists and others specializing in testing and assessment, including school professionals.

Although it can be difficult to navigate, your pediatrician and your child's teacher or school counselor are great places to start.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) reports a steady increase in the prevalence of Autism in the US, having increased from 1 in 150 children in the year 2000 to 1 in 59 in 2014, with a notable increase of 15% between 2012 and 2014.

Although there are many theories as the why the numbers are increasing, I believe some of it can be attributed to teachers. parents, and pediatricians being aware of the symptoms and seeking help for their loved ones.

One of the most important aspects of treating Autism and allowing your child the best chance at doing their best is early intervention.

Here are some ways you can be proactive about your child's health:

 Milestones! Track your child's milestones. which monitor over time how they are learning, moving, speaking, interacting and developing physically and cognitively. There are a number of

apps that can help track milestones, including one offered by the CDC for free, in English and Span-

· Discuss your concerns with your child's pediatrician early and often. As a parent and a doctor, I take my doctor's hat off when I visit with my children's physician, and ask a lot of questions. Remember when you were young and you were told, there are no stupid questions?

This is true in your doctor's office too. We want to hear from you. I always tell my patients "I am the expert in medicine, YOU are the expert when it comes to your child." Understanding and healing is a team effort. Speak up early, often, and loudly.

 Engage your school or other early intervention programs in your area. Your school and daycare staff spend significant time with your child. Ask them for input on symptoms and for resources to help your child thrive.

 Get an evaluation. When in doubt, trust your gut and listen to the signals that your child or

loved one is sending.





We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

By Charles Sercombe ing on the lot next to the March, the council process of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Feb. 26. Mayor Karen Majewski and Councilmember Saad Almasmari were absent.

Wayne County Commissioner Martha Scott said she would like to place a statue of civil rights legend Rosa Parks in the city's new park, the Sarah Sims Garrett Memorial Park.

The park, located on Dequindre just north of Caniff (on the west side of I-75), has yet to be developed.

The council agreed to install the statue.

The city's auditors presented a financial review. The report showed that the city has an \$8.2 million budget surplus, and that 51 percent of the city's revenues come from property taxes and state grants.

About 65 percent of the city's expenses go toward public safety, which is considered within the normal range for any municipality.

On the down side, the city's pension fund is running a deficit.

During public comment, Bill Meyer said he is trying to save a mural on the side of a building at Jos. Campau and Goodson. He said the owner wants to build a two-story building on the lot next to the mural, which would effectively block the public's view of it.

Meyer said he is working with the owner to find another lot to build on.

The council took the first step to vacate streets near the Missant Building on Conant. The owner of the building said the streets had previously been vacated many years ago, but there is no official record of that action by the city.

(At a later hearing in

March, the council postponed that proposal.)

The council approved a \$201,000 grant from the Michigan Indigent De-

fense Commission.

In a memo to the city, it was explained that the grant will "provide funding to Hamtramck so that the city can provide attorneys to defendants who are not able to afford their own attorney ..."

Councilmember Ian Perrotta said the city needs to update its recording technology in order to better broadcast the council meetings.

City Clerk August Gitschlag said he is working on the matter, but said he is "handcuffed" by the city's contract with

Comcast.
Financial Director
Susan Hendricks gave a
short update on the city's
finances. She said some
departments have been
overspending, particularly
the Fire Department.

"We are diving into the expenditures there," she


2.That Councilman Ian Perrotta be and hereby is admonished to guard against making such biased, abusive and impertinent remarks in the future;
