Candidates who decide to back out of the election had until today, Friday (April 26) to withdraw. The Review went to press on Thursday.

A primary election will be held on Aug. 6 to whittle the nine candidates down to six. If at least three candidates drop out by Friday (April 26), there will not be a need for a primary election.


The top three vote-getters in the November General Election serve four-year terms.



It's a New York-style bar long and narrow, and nice and dark.

We recently caught some friends playing in there, and we were reminded how great the sound level is - not too loud, not too soft. A perfect balance, and no doubt the layout of the place adds to the good acoustics.

Whoever comes along and buys the bar next will only have to open the door and turn on the lights.

You'll be ready to go. And Cathy and her husband, Lew, can finally retire.

After owning and operating a bar for 34 years, Gordon said it's long past time to move on.

"As you get older, you run out of steam," she said. "We'd like to retire." When it isn't hosting bands, the bar still has a reputation for serving up a tasty burger. But, as you might guess,

there's been a sea change in the local bar scene in recent years. There were over 100

Ask Uncle Stan

Dear Uncle Stan,

I moved to Hamtramck last fall from Grand Rapids with my wife. One of the things we noticed right away was the fact that people liked to keep kitchen chairs in the street.

We assume this is a local custom, so we decided to put our own kitchen chair in the street in front of our apartment. It made us feel like town-

We still don't know where the tradition originates. Can you help us out, Uncle Stan?

Sincerely, Baffled

Dear Baffled,

In the olden times, there were no cars. Though Hamtramck was a prosperous village, most of the citizens could not afford to keep horses, let alone eat

They walked, as did many of the peoples who travelled through Hamtramck to Detroit from the untamed Michigan wilder-

At the time, Hamtramck even lacked the resources to be able to adequately provide accommodate its own walkers, let alone the thousands of immigrants that passed through it every month.

It was so bad, people were often to forced to sit on the ground, where the sidewalks are now. This was a time before sidewalks, and the streets of Hamtramck looked desolate, like a Sterling Heights

The township fathers got together and passed a law. The law said every resident was required to place at least one kitchen chair "of good working order" in or near the edge of the road so that walkers might have a place to sit while passing through

Agents of the Dodge brothers and Henry Ford implicated council members in 1926, from what became known as the Chair Affair, in which members were rewarded with free drinks at their favorite speak-easy for a month.

The council members repealed the law, arguing the chairs impeded autos, and enacted a new law to ban chairs from the street. Stash Shaggy, reporter for the local newspaper, the Hamtramck Resident, first reported the scandal that eventually resulted in the recall of two successive city

councils. In recent years, the anniversary of the Chair Affair has been celebrated with a dinner hosted by a local

non-profit. Hamtramckans are a proud and stubborn people who were not going to let crooks in city hall push them around. So, what was once a law that was meant to help people walking in our city has become an enduring Hamtramck tradi-

Odds & Ends

Reminder... The Hamtramck Drug Free Coalition (HDFCC) is partnering with the Hamtramck Police Department for the National Prescription Drug Take Back Day this Saturday, April 27.

According to the Coalition press release:

A temporary collection box will be located in the Hamtramck Senior Plaza lobby (2620 Holbrook) where community members are encouraged to bring unused or expired medication for proper and safe disposal. The collection will run from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

You can drop off prescription medication, overthe-counter medicine, vitamins and even medication for pets.

However, they will not invited to make book accept liquid medications, needles, ointments or inhalers. All personal information on prescription labels should be marked out before disposing of items at the collection.

Returning expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs to proper receptacles helps prevent water supply contamination and prescription abuse.

A permanent prescription drug drop box is also available 24 hours, seven days a week at the Police Department in the lobby in Hamtramck City Hall.

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Polish-born American war hero is in the ultimate 'He said/She said' dispute

Will history books have to be rewritten about Revolutionary War hero Casimir Pulaski?

Researchers are now saying the famous Polish general may have actually been a woman, or even what's called an "intersex" individual.

That type of person shares biological characteristic of both a male and a female.

The Smithsonian Channel recently presented a documentary called: "America's Hidden Stories: The General Was Female?"

Last October, President Trump officially proclaimed Pulaski as the "Father of the American Cavalry."

Maybe: Not so fast?

Pulaski was born in Poland in 1745, and later came to America to help with the founding of the country. He played a key role in several Revolutionary battles, and ended up wounded at age 34.

So why do researchers believe Pulaski may have actually been female?

His skeletal remains were examined after being excavated in the 1990s, and it was determined that "his" pelvis was actually female - having an oval shape.

That's unusual, and in the U.S., there are about 2,000 children who are born intersex each year.

Some online observers, of course were skeptical of the news. Wrote one person: "What's neat about the story is that, as far as

Pulaski knew, he was just a dude the same as any other dude he knew, but he happened to be famous enough that people would want to look at his bones and find out that it was more complicated than

Others simply marveled at the complexity of the human body.

"The human body is a ramshackle miracle," said another commenter.

Hamtramck, once a predominantly Polish enclave, has a few connections to Pulaski. There is a street named after him, and there was an elementary school named after him that was located in what is now called Pulaski Park.

Hamtramck's ethnic makeup has changed in recent years, and it is now no longer Polish-centric. According to the 2010 Census, almost 20 percent of the population are Bengali, 11 percent Pakistani and only 10 percent Polish.

The Yemeni population, at that time, was thought to comprise 9.2 percent although it is believed that population has jumped up in the last 10 years.

According to the 2010 Census, there were almost 23,000 people living in Hamtramck at that time down now by about 500 according to the 2010 Census.

The next Census, which takes place nationally every 10 years, starts again several months from

City gets hitched to towing lawsuit in federal court

The City of Hamtramck is now on the receiving end of a federal class action lawsuit regarding the towing practices of a Detroit company.

As reported last February in The Review, a lawsuit was filed in federal court regarding Breakthrough Towing.

The company first came to the attention of the public for towing cars from the CVS parking lot on Jos. Campau and Holbrook after the store closed for the day.

Patrons at Bumbo's Bar, which is across the street from CVS, complained that Breakthrough targeted their cars, and were charged upwards of \$400 (in cash only) to give their cars back.

Although there were parking signs some posted by Breakthrough at the CVS lot, there was

no contract with the company and CVS. And technically, the state's signage law was not fully followed.

Tony Paris, one of several attorneys behind the lawsuit, said that, for one thing, there are supposed to be a warning signs posted at all entrances, which there were not.

After The Review broke the story, the few parking signs that were posted were removed from the lot.

Breakthrough was also accused of predatory towing at two locations in midtown Detroit.

The lawsuit accuses CVS of being part of - or at least responsible for, the towing scheme. Also accused is the Hamtramck Police Department.

The City of Detroit and several Detroit businesses as well as unnamed Detroit police officers were also added

Paris said the cities and police departments were added because of questions about the cities' policies when it comes to allowing towing companies to operate here.

He said Breakthrough had been operating without a state license for about a year, but neither city called out the company on the matter.

Hamtramck City Attorney James Allen issued this press release in response to the lawsuit: "The serious allega-

tions in the complaint against unnamed members of the Hamtramck Police Department completely lack merit. Hamtramck does not contract with the defendant towing company and, under state law, cannot interfere with private property owners who choose to do so. Hamtramck has, however,

taken appropriate measures to enforce state law as it relates to towing companies operating within the city. Hamtramck selected its own (different) towing company in a thorough competitive bidding process.

"That company is the exclusive provider of towing services to the city and the only vendor HPD is authorized to call for towing services. Hamtramck and its provider follow state law regulating towing. Hamtramck will vigorously defend this meritless lawsuit."

Paris dismissed Allen's contention that the city can't interfere on matters that happen on private property.

"Somebody could steal from me on a private lot and the police can't interfere?" Paris said. "I hope that's not what Jim Allen thinks."

The whole thing kicks off Saturday afternoon at 3 p.m. with food rotating in and out from 15 or more additional local pop-up food purveyors.


