What's in store for the coming year? Just look back to last

Now that 2019 is behind us, it's time once again to dust off our crystal ball and gaze into the future – the year 2020, to be exact.

Just what news and issues can we expect in the coming 12 months?

As usual, plenty of the issues that will remain ongoing are leftovers from 2019.

One issue that received a lot of attention last year was the future of the GM Poletown plant, and its financial impact to the city.

It's still on the top of the list of things to watch.

Last year, there was a scare that GM would actually follow through on its announcement of closing the plant, along with four other North American plants.

That was truly a bombshell, considering GM

just recently built the plant in the 1980s - to much controversy and fanfare. For Hamtramck, it would have been a financially devastating blow because, under the terms of a special deal, GM paid the city about \$700,000 a year in lieu of property taxes.

A small portion of the plant straddles the Hamtramck side of the Detroit border.

Losing that amount of money might seem like a drop in the bucket for the City of Detroit, but in Hamtramck, it would have crippled us.

GM eventually did a turnabout on the plant and saved it.

But... and in this case, but is not a good thing... the plant will be closed for up to two years while it retools in order to eventually produce electric-fu-

Raymond Wojtowicz: A voice of reason

"Where did the money

If you were in Hamtramck exactly 50 years ago, you would be familiar with that question. It was the slogan that propelled Raymond Wojtowicz into the mayor's chair in Hamtramck.

In the winter of 1969-1970, Wojtowicz tapped into the frustrations of Hamtramckans many who were watching their hometown sink into financial ruin.

Woitowicz, who died last week after serving as mayor and then having a remarkably successfully career outside of Hamtramck, was virtually a political outsider in 1970 when he joined the mayoral race. Elections were held in the early spring back then, with the primary election held in February.

It was a time of tremendous political turmoil in Hamtramck as the city teetered on the edge of Continued on page 4

eled vehicles.

According to the payment plan with the city, that means the city will stop receiving \$700,000 a year for that time period, because the plant will be idle.

So, it's back to the financial drawing board for city officials while they brace for the financial blowback.

Could part of this financial puzzle be solved by a new contract with the firefighters' union?

Contract negotiations are underway, and it's a

good bet that something is going to change. Whatever it is, it will take place months from now.

Also, at the end of June the employment contract with police officers ex-

There could be an attempt at cutting corners there as well.

As if all that isn't bad enough, the city's pension obligation for this year shot up by about 47 percent, from a yearly payment of \$1.3 million to around \$2 million.

Needless to say, the

city manager is going to have her work cut out for her this year.

Our suggestion to the manager: You're going to need a big bottle of Tums - and aspirin.

Recreation-wise, the city is seeking a grant to further develop Veterans Park, which has already undergone a substantial transformation. There are now various types of children's play equipment, an outdoor soccer arena, and a volleyball beach

If we are lucky, we may even hear back about a possible multi-million-dollar grant from the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation to fix up the historic baseball stadium. Over at the public

school district, the school board is taking steps to seek a \$35 million bond issue to continue building improvements and construct a new school next to Kosciuszko Middle School, as well as add another floor to the administration building.

This ambitious plan would require voter approval. It's likely going to take a herculean effort by school officials and community members to get it passed.

Culturally-speaking, Paczki Day is right around the corner this year, on Feb. 25. That's when the streets of Hamtramck turn into a Mardi Gras of the north, as thousands of paczki-loving fans flock into town to party and dance to live music in our bars.

And then two days later, the annual Hamtramck Music Fest kicks off on Feb. 27 and runs through Feb. 29. A huge number of bands, performers and DJs will be playing in dozens of venues, including bars, veterans halls and even the public library.

Now that's a lot of partying for one week!

It's seems like we barely scratched the surface, but perhaps this is a good place to end - just thinking about all of it is making our heads spin.

Could there be trouble brewing in city council?

In what is usually a routine matter, the vote to appoint a mayor pro tem at last week's city council meeting was anything but routine.

The council split in a tie whether to appoint Councilmember Ian Perrotta to that position, forcing Mayor Karen Majewski to cast the tie-breaking

She voted in favor of Perrotta, whose main duty as mayor pro tem is to run council meetings when the mayor is ab-

Councilmembers Fadel Al-Marsoumi, Mohammed Alsomiri, and Mohammed Hassan were opposed to appointing Perrotta to the position, but they did not say

Board President Maggie Srodek decided to step down from that position. Instead, Board Vice President Evan Major will take on that role.



bankruptcy, with a common council that was barely coherent, let alone functional.

Wojtowicz stepped into the fray as a voice of reason and responsibility, with a clear vision of the problem – and how to deal with it.

"The first thing we should have is open books," Wojtowicz said. "For too long, the city has operated in such a way that the public can't check on how or what decisions are being made."

Wojtowicz called for annual audits, and for bringing the public into the decision-making process, among other actions.

His comments registered with the city's voters, and he came in second in the primary election, behind city Treasurer William V. Kozerski.

It was the first time in Hamtramck's history

than incumbent mayor was defeated in the primary election. That was Mayor Joseph Grzecki, Sr., a well-intentioned, dedicated man who was overwhelmed by the city's list of growing problems.

Meanwhile, Kozerski had outpolled Wojtowicz 2,661 votes to 2,558, and few had expected Wojtowicz to win in the April general election, but Wojtowicz showed just how much the residents wanted a change. Wojtowicz easily took the win, 5,484 votes to 4,103.

"This administration will place the government back in the hands of the people," Wojtowicz said.

After barely a week in office, Wojtowicz and the common council were presented with a 15-page document listing the city's mass of unpaid bills. In all, it contained about 700 items, including DTE and phone bills, that had not been paid since the previous summer. The bottom line was \$369,515.67.

But that was just a small portion of the total debt. Taking all the debt into account, the city had a pile of bills amounting to \$3.2 million. On top of that, the city was mired in the R-31 Urban Renewal lawsuit, in which the city was accused of using the urban renewal program to oust black residents from the city.

This had drawn the attention of the State of Michigan. In May, 1970, James Marling, deputy treasurer for the state, met with Wojtowicz and

the Common Council to review the situation.

Marling was direct: "I have never seen a city in the state of Michigan in such a mess as Hamtramck," he said.

He then outlined what the city was going to have to do, including producing a balanced budget and laying off at least 125 employees.

That set the tone for the remainder of Wojtowicz's tenure in office. It seemed that, whatever direction he faced, Woitowicz found an adversary. The city workers were furious over the layoffs: the common council regularly opposed whatever he proposed, when they did anything at all, and finally became so dysfunctional that four members were recalled, and the state ultimately took over control of the city's finances.

Even after many difficult decisions had been made and a more reasonable common council installed, Wojtowicz had a tenuous relationship with the adversaries he had accumulated.

In 1973, a new adversary emerged. Former Mayor Al Zak, who had served from 1953 to 1963, said he had been recruited by disgruntled residents to come back.

He had left Hamtramck politics to take a job with Wayne County, but to many residents Zak represented Hamtramck's Golden Age, when the alleys were cleaner that most town's main streets.

In the election that year, Zak narrowly defeated Wojtowicz, 4,425 to 4,409 votes.

While that ended Wojtowicz's service as mayor, he went on to a distinguished 38 years as Wayne County Treasurer.

Wojtowicz was a man who measured his words carefully when he spoke. His actions in Hamtramck show they came from careful consideration.

And while his tenure as mayor was short, he proved to be a voice of reason at a time when that was sorely lacking.

The key to Hamtramck's success this year: Cooperation

In this week's paper, we explore some of the issues that will be coming up in the new year.

Hamtramck's financial security will continue to take up a lot of space in upcoming issues.

That's because the Story of the Year in 2019 will continue, in 2020, to be the GM Poletown plant.

GM will be closing the plant likely for two years, in order to retool it for the production of electric-fueled vehicles. While the plant is shut down, the city won't received about \$700,000 a year in a special payment arrangement in lieu of the company paying property taxes.

That is going to be a huge hit to the city's yearly operating budget.

We have faith that City Manager Kathy Angerer, and the city council, can steer around this pitfall.

We are also optimistic a title which basically that the city and school partnership to expand recreation, and secure major grants to improve Veterans Park and the historic baseball stadium will pay off this year - bigtime.

The key here is cooperation.

Hamtramck politics has a deserved reputation of being brutal and divisive. Sometimes, we are our own worst enemy.

We have recently, more or less, had a functioning relationship between the council and the city manager. But the new council was off to a bit of a rough start at their first meeting last week.

The council was needlessly divided over whether to vote in support of Councilmember Ian Perrotta to fill the role of Mayor Pro Tem -

means that he would conduct council meetings in the mayor's absence.

He clearly has the experience to handle the duties of that position. Why in the world did three councilmembers, Mohammed Alsomiri, Fadel Al-Marsoumi and Mohammed Hassan, vote in opposition?

The vote resulted in a tie, and required Mayor Karen Majewski to break it. She voted in support of Perrotta.

Those voting in opposition did not offer an explanation before the vote, and also did not offer one later in the meeting.

That was not an auspicious beginning of the new year.

Let's hope it was a fluke.

"That is all the information we are going to release out of respect for the privacy for Camay and her family.

"We appreciate all the concern and assistance from the community, and we are very happy to know she was found safe."

Donations will be made to the Steve Irwin's Foundation, Wildlife Warriors, and the Australia Zoo Wildlife Hospital.


And here is what donations from all over will help accomplish:

residence here in Hamtramck, but was addressed to a person living in Shelbyville, Michigan - some 170


The street name (4th St.) on the envelope is not a Hamtramck street. so there was no mistake based on that.

During regular business, a discussion was held on whether to hire a company to install new parking meters.

In an overview presented to the council by City Manager Angerer, she had this to say about the meters:

"For several years, the parking meter equipment throughout the City has not been functioning as intended in Hamtramck. The existing equipment that is in place is obsolete, and in many instances the parking equipment is not working or missing.

"The city not only suffers loss of revenue, but parking spaces in our central business district do not turn over when meters are missing. Having working meters will allow shoppers to visit establishments to conduct business and then vehicles will move when the business is com-

"Working meters will not allow vehicles to remain parked for hours without putting funds into Non-working a meter.

meters are a disincentive to a vibrant shopping district when cars remain parked for reasons that do not include visiting the establishments in the business district.

"Having a viable parking system will be an incentive to help businesses to thrive in our downtown."

A private company, Michigan Parking Services, would install the meters at no charge, but the company would receive 50 percent of the fees and fines collected for five years.

The new meters will be installed on Jos. Campau between Holbrook and Caniff, and in municipal parking lots located in that area, as well as the city parking lot on Caniff and McDougall.



option to continue with "our current broken system." The council agreed to

go with the new meters, which will be installed this spring. In another matter, the

accepted council \$10,000 from the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) to conduct a study on about 9 miles worth of infrastructure under some streets.

The actual study will cost about \$38,000, which the city will have to pay the balance of.

The study will also help identify possible sources of federal funding for repairs and upgrades.

A lengthy discussion was held on whether to adopt an employee handbook for city employees.

In an overview for the council, it said:

"(The) Administration

determined that the City of Hamtramck did not have a document that is shared with employees that outlines the expectations of employment with the city. "The City of Ham-

tramck Employee Manual was drafted to set forth expectations for city employees and, upon adoption, will be given out to new employees upon hiring, and distributed to employees who are already working at the City of Hamtramck.

"The Employee Manual will be utilized in conjunction with any labor conindividual tract (and) contracts." Councilmember Andrea

Karpinski questioned who would enforce what is outlined in the handbook.

Angerer said the "appropriate person," will do that.

Karpinski said that,

"technically" the hiring of

Garbarino violates what is outlined in the handbook.

City Attorney James Allen said that is not true, but he did not elaborate.

Karpinski also noted that there is no job description for the new position that Garbarino was hired to fill.

Councilmember Miah defended the handbook, saying there is a reason why the city charter created a strong city manager position.

Councilmember Perrotta said that, if the council OK's the handbook, it would be "adopting rules we have already broken."

The council approved the adoption of the handbook, with Karpinski being the sole objection.

A lengthy discussion was held on whether to set aside a portion of Veterans Park to honor the Yemeni community.

Councilmember Almasmari proposed the resolution, and said that Hamtramck is the appropriate community to host this site, since there is a large Yemeni community

But there were some objections raised. It was pointed out that

a Yemeni-dedicated park is being created next to the Yemeni mural, which is just a few buildings away from the proposed Veterans Park site. It was argued that cre-

ating two parks honoring the Yemeni community is redundant, and would undermine the mural site. Karpinski also said

that the city has to get permission to make changes in Veterans Park because it is a historical site.

She also said that there need to be more specifics about what is

being planned for that area of the park.

Angerer said that all this resolution does is allow a committee to continue planning for the site.

In the vote to approve proposal, Councilmembers Perrotta and Karpinski objected.


