School bond highlighted in annual address

The Hamtramck Public School District had nothing but good news to re-

School officials, along with the public, gathered last Thursday afternoon at the Hamtramck High School Community Center for the annual State of the District address.

This was the first such presentation under Superintendent Jaleelah Ahmed, who was appointed to her position last year.

She has enjoyed a successful year, to say the least.

The district is still boasting of a budget surplus, which is at \$12.2 million. The district's Chief Financial Officer, Sherry Lynem, pointed out that financial picture is in sharp contrast compared to 10 years ago, when the district was in a financial crisis and had a \$5 million budget deficit.

That was due in part to drastic cuts made by then Gov. Rick Snyder, who combating statewide economic recession.

The district managed to climb out of that financial hole by slashing the budget, and also due to teachers and staff members taking deep salary cuts.

Today, the financial picture keeps getting better. Gov. Gretchen Witmer increased per pupil funding by the state by \$240. However, Hamtramck receives the lowest amount of state aid, at \$8,111 per pupil.

That will continue to increase in the 2020-21 school year by another \$225 per pupil.

The district has about 3,500 students - a number that has continued to increase in recent years.

There is one more huge financial goal the district is about to embark on: Asking Hamtramck voters to approve a 30-mill bond, to pay for extensive renovations to the district's existing buildings, and to actually construct a new school building on the grounds of Kosciuszko Middle School.

The bond, if approved in a special May 5 election, would continue for 30 years. It has been esti-

mated by the school board that the cost to the average homeowner would equal an extra \$200-\$300 per year.

If that sounds like an impossible task to get voter approval for, remember several years ago that voters OK'd a bond to begin needed renovations at the district's buildings, which had long been neglected in maintenance.

Superintendent Ahmed made it a point that Michigan is one of 12 states where the state government does not supply districts with funding to make building repairs.

She said that creates an "equity gap" for districts, and puts many districts at a disadvantage especially those in low-income cities where property values depressed.

The proposed threeschool building story would allow the district to portable remove the classrooms on school's site, which were purchased several years ago in used condition, and were supposed to be temporary.

Several of the district's administrators also made presentations about the strides their departments are making.

The district's special needs program, in particular, has been greatly expanded.

A chat with the Hamtramck Music Fest organizer

It's that time of the year again - the most wonderful time of the

No, Christmas didn't come early. No, we're not talking about Black History Month (although, that also makes this the most wonderful time of the year).

Instead, for the seventh annual time, Hamwill host Hamtramck Music Fest.

For newbies in town who are unfamiliar, the Hamtramck Music Fest is a three-day event in the city that houses several independent acts across several different venues.

This year, 190 bands (10 more than last year) will be scattered across your favorite bars, restaurants, and other venues on the final three days of February. All you need is \$15 wristband (which can be bought at hamtramckmusicfest.co m) and the enthusiasm to discover new music.

Even better, attendees be comfortable knowing that there is a Zero Tolerance Policy regarding harassment, discrimination of any kind, and matters of public safety upheld by HMF.

Anyone not adhering to these guidelines will be removed from the festival immediately. This includes patrons, performers, volunteers, and general members of the community.

And the man who continues to put it all together every year is Eugene Strobe, who of course has help from many volunteers.

When The Metro Times' Hamtramck Blowout - the city's original premiere event for music every year moved to Ferndale in

2014, there was interest from people wanting to extend Packzi Day to Packzi Week, with hopes of putting on an exclusive event to bring people to

Hearing such whispers, Strobe was quick to take action, and lo and behold. Hamtramck Music Fest was born.

Although the Blowout has not been active for a few years, Strobe has managed to keep Hamtramck Music Fest alive and kicking for seven years in a row.

As we did these last year? couple years, we took the time to chat with the event's co-founder and spokesman about what we can all look forward to at this year's festival.

Review: How many bands and venues are involved this year?

Eugene Strobe: 190 bands and 23 venues.

Review: How does the process go when it comes to recruiting bands for the fest every year? Do you reach out to them personally, or vice versa?

Strobe: We hold an open application process via our website & social media pages.

Review: Personally, which bands are you

looking forward to seeing the most this year?

Strobe: All 190 of them. It would be a dream to see each and every one, but I'm always surprised by a group I've never seen before, and they are totally entertaining and unexpected.

Review: Some of the proceeds from last year's festival went toward charitable donations. Where was the money donated last year, and where will money be donated this

Strobe: We asked local music and art public school teachers what their wish list was for their classrooms, and we \$10,000 purchased worth of instruments, and sound supplies, for equipment schools and the Hamtramck high school auditorium in 2019. With the proceeds of this year's festival, we plan to do the same: Purchase more art and music equipment and supplies.

Review: What is the biggest difference between this year's festival and last year's festival?

Strobe: This year we are holding the festival the same week as Paczki Day week, and the dates are slightly

Feb.27, 28, and 29. We traditionally have the festival take place the first weekend of March.

Review: What should long-time festivalgoers look forward to the most this year that's different from previous years?

Strobe: We have some new venues, & we are working on having more all-ages and daytime activities.

Review: What about first-time festgoers? What should they look forward to, or know, before diving into Hamtramck Music Fest for the first time ever this year?

Strobe: First-time festgoers should be aware that there is a free shuttle bus service provided by SMART that drops folks off pretty much in front of each location's front door, and is avail-



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City Hall Insider

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Feb. 11, and all councilmembers were pres-

The meeting started out with a proclamation in honor of retired Hamtramck police officer Greg Collins, who had died recently at age 62.

His family was present at the meeting.

Mayor Karen Majewski said that Collins "was more than just a police officer. His no-nonsense demeanor, work ethic, sense of style, and family self-appointed 'cousins' made him a Hamtramck institution."

She further described him as a "big man with a big heart."

Afterward, an overview of the city's financial picture was presented.

Some general facts included:

Most of the city's revenue income comes from property taxes, to the tune of \$6.5 million a year.

State revenue sharing is the next largest revenue stream, coming in at \$3.4 million, and then next is income tax collection at \$3 million.

On the expense side, 60 percent of the city's budget, some \$10.7 million, goes toward police and fire services.

The next highest expense is general government services at \$3.4 million and then public works at \$2.6 million.

The city has a budget surplus, which is called a "fund balance," of \$6.8 million, down from 2018 when it was \$8.2 million - the highest it had been in many years.

Water and sewerage services have always been a point of interest for property owners. In 2019, the city earned \$5.2 million from sewage disposal service, and \$3 million from selling water.

On the expense side, the city spent \$4 million on sewage disposal, over \$700,000 in providing water and \$1.2 million in general operation costs – among several other expense areas.

There is an \$11.4 million budget surplus in the Water Department.

Next up was an annual report for the Police Department.

In 2019, there were

over 11,000 calls to the department, and 847 arrests, 207 for felonies and 706 for misdemeanors. (Editor's note: According to the police department "some arrests have multiple charges and may be a combination felony/misdemeanor

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charges.")

There were over 14,000 traffic citations.

During the year, there were eight officers who were hired, and eight officers, including detectives, who resigned or retired, as well as one K9 police dog. That K9 "partner" was replaced.

During the public comment portion of the meeting, Robert Zwolak said city's contractor should be doing more than just 30 rental inspections each month. He said the inspectors should be doing 100 a month.

Kit Parks said that it appears the Yemeni mural on the southend will be saved from a proposed development.

She said the city agreed to sell two cityowned lots to allow the project to go ahead without blocking the mural.

She also noted that, while campaigning for a presidential candidate, which she declined to name, she was "surprised" to find out that many voters were undecided, and even unaware of the upcoming March 10 Presidential Primary.

A public hearing was held on a proposal to bestow an honorary name Commor St. as Shevchenko St. It was later approved.

The designation came in light of promoting the area as the Ukrainian Heritage Neighborhood.

In another proposal, the council agreed to name a donated lot at 2134 Trowbridge St. as "Salam Peace Park."

However, it was pointed out that Salam is Arabic for the word "peace," and that naming it Salam Peace Park was redundant.

Councilmember lan Perrotta suggested just naming the park as "Salam Park." By the end of the dis-

cussion, it was agreed to go with the original

A lengthy discussion was held on an update for the city's zoning ordi-

Some councilmembers and members of the public had an issue with removing council approval of site plan proposals, and leaving that decision up to the Plan Commission.

The proposal was made to bring the city in line with a state program called "Redevelopment Ready Communities."

Councilmember Mohammed Hassan said the council should reject the proposal because it would remove a right the council has.

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski cautioned that by rejecting the proposal, the city could jeopardize

future grants.

Councilmember Perrotta said that rejecting the proposal "reeks of incompetence."

The council, he said, "should not be micromanaging our economic development."

Mayor Karen Majewski said the change will help streamline the city's process in approving zoning proposals.

Despite those concerns, Councilmembers Hassan, Nayeem Choudhury, Fadel Al-Marsoumi and Mohammed Alsomori voted against it.

Mayor Majewski admonished those councilmembers, saying it was "completely irresponsible."

Later in the meeting, councilmembers agreed to redo the vote. and allowed the proposal to move forward to the next step of being considered for adoption.

A lengthy discussion was also held on whether to fill the position of Community and Economic Development and DDA Manager.

The candidate being considered was Alexander Iseri. The position's salary is \$53,000.

Councilmember rotta said he was not "confident" in the candidate because his background was mostly in an

Gerald Wendell Rodgers, 75, died February 15, 2020

in Glendale, AZ.

Gerald was born in Detroit, MI on April 26, 1944 as the eldest son of Levi Henry Rodgers, Jr. and Marie Esters. Gerald three siblings; Norma, Joyce and Glenn, all of whom preceded him in death.

Gerald was a student in the Hamtramck public school system from Holbrook Elementary Hamtramck through High. Afterwards he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was stationed in Anchorage, Alaska during the historic 9.2 earthquake in 1964. At the end of his tour he returned home and found work in the automotive industry working Dodge Main and the Chrysler plant in Hamtramck. He then married Geraldine Yamashita: with this marriage came their daughters, Kimberly and Lynnette. During his years in the automotive industry he became an active union leader creating a better work environment for all.

In 1978 Gerald relocated his family to Palos Verdes, CA and began a new career in the steel industry. While residing in California, he followed his dream of becoming a professional boxing promoter and created Rodgers Promotion Co., which gave him the opportunity to work with the legendary Muhammad Ali. In his later years, Gerald moved back to Detroit, MI and eventually retiring in Phoenix, AZ.

Gerald is survived by his eldest daughter, Kimberly Rodgers-Coughlon; son-in-law Robert Coughlon, Jr.; youngest daughter Lynnette (Rodgers) Roslin; step-daughter Vanessa Juarez; step-son Matthew Marquez; grandchildren, Kristen Rodgers, Kyle Harris, London Bolton, Carrington Bolton; and the newest addition to his family, his first greatgrandchild, Kairo Levi Harris; along with a host of extended family and friends.

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
