City mulls budget options

Hamtramck City Hall could look very different in the coming weeks and months.

No, we're not talking about a physical change to the building.

Instead, it's what you'll see - or not see - by the time the coronavirus pandemic fades away.

There could likely be fewer employees working inside city hall.

Recently, 27 city employees were temporarily laid off - or furloughed. as it is being called - because of the city's shrinking revenues.

Hamtramck is among many municipalities, county governments and state offices that have reduced its work forces.

For some, the furloughs will be temporary – as Hamtramck had originally planned.

But City Manager Kathy Angerer told the city council that there might now be a need to restructure city offices, and to merge work.

The city was already in deficit spending for the current budget year to

the tune of \$1.8 million.

Fortunately, the city had a \$5 million budget surplus. Budgeting for the new fiscal year, which starts July 1, was already going to be a challenge.

"But this COVID emergency changed everything," Angerer told the council.

It now looks like the city will have to dig deeper, possibly over \$1 million, into its surplus.

"We have a revenue problem," Angerer said.

And that includes, because of the statewide work shutdown, a loss in income tax collection (for which the deadline to pay has been pushed to July), a loss of property tax payments, and likely a huge decrease in state revenue sharing.

Even the Hamtramck 31st District Court has seen a dramatic loss in revenue. There have been few traffic fines paid lately because police officers are not issuing tickets in order to limit their contact with the public and possibly become infected with COVID-19, Angerer said.

Angerer said that in times of financial crisis where other cities come down with metaphorical "colds," Hamtramck catches "pneumonia."

Because of the financial crunch, the city will likely cancel this year's ongoing alley repair program, which will save \$285,000.

Angerer came up with several other cuts, but they totaled a paltry \$460,000.

None of the proposed cuts touched the police or fire departments, although the fire chief's position has been reduced to part-time with also a 50-percent pay cut.

One way to help ease the city's financial obligation, Angerer said, is to ask voters to pay an increased millage that will help pay for the cost of police and fire retirees.

The city now levies a half mill for the cost, but that covers only a fraction of that expense.

At Tuesday's council meeting, the council agreed to ask voters to increase that millage to 10.5 mills in the August Primary vote on Aug. 4. The council agreed.

The half mill raised \$103,359 for 2019. If the extra millage is passed, it would raise almost \$2.6 million a year, which would cover the cost of the police and fire retirees' pension.

Angerer is also considering to end funding health costs for retirees who are under the age of 65. The city currently pays those employees \$134 a month.

That move will certainly spur a howl of protest from those retirees, but a court recently ruled that cities are not obligated to pay the health costs for

Angerer stressed that, no matter how unpopular the budget decisions will be. "we need a clear path to our survival."

Hold that thought, because you'll have to wait a bit longer. Last week, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer extended her order for keeping those establishments closed until May 28.


However, the businesses can still continue with their carryout food service.

At this point it's unclear how they would resume operation after May 28, or if the governor will once again extend her shutdown order.

Gov. Whitmer also unveiled a six-phase recovery plan in dealing with the coronavirus. She said the state is currently in the third phase, where the number of COVID-19

Whitmer said she is trying to avoid causing a second wave of infections.

"The worst thing we can do is open up in a way that causes a second wave of infections and death, puts health care workers at further risk, and wipes out all the progress we've made," Whitmer said in a press release.

"That's why we will continue to monitor the spread of this virus, hospital capacity, testing rates, and more as we work toward reaching the 'improving' phase."

As of press time Thursday, the number of COVID-19 cases in Hamtramck was 156, and the number of deaths caused by the disease was 16.

Last week at this time. there were 148 cases, and 15 deaths, so it does appear the spread of the disease has slowed down.



In this day and age, now more than ever, it is important to keep the ground below us and the environment around us as clean as possible.

Long before such health and cleanliness precautions were this vital in the era of the coronavirus pandemic, Tom Derry has been pre-

serving the environment as a groundskeeper.

In hopes of paying respects to famous Tigers broadcaster Ernie Harwell (who had just passed away), Derry planned to play a ball game with some friends that day, but the tattered shape of the once historic field – the grass was tall and hadn't been cut in ages, while the once beautiful landmark was bathed in loose garbage

 had discouraged Derry from even wanting to play.
 Instead, he felt inspired

to restore the grounds to its former glory the best way he could.

He gathered some local friends and started sprucing up the place.

"None of us had any experience with groundskeeping," Derry said, in reference to the group of friends who volunteered to help.

They later dubbed

themselves the Navin Field Grounds Crew, based on the park's original name from 1912. "It was just a passion,

and a desire to preserve baseball history and make a park that everyone could enjoy," Derry said.

Because of his group's efforts, he was able to preserve the historic landmark as a frequent visiting spot for thousands of locals over the

next six years.

What followed were several vintage events, little league games, dog walking, soccer games, picnics and much more on the same grounds that were so appallingly battered before Derry and the other volunteers came along.

Eventually, their commendable efforts grabbed the attention of Hamtramck's very own Tom Niczay, the now retired Hamtramck Public Schools Superintendent.

Soon after the city handed over the land to Detroit PAL organization, an athletic league, Niczay reached out to Derry in need of help to renovate Hamtramck Stadium in Veterans Park.

And so, the Navin Field Grounds Crew became the Hamtramck Stadium Grounds Crew.

Now they continue their grounds crew work, by working with both the City of Hamtramck and the

Councilmember Mohammad Hassan still has ambitions for higher office.

Having just won a seat back onto city council this year – after abandoning the council for a failed attempt to become mayor a few years ago he is now setting his sights on being Wayne County Commissioner.

Within the last year, Scott steered a county grant worth \$50,000 to Hamtramck. It will be used to make improvements to Veterans Park the city's largest park.

An August 4 Primary Election will settle who wins the office. Since there is no Republican challenger, whoever wins the primary will glide into office after the November General Election.

In other election news, Hamtramck 31st District Court Judge Alexis Krot can rest easy. She has no challengers for the six-year term.

Other Hamtramck residents seeking public office include Abraham Aiyash, Shahab Ahmed and Michele Oberholtzer. They are all seeking to become state representative of the 4th District.

All of them are running as Democrats.

That seat had been held by Isaac Robinson, who died recently at age 44. It has been reported that the likely cause of Robinson's death was Covid-19.

There is one lone Republican running for the seat, but the district has long been a Democratic stronghold. Whoever wins the primary election is pretty much guaranteed to win the November election.

Speeding driver crashes into police car and market

A driver sped northbound through a red light Monday afternoon at Jos. Campau and Caniff and crashed into a westbound Detroit patrol car, and then ricocheted through the front of a Jos. Campau market.

There were no apparent serious injuries, and the driver was arrested at the scene.

The police department refused to release information about the accident or driver.

Hamtramck School Boardmember Maggie Srodek told The Review that she witnessed the accident as she was waiting to turn southbound on Jos. Campau at about 1:30 p.m.

Srodek said the driver was going northbound on Jos. Campau "at a highrate of speed" when he hit the front end of the police car, and then careened into the Surma Bazar market, located across from PNC Bank.

The driver managed to get out of the car he was driving, and although he

seemed dazed, Srodek sensed he was going to run awav.

immediately Srodek pulled over after the accident, and first checked on the Detroit officer's condition. That's when she noticed the driver was out of his vehicle and looking like he was about to run.

Srodek, who is licensed to carry a concealed gun, took out her 9mm handgun, and ordered him to hit the ground.

"I was screaming at him to get down on his knees," Srodek said.

On Tuesday, The Review submitted a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the police department for the incident report on the accident.

The city denied the request, saying:

"This case is still under investigation as the HPD is following up with the DPD employee for a statement, the witness is providing a statement, and charges will need to be determined and sent to prosecutor."

The Review appealed the denial. According to attorney Joseph Richotte, **Deputy General Counsel** for the Michigan Press






