Election clock winds down

Hamtramck voters, like voters nationwide, are coming out in droves for Tuesday's election.

Over 5,600 voters have received absentee ballots, and over 3,600 of those ballots have already been returned.

By the looks of things, next Tuesday's presidential election could exceed the turnout in 2016. In that year, over 6,200 local voters participated.

On Tuesday, we could see that number shoot up to 8,000 - which would include those voting by absentee ballot.

And for those who have yet to return their absentee ballot, Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson is warning voters that it is likely too late to rely on the post office to deliver your ballot on time to be counted.

"We are too close to Election Day, and the right to vote is too important, to rely on the postal service to deliver absentee ballots on time," said Benson in a press release, issued ear-

lier this week. "Citizens who already have an absentee ballot should sign the back of the envelope, and hand-deliver it to their city or township clerk's office or ballot drop box as soon as possible. Voters who haven't yet received their ballot should go to their clerk's office to

Besides the presidential

election, Hamtramck voters will be faced with three ballot proposals.

Proposal 1 and 2 ask voters to decide whether to eliminate the language in the city charter that establishes the police and fire departments, and their respective chiefs.

If voters say yes to both, it would then be up to the city council to come up with a way to provide those services.

Advocates of the proposals say that finding an alternative way to provide police and fire services will

Recall organizer says he has enough voter signatures for election



The recall effort against City Councilmember Ian Perrotta has inched forward.

A press release, issued by fellow Councilmember Mohammed Hassan, who is behind the recall, says that he has more than the 1,300 voter signatures needed to get a recall election date scheduled.

However, Hassan said that he will hold off from submitting the signatures until after the Nov. 3 General Election, and during that time will continue to collect more voter signatures.

Hassan is calling for Perrotta's ouster from council, based on the fact that Per-

rotta was twice censured by most of his council col-

took place in 2019 and then again a couple of months ago, accuse Perrotta of inappropriate behavior and the harassing of city employees.

Review emailed the press release to Perrotta for comment, but he did not reply. Instead, he posted the press release on his Facebook page, and said:

"It's a shame that current and former councilmembers put more effort into harassing and trying to get rid of me than they do working to make the city better."

(Perrotta had been a copy editor at The Review until February 2019.)

In Hassan's press release, he included:

"Mr. Perrotta does not represent the diversity of Hamtramck. In fact, if you believe him, the only way any Bangla or Yemeni person is elected is through massive voter fraud. He actually said that at the last city council meeting. Mr. Perrotta gives voice to the darkest corners of American politics, and we have to stand against him."

The next step in the recall process is for the voters on the petition to be verified. If it is deemed that there are enough valid signatures, an election date would be set, which the next one allowed by the state would be in February.

At that point, Perrotta will be in the last year of his term on council.

When the recall was initiated several weeks ago, Perrotta read from a prepared statement at a council meeting and said, in part:

"I'm honestly not worried about the outcome. I know I'm fit for office, and I know I'm a good representative of the city."

He also said that if the recall is successful, it will because of "widespread voter fraud."



City Hall Insider ...

What is our City Council up to these days? We have the highlights of the latest council meeting.

The city council met on Oct. 13, and all councilmembers were present.

Virginia Skrzyniarz, Hamtramck's Complete Count Chairperson, spoke about the city's Census effort, which ended on Oct. 15.

She said the number of households that participated "are not what we like them to be."

Skrzyniarz said it appears only 61 percent of the households returned their Census forms down from 63 percent in 2010 – the last time the Census was held.

During the public comment portion of the meeting, Robert Zwolak complained that the Hamtramck Downtown

Development Authority has been sitting on a \$150,000 budget surplus. He said that the DDA needs to start spending it to promote Hamtramck.

He said that if the DDA refuses to start spending its money, the city may want to think about dissolving the organization.

"When are we going to start to promote Hamtramck outside of Hamtramck?" Zwolak asked.

Later in the meeting, a DDA spokesman defended the agency's spending habit, saying money is being spent responsibly.

Bill Meyer was up next, and started his comment by saying that he would "try to not be controversial" in this meeting.

He said that Jos. Cam-

pau businesses are in a "bad state," and that Yemeni and Bengali businesses need to be invited to join the DDA.

A resident said that he is concerned over two city charter proposals that are on the Nov. 3 ballot. He said he is against creating a public safety department or having the police and fire services contracted out.

The two proposals, if passed, would eliminate the wording in the city charter that establishes both departments, and would allow the city council to decide how to provide those services.

Moving on to new business, a lengthy discussion was held on whether to approve a marketing plan to promote the sale of city-owned lots, to be developed into multidwelling residences.

Alex Iseri, the city's Community and Economic Development Manager (who has since resigned) presented the plan. He said there is a high demand for housing in the city.

A note to the council from the administration gave some background on the plan:

"The City of Hamtramck has not seen voluntary significant residential development in nearly a century. The vast majority of Hamtramck homes were built prior to 1939 (91.4%) and, while this has resulted in generally cheaper homes and lower rents, it has also potentially stifled growth.

"These limitations of Hamtramck's housing stock forces current residents who are interested in purchasing a new home, because their families have grown or just because they have the means to upgrade, to explore other markets, which frequently results in the city losing residents. Losing these residents has a direct impact on the tax revenues of the city, which also directly affects the quality of services that the city can provide.

"A 2019 target market analysis of Hamtramck's housing stock reinforces this interpretation of the city's declining population. The study found that there was sufficient external demand (i.e., demand from non-Hamtramckans) to warrant the construction of at least ten new for-sale homes every year, each worth at least \$160,000.

Teacher grants

Governor Whitmer's administration has announced grants being made available to all eligible Michigan teachers and other educational support staff, if they have worked extra time or incurred other costs due to COVID-19.

The grants are split into two separate programs, the Teacher COVID-19 Grant and the Support Staff COVID-19 Grant.

Eligible teachers can receive up to \$500 from the grant, and support staffers can get \$250.

The governor praised education workers as a whole, noting their "incredible sacrifices," and vowing to "continue working hard" to protect both them and their students.

Senator Dayna Polehanki mentioned "the shift from in-person instruction to remote learning" as being responsible for more time, money and energy commitments from teachers and other staff.

And State Representative Sheryl Kennedy also cited the need of teachers having to "learn a completely new skill set" as they tried to keep students on track, per the national mandates.

If awarded, the grant check would go directly to the teacher or staffer from the state Treasury Department in February of next year.

That increase would allow the city to fully fund the present pension obligation of about \$2 million. The current The most talked about millage pays only a tiny fraction of what the city is obligated to spend.

Obviously, that millage increase is huge, and would likely increase yearly property taxes by a couple of thousand dollars per year for the average homeowner.

All of these proposals appear to have considerable opposition.

So, this may make some wonder, why would city officials even make these proposals?

The answer is simple: the city is going broke. It is currently in deficit spending, and it will soon blow through its budget surplus. In other words, Hamtramck is heading toward yet another financial crisis.

Keep Hamtramck Safe

If that happens, it would likely be the third time in 20 years for city officials to ask the state to step in.

And when city officials do that, state officials are going to ask if they did everything possible to avoid this financial implosion.

And that's why you are seeing these proposals on the ballot.

Mayor's message this week is to still take **COVID** precautions

There was more grim news about the spread of COVID-19 in Hamtramck this week.

In her weekly Monday morning talk with the community via Facebook, Mayor Karen Majewski said that Hamtramck once again had over 50 new cases reported for the week.

It was the same news as from the week prior.

As of Monday's talk with the community, the mayor said that Hamtramck has 837 cases reported for the year, with 27 deaths

780 cases.

Despite the annoyance of wearing masks, maintaining social distancing and limiting our public exposure, Majewski pleaded with the community that "we can't give up

She also noted that employees who come down with COVID have a right to stay home and not be retaliated against by their employer.

This week the mayor spoke for only a little over 10 minutes, and she repeated a number of things she has talked

"When researchers factored in internal demand (i.e., demand from Hamtramckans), the number of units that the market may absorb increases to 30 new for-sale homes, each worth at least \$160,000.

"New construction of this scale would be a boon for the City of Hamtramck, as it would result in much-needed additional revenue. new home and parcel with a true cash value of \$160,000 represents \$4,578.34 in taxes annually; \$1,564.96 of those taxes are received by the City of Hamtramck.

"If all the lots that the city proposes to sell were to be successfully into single and multi-family homes, that would represent at least \$46,948.80 annually. If these homes were to last as long as most Hamtramck homes have (80 years), that could represent as much as \$3.76 million in revenue for the city.

"If these parcels are sold and not developed, the outlook is much less rosy. In this scenario, not only is Hamtramck no closer to meeting the housing demand that is currently responsible for inhibiting growth, but the city receives only a fraction of the additional revenues that it would have if the property had been developed.

"The City of Hamtramck's assessor office estimates the average true cash value of an undeveloped lot as \$10,000, for which the total tax liability would be \$286.11 per parcel. The city would collect \$97.81 in taxes, per parcel.

"The difference in revenue collected by the city would be \$1,467.15 annually, per parcel. Over an 80-year period, this represents a large difference in revenue for the city."

Councilmember Andrea Karpinski said that, while the plan is "nice," there

are residents who wish to purchase city-owned lots next-door to them so they can have a double lot.

She questioned "What is the reality of this happening?" referring to the assumption that there are developers waiting to purchase the lots so that they could build multi-residential dwellings.

She said building more multi-dwelling housing will only contribute to the city's "transient" population, rather than appeal to those who wish to have a single-family house and plant their roots here.

Karpinski and Councilmember Mohammed Hassan were the only two councilmembers to oppose the plan.

Hassan had earlier noted that all proceeds from the sale of city-owned lots have to go toward the city's pension costs - per a prior state requirement, from when Hamtramck was under the control of an emergency manager.
